HOLLYWOOD (AP) - Don Adams, the flat-voiced sleuth of "Get Smart," is the kind of a comedian who draws laughs from his wife even when he's deadly serious.

Recently he telephoned his wife from a hospital and told her: "Darling, there's been an accident. I've broken my nose."

Mrs. Adams burst out laughing. When her husband grew indignant she explained that her alarm over his mention of an "accident" was so relieved by news of the broken nose that she felt impelled to laugh.

The accident to Adams was no joke to NBC and Talent Associates, which has an investment of millions riding on the comedian. Like only a few other stars Lucille Ball, Andy Griffith, Jim Nabors — Adams is virtually irreplaceable in his television series, since his personality is so firmly imprinted on it.

Fortunately for all concerned, Adams is recovering from the accident, with no apparent damage to his face or to his inimitable voice,
