By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER Washington, June 4 (/P)-The late Joseph Stalin was ac cused by one of his successors, in a speech disclosed here to day, of planning a murderous new purge of some of the highest officials of Soviet Russia at the time of his death.

The charge immediately stirred speculation among Amer can officials that Stalin may have been murdered to preven

him from carrying out his alleged purpose. Stalin's death March 5, 1953 was attributed to natural causes in Russian reports, and there was little inclination at

The accusation against Stalin, including the charge that he was preparing to wipe out some time Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and Politburo member A. 



Incredible! Perhaps your teen-ager is not one of the many undernourished boys and girls in this country, but consider these facts: in this land of plenty, teen-age malnutrition is nationwide. Studies of more than 59,000 boys and girls in 38 states, revealed that about one fourth of them had diets that met the recommended allowances of the National Research Council for good nutrition. Doctors, nutritionists and teachers indicate there are several factors to blame for the poor teen-age eating habits: (1) lack of parental direction or discipline (2) lack of dietary knowledge; (3) good economic conditions allow teem-agers to have more spending money. Teen-agers, when left on their own, often select food containing empty calories, (observe them at a drug store fountain or cafeteria) it fills them up. and kills their appetite for wholesome meals. Many are breakfast snatchers, starting the day off with no nourishment. This is in imitation of their parents who grab a scanty breakfast and run. There are no amenities at meal time which are essential to good digestion. The food habits of the girls are particularly alarming. One fourth of the mothers bearing a first child are under 20 years old. Many of them develop childbirth complications as a result of teen-age

Milk is the basic diet around which the whole program of nutrition is built. It is nature's most nearly complete food. At least four glasses daily should be con-sumed as a drink or in food. (Cheese and ice cream contain the excellent food values of milk). Three or more servings of meat, cheese, fish or poultry are needed every day, including at least one egg daily; two servings of vegetables (one should be green or yellow) other than potatoes a day; two or more servings of fruit or 8 ounces of fruit juice is needed (one serving should be a citrus fruit); three servings of whole grain or enriched bread with two tablespoons of butter are essential every day. These seven basic foods are required for proper growth and for main-tenance of good health. How do you and your teenagers rate? Remember, the balanced diet is more economical than the poor diet!
