The Doctor Says

Primary Cancer Weapon

By EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D. Written for NEA Service For some years April has been designated cancer control month by Presidential proclamation and y act of Congress, This is the time when the American Cancer Society raises funds for its activities in the field of research, education and service. It is a worth-While endeavor.

I do not subscribe to the belief

that people need to be scared to death about cancer to do something about it. In fact, too much fear is to be avoided almost, as much as carelessness in heeding warning signs.
The person who is terribly frightened of cancer at all times should refrain from reading about the disease.

He or she should merely be-

cores informed once and for all about what signs to watch for and pay attention to, and should make a real effort to forget all about it at other times.

There are important things about cancer, however, which everyone should know Surely it should be obvious that no cancer can be treated until the patient has consulted a physician and the physician has made the diagnosis, Early diagnosis is the most im-portant factor. The person who stave away from the doctor in the presence of warning symptoms because he is afraid he will be told that cancer is present is taking a grave risk,-Lumps which appear on the body should always be suspect. Abnormal bleeding from any of the openings of the body is also

always a cause for immediate examination. Loss of weight, which cannot be explained by dieting or other obvious cause, is another thing which should be taken as a reason for consulting a physician. Of course, cancer in some locations is much easier to diagnose than in others. By modern methods of diagnosis, including X-ray, many cases, even those involving the internal organs, can be discov ered early enough so that treat-

ment is satisfactory.

Examination must be complete and careful. Today the facilities for diagnosis and treatment are so much better than in the past that great strides have been made in the conquest of cancer, More progress lies in the future.

She will be much happier if you encourage her to see that a man with a blind mother living in his home has obligations to his moth-er as well as to his wife. The best way for the wife to make a satisfactory adjustment to the situation is to share the hus-band's feeling of responsibility to the mother, instead of fighting against it.
