## Britain Cuts Taxes on Gas, Movies, Household Goods

### New Budget Also Trims Income Tax

London, April 9 (AP)—Britain's Conservative government announced today a cut of 100 million pounds in the taxes Britons pay for entertainment, gasoline and some household goods. But the tax for owning a TV set went up.

The cut, equivalent to \$280 million, was disclosed in the House of Commons by Peter Thorneycroft, chancellor of the Exchequer, in outlining the new budget.

The reduction included a cut in income taxes, mostly in the higher brackets. Most of the relief went to those earning from 2,000 pounds to 4,000 pounds (\$5,000 to \$11,200) a year. The average wage in Britain is equivalent to about \$1,650 a year.

Britain's tax burden is generally recognized as the highest in the free world, and Thorneycroft's message was greeted with cheers from Conservative benches.

Some Grounds for Joy  
He declared there was some grounds for cheerfulness in the country's economic outlook, but he stressed that emphasis must remain on exports at the expense of belt tightening at home.

"Against the background of a budget nearly balanced, I can make a reduction in the burden of taxation by around 100 million pounds," Thorneycroft said.

Before getting into the details, he told the Commons the Suez crisis "affected our commercial position less than might have been expected." The Middle East has always been a key to the British economy—with the Suez Canal as a lifeline.

First tax relief went to Britain's entertainment industry—especially theaters and movies—which has been affected adversely by television. The entertainment tax has totaled one-third of all receipts.

Thorneycroft abolished the tax on tickets to state theaters, which have been hard hit, and slashed the taxes on movie tickets by an estimated 6½ million pounds a year.

All taxes were lifted from tickets to sports events.

**DENY RIGHTS BILL DEAL**  
Washington, April 9 (AP)—Two Republican congressional leaders said at the White House today there has been no "deal" to delay action on the administration's civil rights program. Sen. Charles McNamara, California, and House GOP chief Martin Dies said they would continue to work with President Eisenhower.

**MALLORY TO QUIT DANBURY**  
Danbury, Conn., April 9 (AP)—A spokesman for the John E. Stetson Co. said today that Mallory Hays, a Stetson Division executive, will move his finishing operations to Philadelphia. The move will take place some time this spring, leaving about 160 to 200 of the present 500 Mallory workers at the plant here to "make hat bodies."

**WHE TO TEST COPTERS**  
Washington, April 9 (AP)—The much-discussed White House helicopters will be used to "evacuate" President Eisenhower in an emergency test drill in June, press secretary James C. Hagerly announced today. Hagerly said, however, that there is a possibility the President may make some use of the aircraft even earlier. He did not say when or how.

**'HOT CARGO' CLAUSE HIT**  
Washington, April 9 (AP)—An examiner recommended today that the Interstate Commerce Commission move to cancel operating permits of truck lines refusing to handle freight labeled "hot cargo" by the Teamsters' union. In "hot cargo" clauses, incorporated in most Teamsters' union labor contracts, employers agree their workers may refuse to handle goods held by the union to be "unfair" or "hot."

**JET STREAM STALLS TEST**  
White Sands Proving Ground, N. M., April 9 (AP)—A jet stream of nearly 150 miles an hour robbed project Vanguard scientists of the opportunity of studying Earth satellite instruments early today. An Aerobee III rocket, aimed at testing both the instrument and the long-planned Earth satellite and a single stage work altitude record, was kept on the ground by winds.

### Culombe's Kin Threatened by Joe Taborsky

Hartford, April 9 (AP)—A lawyer for one of two men police say have confessed to a number of fatal holdups claimed today that one of the men, Joseph Taborsky, once threatened to kill the wife and children of the other, Arthur Culombe. Both are 33-year-old ex-convicts.

This accusation was made in Superior Court today by Atty. Thomas F. McDonough, the special public defender appointed by the court to represent Culombe at his forthcoming murder trial.

It came about in the course of a hearing before Judge James C. Shannon, on a motion by Atty. Wallace R. Burke. Taborsky's special public defender, for a separate trial.

Trial Set April 23  
Unless the judge grants the motion, Taborsky and Culombe are scheduled to go on trial together April 23 before Judge Shannon and a jury.

Burke, in support of his motion, stated that Culombe's defense would be antagonistic to Taborsky's.

State's Atty. Albert S. Bill, who opposed the motion for a separate trial, said that such a statement should come from Culombe's counsel and not through Burke.

The judge turned at this point and looked quizzically at McDonough, who had taken no part in the proceedings up to this time. McDonough rose to his feet.

"I believe the defense of Culombe will be antagonistic to Taborsky's," he said. Then he sat down again. Bill pressed forward with information. He told Judge Shannon

### Reuther Holds Full Control at UAW Sessions

Atlantic City, N. J., April 9 (AP)—Walter P. Reuther appeared today to be in firm control of the United Auto Workers convention after winning his following approval of everything he has proposed so far.

But the UAW president may encounter some opposition from an minority faction fighting his proposal to increase basic union dues of \$2.50 to \$3 a month.

The opposition developed last night at an anti-Reuther caucus led by Carl Stellato, president of the 44,000-member Ford Rouge Plant in the Detroit area.

A longtime critic of Reuther, Stellato urged his followers to maneuver for a roll call when the dues question comes up, for a vote. But he said that would take 800 of the convention's 3,300 delegates and he wasn't over-optimistic about it.

Stellato said he opposed the dues increase "because none of it is going to the strike fund." He said the UAW's present \$23 million strike fund should be increased to at least \$100 million.

Reuther had everything his own way yesterday.

An estimated 97 per cent of the delegates approved his plan setting up a public review board to act as a watchdog on union officials' practices. The board, made up of seven prominent citizens outside the union, also will share the authority with the convention as the ultimate appeal body for grievances of union members.

The convention accepted almost unanimously the selections of the union's executive board. Named on the review board were Mgr. George Higgins of Washington, D.C.; Rabbi Morris Adler of Detroit; Methodist Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam of Washington, D.C.; Clark Kerr of the University of California; Dr. Edwin White of the University of Wisconsin; and Circuit Judge Wade H. McCree of Detroit. (Reuther said President Eisenhower's brother, Dr. Milton Eisenhower, turned down an invitation to serve on the board because "of the pressure of many

### Ike Plans Parley on Aid Funds

Washington, April 9 (AP)—President Eisenhower plans to discuss details of the administration's \$4,400,000 foreign aid program with Congressional leaders of both parties after the Easter recess.

This was announced at the White House today by Republican Congressional chiefs after their regular weekly meeting with Eisenhower.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Senate GOP leader, noted that Secretary of State Dulles gave a special Senate Committee a broad outline of the administration's foreign aid plans yesterday.

The President, Knowland said, wants to meet with the leaders of both parties to provide greater detail. Knowland added that such a conference will be held after the lawmakers return from an Easter recess scheduled to start April 18.

Dulles' presentation got a generally favorable reception from the lawmakers, but Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said he would oppose any new program that might lead to a "perpetuity of spending abroad."

A number of other Senators, including Fulbright (D-Ark.) and Capehart (R-Ind.) applauded, however, a proposal to set up a fund to provide loans for economic development abroad and put all foreign aid on a long-range basis.

A major point in the new approach, as it was outlined yesterday by Secretary of State Dulles, is a lending program he said might reach as high as \$750 million annually in the years ahead.

Tied in with this is the recommendation that funds for economic assistance be separated from appropriations for military arms aid and defense support for countries with which the United States has military defense agreements. The arms aid would be included in the appropriations bill for the Defense Department.

Fulbright, told interviewers that authorization of these military aid and defense support funds should be placed under the jurisdiction of the Armed Services Committee.

That, he said, would put foreign economic assistance "in its proper perspective."

Fulbright, who is leading off spending to help count off a strengthening their economies and in technical assistance will look pretty small when separated from foreign military spending," he said.

Fulbright said he favored an economic development fund patterned after the depression-born Reconstruction Finance Corp. (RFC), with Congress appropriating sufficient money to get the fund going and replenishing it.

### Blaze Traps Waitress As She Calls Firemen

Old Lyme, April 9 (AP)—A waitress, trapped by flames in a telephone booth as she called the fire department, was burned critically early today when a fast-spreading fire swept a Lakeside Inn here.

Miss Helen Murray, 25, who lives at the inn, was pulled from the flaming, two-story wooden building by Fire Chief Everett Burke, who lives two houses away.

"At Lawrence Memorial Hospital in nearby New London she was reported in 'very, very poor' condition, suffering second and third degree burns on her face and body. A hospital spokesman said she also may have a head injury.

Three men, including the owner, escaped from the building—one with a severely burned hand. They said the fire spread so fast they were groggy and dazed when they got out. They went back into the building in an effort to locate Miss Murray, who they thought had escaped.

Firemen said the blaze started in the furnace room.

### Marines Oust Lieutenant for Hitting Recruit

Parris Island, S. C., April 9 (AP)—First Lt. William D. Conroy today was sentenced to a dishonorable dismissal from the Marine Corps today by a 7-man general court-martial.

Conroy pleaded guilty to charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman. The charge stemmed from an assault March 12 on Pvt. David L. Porter. The court deliberated for 30 minutes before passing sentence.

The sentence is subject to review by Brig. Gen. Wallace M. Greene, the court-martial's convening authority. It then is subject to review by the Naval judge advocate general.

Both of these reviewing authorities can lessen the sentence. They can not increase it.

Conroy will remain on active duty until the review is completed.

Three of Conroy's fellow officers testified in his behalf. They were Maj. Walter L. Williams, Boston Mass.; Capt. J. H. Dunn, 4228 S. Conklin, Spokane, Wash.; and Capt. Alfred Reute, 67 Elmwood Rd., Verona, N. J.

They agreed unanimously that Conroy's "loyalty to the corps" was above reproach and that the offense to which he pleaded guilty was, in the words of one, "an unfortunate occurrence."

This was another in a continuing series of maltreatment trials which began after six men drowned a year ago last night on a disciplinary march into a tidal creek here.

### Probers Hunt Reds In Field of Music

New York, April 9 (AP)—Internal Security probers today launched a congressional inquiry into communism in music, and the opening moments were highlighted by a hearing room drama.

Testimony of the first witness, a woman, was halted temporarily while the second witness, a man, told of having known her as a Communist.

First to take the stand before a subcommittee of the House Committee on un-American Activities was Lily Popper, director of the Metropolitan Music School in Manhattan.

She repeatedly declined, under protection of the First and Fifth Amendments to the Constitution, to say whether she ever had been a Red or answer other questions concerning communists she might have known.

The subcommittee then had her leave the stand temporarily and

### Reds Oust Aide of U.S. In Hungary

Budapest, April 9 (AP)—Communist Hungary today accused Capt. Thomas R. Gleason, assistant U.S. military attaché, of "open espionage" and gave him 48 hours to leave the country.

A spokesman for the U.S. legation said that the charges against Gleason do not constitute espionage under international custom and usage, and were "largely inaccurate."

In Washington, a spokesman said the State Department had not been informed of the ouster order against Gleason. In normal diplomatic practice, the United States would have no choice other than to get Gleason out of Hungary at once.

U.S. May Retaliate  
There was at least a possibility that the United States would retaliate by ousting a Hungarian diplomat. That kind of counter action has been taken many times in recent years by the U.S. government. However, it is by no means an automatic step.

Gleason, 31, Montclair, N.J., U.S. military attaché, 3221 E. 8th St., Tulsa, Okla., was stopped in a Hungarian country road last Wednesday and questioned for more than five hours. They were accused of photographing a Russian-occupied barracks. Gleason had no comment today, but previously both he and Todd denied they were taking pictures of the barracks.

### Egypt Opens Canal to Ships Of Larger Size

Cairo, April 9 (AP)—The two biggest tankers to use the Suez Canal since it was blocked last November entered the waterway at Port Said today—the first day the cleared channel was opened to ships of up to 20,000 tons.

One was the 19,418-ton Belgian tanker Elizabeth, the other the 20,766-ton Italian Fina Canada. They were bound for Middle East ports to pick up oil. Four other smaller ships were in the southbound convoy.

The first passenger vessel to move through the canal since the British, French, Israeli invasion was due at Port Said later today to begin the 103-mile trip south to Suez. The ship is the 12,839-ton Italian liner Oceania, headed for Australia with 499 passengers.

While whistles shrieked and hundreds of persons watched from the banks, U.N. salvage crews raised and towed away the sunken Egyptian frigate Abukir yesterday. That cleared the channel for all shipping adapted to its 34-foot depth.

The Egyptian Suez Canal Authority followed with an announcement that the canal would be open today for ships of 20,000 tons with a draft of 26½ feet.

The authority gave no indication when a capacity operation would be resumed. Before the

### British Doctor Free Of Murder Charges

London, April 9 (AP)—Dr. John Bodkin Adams was acquitted in his defense, Mrs. Morrell's body was cremated, and the verdict hinged largely on the conflicting testimony of medical experts for the prosecution and defense.

The prosecution experts said the doctor's intent could only have been to end Mrs. Morrell's life. A medical expert for the defense claimed the treatment was not unusual in such cases—the widow had suffered a stroke two years before—and that the treatment was intended only to ease her pain.

The Attorney General said the charges against Mrs. Morrell's death last summer of Mrs. Gertrude Hullett four months after her husband, a 71-year-old millionaire, died in Eastbourne.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Hullett were patients of Dr. Adams. Her death was officially recorded as suicide from an overdose of drugs, but during the preliminary hearing that led to Dr. Adams' indictment in the Morrell case, the prosecution had blamed the doctor for the deaths of both Mrs. Hullett and her husband.

"I have reached the conclusion," the Attorney General said, "in all the circumstances and in the public interest it does not require Dr. Adams to undergo the ordeal of a further charge of murder."

Mrs. Hullett left Dr. Adams another Rolls Royce in her will.

The doctor still is accused of certifying, when he obtained permission for Mrs. Morrell's cremation, that he knew of no financial gain according to him from her death.

In summing up the testimony in the trial, Justice Sir Patrick Atkinson told the jury it was up to it to decide between the conflicting testimony of the medical experts.

Justice Devlin in his charge cited the conflicting medical evidence and told the jury:

"You convict of murder only if the witness in the witness box can clearly supply the evidence to the

### French Honor British Queen On Paris Visit

Paris, April 9 (AP)—Looking a bit tired from her strenuous arrival day, Queen Elizabeth II was driven through crowded streets today to pay her respects to the 2,000-year-old city of Paris.

In fluent French broadcast throughout the nation, the 37-year-old British monarch told an applauding audience at the Hotel de Ville (the city hall) "Your capital is a home away from home toward which, at each new generation, the United Kingdom has sent its elite, attracted by the radiance of your science, spirit, and good taste."

Elizabeth, who is visibly moved when she was presented flowers by a small French boy and girl, chosen because they were born on the same day as her two children, Prince Charles and Princess Anne, presented Elizabeth with a miniature Paris subway train for Charles and a set of dolls for Anne.
