Last night's audience at the performance of Handel's "Messiah" learned the agony of not being able to applaud. Several times during the performance, especially after the chorus sang the "Hallelujah" chorus, an audible sigh swept the level-up audience which had no way of going vent to their feelings.

The general quality of the entire performance was very good, with a few exceptions.

There were moments when the quality was more than very good. It was superb when Mrs. Harbrecht, the lyric soprano, and John McCurdy, bass, sang the "Amen" chorale. # National Officials Laud Religious Safety Pleas

Hartford, Dec. 16 (AP)—The results of a study of Connecticut's first religious traffic safety weekend were hailed today by state and national officials.

He said the Connecticut observance was watched by safety officials from other states.

Steve Shandley, executive director of the State Safety Council, said "The cooperation and enthusiasm of clergy men of all faiths was most gratifying."

Gov. Ribicoff, who proclaimed the observance, attended services at his own synagogue, Temple Beth Israel of West Hartford. He heard a highway safety sermon preached by Rabbi Abraham J. Feldman, spiritual leader of the temple.

The Governor said that he too was gratified by the widespread acceptance of the safety theme by religious groups.

"When all our people realize the moral responsibility to save the lives and health of our fellowmen," he concluded, "we will have made a great step toward safety."

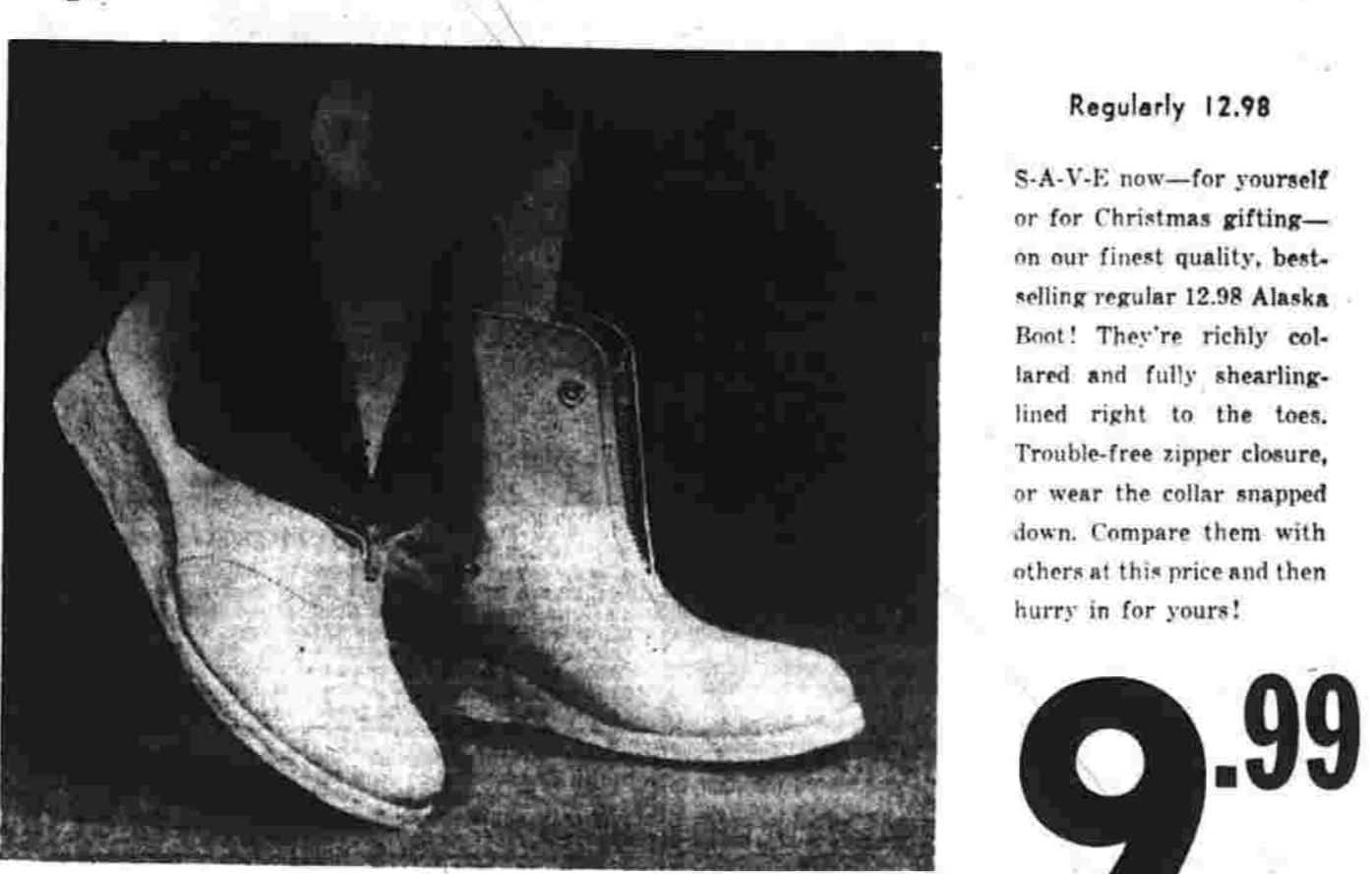

members of Parliament. They will sit with 123 others chosen by the ruling military junta which occupied Thailand last year as premier. The junta ordered new elections after it took over.

Premier Pote Sarasin, who continued Phibun's pro-western policies, will be replaced in two weeks.

The Democrats' landslide in the capital struck hard at Leftists and pro-Communists, who have received editorial support in the past year from most of Bangkok's anti-American press. Leftist candidates look less than 10,000 votes in first returns.

But the Democrats were uncertain of winning nationally. The Leftwing Economic party is strong in the northeast part of the country and the moderate Left-Center Unionist party candidates are heavy votes in the northern and southern regions.

Eighteen parties and 813 candidates sought seats in Parliament. Democrat strength in the capital comes in large measure from the Royalists and anti-Communist Intellectuals. Farmer discontent was expected to help the Economic and Unionist parties outside Bangkok.

Khuang, who has been premier three times, said he would not participate in a coalition government. He said if the Democrats win, he wants to choose his own cabinet and policies.

### The Harwell Triumph

Over the past few weeks, there have been reports that British scientists at Harwell have cracked the secret of how to harness the power of the hydrogen bomb for peaceful purposes. It is true, it means they have secured a scientific achievement which Sputniks I and II and all those that will follow pale into insignificance.

It means that man now has the means to virtually eliminate poverty and hunger on his planet. It means that through the atomic process, he can use water to produce all his power needs. It means that he can use the energy of the atom to produce the achievement, former British Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, Anthony Nutting, has called the Harwell triumph, says, "It is as if all the rivers and the oceans of the world were suddenly filled with oil and gasoline."

It might be assumed that the West would be shouting about this success from the housetops of this world as a counterweight to Russian propaganda which Sputniks I and II have so effectively evaded on the subject in both London and Washington.

All the British government will say is that there is "no reason to believe that we are leading the world in the experiments we are conducting." And, when United States officials are questioned on whether the British are ahead of us in this field, the answer is invariably "No," that the British tell us everything they are doing and that, therefore, they cannot be ahead of us.

The first reaction to this sort of talk is the assumption that the administration in Washington has put a muzzle on Britain. It is already being speculated that the administration has been made so sensitive by criticism resulting from Russian successes in space satellites and missiles that it could not bear to have it announced that the vaunted American scientific knowledge has placed second again, even if the winner this time is a friend and ally.

If this were true, the administration would be guilty of not only childishness but monumental stupidity. However, another explanation has been advanced for the reticence being practiced by both Washington and London, and that is both more charitable and, at the same time, more logical. This view has it that the administration is holding back the news of the achievement in reserve against the day when it asks Congress to relax our laws in order to facilitate the exchange of nuclear information with our allies.

If London and Washington can launch a full-scale propaganda campaign announcing the Harwell triumph at the same time Congress is being requested to ease the security statutes, there will presumably be fewer members of that body asking what there is in it that we can learn from our allies that we don't already know.

However, it is to be hoped that the news of the achievement is not held up very much longer. A world made both dizzy and fearful by news of missiles and anti-missile missiles would welcome announcement of a scientific development that promises to enrich us all instead of threatening 16 wives us all out.

### A Way Out For France

The mounting internal and external pressures on France to accept something less than unconditional surrender as a basis for ending the Algerian war appear to be taking effect.

Evidence of this can be found in the United Nations resolution on Algeria, which was adopted 80-0 on Tuesday. Although a watershed voting of what the Arab-African bloc wanted and got, in any case, legally binding on anybody,

### Open Forum

To the Editor,  
It is common knowledge that some P.T.A.s have passed a resolution to approve fluoridation when there was not even a quorum present at a meeting. One way of obtaining endorsements for fluoridation has been by the use of political pressure. Another way is for a speaker to go to one of the club officers after delivering a "pitch" for it and ask for a signature to be entered into that will lead to a solution of the problem. Last February, the General Assembly resolution merely expressed the hope that "in a spirit of cooperation, a peaceful democratic and just solution will be found through appropriate means, in conformity with the principles of the United Nations Charter."

Two years ago when the issue first was brought before the UN, the General Assembly didn't even pass a resolution. At that time the argument that Algeria was a part of metropolitan France and that the conflict there was merely an internal dispute, was still fresh. Furthermore, France still had hopes of a quick military victory as a result. France walked out of the Assembly, and the issue was taken off the agenda.

But much has happened since 1955, even since last February. The war, which has dragged on longer than the French had expected, has caused severe economic dislocations at home. It has, furthermore, practically drained Europe of her reserves of gold and dollars to the NATO armed forces. This, discounting at home and growing anxieties among her NATO allies who would like to see the 500,000-man French army returned from North Africa and retrained by the United States, has forced France toward a search for a way out of the Algerian war.

And the end result, as indicated by the UN resolution, may be provided by Tunisia and Morocco. French President Gaillard has rejected the offer of those countries to use their good offices—but not unequivocally. He has said he would accept their assistance if no political conditions were attached. And there are reports that a recent cease-fire without conditions would not end the Algerian problem. The Algerians would still want their independence and Paris would still need French supplies in some form. But at least the more than three years of bloodletting would be ended.

### East-West Exchanges

Almost surreptitiously, it seems, almost as though the two countries were embarrassed by it, the United States and Russia are engaged in a program that can be mutually beneficial and who knows?—even strengthen the cause of peace.

The program is one of cultural and scientific exchanges. It is not a formal program—not yet, anyway—and it has not been getting much attention. Only a few changes with a particularly good news angle get any real publicity. An example is the proposed exchange of eight Russian and American education specialists, arrangements for which are all but complete. This development becomes newsworthy, of course, because of the Soviet Sputniks. Ever since Sputnik I began orbiting in space, the criticism of education in this country has been matched in intensity only by the admiration expressed for Russian education, particularly in the fields of science and mathematics.

The proposed exchange is a government-sponsored project, with the American end of it being handled by the Office of Education, and the Russian end by the Ministry of Education and Welfare. And it will undoubtedly prove rewarding. For despite the acres of newspaper devoted to Soviet education in this country, our first-hand knowledge of that subject is very limited. We have the word of Secretary of Education Folson for that.

However, the other, less publicized exchanges were undoubtedly beneficial too. Only recently Dr. Paul Dudley White, the president's heart specialist, and several colleagues went to Russia to survey aspects of medical science there. Now, that visit is being repaid by a group of Russian doctors, some of whom are living in Dr. White's house in Boston.

**Quake Kills 952 in Iran**

Tehran, Iran, Dec. 16 (AP)—The government announced today that 952 people were killed and 1,000 bodies in the wreckage left by earthquakes which rocked West Iran.
