How to Get Out in Manchester's 'Operation Exodus'

These are the routes you will use to get out of Manchester and into towns east of here if Hartford should be subject to enemy air attack, according to plan worked out by Civil Defense officials.

No one in Manchester will be able to get onto the Wilbur Cross Highway, however, because that avenue is being reserved for the exodus from Hartford, which CD officials are assuming will be a main target.

The plan is to get Manchester residents and whoever else might be here at the time of the attack, out of the town, most of which is within eight miles of "Ground Zero," and into

Hebron, Bolton, Vernon, Tolland, Andover, Columbia, and Coventry, all areas where vehicles will be stopped and stored. The first vehicles out will be the ones directed the farthest away.

In tomorrow's edition, The Herald will publish a map showing the vehicle storage areas in those outlying towns.

District Plans Open House At Sewage Treatment Plant

Reclect Six Officials: Advance Parties Voters Lay 2 1/2 Mill Tax Rate, Buy Land Leave for Camp

Voters of the Eighth School and District last night were invited to attend an open house at the District's sewage treatment plant, where some 300,000 was recently spent on improvements. The invitation for Wednesday night at 8:30 was extended by Ray Warren, president of the District, during the District's annual meeting at the Hollister Street School. "An invitation to a sewage treatment plant might not sound attractive," Warren acknowledged, "but we'll show you how the plant operates and show you just what your tax dollars bought."

The improvements the tax dollars bought at the plant, located off Hilliard St. near the railroad bridge over the Housatonic, are to permit drying 15 months a year, a digester tank hood to collect sewer gas that in turn is burned to heat sewage in the tank and keep it at a uniform temperature; an agitator to keep the sediment and prevent a crust from forming; and a shaft to chew up rags and paper, and keep out stones, metal and other foreign materials.

The District's Board of Directors and the plant's workers will serve as hosts for the occasion, Warren said. Warren issued his invitation in connection with a notice of the fact that the District would eventually be called on to build a secondary sewage-treatment plant.

This would be in line with the State's anti-pollution drive, the aim of which is to clean up all the streams and rivers in the State. The town is faced with the problem of building a primary sewage-treatment plant as well as a secondary plant.

Some 50 voters who turned out for the meeting authorized the laying of a 2 1/2 mill tax rate, the same rate paid by the District for the past several years.

Warren, who during the meeting was elected to his 10th term as president, said he regarded as "noteworthy" the ability of the District's Board of Directors to hold the tax-rate line in view of the money spent on capital improvements.

But, he warned the meeting, "more money will be needed for the secondary treatment plant," and other matters last night, the voters selected, without a contest, five District officials besides Warren and authorized the purchase of some six acres of land on N. Main St.

The land, now owned by Cheney Bros., is needed for the expansion of sewer facilities. It will cost the District \$7,000. Predicted with Warren last night were Directors Leon Thorp and Ernie Larsen, for 3-year terms; Joseph Vola, clerk; Walter Leachy, tax collector; and Howard Kenney, treasurer.

The voters also authorized the payment of annual salaries in the amount of \$500 for the president, \$600 for the clerk and \$600 for the treasurer. These officials and the tax collector are elected for 1-year terms.

Also authorized last night was the designation of the Manchester Trust Co. and the First National Bank of Manchester as depositories for the District's funds, as well as the setting of \$20,000 limit on borrowing by the District officers.

State Capitol, Hartford, June 24 (AP)—The Senate and House became deadlocked today on the question of how much money should be provided for state vocational schools.

The differences were brought to a head as the Senate amended a House bill to provide for schools in Hartford and Danbury.

As amended by the House yesterday, the bill authorized a \$7,034,000 bond issue. The Senate vote that figure to \$12,917,000 to provide \$4,700,000 for Hartford, \$480,000 for Danbury and \$1,000,000 for New Britain.

The New Britain item previously had been approved by the Senate in a separate bill, but for was decided to lump it in with the other vocational schools in a single overall bill.

Dules Tells Molotov Soviet Observance Of UN Aims Only Way to End Cold War

State Capitol, Hartford, June 24 (AP)—The Senate and House became deadlocked today on the question of how much money should be provided for state vocational schools.

The differences were brought to a head as the Senate amended a House bill to provide for schools in Hartford and Danbury.

As amended by the House yesterday, the bill authorized a \$7,034,000 bond issue. The Senate vote that figure to \$12,917,000 to provide \$4,700,000 for Hartford, \$480,000 for Danbury and \$1,000,000 for New Britain.

The New Britain item previously had been approved by the Senate in a separate bill, but for was decided to lump it in with the other vocational schools in a single overall bill.

Senate Democratic Leader Joseph E. Longo expressed the hope that a conference committee would be able to iron out the differences before the end of the special session.

Sen. Newman M. Marzulli (R-Trumbull), in opposing the Senate amendment, said that the legislative already has authorized borrowing of \$45 to \$60 million.

With the expected close of the special session only quickly approved an administration request to increase the national debt limit to \$281 billion for another year.

Attacks Seven Point Russian Peace Plan

San Francisco, June 24 (AP)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told Russia in blunt language today: "The way to end the Cold War is to stop using force against other countries and to stop supporting subversion."

In a stinging attack on Communism, Dulles declared: "To bring the Cold War to an end, seven points are not needed; this one is sufficient."

The Secretary spoke at a U.N.'s 10th anniversary meeting, which Wednesday heard Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov propose a seven-point program to liquidate the Cold War.

Dulles spoke with President Eisenhower's confidence and concurrence. The President had said so on Monday when he addressed the evening session. He told the delegates the Secretary would speak today "on appropriate elements in the foreign policy of the United States."

Reviews Communism Role Dulles pulled no punches as he reviewed the role of Communism in recent history. He agreed with Molotov that some problems had been settled recently, but he said they would have to be settled earlier except for the Communists.

"We do not forget," he said, "we dare not forget, that some of those who now hail the recent decisions strongly in favor of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and other organizations which do not belong into the armed services.
