William Ernest Hocking

There died the other day, up in the town of Madison, New Hampshire, at the ripe and distinguished age of 92, in a stone house he himself designed and help build with his own hands, one William Ernest Hocking. He had retired. way back in 1943, from the post of Alford Professor of Natural Religion. Moral Philosophy and Civil Polity at Harvard University.

Six years ago, at the age of 86, in the next to last of his many books, William Ernest Hocking could write, after his more than half century of lively quest into the problems and the realities of his time, a declaration of faith in his fellow man like this:

"I am speaking as a common citizen of the USA, grateful for and proud of my heritage speaking for the common citizen and to the common citizen. The man of the street has always a deeperthan-current-opinion ground of judgment. He may lose his grip upon his own certitudes; but he can never lose his felt connection with the central human realities in which our standards of truth, justice-yes, and of beauty and decency-have their perennial sources. I write in the hope of reviving his awareness of these standards so that they may become once more forcessledge hammers if you will—it





# Office Papers Barred As Dodd Case Evidence

### Senate Probe Open Behind **Closed Doors**

WASHINGTON (AP)-The Senate ethics committee hearing misconduct charges against Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., barred as evidence today copies of over 4,000 documents removed from his office.

The six-member, bipartisan committee began its closed hearings without announcing who the first witnesses would be Newsmen and television cameras jammed the corridor outside the hearing room.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss. , the committee chairman, said in an opening statement many allegations that have appeared in the press about the case were based on over 4,000 papers removed from Dodd's office files without authorization.

"Although the committee has not completely gone into the facts surrounding the source of these papers," Stennis said, committee feels that the copies of such papers are sufficiently stigmatized so as to pretheir use as evidence

"The committee wishes to make it clear all papers offered to the current hearings were voluntarily given to the committee by Sen. Dodd." Stennis added in the opening statement released to newsmen.
