New 'Supersonic' Vaccine Combats Whooping Cough

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Development of a new and promising 'supersonic' vaccine against whooping cough was reported today.

It was described by a Texas scientist as being at least as effective as the first vaccine — an extract of the bacteria which causes the disease.

The vaccine is 'supersonic' in that it is prepared by disintegrating whooping cough germs with sound waves of high frequency.

Dr. Harriet M. Felton of the University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston, described the new development at a scientific exhibit prepared for the annual meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP).

But 18 out of the 159 in the first group got whooping cough, ranging from severe to mild.

Dr. Kendig said "tuberculous infection in infancy occurs more often than might be suspected and offered this evidence:

Out of a group of approximately 600 children seen at a 'well baby clinic' during a four-year period, 11 percent have acquired tuberculous disease.

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HEART IN SHOCKED Electric shocks to make hearts quit beating for safer and new heart operations were reported today to the American College of Surgeons.

Dogs' hearts have been stopped this way for up to 22 minutes, and the doctor urges universal use of the 'tuberculin test' on all new patients more than a few months of age.

The 'tuberculin test' consists of injecting a small amount of extract derived from dead T.B. germs under the skin of the patient or 'scratch' it on the skin's surface.

Dr. James A. Helmsworth, University of Cincinnati College of Medicine, said the test is done with a special 'patch' technique wherein a small strip of gauze impregnated with the material is applied to the skin.

Provides Easy Method 'Use of the routine tuberculin test between 15 and 18 months of age,' said Dr. Kendig, 'provides an easy and satisfactory method of tuberculosis case finding in this age group.'

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Coventry Mansfield Training School To Hold 'Good Thief' Mass

Coventry, Oct. 7.—(Special)—The Rev. Bernard J. Foster of St. Mary's Church announced today that the "Good Thief Sunday" will be observed for the first time Sunday in the Mansfield Training School and Hospital in Mansfield.

Simultaneously, similar observances will be underway in more than 250 other correctional institutions in at least 40 states of the U. S. and Canada.

The Holy See of the Roman Catholic Church last February granted permission to inaugurate an annual "Good Thief Sunday" in America's penal institutions on the second and Sunday of October.

The Masses in the United States will be held in churches, schools, and other public places.

Prison Masses Encouraged For years, devotion to St. Damas as the Good Thief of Calvary traditionally is known.

The movement to set aside one Sunday a year to honor the Good Thief, who "steal" Heaven in his dying moments, began last year among members of the National Catholic Prison Chaplains' Assn.

At the annual Congress of Correction last October, it was pointed out that the move to establish "Good Thief Sunday" would not only promote devotion to St. Damas but would also point up the important role of religion in social rehabilitation.

Such emphasis is especially important these days, the Congress members pointed out, when so much stress is laid upon the psychological and materialistic aspects of correction.
