

















### Town Owns New Alcometer And Money-Back Guarantee

#### Machine Has Been Here Two Weeks but Officials Didn't Report It

The Manchester Police Department has a brand new alcometer, one that carries with it a money-back guarantee.

The presence of the new machine along with the willingness of the company selling it to guarantee it were announced by Judge John B. G. Rotiner yesterday after a closed-door conference of town, court and police officials and a representative of the McAlister-Buckell Co. of New Haven, which sold the alcometer to the town.

It had not been known that Manchester had a new machine until Judge Rotiner's announcement yesterday, and this morning Chief Police Herman G. Schendel said it had been here for a couple of weeks.

The meeting yesterday was held in Chief Schendel's office in the police station at 2 p. m. after a lengthy court session yesterday morning caused the conference to be postponed from 10 a. m. Besides Judge Rotiner and Chief Schendel, Town Council Charles W. Crockett and Robert Schlap of the New Haven distributing company attended the meeting.

It had been decided to decide the fate of the alcometer which had been delivered to the town last summer but never used. The machine was found to be inaccurate and was sent back to the manufacturer for repairs in September. After an almost six months' wait for the machine, Town Council Crockett was directed to communicate with the company, and he requested that the machine be taken back and the \$775 purchase price refunded, arguing that the prolonged delay had damaged its value as a "witness" in court.

Chief Schendel, who had turned the matter over to the town council after the delay in the delivery of the repaired alcometer, has continued to claim that had publicity given the machine in the press because of its need for repairs has seriously damaged its usefulness in producing evidence.

### Herald Publishers Will Attend ANPA

New York, N. Y., April 14.—The Manchester Evening Herald will be represented by Thomas F. and Walter F. Ferguson, co-publishers at the 4th annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers Association to be held in New York City at the Hotel Waldorf Astoria April 21-23.

Rix, Milwaukee, Wis., attorney, past president of the American Bar Association and a member of the Bar Association's Committee on Peace and Law through the United Nations. His subject is "Treaty Law and the Press," tracing the rights, covenants and conventions of the U. S. Constitution and the rights of U. S. citizens.

In order to assist those presiding at the Tuesday sessions a panel of experts have agreed to furnish answers to questions on specialized subjects from the floor of the convention.

### Save Fighting On Korean Front

Pyongyang, North Korea's capital, in the day's biggest strike.

Tough South Korean industry men smashed two Communist attacks against Texas hill in central Korea, focal point of bitter fighting for the past weeks. The ROKA recaptured the strategic Knob-hill, about three miles counter-attack Sunday.

Smash Red Attacks

Other South Koreans killed 66 Communists in smashing a two-prong attack by 150 to 175 Reds on sister outpost north of the Punch-bon on the eastern front. The Eighth Army said the Communist attackers were cut up and driven back in a two-hour battle.

Smaller Chinese units hit American main line positions southwest of Old Baldy on the western front. Both attacks were stopped cold.

Eighth Army headquarters announced that the 8th British Commonwealth division is back on the battle line after 10 weeks in reserve. The division is fighting on the western front.

The Fifth Air Force said Marine Panther jets flattened 10 buildings in a morning attack against a Red supply center five miles south of Seoul in northwest Korea. Ten more buildings were wiped out by Shooting Star jets 10 miles southeast of Haeju on the west coast.

Other fighter bombers swept over Communist front lines, bombing and strafing bunkers, trenches and gun emplacements.

F-84 Sabre jets patrolled MIG alley without sighting a MIG.

The battleship New Jersey, two destroyers and Navy planeslobbered the east coast city of Chongjin in a tremendous sea and air attack Monday.

An entire industrial sector was knocked out and smoke billowed several thousand feet. The whole area was left ablaze. An important result of the day-long attack was destruction of a telephone exchange that was a key link in the enemy's communication net in northeast Korea, the Navy said.

Panther jets from the carrier Philippine Sea struck a group of industrial buildings on the north-east edge of the city and set on two secondary explosions that sprayed burning debris on surrounding buildings. Fanned by a strong wind, the flames spread over a wide section.

The flight leader, Lt. Commander Vernon W. Blair of Riverton, Wyo., said: "We had pretty good luck, everything was airt in the whole area."

South of the city, Corsairs and Skyraiders from the Philippine Sea, led by Lt. Charles Stevens of Meridian, Miss., damaged a moving locomotive, destroyed two box cars and damaged three others.

Lt. John Callow of Clarkboro, N. J., got a direct hit on the smoke stack of an iron trolley with a one-thousand-pound bomb.

group that the Treasury withdraw the bond offer until he has "advised and consulted with the policy-making branch of the government—the Congress."

But he issued a statement saying that inflationary forces are still present and declaring that higher cost to the government, in part of the national debt, will be offset many times over if it enters the cost-and-disinflation of inflation.

### Frozen Water Makes Turkey Put on Weight

Washington, April 14.—Some turkey dealers have been getting 80 cents a pound for water-soaked frozen turkeys.

The practice was discussed in recent testimony before the House Appropriations committee by officials of the Food and Drug Administration.

The lawmakers were told that some dealers have been injecting a pound or two of water into turkeys just before they dropped them into the deep freezer.

The result: Consumers paid the turkey price for nothing more than water.

But the government's food inspectors have been catching up with such unscrupulous operators. Only recently said Deputy Commissioner George F. Larrick, they nabbed a 80,000-pound lot. The case is now in the courts.

Larrick also told how a New York City butter-boogler was unloading Oleomargarine being rolled into a certain factory. But nothing but water ever came out. Agents look up day and night surveilling the suspected operators. Eventually, they found concealed machinery which stripped away oleomargarine wrappers and substituted butter wrappers as the spread was processed.

This case, too, is in the hands of the courts.

**Regional School Discussion  
Receives Varied Reception**

Bolton, April 14.—(Special)—The town meeting form of government, widely held to be the most democratic, was at its New England best at the Community Hall last night. There was relatively little discussion by the 80 townpeople who attended until questions concerning the proposed regional high school were reached.

**Clerk Toomesy Reports**  
The report of Town Clerk David Toomesy on the work of a committee on which he was assisted by Town Treasurer Kenney Hutchinson and Tax Collector Anthony A. Manganga was received with only a few remarks from the floor. An appropriation of \$300 was voted to obtain more technical advice on providing storage for valuable town records.

**F. Weldon Miner, secretary of the tree-town planning committee for the proposed regional high school, reported on the work of the committee to date and explained the necessity for the request of \$910 as Bolton's contribution to the budget of the planners. This was eventually voted with relatively few nay votes.**

**Farm Wins Points**  
Miner reported that the Gardners farm, the only piece of property lying within the boundaries of all three interested towns and the original choice of the site committee, had received 87 points of a possible 94 in a survey by the State Department of Education.

**Six points awarded for municipal water and sewage would not be available for any site in the area. The State Department of Health, however, subsequently found the portion of the property being considered as a building site, unsatisfactory from a drainage viewpoint.**

**Questioned from the floor, Miner stated that although the committee had voted to take an option of the Gardners property, none had ever been executed in view of the Health department's findings.**

**Corrects Error in Figures**  
Paul H. Arnold, chairman of the transportation committee which made its report to the planning committee on Thursday, made an announcement correcting figures given on the cost of bus transportation.

**The report, published in Friday's Herald, gave a figure of 67 cents per mile as the cost of bus transportation in Bolton for the year 1951-52. The figure was based on cost figures prepared by the State Department of Education.**

**Wrong in Hartford**  
Arnold told the meeting that several inquiries had been made on that cost figure since its publication on Friday and as a result, he had checked local figures and found the State Department of Education to be in error.

**The correct cost of bus transportation in Bolton for 1951-52 was 28.1 cents a mile. State figures omitted consideration of 10,000 miles in their computation.**

**There was a lengthy floor discussion on local school problems, perhaps not always on the subject as some pointed out, but a healthy airing of opinion, many observers felt. Appreciation of rising taxes, of economic recession, of a reverse trend in population drift were all expressed.**

**The advisability of staying "with" Manchester, of building Bolton's own secondary school facilities were championed. In spite of the varying opinions, the meeting voted \$910 to cover budget expenses of the planning committee.**
