Manchester Wins Honors In State Rating of Safety

Hartford, July 24.—(Special to Herald)—Manchester won top rating among 14 Connecticut towns which filed inventories with the Connecticut Safety Commission for 1951 covering traffic safety activities. In a letter today to Town Manager Michael Martin complimenting Manchester for its achievement, Director William M. Greene of the Safety Commission stated that Manchester's "rating of 42.5 points out of a possible 700 was highest for any Connecticut town."

The Safety Commission's annual traffic safety report, which is a special tribute to the town's efforts in reducing traffic deaths and injuries, was prepared by the commission's representative and superintendent of the town's traffic safety program, according to the report. The report stated that Manchester was credited with only 27.5 points out of a possible 300 for "traffic fatality experience" during 1951 against a three-year average of 30.5 points.

There were four traffic deaths charged Manchester last year on the Wilbur Cross Highway; two on the 190 and two on the 192.

Manchester was rated third best in the state, according to the report. It was credited with 42.5 points out of a possible 700 for its traffic safety program.

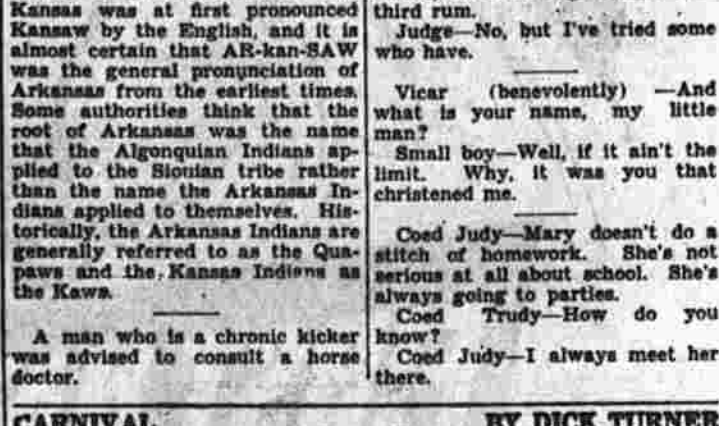
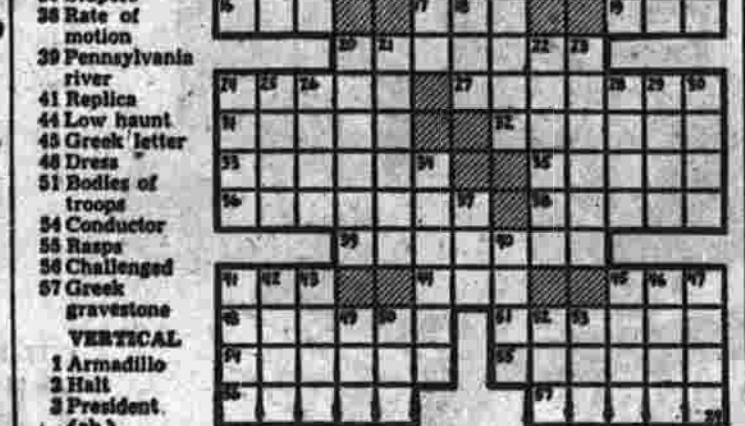

Sense and Nonsense

Many people are puzzled as to why Arkansas is pronounced AR-kans-aw, while Kansas is pronounced KAN-sas. Whether the similarity in these two words is merely accidental or whether they had a common origin is not known for certain. Both are derived through French from Indian words or phrases. The early French explorers, traders and trappers in the Arkansas and Arkansas, variously spelled, to two different tribes, which were of Algonquian and Iroquoian stock and closely related. Some authorities suppose that Kansas signified "war" people and that Arkansas was formed by the French spelling the "kan" for Kansas. If this theory is correct, which is doubtful, the Arkansas literally means "war" people. Originally the name was applied to the Algonquian Indians and was retained in the singular. In French the s was silent and the singular and plural forms were pronounced alike. There is definite evidence that Kansas was at first pronounced Kan-sas by the English, and it is almost certain that AR-kans-aw was the general pronunciation of Arkansas from the earliest times. Some authorities think that the root of Arkansas was the name of the Algonquian Indians applied to themselves. Historically, the Arkansas Indians are generally referred to as the Quapaws and the Kansas Indians as the Kaws.

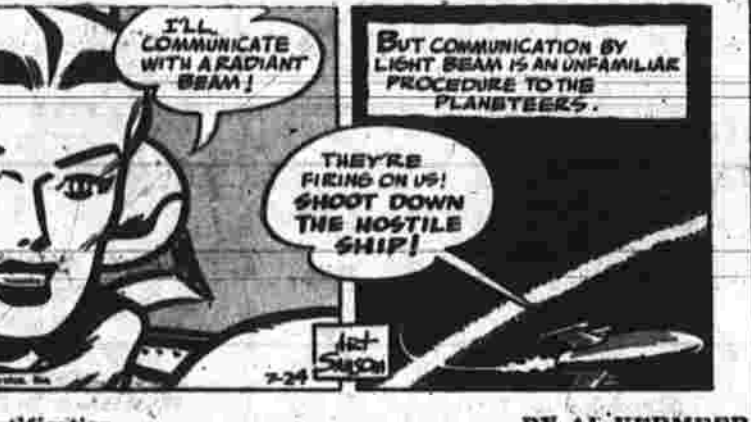
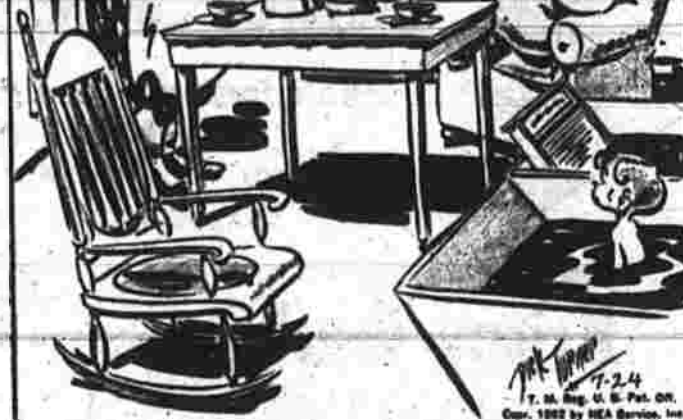
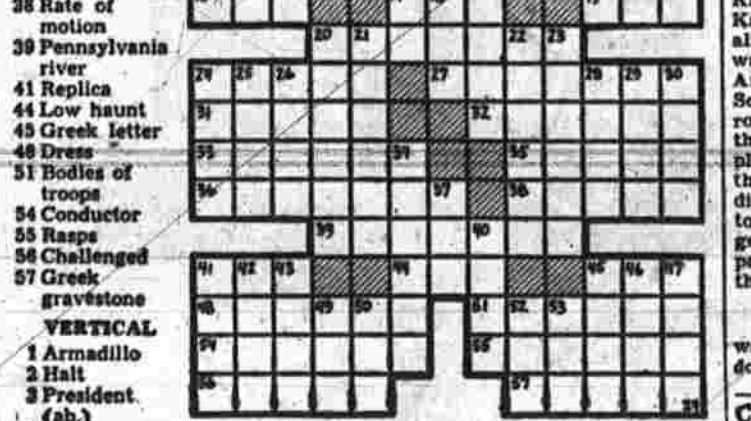

Sense and Nonsense

Many people are puzzled as to why Arkansas is pronounced AR-kan-SAW, while Kansas is pronounced KAN-saw. Whether the similarity in these two words is merely accidental or whether they had a common origin is not known for certain. Both are derived through French from Indian words or phrases. The early French explorers, traders and trappers in the Arkansas region applied the name of the Arkansas river, which were of Siouian linguistic and racial stock and closely related. Some authorities suppose that Kansas signified "wind people" and that Arkansas was formed by the French prefix "arc," "bow" to Kansas. If this theory is correct, which is doubtful, Arkansas literally means "bow wind people." Originally the "s" was added to both words to form plurals. Arkansas and Kansas, and were retained in the singulars. In French the "s" was silent and the singular and plural forms were pronounced alike. There is definite evidence that Kansas was at first pronounced Arkansas by the English, and it is almost certain that AR-kan-SAW was the general pronunciation of Arkansas in the early days. Some authorities think that the root of Arkansas was the name of the Algonquian Indians applied to the Siouian tribe rather than the name of the Arkansas Indians applied to themselves. Historically, the Arkansas Indians are generally referred to as the Quapaw and the Kansas Indians are the Kawa.

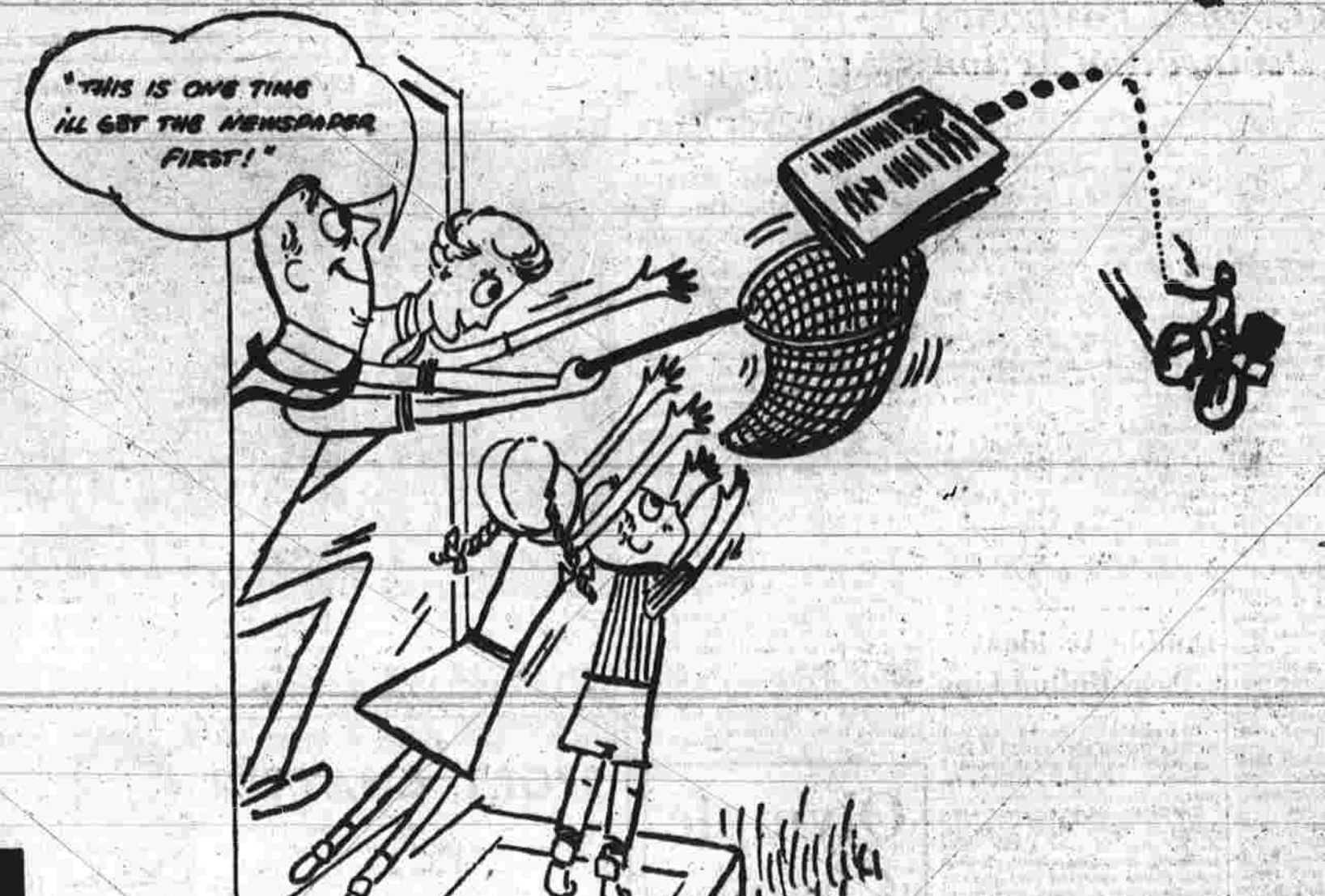
