General Burns

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Father, Son Die For Same Crime

Madisonville, Ky., March 18 (AP)—A father and son died in the electric chair early today—one still insisting he was cheated by the law.

As Roy Terrence, 49, entered the execution chamber at 3:30 p. m., his father, James B. Duke, 70, came to the gallows.

"Lord to bless and keep my wife, 'May God bless you all," he added before the black hood was slipped over his face. He was pronounced dead at 12:13 a. m.

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### Ground Broken at Site For \$5 Million School

#### 125 Brave Snow Storm To Witness Ceremony at Memorial Field as Project Gets Underway

Some 125 persons clustered in a small circle at the north end of Memorial Field today to participate in the historic ground breaking ceremony for the \$5,000,000 high school, the largest project ever undertaken by the town and the largest school in New England.

The town and the M. S. Kellner Co. signed a contract for construction of the school shortly before the 11:30 a. m. ceremony began.

The heavy snow which fell throughout the night celebration added to the stiffness in the 44 feet high walls of the building, the enthusiasm of town officials, all of whom expressed their happiness that the month of planning had culminated in the breaking of ground.

Six life lines were stretched across the ground to lift the "first shovels" of dirt.

They were Raymond S. Goble, chairman of the School Building Committee, Robert Buckley, president of the Board of Education, and Arthur Adams, superintendent of the school. Other officials present were: Mayor Harold A. Turkington, Charles E. Goble, Jr., and Mrs. Anthony M. Marcolli.

At 11:30 a. m. the ceremony was held at the site of the new school building, which will be located on the corner of Main and Elm streets.

The school building will be a four-story structure, 150 feet long and 40 feet wide. It will contain 100 classrooms, 100 lockers, a gymnasium, a cafeteria, a library, a music room, a drama room, a science room, a shop, and a playground.

The school will be completed in 1937 and will cost \$5,000,000.

### Hero of Local Holdup in 1940 Is Dead at 63

At the time, his death he was chief of the Courthouse security force.

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**Regional School Enthusiasm Low**

Hebron, March 18 (Special)—A disappointing small number were present at the meeting of the Regional High School Planning Committee Tuesday evening, only about 30 attending. Plans for many were brought out, one being the increase in participation school enrollment from the three towns concerned, Hebron, Andover and Northford.

At the planned date of opening of the school, 1957, it was estimated that there would be 575 pupils listed. It now seems that by another six years or so from the above date 1,113 pupils will be on hand, but a plan submitted shows how this number can be accommodated by addition to the school building.

Estimated cost of the proposed school building is \$1,280,000, with 22 classrooms, to take care of 800 pupils, grades 7 to 12. This would help relieve the elementary school overcrowding by absorbing the higher grades. **Revision Urged In State Laws On Old Age Aid**

Hartford, March 18 (AP)—Witnesses at a hearing of the Connecticut General Assembly Wednesday generally agreed that the state's old age assistance laws should be revised. The witnesses were urged to make changes in the law.

Commenting specifically on a bill which would create a commission to survey housing and recreational needs of the aged and report its recommendations by the first of next year, Mrs. Driscoll said:

"The biggest problem confronting the aged is the lack of adequate housing. The committee has before it a wide variety of measures affecting the aged. A proposal to pay a \$65-a-month pension to all citizens who attain the age of 65 got little support. Albert Hoover of the State Welfare Department estimated the bill would cost more than five million dollars annually.

Mr. Hoover estimated a proposal to lower the old age pension slightly to \$60 a month would cost \$4 million annually. He said his department favors and would cooperate in a study of the state's old age assistance laws. A measure before the committee proposes such a study by a 10-member commission which would report to the 1957 General Assembly.

Ben Benjamin, L. Barringer (R-New Milford) said he opposes some provisions in the present law which require a person to be "impoverished" before he can collect old age assistance. Barringer said applicants should not be "subjected to a humiliating survey of their finances."

Sen. Paul Amis (D-New Britain) testified in favor of a bill he is sponsoring to establish a form of pilot program in housing for the aged.

**Russia May Cut U.S. Travel in Retaliation Act**

Knofla said today he believed he could build the 10-foot by 10-foot structure within 10 days after construction begins.

Knofla, who was also the apparent low bidder for the remodeling of the Hall of Records, understood two other bidders who submitted prices on the sky-watch project.

The other bidders were William Kanehl, 319 Center St., who asked \$2,337; and W. G. McCall and Sons, 6 Morse Rd., who asked \$2,385.

Knofla's bid was \$215 under the \$2,500 approved by the Board of Public Works Reserve Fund for the project.

Plywood Finish. The skywatch, which will be finished in plywood on the outside and sheetrock on the inside will be 17 1/2 feet high and located on the west side of the roof. A fire escape extension to the roof will permit skid watches to be placed on the roof without going through the police station, and a catwalk will be used to eliminate the need for working on the roof.

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Pushes \$21 Per Student State Grant

Hartford, March 18 (AP)—Republican legislative leaders today rejected Governor Ribicoff's proposed cigarette tax increase, as they came up with a program to hike per pupil state grants.

The new per-pupil figure contrasts with the \$8 increase wanted by the Governor, who said a cigarette tax increase from 2 to 4 cents a pack is needed to finance it.

House Speaker W. Sheffield Cowles, Farmington Republican, announced the GOP position which followed days of deliberation by party leaders.

There is no need to burden the taxpayers with a cigarette and sales tax increase for this purpose," he said.

The Governor recently said he would sign a sales tax raise if approved by the Legislature for educational aid.

The new Republican-drafted program, Cowles said, would give \$21 additional to per pupil aid during the coming two years.

It is also agreed to give greater weight to the increase in the larger enrollment in the larger towns.

Hartford, for example, would have its per pupil aid jumped from \$16 to \$21 per pupil, an increase of 33 per cent.

The Governor's plan would be simple revenue in the budget for this year. It would be a one-time increase.
