### Postal Service, Inc.? Everybody-absolutely everybody with no exceptions—wants absolutely contradictory things from the Post Office De-

Congress, which is the big ultimate boss under the present arrangement, wants the Post Office Department to support itself while it requires the Department to operate with rules and

rates which make it impossible for the

Department to break even. Congress, operating on such a philosophy, is entirely capable of refusing to appropriate additional funds to the Department and of refusing to allow the Department to charge higher rates in the same session, all while it also, no doubt, occasionally registers complaints about the quality of the service.

As for the public the Department serves, it demands instant delivery efficlency at low rates and is quite willing to have its own particular rates subsidized, either by the general taxpayer, or by other users of the Department's facilities. What the ordinary citizen seliom realizes is that he, as primarily a first class letter man, always pays his own way, and probably contributes to he subsidization of other classes of mail which don't pay their own way, especially the junk mail which nobody even wants to receive but which almost everybody helps subsidize.

the public stands the valiant array of administrators and executives who have come into the system, sometimes through politics, sometimes through civil service, and who become dedicated to an ideal of private enterprise style efficiency in an atmosphere

of bureaucratic buck-passing. This latter class usually comes to the desperate realization that it really has no kind of chance. And Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, who seems to have come to this desperate frame of mind in a very short time despite what should be the philosophy of a background in politics, has now dramatized his own feelings by openly recommending that the present system be abandoned, and the postal service be set up as a nonprofit Government corporation. He would have this corporation, after it had been given original guidelines for the distribution of its costs among various types of services, empowered to operate with rates on a fixed formula basis. And he would have the executives of the corporation given actual power and control over all the elements of its opera-

We don't expect Postmaster General O'Brien's recommendation to be adopted. Neither do we expect his recent warning-that his department "is in a race with catastrophe"-to prove itself literally true. We expect more muddling through, leavened and perhaps civilized, to a mild extent, by the fact that the Postmaster General has made both Congress and public a little more aware of their persistent habit of demanding from the Department more than anybody is willing to provide to it.

### Fits The Requirements

For years we have, in our limited vision and wisdom, been searching for some particular practice or commodity which could be made the subject of a tax which could be devoted exclusively to the financial support of the United

It has been relatively easy to formulate an abstract idea of how such a tax might be devised.

First, the thing to be taxed would have to be some item or commodity or practice not already being taxed for any of the world's lesser governmentsnational, state, city, town or district.

Second, it would have to be an item or commodity of truly international occurrence and status, so that the taxaion involved would be broadly based.

Third, it would need to be some item sommodity or practice which could be relied upon to be a fairly continuous and standard source of revenue for the United Nations.

Fourth, it would have to be some item or commodity mankind could not do without, or learn to abstain from, so that people wouldn't ever be able to give it up to get out of paying taxes on

Fifth, it would have to be something in which cost would never be a con-

All these conditions were met, suddenly, by the simple adaptation of a random, somewhat whimsical suggestion made, the other day, by Philip Johnson, the noted architect, while addressing the Women's National Democratic Club in Washington.

What Johnson suggested was that-we merely impose a gentle 10 per cent tax on the \$20,000,000,000 a year we are spending on the war in Vietnam, and use the tax income to cure some of the ugliness of America's cities.

Universal in character, not now subject to tax by any existing government, the most reliable recurrent practice in history, the one thing man keeps proving he cannot do without, and the one thing in which money is never any object-the perfect thing to be taxed is war. The United Nations would be guaranteed permanent solvency.

### "I Oppose The War In Vietnam"

It is estimated that we spend \$322,-000 for each enemy we kill, while we spend in the so-called war on poverty in America only about \$53 for each person classified as "poor" and much of that \$53 goes for salaries of people who are not poor. We have escalated the war in Vietnam and de-escalated the skirmish against poverty. It challenges the imagination to contemplate what lives we could transform if we were to cease killing. . . .

America is a great nation, but in this war she seems bent on her destruction. Through rugged and dazzling achievements. America has become the richest and most powerful nation in the world. We have built machines that think and instruments that peer into the unfathomable ranges of interstellar

We have both gargantuan bridges to span the seas and gigantic buildings to kiss the skies. Through our airplanes and spaceships we have dwarfed distance and placed time in chains, and through our subways we have penetrated oceanic depths. This year, our Gross National Product will reach the astounding figure of \$780-billion. All of this is a staggering picture of our great pow-

But honesty impels me to admit that our power has often made us arrogant. We feel that our money can do anything. We arrogantly feel that we have everything to teach other nations and nothing to learn from them. We often arrogantly feel that we have some living messionic mission to police the whole world. We are arrogant in not allowing young nations to go through the same growing pains, turbulence and revolution that characterizes our his-


We arm Negro soldiers to kill on foreign battlefields, but offer little protection for their relatives from beatings and killings in our own South. We are willing to make the Negro 100 per cent of a citizen in warfare, but reduce him to 50 per cent of a citizen on American soil. Of all good things in life, the Ne gro has approximately one-half those of whites; of the bad, he has twice that of whites. Thus, half of all Negroes live in substandard housing, and he has half the income of whites. When we turn to the negative experience of life, the Negro has a double share. There are twice as many Negroes in combat in Vietnam at the beginning of 1967 and twice as many died in action (20.6 per cent) in proportion to their number in the popu-

All of this reveals that our nation has not yet used its vast resources of power to end the long night of poverty, racism and man's inhumanity to man. Enlarged power means enlarged peril if there is not concommitant growth of the soul. Genuine power is the right use of strength. If our nation's strength is not used responsibly and with restraint, it will be following Acton's dictum, power that tends to corrupt and absolute

power that corrupts absolutely. Our arrogance can be our doom. It can bring the curtains down on our national drama. Ultimately, a great nation is a compassionate nation. We are challenged in these turbulent days to use our power to speed up the day when "every valley shall be exalted and every mountain and hill shall be made low; and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain." Let me say finally that I oppose the

war in Vietnam because I love America. I speak out against it not in anger but with anxiety and sorrow in my heart, and above all with a passionate desire to see our beloved country stand as the moral example of the world. I speak out against this war because I am disappointed with America. There can be no great disappointment where there is no great love. I am disappointed with our failure to deal positively and forthrightly with triple evils of racism, extreme materialism and militarism. We are presently moving down a dead-end road which can lead to national disaster. . . .

Those of us who love peace must organize as effectively as the war hawks. they spread the propaganda of war, we must spread the propaganda of peace. We must combine the fervor of the civil rights movement with the peace movement. We must demonstrate, teach and preach, until the very foundations of our nation are shaken. We must work increasingly to lift this nation that we love to a higher destiny, to a new plateau of compassion, to a
