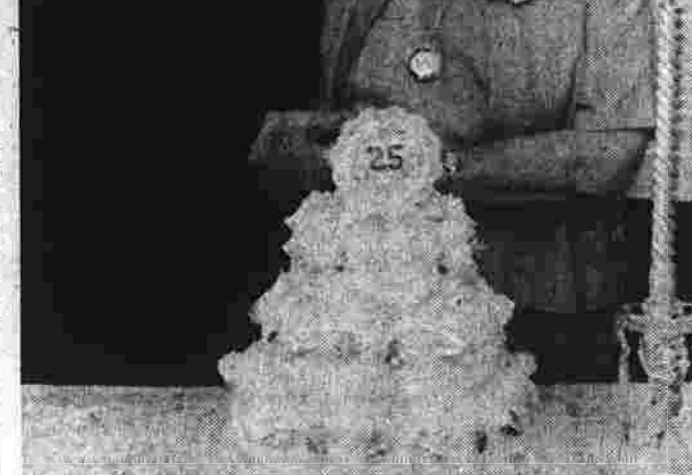

POLICE SCHOOL PLANNED HARTFORD (AP)—The Connecticut Municipal Police Training Council has selected a site for a \$1.5 million police academy. Road, Sewer Funds On Agenda Tuesday

The Board of Directors Tuesday night, is expected to allocate \$47,141 from the Capital Improvement Reserve Fund to pay its 50 per cent share of road and sewer improvements into Green Manor's Manchester Industrial Park. The improvements will be from Colonial Rd.

The action is considered routine because the board has already approved from the Industrial Reserve Fund under the recently adopted industrial park plan. The allocation will be the first under the new rates.

Green Manor will be required to pay 50 per cent to guarantee that the town will recoup its cost within seven years, either from increased tax revenue in the industrial park or from the sewer bond.

Tuesday's regular board meeting will be at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

Reno Cleared
WASHINGTON (AP) — Maj. Marcus A. Reno has been cleared of charges of drunkenness and taking liberties with another man's wife that led to his dishonorable discharge from the Army 37 years ago.

The action probably means little to Reno, who died here of cancer in 1959. But it does permit removal of his body from an unmarked Washington grave to a national cemetery where only the honorably discharged may be buried.

Reno once was accused of cowardly failure to aid Col. George A. Carter at the Battle of Little Bighorn where Reno wanted to rebury the major's body and his unit were wiped out in 1876. Although a court of inquiry cleared him of that charge, he was kicked out of the Army four years later on the other charges.

Charles Reno, 54, a New York City bartender and a great-grandson of the major, filed a petition last October to have his great-great-uncle's name cleared.

An Army board for correction of military records reviewed the case and said Wednesday the recent loss of Reno's wife, his state of bachelorhood in a deserted frontier fort and in the field and the attendant primitive conditions were not conducive to producing "blatant soldiers."

First in Medical School Continues Trying Life

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — When Hamilton Earl Holmes regains his status at the University of Georgia six years ago, demonstrators robed the Athens campus and there were shouts of "nigger, go home!"

But Holmes, who integrated the sprawling state university with a high school classmate, Charlyne Hunter, did not leave. He graduated in 1963, a Phi Kappa student, and planned to become a doctor.

Next month the serious young Negro will become the first member of his race to graduate from the Emory University Medical School.

After that his life, as it always has been, will be laid out like chapters in a book. The most trying part — his years at the University of Georgia — is over but not forgotten.

Holmes, who will be 28 in July, speaks of his life on the Athens campus without bitterness.

"While I was down there I never enjoyed it," he said. "But I thought I benefited from it. It's a pretty good school. I got a good background in the basic sciences."

Holmes, who transferred to Georgia from Morehouse College in Atlanta, lived off the Athens campus and said he made no friends.

"Now that I'm away from there, it wasn't too awful bad," he said. "It was good education and it helped me to mature an awful lot. The big drawback was the social life. It was nonexistent."

"I treasured those weekends," he said.

Holmes, a stocky and muscular man, also was the first Negro to enroll in the medical school at Emory, a Methodist Church-affiliated school.

But he said a number of other Negroes were accepted, although only one chose to attend. "That was his decision," he said.

Holmes said Emory had been a pleasant and enjoyable experience for him.

"Basically the big difference between Emory and Georgia has been the attitudes of my classmates. The faculty at Georgia was helpful and cordial and fair. But the students were cold and not friendly. I was never quite accepted."

Holmes said he plans to intern in Michigan at the Detroit General Hospital, beginning July 1. He said there were several factors which led to the choice.

"I've been in the South for all these years," he said. "I was born here, grew up here, and went to school here. I'd like to go off just for the remainder of my training. It's not that the training here wouldn't be good. I just think the perspective

Not In Triumph. It would be pleasant to be able to read that Walter Lippmann, a presence who has so often seeped almost the only remembrance of sanity within the nation, is retiring from his regular column of security, dignity and wisdom.

He deserves, for his past services to us all, a departure which would be a triumph. But we do not always get what we deserve.

The actual reading of the circumstances and the intentions of the Lippmann retirement comes out as a touch of sadness and cruelty in it.

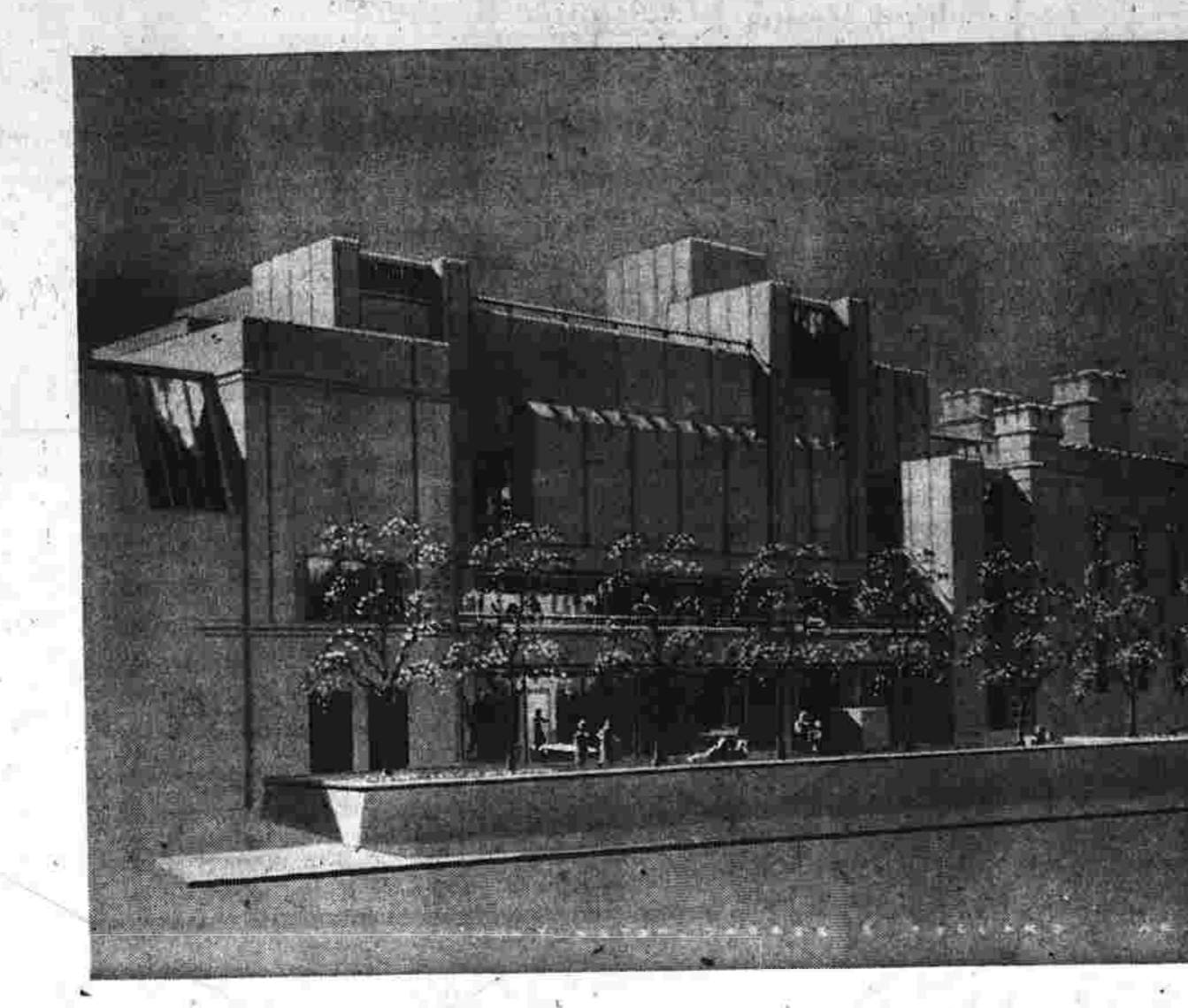
He withdraws from his ordeal with the world at the moment when the world is rushing pell-mell and point-blank in directions his own reason and intelligence label disastrous folly.

It is a disappointment of such a figure as Walter Lippmann, so wise and cool for so many decades upon the scene, to acknowledge that, at the age of 77, the world has succeeded in battering him, and weakening him, until he has had moments of losing his own composure, of letting the boresness in others get under his own skin.

This is all a measure of the world, and of human beings, even more than it is a measure of Lippmann. He has been what he has been, and that has been, the price, the greatest of our time, that his times should finally, in his advanced years, be able to bring him to bay, and unnerve even him, and even yield a cheap chuckle, at his departure, to vulgarly in high place, is a bitter sadness, but something to be noted, and not glossed over.

Science Catches Up To The Myth. The story of how the myth of disease detectives are beginning to zero in on the sources and courses of salmonella, the bacteria which is responsible for most of the country's food poisoning incidents is almost unbelievable in some of its details.

3 Die on Israel-Syria Border In First Armed Clash of Crisis

Fight Follows Recall Of Hawkish General

JERUSALEM (AP)—An armed clash erupted on Israel's border with Syria today, bringing the first fatalities since the Middle East crisis broke out. Israel's army spokesman said two Israelis and a Syrian were killed. The fighting came a few hours after the appointment of Gen. Moshe Dayan, a vigorous fighting man and architect of the Suez war of 1956, as defense minister. Israel looked to Egypt to prosecute a vigorous policy. The skirmishing was at the border near the Golan Heights, a territory largely by settlers from Britain. It is less than a mile from the Israeli border and about 10 miles north of the Sea of Galilee. An Israeli army spokesman said an Israeli patrol encountered four armed Syrians as they were returning to Syria. The Israeli patrol shot at the Syrians' body were a sub-machine gun, two antipersonnel mines and ammunition. It was the second day of firing on Israel's border with its Arab neighbors. Jordan said it opened a Thursday on an Israeli helicopter that flew over its half of divided Jerusalem. Israel said a shell burst hit a house but no casualties were reported. At the border incident added to war jitters. French President Charles de Gaulle spoke out on the Middle East crisis, warning that any nation opening fire will have "neither the approval nor support" of France. Arab states have considered France a friend in the crisis although it has sold arms to Israel in the past. "The worst thing which could happen would be the opening of hostilities," De Gaulle said in a Paris statement. De Gaulle again called for the United States, the Soviet Union, and Britain to mediate.

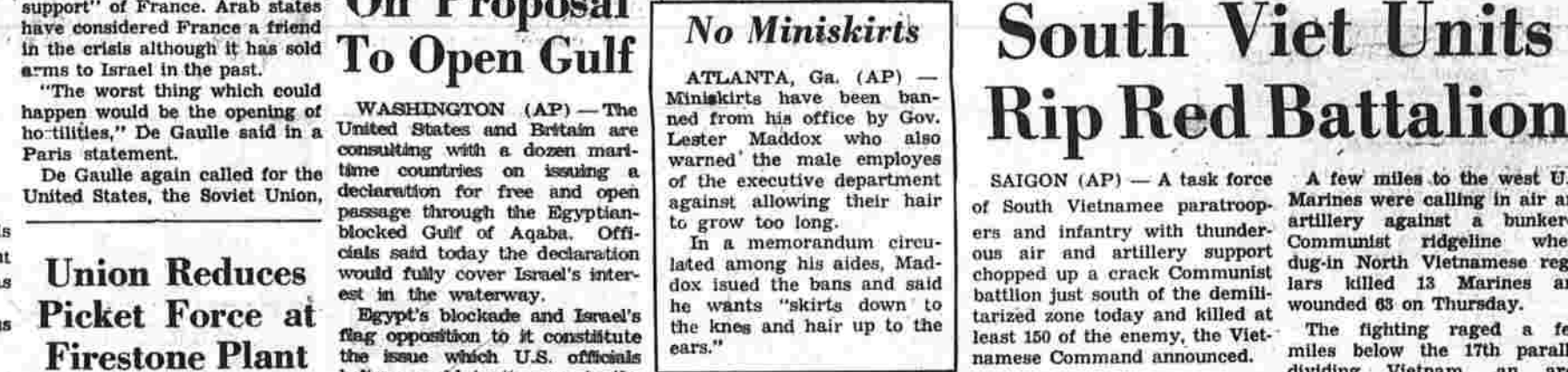

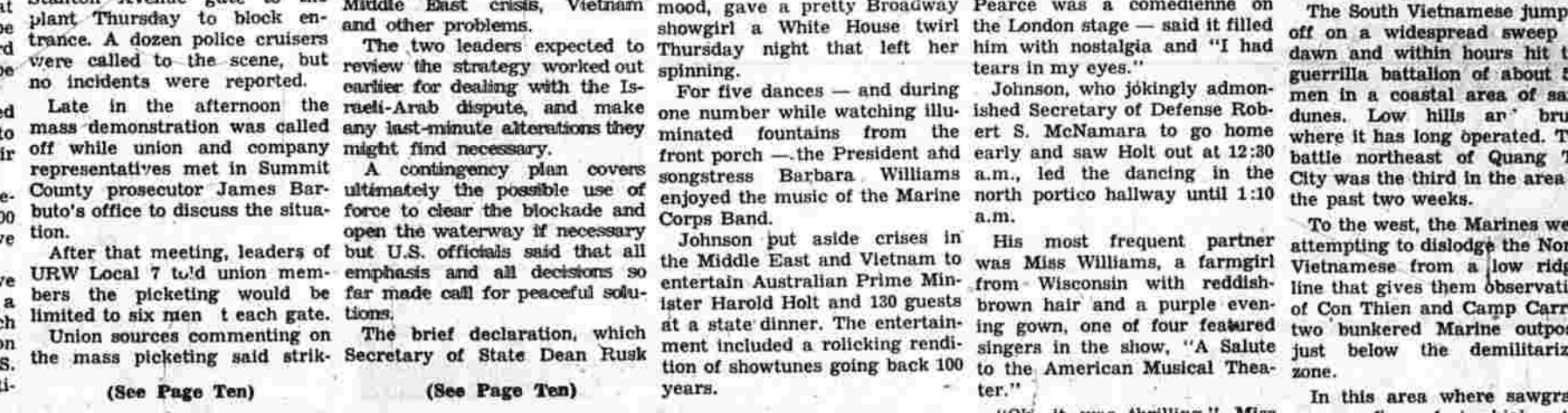
