Powell Makes News

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Alan Clayton Powell made news on two fronts Tuesday, claiming his new information about more universities with the Central Intelligence Agency and charging that draft deferment tests are reminiscent of Nazi Germany.

The New York Democrat told newsmen he has received unclassified information that CIA personnel have been associated with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of Pennsylvania.

He reported this in announcing that his House Education and Labor Committee will investigate recently alleged CIA links with Michigan State University.

A spokesman at Penn denied knowledge of any CIA contact on its campus. Officials at the MIT Center of International Studies had announced April 29 they would drop a series of research contracts with the CIA.

"There was never a secret about the contracts," a spokesman said.

In his attack on the deferment tests, Powell said they "bring the history of racial discrimination full circle."

"First we provide an inferior education for black students," he said. "Next we give them a series of tests which many will flunk because of an inferior education. Then we pack them into academic failures off to Viet Nam to be killed."

He said the tests "are reminiscent of Hitler's twin-system of eugenics and education—based on the intellectually superior or socially undesirable by conscripting them for cannon fodder." He called for a return to the old "fish bowl method" of random selection for draftees.

Memoirs Blocked

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has asked a federal court to forbid the editor of convicted murderer Joseph Valachi's Cosa Nostra memoirs to disseminate or publish the manuscript in any form.

In its suit filed Tuesday, the department said Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach decided in March not to allow the manuscript to be published. Earlier officials had indicated they might allow publication, which would be subject to law enforcement.

The editor, Peter Massa, has indicated he intends to make an arrangement for the manuscript's publication without the Justice Department's approval.

Fallout Check Due

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service and other agencies are heading for some radioactivity fallout from Red China's third nuclear device explosion begins drifting across the United States.

Depending on the weather conditions, it may be four or five days more before the radioactive cloud appears in this hemisphere and can be analyzed, officials said Tuesday.

Until then, reconnaissance planes operating out of the Far East will pick up debris and take it to laboratories in South Korea and this country for analysis to determine the exact nature of the Chinese blast, which took place Monday.

Rent Subsidy Program Survives Severe Test

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's controversial rent subsidy program has survived another narrowing test in Congress.

With some personal pressure from several top administration aides, the House voted 192 to 158 Tuesday to include \$22 million to finance the program next year in an otherwise noncontroversial \$14 billion omnibus appropriation bill.

The measure goes to the Senate, where an earlier emergency measure allocating \$12.1 million for the program for the rest of this fiscal year was approved 46 to 40. The House had passed the emergency measure earlier, 198 to 150.

The rent program was created by Congress last year at Johnson's behest. During its projected 40-year life, \$8 billion could be paid to landlords or cooperative groups which build housing for low-income families. The payments normally would represent the difference between 25 percent of the tenant's income and the rental cost.

Six Republicans joined 188 House Democrats in support of the amendment to finance the program next year despite the House Appropriations Committee's refusal to do so. Voting to fund the program were 89 Democrats and 119 Republicans, and 120 million in authority to enter into new contracts —

Blackboard-by-Wire Puts Teacher in Many Classes

NEW YORK (AP)—A professor draws a circle on a tablet in his New York office. The circle appears simultaneously on television screens in classrooms around the country.

The circumstance equals the diameter times pi, "drones the professor's television voice. And on the screen appears the formula: "D lines 2.1416 equals C."

The technique, dubbed "blackboard-by-wire," is one of many that is revolutionizing modern teaching. It can connect the poorest schoolhouse with

transmitting equipment in test classrooms later this year. The equipment will sell for about \$5,000. It connects, with a small adjustment, to standard television sets.

Unlike educational television, "blackboard-by-wire" utilizes neither costly coaxial cables nor limited-range air-borne transmitters. Images are formed by electronic impulses, similar to those that produce photographic pictures over telephone lines for The Associated Press.

Besides its classroom uses, the system may become valuable to industry and military sources who want to confer graphically over long distances. In each case, the "blackboard" conversation can be kept as confidential as a telephone call.

Computers Could Predict Our Behavior, Doctor Says

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Development appears feasible for electronic computers that would predict human behavior — including how people would vote in an election — a psychiatrist said today.

The trick could be done if enough brain power — and money — were put into a "computer program" designed to perfect data-feeding and other techniques needed to activate such robots, declared Dr. Daniel Cappon of the University of Toronto.

Such an achievement could advance psychiatry by half a century, he said in a report to the 122nd annual meeting of the American Psychiatric Association.

Cappon said he is convinced the goal is feasible on the basis of his own use of a computer for the past five years as an aid in psychiatric research.

He said he has used it for such things as rapid calculation of experimental results and as a means of information storage and retrieval. And, most recently, in promising experiments aimed at translating the psychiatric histories into a relatively simple "computer language."

"There is no reason why," he said, "once data incorporating the life experience and mental state of persons — such as patients and controls — is put into computers, this could not be subsequently tapped to answer questions about how people might behave under certain circumstances, for example, under conditions of stress, of treatment, or in casting a vote."

"If enough information is stored — and if the computer yields sufficient criteria to be subsequently reprogrammed, it should be possible to ask computers, on behalf of the population they represent, to make decisions between alternate fu-

New Lincoln School Asked in Renewal

The board of directors has unanimously voted to request the board of education to include a new Lincoln School in plans for the proposed Downtown Renewal project, expected to go before the voters in a fall referendum.

The board's decision to abandon Lincoln came at its Monday meeting, following the latest of numerous discussions over the fate of the old school at the Center built about 1910 on a one-acre site. In its deliberations, the board came to the conclusion that Center Springs Park would be the only logical site in the Center area large enough to accommodate a new school and heard an opinion from the board of education. Curtis said the park land could "probably" be made available.

The antiquated condition of the school has been the object of considerable consternation from Lincoln parents in recent months, who have been agitating for improvements through the Lincoln School Parents Association.

Mrs. Virginia Oliniski, chairman of the association's improvement committee, was spoken to by the board several times in the past, was on hand Monday night. At the outset of the discussion, she asked the board to "consider our school with its limited site and facilities."

She said that next fall six classes will have 23-30 pupils (the board-established ratio is 25 to a teacher) and that general "conditions are getting worse."

"Are you prepared to support a new school, or to spend \$200,000 to fix an old inadequate building?" she asked.

At her request, members of the school board, General Manager Robert Weiss, and several of the directors recently had toured Lincoln to examine the condition of the school, termed "deplorable" by the parents' association.

Mrs. Katherine Dour, in reply, offered the observation that under plans for Downtown Renewal the relocation of Main St. at the Center would take some of the school property, she suggested trying to include plans for a new school in renewal if possible.

In answer to N. Charles Boggs' question whether Weiss and the directors had given any indication of interest in using the school for Jean, Margaret, Mrs. Oliniski said, "They don't want it any more than we do. It is of more value than the building."

Boggs, who has also spoken out on several occasions in favor

tion on the grand list, the result of proposed new building construction in the renewal areas.

Keith said new construction will actually approach \$8 million, but removal by demolition would bring the net increase in the town's tax base to \$6 million.

According to Keith, the work to be done under the \$14,700,000 state and federal grant would include about \$5 million for street work, utilities and grading in the downtown area, which the town faces regardless of renewal.

The next administrative step will include property acquisition, demolition, landscaping on the proposed Main St. shopping mall, landscaping of surrounding streets, legal code, administration and site improvement. The site improvement includes storm drains, sanitary sewers, and utilities, most of which will go underground.

"We have much to do," said Keith, "and our next immediate goal is the completion of an urban design study and a three-dimensional model of the proposed shopping mall that is expected to be a major factor in revitalization of the town's Main St. shopping district."

The creation of a mall is the key feature of the plan for Downtown Renewal which includes the relocation of parts of Main St. The present stretch of Main St. between Bessel St. and Maple St. would be closed to auto traffic. Main St. along that stretch would be relocated to the west. Where Main St. joins Center St. it would be moved slightly to the east.

The plan also calls for widening some downtown streets, eliminating portions of other streets and extending some.

A committee, headed by Robert Fuller of Colonial Board Co., has been formed to promote the renewal project.

This meeting will feature a talk by Dr. Ralph Conant on "Progress of Regionalism in the Capital Area."

then, unless these forms are signed by not less than 5 per cent of the electors of the town, the act is not lawful."

There is no other existing site where the school could be built, and that acquisition by condemnation would be "disproportionately costly."

In the event the park land is not used, Curtis said, the best alternative would be to restrict school buses and make changes in perimeter schools, discontinuing the "Liberal District" entirely.

However, this alternative might also pose the problem of basic changes in board policy, which now limits elementary schools to a 20-room maximum.

Curtis agreed to have Nathan Roy, Lincoln protocol, and Theodore Fairbank, superintendent of buildings and grounds, prepare a list of plant deficiencies immediately for presentation to the board, following which they would suggest the possible utilization of Center Springs Park land as a new school site.

Curtis noted that while he has an informal opinion that the land could be made available, this possibility is still being checked by Weiss.

He added that, in his judgment, there is no inherent power in the people of the town of Manchester. This type of referendum is not allowed by the Charter of the Town and, therefore, no right to such a referendum is in the people of the Town of Manchester.

The Board of Directors may appropriate funds only for a legally proper purpose. These purposes are spelled out in the Charter of the Town and the Statutes of the State. Autos Made at Record Pace Despite Several Cutbacks

DETROIT (AP) — The auto industry had another jump Tuesday but still relied on a pace record only to record a new one.

The latest move was a Chrysler Corp. decision to cut back its June car production. Ford and General Motors previously reduced their May output.

The cutbacks came in the wake of April sales reports which showed the four U.S. auto firms sold 761,000 cars, about 28,000 below the April 1966 total.

That report shook up auto executives who had seen first-quarter sales zoom to a record high of 2.3 million units, about 11,000 ahead of last year.

Many felt the April slump was due to the temporary and they counted on sales reports for the first 30 days of May due Thursday to reverse the downward trend.

Auto executives who had sidestepped the issue of what effect the auto safety issue had on sales met it head on Tuesday.

Two presidents, Arjay Miller of Ford and Roy Abernethy of American Motors, said auto safety hearings were a part of the slowed sales picture.

General Motors confirmed Tuesday that it had stopped production of the Chevrolet Corvair at its Los Angeles assembly plant. Corvair was mentioned frequently in the safety hearings with GM defending it vigorously.

A GM spokesman said the Willow Run, Mich., plant, original center of Corvair production, is the only one now building Corvairs. That plant was involved in last week's GM work slowdown and it will be closed three additional work days this month.

Corvair sales and production this year are running behind 1966 figures.

On the other side, auto makers reported that production of 1966 model cars through April 30 totaled 6.8 million units, nearly 6.2 million ahead of output in the same period of the 1965 model run.

Ward's Automotive Reports, an industry publication, predicted that today's 1966 model run would wind up around 8.7 million units, which would make it the second highest in U.S. history.

Chrysler, in announcing its production advances, said it had two of its seven assembly plants would be closed for four work days beginning May 21 to "adjust production schedules with inventory."

Spokesman said the action would trim 10,000 cars from its monthly quota of 24,000 cars to 13,000 units.

General Motors had four of its 23 assembly plants on short time last week and cut 10,000 cars from its planned output. It said eight plants would be on curtailed operations, ranging from one to three work days, in the remainder of May.


