France Joins UN Debate

Vietnam War Tied To Mideast Peace

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—France declared today that as long as the war in Vietnam continues, there is "no chance for peace in the Middle East."

It would back Israel's right to exist and its rights to use of international waterways, and it would support withdrawal of troops, but again the wording would be vague, leaving the door open for future negotiations.

They were at the Soviet mission, preparing to be hosts at a luncheon to U.N. Secretary General U Thant, and perhaps waiting for a break on the possibility of a Kosygin meeting with President Johnson.

The French foreign minister's statement was in tone. He avoided the direct condemnation of Israel that he had highlighted a statement Wednesday by President Charles de Gaulle.

It was clear, he said, that no matter what conclusions were reached in this date on Israel's swift victory over the Arabs, recognition is the only possible course of action.

As he spoke, diplomats of Asia, Africa and Latin America, who consider their nations relatively neutral and balanced in the big East-West contest, groped for a formula intended to save face for all parties concerned.

Dodd Stays Confident Despite Early Defeat

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., thumbed more steeply uphill against Senate passage today after overwhelming rejection of a move to substitute mid-ammunition for one set of the charges against him. But he insisted he was still confident.

The Senate, in its first vote after seven days of debate, rejected Dodd's amendment by a 54-46 vote.

Dodd, excused from voting at his own request, said the rejected vote didn't discourage him.

The white-haired, two-term senator told newsmen later he has "complete confidence" in the final outcome because "I have been guilty of no conscious wrongdoing."

U.S. Air Attacks Renewed Against Hanoi Rail Lines

SAIGON (AP)—U. S. forces reported killing 143 Communist troops in two battles in the central lowlands Wednesday while waves of U. S. jets ranged over a wide area to pound North Vietnam's rail network and its biggest iron and steel works.

American casualties in the lowlands battles 800 miles north of Saigon were six dead, 22 wounded and four missing, U. S. Command said. It said there was light, scattered contact in 21 other U. S. and allied ground operations.

With good weather prevailing, U. S. Air Force and Navy pilots flew 133 missions against the Communist North. They hammered 11 railroad yards and early February. American casualties for the week totaled 112 — seven less than the week before Hanoi.

Hanoi Radio claimed three U. S. planes were shot down Wednesday, including two pilotless reconnaissance craft.

U.S. Vietnam Casualties Lowest Since February

SAIGON (AP) — Fewer fighting last week was characterized by widely separated enemy contact throughout the country. This meant some sharp tactical engagements and many small clashes but no sustained fighting.

The total of 145 American dead was the lowest for a seven-day period since the week ending Feb. 11 when 107 U.S. military men died in action.

The U.S. Command also said the number of American military personnel in South Vietnam remained at 463,000 last week. The estimate of enemy personnel in the country increased 1,000 to 295,000.

Other allied forces reported 25 men killed, 33 wounded and none missing last week, compared with 11 killed, 25 wounded and none missing the week before.
