8 Students, Adviser Die in Cornell Blaze

Many Flee Building on Sheet Ropes

ITHACA, N. Y. (AP)—Nine persons—eight students and a faculty adviser—died today in a smoky fire that swept a Cornell University residence hall in the pre-dawn hours.

Eleven other persons, eight of them staff students, suffered from smoke inhalation but none was considered in serious condition.

Among the dead students were three who were taking over a six-year experimental course for top-ranked freshmen seeking associate degrees.

A university spokesman said the two-story, cinder-block building on the edge of the city campus housed 71 persons, including 48 in the experimental program.

The cause of the fire was not determined, Firemen said it apparently began in the basement.

The bodies were discovered in hallways, rooms and in the lobby.

Shells dangling from modern, horizontal paneled windows indicated an escape route used by more than a score of the students.

A policeman among the first on the scene told a newspaper that there was no visible fire from the building but "people were hanging out of all the windows."

University President James B. Zerkline was in Paris when informed of the tragedy.

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LBJ Asks Postal Pay Increase

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Lyndon B. Johnson today asked Congress to raise postal rates to \$1.50 a year for a three-year pay increase of some \$1.5 billion for all federal employees and members of the armed forces.

In a special message, Johnson recommended that the cost of mailing letters be increased by 2 cents. The charge for first-class mail would go to 6 cents and an air mail stamp would cost 9 cents.

The President also called for increases in all other postal rates.

Johnson proposed that the government's 2.5 million civilian employees, and members of the armed forces, be given an average pay increase of 6.6 percent effective Oct. 1.

In addition, he called for further increases on Oct. 1, 1968, and Oct. 1, 1969, for civilian workers.

Johnson said that would make federal salaries, compared with those in private industry, and "with a similar increase for the armed forces, the cost would be more than \$1.5 billion per year."

The chief executive balked at such a demand for a pay raise against ABC, CBS and NBC, private pay as soon as possible.

He added, however, "in view of today's fiscal and economic conditions, my advisers inform me that it is not likely to be the end of the road for the postal rates." (See Page Fourteen)

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Grant Leads Republicans To Victory in Vernon Vote

By MALCOLM BARLOW The new government will take over on April 15. Voters approved a budget in the future in one of the three questions on the ballot. But a proposal to abolish the annual town budget meeting was overwhelmingly defeated.

Democrats, it appears, stayed away from the polls in large numbers. Nearly 500 registered Democrats in the city, it was reported, did not show up out of more than 1,400 eligible voters.

Republicans took over the Board of Education and the Board of Selectmen. But the 9-6 split in the Board of Representatives continued with the Democrats taking four seats from District I and two from District II and the Republicans vice-versa.

In the last two years control of the Board of Representatives was decided by the presiding mayor who cast the tie-breaking vote.

Control of the Board of Education is now clearly Republican as the content of the board switched from 4 Democrats to 4 Republicans.

Both Republican candidates Charles O'Flinn and Joseph Powers were put on the board by the voters along with Mrs. Marie Herbet, Democrat. They replace Democrats Peter Humphrey and Dr. Robert Giacomoni and Republican Arthur Calahan.

Powers was the highest voter on the slate topping even Grant with 3,160 votes. The most surprising thing the voters did was in the city vote.

Grant defeated Peter Humphrey, Democrat, for the mayor's office by a total of 3,171 to 2,711 votes or more than 400 votes townwide.

Grant even took what was supposed to be a Democratic stronghold, the old city of Rockville, by 1,401 to 1,386 votes.

On what appeared to be a consolidation backlash, John E. Grant led the Republican party to victory in town elections yesterday.

Grant defeated Peter Humphrey, Democrat, for the mayor's office by a total of 3,171 to 2,711 votes or more than 400 votes townwide.

Emergency Phone Setup Is Revealed HARTFORD (AP)—Gov. John Dempsey confirmed today that the nation's governors are being offered special telephones to receive emergency communications from the President.

"This is a civil defense measure," Dempsey said at his morning news conference.

He released a letter from State Civil Defense Director William L. Schatman, which said the equipment "provides a means to disseminate civil defense information and an attack warning message directly to the chief executives of the states."

The 41-year-old retired manufacturing director of the International Trade Mart was arrested Wednesday by FBI agents in a message from the federal authorities, possibly an hour before the President will talk to the governors.

"The governors will not be able to use these phones to talk to one another," Schatman said.

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Norwich Pastor Arraigned in Church Burglary

NORWICH (AP)—A Greek Orthodox priest was held under \$2,000 bond today on charges of larceny and receiving and entering involving the church of which he had been pastor.

The Rev. Stanley Markonias, 38, was arrested Tuesday and arraigned in Circuit Court on charges that he broke into the Holy Trinity Church and took records and books last March 31.

The court appointed a public defender for Father Markonias, who was suspended from his priestly duties by the church hierarchy last fall—and ordered a psychiatric examination for him.

He became priest of Holy Trinity in October 1965. After that his suspension he continued to live with his family in the parish home next to the church.

Police said the records and books have been recovered.

Before coming to Holy Trinity, Father Markonias served as pastor of churches in Dover, N.H., Fresno, Calif., and Highland Park, N.Y.

NEW YORK (AP)—Civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. has unveiled a major program of teach-ins, protests and mass demonstrations in an effort to gain attention for the government's demonstration "that we have been wrong about the beginning of our adventure in Vietnam."

Fifty-five nations have achieved independence since the founding of the United Nations in 1945. As a tribute to those newly independent countries, the U. N. Postal Administration has issued a new stamp in two denominations, 5 cents and 11 cents.

The design of the new U. N. stamp features a fireworks display, the traditional way of celebrating independence. Also on the stamp are the U. N. seal and the word "Independence" in a semicircle around the seal.

The date "1967" appears in the stamp in blue, yellow, pink and green.

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Sheinwold on Bridge

Several thousand college students competed last month in the annual intercollegiate championship, playing hands constructed by Larry Rostler and Jeff Rubens. A commendable number of contestants found the right line of play in today's opening lead—three of diamonds.

At most tables East took the ace of diamonds and continued with the jack of diamonds. Each declarer won and cashed the three top clubs. So far, so good; but the next play was crucial.

If South next led the king of hearts he went down. West took the ace of hearts and returned a diamond to cut the return of the suit.

At this stage South could be sure of only three clubs, two diamonds, two hearts and one spade. South needed another spade trick, but whenever anybody led spades West would lead the king of spades and defeat the contract with two good diamonds.

In order to make the contract South must steal a spade trick before he leads the hearts. The queen of diamonds, cashes the three top clubs and then leads the queen of spades.

If a defender is foolish enough to take the trick, South can win the diamond return and get to dummy with the jack of spades to cash the rest of the clubs. Declarer wins six clubs, two diamonds and one spade.

If nobody takes the queen of spades South is sure of two spade tricks and still has a diamond stopper. He switches to the king of hearts to force out the ace, win the diamond return and then takes two spades, two hearts, two diamonds and three clubs.

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP) — Cloudy, skies will continue overcast through New England today, says the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Copying 'Nile River' Floods, Little Coon Creek Overflows

CANTON, Md. (AP)—Since the time of Joseph, the Nile River has flooded each year to refurbish the river land with water and silt and boost Egyptian farm production.

In southwest Missouri, 20,000 M. B. B. borrows this technique to grow bumper crops on land that a generation ago brought farmers a bare living.

For Potrot, the Nile is Little Coon Creek, a sluggish meandering stream searching its way through the rolling country for the Spring River.

It is winter and early spring. It can turn into a swollen, gushing torrent. This is when Potrot captures part of the excess water in ponds to use when the rains fall and the broiling Missouri sun threatens to shrivel the crops.

This land has come through the white sequoias of poverty, depression, drought, depression, everything," Potrot said. "We're doing a good job of farming now by returning the silt back to the soil and planting wheat."

In 1966, southwest Missouri was a drought disaster area. Only 28 inches of rain fell, compared to the normal 48. By pumping excess creek water into an 11-acre pond, Potrot irrigated 270 acres. His corn yielded 120 bushels an acre, and a field of green beans netted him \$85 an acre.

"That ain't disaster," Potrot grinned.

Most irrigation in the United States involves drawing of water from deep wells or ditches by from simply supplied pumps. Neither works in southwest Missouri. Potrot believes he has a cheap, simple method of turning poor land and dead-end rainfall into riches for his community. It could be the key to industrial development in the area.

It involves a system of ponds, gates—perhaps months later—he and dams.

About a year ago Potrot and other business leaders formed the Ozark Agricultural and Industrial Development Corp. Their proposed development area includes 2.1 million acres and extends into portions of Kansas and Oklahoma.

"We've been getting good support from our congressmen—both in Missouri and Kansas—in rubber as well as in any means," Dale said.

Area industry, Dale and Potrot claim, will develop as irrigation produces specialized crops such as beans, strawberries and other high-value commodities.

"When we open up production in Missouri and Kansas, we can supply raw materials for the Suez Canal. The 42-inch line is Potrot said. "We ship our stuff 1,060 miles long."

do it all here at home?" Potrot, a graduate of the University of Illinois, has been farming the "hard pan" of southwest Missouri since the 1920s. His methods have attracted interest from federal and state agricultural officials for years. He also has been cited for wildlife conservation, and his ponds and thickets are favorite haunts of geese, ducks, quail and other small game.

Teacher Pay Talks Continued by Sides

Board of education negotiations with teachers continued last night despite the fact that the Education Association has sent a letter to the state board of education requesting that the talks go to mediation.

After a lengthy executive session on teacher and administrator salaries, both sides emerged to report "no comment" and "no progress."

Both teacher and administrative salaries are part of the mediation request by the EAC. In addition, it is requesting mediation on fringe benefits, department and grade level compensation, and reimbursement for the audio-visual director, on-the-road driver training instructors and the director of driver training.

Earlier in last night's meeting, spokesmen for the EAC explained their proposal for reimbursement of department and grade level chairmen. They are calling for a minimum \$300 compensation, or a percentage of the base pay up to 5 per cent for each teacher in the department, whichever is the greater.

A department chairman in charge of three teachers, then, would receive 3 per cent of his salary, or the minimum \$300 whichever would compensate that chairman the most.

The EAC claims that its proposal will cost less than the board's, which is based on a flat rate of from \$200 to \$400 based on department size.

The EAC further claims that its proposal takes into better consideration a teacher's experience and educational background by using the salary schedule as a base.

Driver Training
Also under discussion last night was driver training. The EAC is proposing that on-the-road instruction be compensated at \$4 per hour, which is also the current rate for classroom instruction in this proposed budget was directed to board members last night. The board of finance has reported to the school board that it will not make cuts in the school board's budget nor at until after the public budget hearings.

These are scheduled in two weeks, with the annual town meeting set for May. Any cuts from the board of finance will be affected before the town meeting.

The school board will then have an opportunity to present its proposed budget to the town on April 17. It reflects an increase of 16 per cent over the current appropriation of \$1,226,000. The board approved the proposed \$1,236,000 budget two weeks ago by a 5-1 vote.

Lupton Sees Little Chance Of Convention Bill Passage

HARTFORD (AP)—Connecticut does not seem destined to cut out of the ranks of states that are asking for a national constitutional convention to deal with reapportionment.

Sen. John M. Lupton, R-Weston, conceded Tuesday that his resolution, which would align Connecticut with the 32 states that have urged a national convention, would find little support in the newly redistricted Senate and the reapportioned House.

Two more states are needed to complete the two-thirds majority specified in the Constitution before such a convention could be held.

Lupton said his resolution would put the Senate on record as favoring the right of state legislatures to decide for themselves whether one chamber may be apportioned "on a basis other than population alone."

He will introduce the resolution Wednesday.

Earl Yost Techniques Differ For Base Stealers

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Stranglehold Maury Willis held on the National League base stealing championship for six consecutive seasons, 1960-1965, was finally broken by speedster Lou Brock of the St. Louis Cardinals last season.

Has the Red Bird leftfielder any sense about the goal for 1967? This question I posed of the former Chicago Cub flycatcher who didn't reach stardom until traded to the Cards. "No," he shot back. "I'm not setting any goals for myself anymore. Two years ago I made 60 steals myself and I got 65, so that's the last time I set a figure."

"My ambition now is to improve my base stealing percentage," he added. "Two years ago I stole 68 bases out of 92 tries for 68 per cent. Now I'd like to up that figure to 90 per cent. That would automatically put me in the 50s in steals as I continue to run as much."

Brock was only a so-so outfielder with speed while wearing Cub flannels. But since coming over to St. Louis, he has probably improved, so much so, that he was named to the National League All-Star team. The major league record of 104 base thefts was set by Willis in 1962.

Better Coaching

"The pitchers hold the runners on better, too," he added, "because the farm system coaches now instruct the young pitchers on how to improve their move to first base."

Talking with Willis several days earlier, I was surprised when he said: "It's easier for me to steal second base against a left-handed pitcher than when a righthander is working. I think I can get a bigger jump on a pitcher when he's looking at me and I can see the ball."

"Base stealing isn't the most important thing in me," Brock added. "You know it can affect your hitting if you just think of stealing bases. You have to get on base first before you can steal."

"People are too wary of the steal nowadays. I don't think anyone will ever break Willie's record for steals. Just five years ago, when I broke in with the Cubs, there weren't two catchers in each league who could take off."

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Pirates Have Candidate For Best Hitting Coach

NEW YORK (AP)—The slugging Pittsburgh Pirates, not satisfied with having the top hitter in the National League last season, have unveiled their candidate for the best hitting coach in the league.

He is catcher Hal Smith, known more for his defensive abilities before a heart ailment sidelined him midway through the 1965 season.

Smith, who will be 36 on June 1, took part in hand Tuesday and singled to start a three-run rally that stopped the Boston Red Sox.

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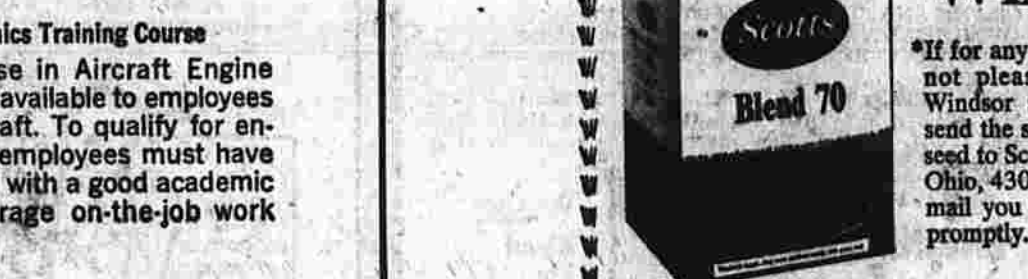

Dad Pays \$250,000, Kidnaped Boy Free

BEVERLY HILLS, CALIF. (AP) — The 11-year-old son of a diamond merchant was kidnaped from his bedroom Monday morning but returned to his home today, unharmed, after the family paid \$250,000 ransom.

The boy, Kenneth Young, was taken from his home in a car parked in a garage in Beverly Hills and was taken to a house in Santa Monica about 3:30 a.m. today.

He waited a half hour, according to the kidnappers' instructions, then giggled free and ran to an apartment house to telephone his parents.

His father, Herbert J. Young, 53, said \$250,000 ransom was asked but did not disclose how much was paid. The FBI in Washington said it was \$250,000.

The father is president of the Gibraltar Savings and Loan Association.

The FBI said the kidnappers picked up the ransom Wednesday in Westwood, a few miles from Beverly Hills and were a large.

When he was greeted by the FBI and his family at the apartment, "Kenny was very calm, not hysterical or crying," Young said. "He said, 'I'm a little scared, I'm a little sleepy.' He acted as if he expected it to end all the time. It was like he'd never been gone."

As Kenneth was examined by a doctor and put to bed in the lavish Young home in a fashionable neighborhood, his father said he was relieved.

Reds Assist 200 To Flee Viet Jail

SAIGON, (AP) — Communist Marines plus the Vietnamese 1st Division and militia troops, in a Viet Cong military position, staged a jailbreak today at Quang Tri, a provincial capital in the north.

The Viet Cong guerrillas were aided by a primary objective of the new mass invasion attempt from the north.

They ringed the city in raids, between midnight and dawn. They attacked U.S. anti-aircraft gun positions and headquarters of two Vietnamese army regiments and shelled the U.S. military advisers' compound.

They freed more than 200 prisoners from the provincial prison, most of whom had been picked up as Viet Cong suspects.

Initial reports said 10 American soldiers were killed and 13 wounded while the Communists set up a base in the city.

Eight trucks were burned at a gas station and four jeeps and three trucks were damaged at another. At a small airstrip, two Viet Cong planes were shot up.

More Communist made sporadic attacks on several villages south of South Vietnamese army headquarters.

The U.S. separated and deployed six long stabilization booms that gave the appearance of a giant shield.

The booms, extending to a span of 200 feet, were part of an experiment to use the booms as a means of keeping

Space Craft Circling in Wrong Orbit

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A \$4-million satellite launched from the Cape today is circling around the globe in the wrong orbit, its mission ruined by a misfiring rocket engine.

The "daddy language" satellite, officially called Application Technology Satellite 1, is circling in the wrong orbit today, its mission ruined by a misfiring rocket engine.

The satellite was launched from Cape Kennedy.

The Agena upper stage hurtled the 48-pound payload into a preliminary orbit ranging from 154 to 7,000 miles high, but after it fired a fuel valve failed to close.

With the valve open, the engine could not ignite to boost the payload into a 7,000-mile-high circular orbit and it continued in the long elliptical path.

The ATS separated and deployed six long stabilization booms that gave the appearance of a giant shield.

The booms, extending to a span of 200 feet, were part of an experiment to use the booms as a means of keeping

GI's Slay 4 Reds In Korea Flareup

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — An investigation was a witness at the U.N. and North Korea observers made a joint four-hour investigation today of an armistice line area where U.S. soldiers and North Koreans who suddenly clashed Wednesday in one of the most serious gunfights since the 1953 Korean armistice.

The U.N. Command said the North Koreans claimed four of their men were killed and two were wounded. But the North Korean Central News Agency said five North Koreans were killed and a sixth wounded.

Before the investigation, the U.N. Command had reported three North Koreans killed.

There were no U.S. casualties.

A U.N. Command statement said the North Koreans observed the bodies of two North Koreans killed on the south side of the armistice line and that these bodies were turned over to the Communists.

The Communists exhibited the bodies of two other North Koreans who they claimed were killed north of the armistice line. The U.N. Command said that the bodies "apparently had been moved north" by the Communists during the night.
