Self-Powered Cars Derail; 40 Injured

BOSTON (AP)—Some 40 persons were injured today and a total of 70 passengers were thrown from their seats when two self-propelled diesel railroad cars were derailed at a switch and overturned.

None of the injured was believed seriously hurt. Fourteen persons were rushed by police ambulance to Glover Memorial Hospital, Needham, from the scene of the wreck at Highland Station in West Roxbury.

A nurse at the emergency ward at Faulkner Hospital said 20 to 30 persons were brought there suffering with bruises and cuts.

A New Haven Railroad flagman, John J. Furdon, said a lock on a switch at a Highland Station siding had been broken,

and he said that caused the derailment.

Passengers said there were loud screams and cries when the cars tipped over. Others said there was no panic.

Police, ambulances and priests from nearby St. Theresa's Catholic Church hurried to the scene.

Betsy Weaver, 20, of Needham, a student, said "I was sitting there reading when suddenly the car began to swerve. It tipped over—and then people began falling on top of me."

Chester Tobey of Needham said "clouds of dust filled the air as the cars tipped over. I was thrown forward and hit by luggage and other passengers being tossed around."

The siding led to a warehouse near the station, railroad officials said.

Hunger Strike Marks Anniversary

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP)—Eighteen young Irish militants started today on a five-day hunger strike as their nation celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Easter uprising.

The youths said they would fast from noon today until 3:45 p.m. Saturday, recalling the duration of the bloody 1916 rebellion crushed by the British. The uprising eventually led to the creation of the Irish Republic.

Despite these protests, there were no outbreaks of nationalist violence. Irishmen celebrated the anniversary by singing patriotic songs or paused to remember the bitter uprising.

Ky Regime Braced for New Riots

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The daily U.S. air strikes against Viet Cong targets in South Viet Nam have been sharply curtailed by a temporary shortage of bombs and other explosives, reliable sources said today.

They attributed the cutback to a logistic problem—presumably a backlog in shipping—and said they expected the shortage to be overcome shortly.

Meanwhile Premier Nguyen Cao Ky's military government braced today for more street violence after the Buddhist leadership vowed to keep up demonstrations until the U.S.-backed junta quits.

"Only when our aspirations are met and our demands satisfied will there be no more demonstrations," the country's most powerful monks declared in a joint statement Sunday.

In militant tones echoing their declarations of political war on the government of the late President Ngo Dinh Diem three years ago, the Buddhists accused the regime of lying, irresponsibility and placing "too many obstacles" in the way of civilian rule.

Stargazer Fails, Space Agency 'Heartbroken'

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—"We're heartbroken," said a space agency spokesman in announcing the failure of America's Stargazer satellite after only two days in orbit.

For an unknown reason, the orbiting astronomical observatory (OAO) lost all its battery power Sunday, and the two-ton satellite whirled silently and uselessly around the globe.

Soviets Indicate Early Moon Trip

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union is preparing for the celebration Tuesday of the fifth anniversary of Yuri Gagarin's first manned space flight, with optimistic talk about putting a man on the moon.

Soviet cosmonauts have been giving indications that their government will attempt man's great lunar adventure sooner than had been expected.

Alexei Leonov, the first man

to walk in space, March 18, 1965, said in Budapest that a Russian will land on the moon as early as 1968.

Gagarin told the Czechoslovak news agency that Soviet space research had advanced more rapidly than planned. He said he was convinced there would be a man on the moon within the next five years.

The cosmonaut's optimism gets support from two big successes the Soviet space program has already achieved in 1966.

First came the soft landing on the moon Feb. 3 by the unmanned Luna 9 spaceship.

On April 3 Luna 10 was put into orbit around the moon, another first and another essential for getting a man there. The most discussed plan for a manned landing calls for the trip to be made in stages, jumping off for the final one from a lunar satellite.

One possible next step in the Soviet program is a manned flight to explore the vicinity of the moon without attempting a landing.

Soviet space flights are never announced in advance. The cosmonauts give hints in general terms, but the world can only guess the rest.

A current rumor is that another space spectacular will be launched Tuesday on the anniversary of Gagarin's flight.

The Soviet Union, backward in agriculture and poor compared with North America and Western Europe, clearly puts a very high value on the prestige

Soft-Coal Mines Closed by Strike

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Miners struck soft-coal operations in six states today hours before the resumption of contract talks between the United Mine Workers Union and mine owners.

The strike spread to Ohio early today. Miners and machine shop employees, a total of about 200 men, walked out at the Hanna Coal Co. Franklin mine near Cadiz in southeast Ohio.

Picket lines appeared in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Illinois, Kentucky and Alabama.

In Washington, a spokesman at UMW headquarters said "there wasn't any sanction" for the walkouts. The spokesman said the situation between the union and the Bituminous Coal Operators Association was unchanged from Friday.

UMW President W. A. Boyle had said then the union "con-

Progress Reported

Vaccinations Used To Retard Cancer

DETROIT (AP)—Wayne State University medical researchers say they may have discovered a way to treat cancer by vaccination.

Results they claim for a four-year program so far include:

— Two cancer patients, earlier given up as hopeless cases, completely freed of their tumors.

— Eight others once considered beyond help still alive, their cancers either halted or growing more slowly.

— Two patients with advanced tumors, their lives believed prolonged by the treatments.

Others among the 20 patients treated showed no improvement, said Dr. Paul L. Wolf, Wayne State professor of pathology and director of experimental pathology at the Detroit Institute of Cancer Research.

Failure in these cases, Dr. Wolf said, probably came because the disease was too far advanced and the patient's body

no longer capable of producing cancer-fighting antibodies.

Union Official Urges Delay in Papers' Merger

NEW YORK (AP) — Bertram Powers, president of New York Local 8 of the AFL-CIO International Typographical Union, has urged postponement of the planned merger of three newspapers here.

Powers said he seeks the delay to allow "time to resolve issues which could result in a strike."

He made the proposal Sunday. He said he expected the Justice Department to approve the merger today.

Under the merger plan, the Worcester Telegram & Sun and the Journal-American would be published as one afternoon newspaper, the Herald Tribune would continue as a morning paper, and the Sunday editions of the Herald Tribune and the Journal-American would be published as a single paper.

Powers spoke of the possibility of a strike when he reported on contract negotiations at the Worcester Telegram & Sun, which he said "exists."

He said there would be no strike if all agreements were reached with the planned newspaper corporation, the World Journal

Corbett Mistaken And Shot After Heart Seizure

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — The bullet that gravely wounded James J. Corbett, Louisiana State University athletic director, was fired when he was mistaken for a prowler, police report.

Chief David Keyser said it happened Thursday night when Corbett, a heart patient for seven years, stumbled to a motel window seeking help after being stricken with severe chest pains while driving.

Keyser said the occupant of the motel room, O. S. Coleman, about 40, of Sorrento, La., fired a .38-caliber derringer out of the window when he saw a hand reach in.

Corbett said his chest pains were so severe it was a moment before he realized what had happened, though the impact of the bullet knocked him down. He then made it back to his car and tried to drive on.

The auto swerved off the street and hit a tree.

Chief Keyser called a news conference Sunday night to outline the case. The investigation has marked time for two days while police waited for Corbett to recover sufficiently to be questioned.

Coleman told police he didn't realize anyone had been hit until he learned the next day that Corbett had been found, near death, slumped in his car in the same general vicinity as the motel.

Chief Keyser said Coleman returned to Baton Rouge to report the shooting.

"No arrest has been made as yet," Keyser said. "An arrest is anticipated, in view of the statements made to us by Mr. Corbett and Mr. Coleman."

"THE WAY I HEARD IT"

Just at present there seems to be no instrument as popular as the guitar. Yet for all the fact that it is widely encountered, it is a thoroughly misunderstood instrument. Most of it is to be found in the hands of young people who learn about it in very small halls, thus limiting the size of audiences.

All of the ancient arts and dances for the lute can be adequately learned on the guitar. Lutes are practically unavailable but guitars can be readily obtained and sound almost like lutes, so it is a mystery to me why this music is not used to some very best advantage.

The instrument is more complicated in construction than the violin, the sound box alone containing more than 150 separate pieces, which probably comes as a surprise to you, and this does not count the "purting" inlaid around the edges nor the music which usually adorns it. By comparison, the sound box of the violin is considerably simpler.

It is not a simple instrument to learn. Despite the fact that most youngsters believe this to be the case. Most of them just never learn to play it properly, and most music lovers have never heard it played fully.

Only a few have ever heard Segovia, for example, whom Fritz Kreisler once said was one of the only two musical artists in the world. (The other was also Spanish, Canada.)

To violinists, it probably comes as a surprise to know that even the celebrated Bach "Chaconne" can be played on the guitar, and is more effective on that instrument than on the fiddle. I do wish, incidentally, that a few of the violinists who return to Baton Rouge to report the shooting.

Andover School Budget Remains Intact After Review

The board of education has decided to hold its budget as presented after reviewing it by them.

The budget calls for four new teachers, one of them for kindergarten in which enrollment is expected to grow to children in two sessions. The school board checked its budget again Tuesday at the request of the board of finance. After the April 2 public hearing on the town budget, the finance board suggested that the school board look at its elementary school budget again in search of some reduction.

Most of the comments at the budget hearing centered on the school board's plan to add three new teachers. Any reduction in the school budget would have to come from this item as other items seemed of unquestioned necessity.

The school board points out that three of the new teachers, one for a first grade and two for second grades, are needed to eliminate class sizes in excess of 25 pupils, and also to do away with combination, or split rooms. The latter practice, in his belief, is detrimental to that part of the combined room which is always kept below its grade level.

At present, the 30 teachers using 10 classrooms for grades one through six, have an average teaching load of 29 pupils, and there are three combination rooms. The school board would like to have 13 classrooms, the average number being 23. There would be no combination rooms.

The projection of an average of 28 pupils per teacher is based on a February 1966 count. What the school board would like to see between now and the opening of school in the fall is difficult to predict. It is certain, however, that any increased enrollment would increase the average to 30 pupils per teacher, which the school board believes to be a desirable maximum.

By most bridge players, defensive play is a game of blind man's bluff. Operating mostly in the dark, they stick to the "rules" of good play and hope that the hand doesn't call for an exception to the rules.

South dealer — Ace of spades. Opening lead — Ace of spades.

When this hand came along a month ago in the national team championship, Edwin Kantar, Los Angeles expert, led the ace of spades. Then he thought for a few seconds, since it wasn't his hand, he had to guess what East had done. He guessed that East had a fast which tricks his partner can diamond trick and could give him.

Daily Question Partner opens with one club, and the next player passes. You hold: Spades, J-10-9; Hearts, A-diamonds and led a low trump; Diamonds, K-9-7-4; Clubs, 4-3-2.

What do you say? ANSWER: Bid one diamond. Show a new suit rather than raise partner's minor suit.

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College Road Before TPC

A proposal to build a road from S. Main St. to the Community College campus in the former Nike site will be considered by the Town Planning Commission (TPC) tonight and the board of directors tomorrow night.

The road, to be paid for with state funds, would run across the Nike site and would not interfere with the layout of the golf course there. Plans for the road have been worked out by town officials.

The TPC imposed a number of restrictions designed to protect the residents of the adjacent parkade and to insure the safety of residents.

Grant Approved To Plan More Elderly Housing

The Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has granted the Manchester Housing Authority (MHA) a \$15,000 development grant for planning the construction of 75 additional units of housing for the elderly, according to an announcement issued by the Washington office of U. S. Congressman Emilio Q. Daddario.

The MHA now manages 100 units at Westhill Gardens, W. Center St., and in July will dedicate and rent out 100 additional apartments, being constructed to the southwest of the existing housing for the elderly.

The 75 new units will be constructed in group of 25 and at three locations, not yet chosen, to follow federal recommendations for constructing such projects in smaller groups and in various parts of town.

The next step for the MHA, under the \$15,000 development grant, is to pinpoint the possible sites for the new housing, conduct a site survey, and then to retain an architect who will prepare the plans for the new housing. No property may be purchased without the eventual approval of William Freeman, secretary of the Housing Agency, subject to the acceptance of the \$15,000 development program.

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Evelyn Waugh, Noted Author, Dies in London

LONDON (AP)—Evelyn Waugh, whose pungent satire made him one of Britain's most successful novelists, died Sunday at his country home where he lived the greater part of his life.

Waugh, 67, died of a heart attack after returning from a visit to his home near Twickenham, in western England.

Waugh was a witty, sophisticated and sometimes brilliant. In private life, he was retiring and avoided publicity. Outside his country home he put up this sign: "No admittance on business."

Waugh was the son of a publisher in London. He was educated at Eton and Balliol College, Oxford. He served in the British army during the first world war and was wounded.

Waugh's religious convictions and his nostalgia for the old order produced a marked change in his writing in 1945, when he published "Brideshead Revisited." Many critics considered it his finest work.

Indonesia, having undergone something of a bloody revolution, is now getting ready to rejoin the United Nations.

The United Nations helped Indonesia become a nation, free of Dutch rule, after World War II, and Indonesia became a member of the United Nations in 1960. Fifteen years later, with President Sukarno playing the game of Communist China, Indonesia formally withdrew from the world organization.

Now Secretary General Thant has his legal staff busy studying the question of whether Indonesia can simply reenter the United Nations, or must stand for election as if it were an entirely new applicant.

Indonesia's rejoicing, if it happens, will reverse the worst sorrow brought to the United Nations has suffered in its 21 years of existence. And, of course, it will knock into total limbo the wild Chinese Communist dream of some kind of rival world organization for which Indonesia would have been a highly prized member.

Perhaps, as the prodigal nation which actually left the fold in preparation to come back, this would be a good time for some others, who may never have moved any such legal distance, to examine the nature of their loyal contribution to the world organization.

President de Gaulle's repeated remarks have perhaps been just as serious as Indonesia's actual departure. And one is forced to wonder what ever became of the great crusade Ambassador Goldberg was going to lead in the United Nations to have the United Nations concern itself with the problem of Vietnam. Was all that grand excitement back around the first of the year one more instance in which the United States was giving lip service to United Nations principles while it carefully kept the world organization from interfering with its own big power policies?

It will be reassuring to have Indonesia let us hope the future history of the United Nations is all in the direction of more, not fewer, members, and better devotion to its principles from them all.

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Who's Kidnapping?

Meriden taxpayers have just got their 1966 tax bills in the mail with each bill a helpful enclosure from the Meriden Tax Assessor, Robert Halbach with the approval of Mayor Shyne. It relates to the recently completed Meriden tax assessor's report on the city and the resulting tax rate. As it stands, it is misleading.

All taxpayers are now assessed fairly and equally at 60 per cent of value, it states. True—and we are all in favor of it. The recent reassessment of property was necessary and has been generally acceptable.

The basic tax rate is 25.3 per cent lower than last year, on all real estate. This is the misleading part. We don't know just what that word, "basic" is supposed to mean. The effective tax rate for the inner district in Meriden is really about 18 per cent higher than it was before reassessment, and about 13 per cent higher for the outer district.

Figure it this way. Former property evaluations in the city ran at approximately 40 per cent of value. Inner district taxes were set at \$15 million. Multiply the two: The effective tax rate under the old system was 37.5 mills.
