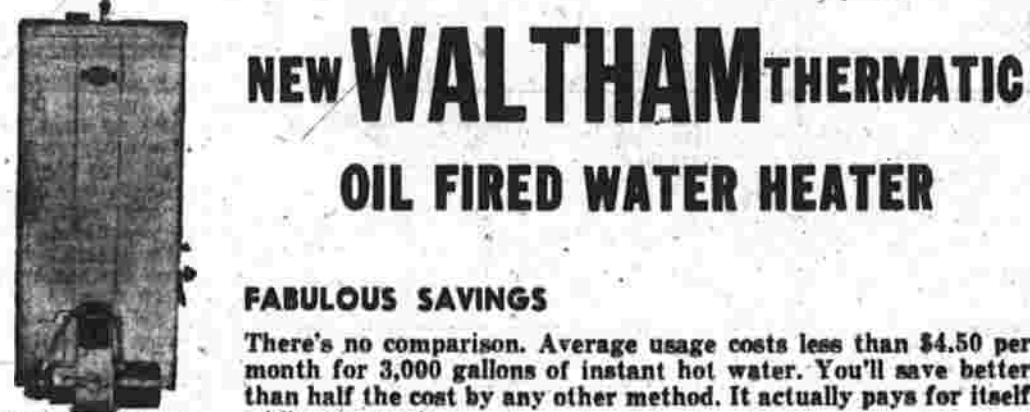

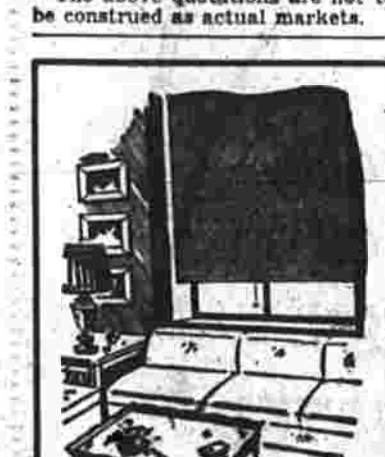

Man Meets Problem

Yesterday, Premier de Gaulle himself began to experience and taste for himself the complicated passions which created the crisis which brought him to office.

He went to Algeria, and he made a speech. The general tone of his speech was intended to be conciliatory and healing, which meant he had something nice and understanding to say about everybody, including the Algerian native rebels themselves.

And in the course of this conciliatory, healing speech, he announced what was intended to be a healing policy—the recognition of the rights of all French citizens for all the people who live in Algeria, no matter what their race or skin.

Now let us consider what happened to the new premier and to his speech.

First, the crowds in Algeria reserved their largest cheers not for him, but for the civilian Jacques Soustelle and General Massu, the paratroop commander who had led the French Army revolt in Algeria.

Second, the leaders of the Algerian revolt which Premier de Gaulle now seeks to bring back under the control of Paris, showed their own mood by locking up two of de Gaulle's cabinet members, who were traveling with him, so that these cabinet members could not make any public appearance during the day.

Next came the reactions to Premier de Gaulle's speech of reconciliation.

The left wing politicians had been outraged that he had accepted the role of the army in the revolt which had brought him to power.

The French in North Africa were outraged that he had praised the native rebels for their courage.

Paris considered that when he had offered full and equal citizenship to the natives of Algeria, he had offered more than he could really carry out.

French North Africa considered that in the promise

of equal voting privileges for the natives he was giving away the position the French settlers insist on holding for themselves.

But, although Premier de Gaulle was offering the natives more than the French wanted to give them, the natives did not think it was enough.

The Algerian liberation movement proclaimed it wanted no integration with France on a basis of equality, but independence itself. Just as significantly, Moslem opinion in Tunis and Morocco was disappointed and discouraged.

So, it is not surprising that what Premier de Gaulle considered too generous and liberal was not liberal enough.

Clarifier May Help Nature To Remove Smell of Brook

William S. Wise, director of the State Water Resources Commission, said yesterday the efforts of the Lyall & Poulos Paper Co. and the Colonial Board Co. to improve the condition of Lyall Brook might eventually help the brook to "improve itself."

In an interview at the company, Wise said this means that as waste materials from the firm are decreased, organisms should grow in the stream and carry out a natural purification process.

This waste-removal by nature, combined with the clarification processes at work at the plant, should help to remove the offensive color and odor from the stream.

"But results can't be expected overnight," Wise cautioned. "The plant general manager Robert Lyall pointed out the company has been working 30 years to clean up the brook."

Wise said the company's two clarifiers have brought about a high reduction of waste solids emitted into Lyall. And Lyall said final adjustments are still being made to the clarifiers to insure maximum efficiency.

He said improvement of a pump on the first clarifier may bring waste-removal percentage up to 80 per cent. That was the reading of a sample taken May 1 from the new clarifier and analyzed at the Commission's laboratory in Middletown.

Also, the Commission is trying out chemical coagulants in the clarifiers to further reduce wastes and color. Wise said this involves tests with many different chemicals to find the most effective one.

In the past, Wise said, the condition of wastes emitted into the brook discouraged growth of aquatic life which might have carried out natural purification by oxidation.

But he hopes efforts now being made at Lyall & Poulos will put the waste material into "such a condition that it will not inhibit growth or development of natural purification organisms."

These should help not only in cleaning whatever wastes enter the brook, but should also help to wear away waste deposits that have accumulated on its banks over the years, Wise said.

The director added that Lyall & Poulos is doing an excellent job on the problem of treating its industrial wastes.
