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### Cellist Hit In Concert

 Bruno di Cicco provided the highlights of the opening concert of this season's Hartford Festival of Music last evening at Milford Auditorium at the University of Hartford.

Offering "Chalkovsky's Variations on a Russian Theme," the talented cellist who has made numerous ensemble appearances in the area gave a performance which was really notable. He played with a certainty and musicality which might well be envied by cellists of wider reputation, and was recalled again and again by the delighted audience.

Sandra Wrubel, soprano, was also heard as a soloist during the evening, presenting a performance of Beethoven's "Allegretto" which likewise pleased the audience, most of whom were probably familiar with her work through numerous local appearances.

This scene and aria was delivered with dramatic intensity and excellent intonation, but the soloist's lower register is inadequate to the demands of the role. Moreover, her diction was pretty bad in a language (Italian) generally considered to be the most intelligible of any tongue.

The delightfully chosen program also included part of Beethoven's First Brandenburg Concerto and the Puccini Suite by Stravinsky, the latter offered several seasons back by Robert Bravley and the Festival Orchestra when these same concerts were held in Bloomfield.

This particular Beethoven was new at this concert though so commonly offered that I have long since forgotten how many times I have heard it by almost everyone from the Boston Symphony to amateur performers being one by the Fritz Busch chamber group before World War II.

If it is any satisfaction to God Lovett, who acts this season as concertmaster for the local group, he provided the very worst performance of the numerous violin solos incident to the work at hand, that I have encountered.

Delivered from a casual perspective, the performance was even more casual with distressingly bad intonation at times and rhythmic inaccuracies that were as sloppy as his position on the stage.

His sense of style was adequate to the Stravinsky, opus but woefully at variance with baroque music. Even in the Stravinsky, however, he played highly questionable intonation and lack of rhythm.

This is regrettable for his performance thoroughly took the edge off what might have been two excellent readings by Mr. Bravley and the remainder of the group.

### Sheinwold on Bridge

**MATCH BOLD BIDDING WITH CAUTIOUS PLAY**  
 By ALFRED SHEINWOLD  
 If you don't mind mixed metaphors, the secret of winning at bridge is to bid a hand to the limit and then play the points off the cards. No European expert is more famous for both of these arts than Mrs. Rexi Markus, for many years one of Great Britain's most distinguished players.

Opening bid — three of spades.

Mrs. Markus leaped to six clubs to keep the bidding simple. Making the slam was not quite so simple.

It would be easy to try the trump finesse first and the heart finesse later, relying on one of the finesses to work. When both fail, the slam is down, but at least you have a reasonable excuse to give to your partner.

Since Mrs. Markus is just as cautious in the play as she is bold in the bidding, she found a way to make the slam without risking either finesse.

The English expert took his first trick in dummy with the ace of spades, discarded two hearts on the top diamonds, and ruffed a diamond with the ten of clubs. When both opponents followed suit, it was clear that the diamonds were going to break normally.

**Hidden Entry**  
 The next step was to lead the four of clubs from the South hand. West stepped up with the queen of clubs and returned a spade to the queen.

Mrs. Markus led the seven of clubs to dummy's nine, thus finding a hidden entry to dummy. This put her in position to ruff a diamond with the jack of clubs normally.

With the diamonds thus established, Mrs. Markus drew the last trump with the king of clubs and got to playing with the king of spades to discard the queen of hearts on a good diamond.

**INURED BOY DIES**  
 STAMFORD (AP) — A nine-year-old Stamford boy died Wednesday of injuries he received June 26 when he was struck by a car.

Austin Sabota Jr., 14 of Corbo Drive, died in Stamford Hospital.

The boy had run into the path of a car driven by Harry White, 4 of Warwick Lane, police reported.

The fire started in a boiler room. A 15-mile-an-hour wind swept the flames throughout the building. Shortly after firemen arrived, a boiler exploded, setting off fuel oil in two 275-gallon tanks.

Firemen said they were hampered by thick fog and smoke which almost led the building. Island firemen got help from volunteers, Coast Guardsmen.

### Service Discharge Easier For Sole Surviving Sons

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department has opened the way for hardship discharge of servicemen who are the sole surviving sons in their families.

The new policy was laid down in a memorandum July 1 from Assistant Secretary of Defense Thomas D. Morris to the secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force. Morris is in charge of manpower.

His brief memo says: "To preclude possible inequities concerning sole surviving sons, military personnel who become qualified sole surviving sons subsequent to their enlistment or induction, will be afforded the opportunity to apply for a hardship discharge, with favorable consideration resulting therefrom."

Morris told the service in his memo "it is desired that this category be assigned to policy be applied uniformly throughout the military departments and that implementing by the earliest practicable date."

The action, a Pentagon spokesman said, brings defense policy in line with that of the Selective Service System, which he said refrains from drafting sole surviving sons.

Such hardship discharges are open to men whose father and/or brothers or sisters have been killed in line of military duty, or whose father and/or brothers or sisters have been totally disabled physically or mentally "as a result of hazards incident to their service in the armed forces" since September 1949.

### Russia Charges U.S. Blocked Nuclear Pact

**BRIDGEPORT (AP)—**Russia accused the United States today of deliberately blocking agreement on nuclear disarmament in order to keep its hands free to develop nuclear weapons.

The Soviet delegate, Alexei A. Rokoshin, told the 17-nation disarmament conference that U.S. demands for international supervision of a treaty banning underground nuclear weapons are "artificial obstacles on the road to agreement."

He said the United States "is impeding agreement and thus to enable itself to continue underground tests for the purpose of developing new types of nuclear weapons."

Rokoshin also denounced U.S. opposition to a Soviet proposal for a convention banning the use of nuclear arms, similar to the 40-year-old Geneva protocol prohibiting chemical and bacteriological weapons.

The U.S. negotiator, William C. Foster said that while there is nothing secret about the U.S. position, it is "not a secret."

### MEA Takes Dispute To Three Arbitrators

The Manchester Education Association, unhappy with a \$254,000 salary increase unanimously voted by the board of education last night—the same increase recently rejected by the MEA—is taking the salary dispute to three arbitrators designated by the state.

James P. Shindler of Hartford was named as the arbitrator and sent a letter to the school board informing them of his arbitration intentions. The MEA, led by James P. Shindler, is approved, they are entitled to it. If they don't sign them, there is a question as to whether they are entitled to the extra money.

The letter in part reads: "The unresolved issues... include the disagreement over the implementation of the salary schedule and the MEA appeal jointly to the town board of directors for a restoration of \$100,000 to the board budget for 1966-67, to make possible the implementation of the salary schedule previously recommended and to meet other important educational needs as recommended by the superintendent of schools."

Miss Martin White, co-chairman of MEA negotiating team, said today she felt the MEA had a "satisfactory solution" from arbitration.

The board, in adopting the \$254,000 increase, said that a salary schedule was needed to hire teachers for the 1966-67 school year.

Arbitration status states that, although the dispute is made by the arbitrators, they are "advisory" and not binding to either side. One arbitrator will be selected by the MEA, one by the school board, and the other by the two chosen by the MEA and the board.

If the arbitrators' decisions are not acceptable to either of both sides, the MEA and the board would then be free agents.

The adopted salary increase came after a 24-hour session mandated by a state law enacted by the MEA and the board.

## A Warm Atmosphere

Manchester's sheltered workshop, the only one in the area, is providing 15 of the town's mental retardates with something hard to come by in an institution—a warm, interpersonal atmosphere.

This, according to workshop director Norman Fendell, is a capacity. And that another, who major prerequisite in orienting the retardates to a more normal life—that of socialization.

Another prerequisite is being fulfilled also. Retardates acquire a sense of accomplishment by working and earning money.

The work and money are provided by about five area companies and organizations who farm out subcontracts to the workshop and pay proportionately according to the retardate's production compared with that of a normal worker's.

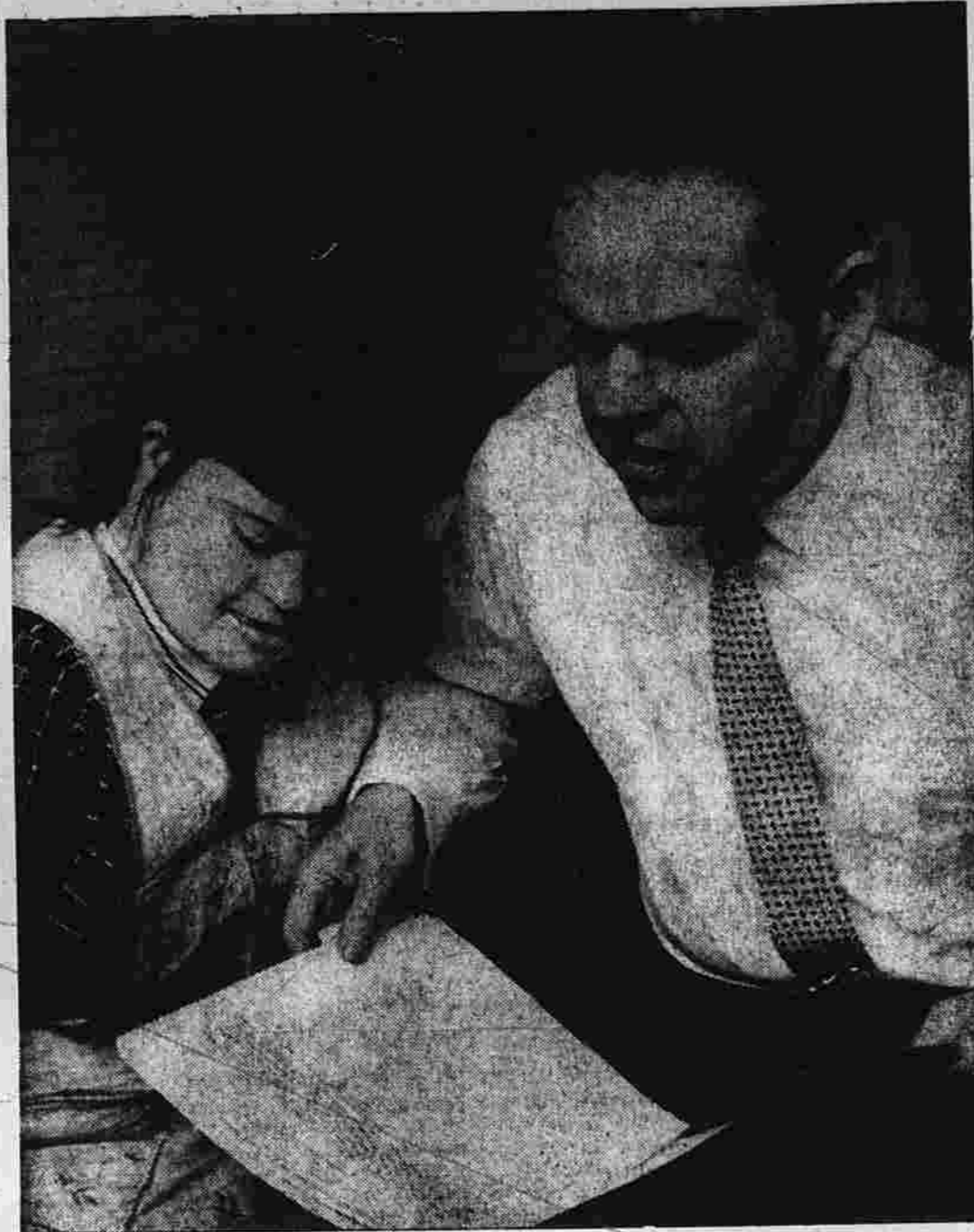
Fendell explained that time studies are performed on all jobs to determine this production ratio.

The workshop's main concern is to train workers whose ages ranged from the teens into the forties, and place them in community jobs. He said that there are now workers who have possibilities of such jobs.

The town's educational coordinator, Sidney Cohen, explained: "When they (the retardates) reach the point where they are capable, they are sent to the community."

According to Fendell, "Most of the retardates are trainable. We've noticed from daily work records that the vast majority of cases show a terrific increase in production."

He pointed out that one of the workshop's females produces 80 per cent of normal

ness" after workers proved themselves by working for charities and accepted subcontracts. Though work is still done for charities, retardates now are earning money.

As Fendell put it: "We're not going around as a charity but as a business."

Mrs. Sullivan remarked: "They've come a long way and we're quite proud of them."

Typical jobs workers perform are assembling, packaging, wrapping, salvaging, stuffing and sorting.

A \$28,791 grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity has been secured to fund the town's new Foster Grandparents Program. The money has not arrived yet, however.

The program calls for the hiring of 15 men and women, 60 or older, who need additional income. They will be paid \$1.80 an hour to work 10 hours a week with the retardates.

The workshop program, entering its second year, is sponsored by the Manchester Association for the Help of Retarded Children Inc. and run by the Manchester Parents Association for the Help of Retarded Children.

It is financed by three main sources—a local fund drive, the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, and the Office of Mental Retardation of Connecticut.

Fendell said that although local organizations and business have donated money and needed workshop materials generously, the program still needs more money to function.

He explained that every year the workshop's books end up in the red.

He pointed out that it costs \$3,000 a year for each patient in Mansfield State Training Center.

"We've had good support in town but the program is expanding. More services are needed and we want to give them recreation along with training," he added.

Workers now bring their lunches to the workshop, located at 30 School St. in the old trade school, but Fendell plans to serve lunches soon. He explained that First Hartford Really has given the workshop a full kitchen set.

The workshop now has subcontracts with the following companies: Cheney Bros., Hartford Provision, Watkins Bros., Burz Nursery, Engineered Metals, and Manchester Memorial Hospital.

The workshop, first located at the Bunce Center, Olcott St., when it was started in 1965, has since acquired new facilities.

The town's board of directors appropriated \$4,000 to renovate the trade school's basement and the workshop changed sites.

The program was started by the cooperation of MAHRPC, town officials, civic organizations, state and federal agencies and a vocational grant by the Office of Mental Retardation, State Department of Health.

Shortly afterward, the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation recognized the workshop as a rehabilitation center and purchased rehabilitation services for area retardates.

A certificate has been issued to the workshop by the Wage and Hours Division of the U.S. Department of Labor accrediting and accepting the shop as a member in the National Association of Sheltered Workshops.

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### South Windsor Council Approves Start of Plans For Town Hall on Wapping Site

The town council last night approved the start of plans for a new town hall. A public hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m. July 20 preceding the next regular council meeting on an expenditure of \$60,000 to buy about 11 acres between Sullivan Ave. and Ellington rd., behind the Wapping Community Church, as the proposed location for the building.

The council also approved a resolution designating the site. Mayor James Thrope said, however, that the resolution did not constitute approval for the purchase. The approval will not actually be purchased until after the public hearing. The town has an option on the land. Mayor Thrope said that the proposed town hall has been under consideration for a year-and-a-half, and that studies have been made of proposed sites. The recommendations of the more recent site study committee and of the town planning and zoning commission are for the proposed location. The 1000 town plan of development named the tract as the site for the proposed town hall. Donald J. Henry, chairman of the public building commission, said it will take some time to complete the preliminary plans to be completed. Councilman Daniel P. Chavara asked the secretary to modify the plans if they do not meet with the council's approval, at his expense. Henry said it is usual to have several schematic drawings prepared for the preliminary plans are prepared. The architect would work on the schematic drawings until a basic plan was accepted.

The firm of Russell, Gibson and Von Dohlin will draw the plans. Town Manager Terry V. Sprengle asked how far the architect would have to proceed with an estimate of the cost of the building could be given. Henry said usually the preliminary plans were drawn before an estimate could be arrived at. However, Mayor Thrope noted if the project is to be placed on the state election ballot in November, notice must be filed with the secretary of state 60 days prior to the election. In order to file notice, the cost figure must be included.

The mayor asked that a referendum figure be obtained from the architect by the next council meeting, July 20. The mayor also requested that the council be invited to meet with the building commission and the architect during their deliberations. Mayor Thrope noted that the item on last night's agenda, calling for consideration of a date for a referendum was there so the council could pick a date when the greatest number of voters go to the polls, as in the state elections. This would insure wide representation of the town voters.

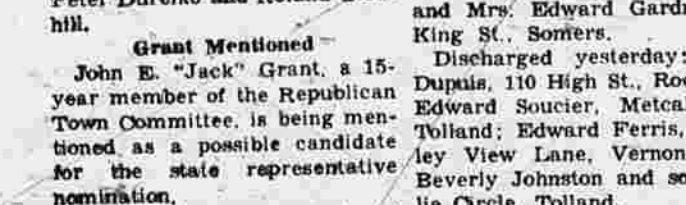

### Research Project Started

## Most Errors in Hospitals Unknown, Unreported

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—It is 9:30 p.m. Terms of the grant for a study of errors in hospitals, then to name the hospital. The categories of errors are:

1. Omission—a dose not given and the time the following dose was given.
2. Wrong dose—a dose at least 20 percent above or below the prescribed amount.
3. Extra dose—one given more than the number of times prescribed by the physician.
4. Wrong form—a dose given in a manner other than that prescribed, such as giving in a syringe when a dose is prescribed for oral use.
5. Unordered drug—a dose not prescribed by the physician.
6. Wrong time—a dose given at least 30 minutes before or after the prescribed time.

The researchers examined 9,700 instances where medicine was given. Errors were found in 10 percent of them—once out of each hundred doses.

In a follow to their conclusions that errors are all too prevalent in hospitals, Heller and Barker now are clipping year after year at the Arkansas Medical Center for a two-year, \$73,000 grant from the U.S. Public Health Service to develop a health services unit where they have developed a research project to check on errors.

After it has been in full swing for two months, Barker said: "Errors were occurring at such a rate that at least every sixth dose administered was in error—one per patient every day."

Barker said more than 90 percent of the errors went by unknown to anyone, including the person making the error.

By projection of his figures, Barker's research indicated 51,300 errors would be made in the hospital during a year. But only 36 errors were reported in a year through normal channels outside the research program.

Barker followed up with a pilot system to see if the number of errors could be reduced. He led him to believe they could, and he had the foundation for the current study.

Heller, 40, and Barker, 29, both natives of Ohio, came together in 1961 when each discovered at a Chicago pharmaceutical meeting that the other had been working independently on the problem.

Working under a \$42,000 grant from the Hartford Foundation of New York City, the doctors decided to expand Barker's previous error study.

They followed a careful plan of tracing each dose at a general hospital and placing each error in a specific category.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (AP)—Producer Charles Lowe and former congressional investigator Rex Sparger Jr. have denied that a \$4,000 television deal was connected with Sparger's attempt to rig audience ratings at a Carol Channing television special.

Sparger, who has been sued for \$1.9 million damages by the national television rating firm of A. C. Nielsen of Chicago, said Wednesday he received the \$4,000 check received by Sparger was related to the Nielsen company ratings.

The depositions indicated all had been working independently on the problem.

The check was dated Jan. 15, before a month prior to the Channing television show on Feb. 18, which Sparger said was one of the targets of efforts to fix the outcome of the Nielsen ratings.
