U.S. Aide in Japan Visits Here

"Being where the action" has been the career of John Coffey, foreign service officer with the U.S. State Department for the past 25 years.

He was stationed in the Philippines during periods of World War II. He was pushed out of China by Mao Tse Tung's Communists in 1949.

Other hot spots since have included Saudi Arabia and Jordan, Yugoslavia, Germany and Indonesia.

The last two years have been relatively peaceful in Japan near the city of Hiroshima, first city to be struck by an atom bomb.

Coffey is vacationing with his family at the home of his parents in Vernon.

Most of his time has been spent in the Far East under the growing shadow of Chinese Communism. He had more than strong misgivings about the Mao-led nation.

"The Chinese seek to play an important role in the Far East," Coffey said in an interview in Vernon. "It is as dangerous as observing reports."

Instating he was not an expert on China, Coffey said reports of civil war there are true. But he cautioned, "This is just one group of communists fighting another."

Japanese Concerned The Japanese are very concerned about the state there and worry about the outcome. He said not only are they close neighbors, but they have \$500 million worth of trade with him.

Japanese Communists are divided right now, he said. One faction is pro-Peking and the other pro-Moscow.

Communists hold few government offices there and are very definitely a minor party, Coffey commented.

The strongest Japanese party is the Liberal Democratic. Despite the name, it is considered very conservative.

Most of the Socialist party, it is strong, he said, but divided.

Coffey said Americans got a wrong and distorted view of Japanese position several years ago when Japanese politicians and an American representative were stabbed by rioting extremists. Japanese revolution at that time was strong, Coffey said, and they have not occurred since.

As a representative of the U.S., Coffey said he fears little on the streets of Japan. Demonstrations against the Vietnam war are frequent and angry but not violent.

Parents Charged In Murder of Daughter's Date

To let them know what their country looks like, their parents took the boys across the U.S. by train from California, arriving in New York City.

Mrs. Coffey has been a world traveler herself even from early Japan, he said. He described some of the better routes to take.

Second Girl Disappears, Fear Grows in Oklahoma

A chess master can usually take a long time to concoct his brilliant plays. A bridge expert must often do his best work without the slightest hesitation. In many situations it is fatal to let the opponent know that you have anything to think about.

Opening lead—sun of hearts. South ruffed the first heart. West followed with the ace club and cleared the top club with a low diamond from his hand. If you are now thinking about the right play from the East hand it is possible that you have a great success at chess; but you won't do well on this bridge hand.

South naturally assumes that East has the ace of diamonds. Declarer returns a diamond from dummy and tries a finesse with the 10 of diamonds. This loses to the jack, and South eventually loses another diamond to the ace.

Daily Question Partner opens with one spade, and the next player passes. The hold: Spades, Q-8; Hearts, A-Q-8-4; Diamonds, A-9-8; Clubs, 10-8-2.

What do you say? Answer: Bid 2NT. This clubs 10 to 15 points, with balanced distribution and strength.

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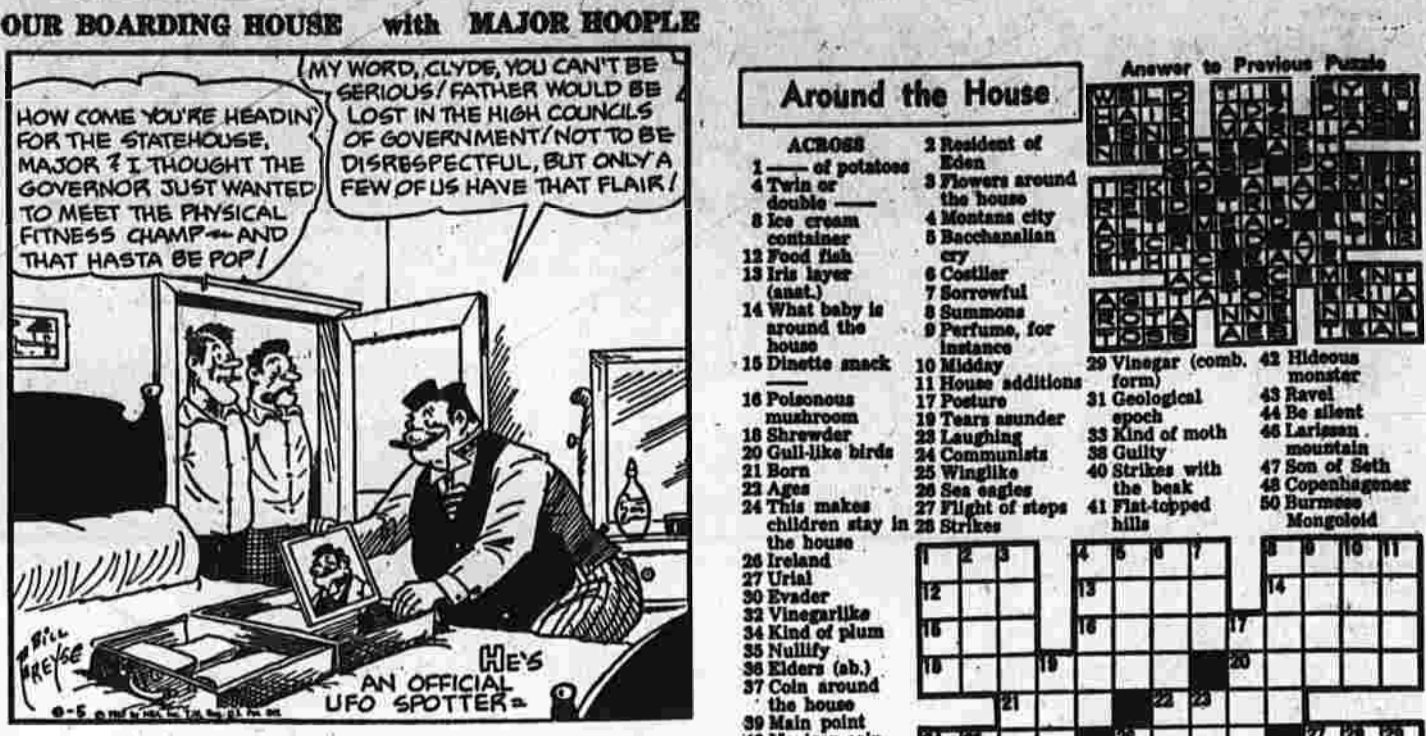

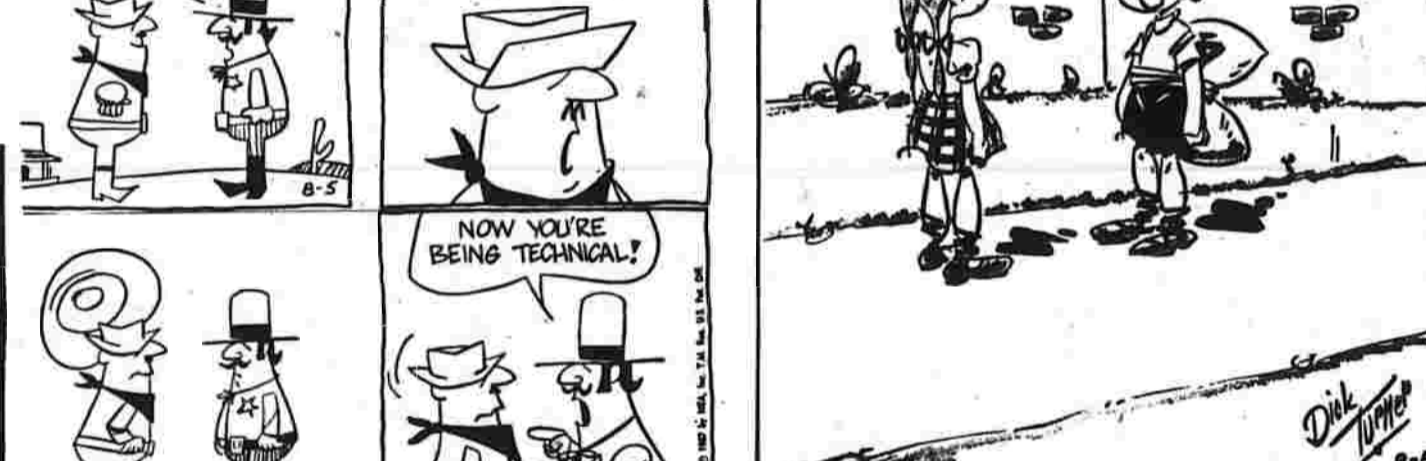
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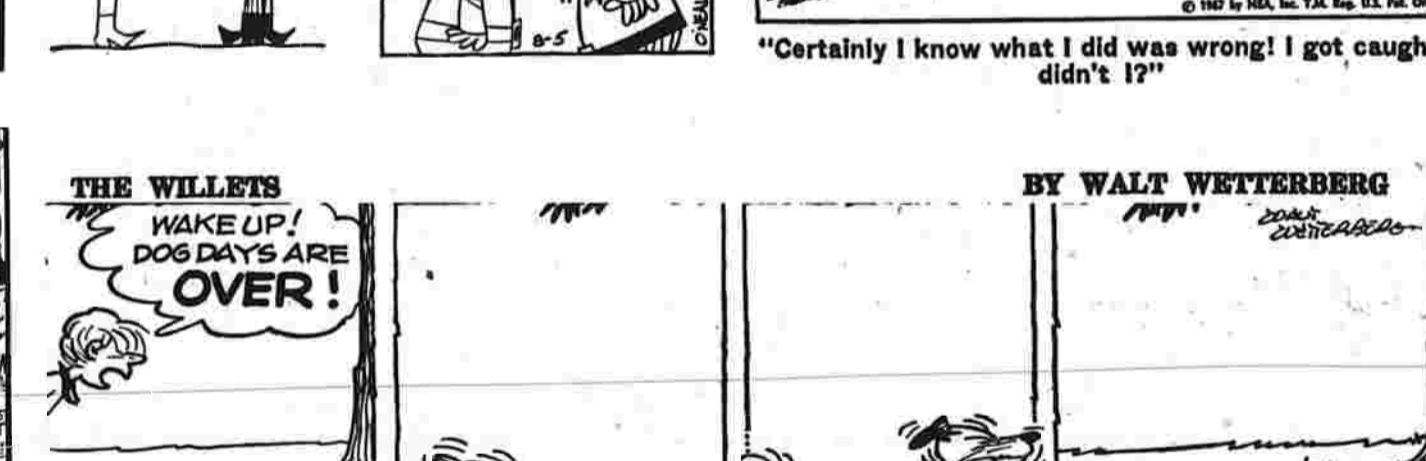

He said Johnson had deemed this useful because it had been nine months since the summit meeting of 5 allied leaders in Manila.

Taylor said there was a general feeling there should be another summit conference but no time or place has been set.

Taylor added that he found no major disagreement on the conduct of any aspect of the war.

High Rise Apartment Now in Marina Plan

The plans for a multi-million dollar marina and high rise apartment building were recently approved by the town of East Hartford. Ralph Kryzak of 20 Spring St. is the developer who asked for the zoning approval.

Kryzak's apartment-marina will be located at the site of the old Haynes Boat Yard, upstream from the Charter Oak Bridge, almost directly across the river is Constitution Plaza.

Kryzak's original plans called for a marina and restaurant to be built on the site. But the plans grew. The marina remains, and the restaurant, also but now the restaurant will be on top of the 10-story apartment.

The developer said he had bids out for the building of the project already, and that the three bids he got back so far have been "unsatisfactory." He will send the plans out for bid again soon.

The building will have "cars in the back yard and boats in the front yard," Kryzak said. Tenants will be limited to only families with children over 16 years of age.

In the immediate Hartford area there is no boating marina, Kryzak said. The closest one is in Portland. As to a luxury-type high rise waterfront apartment, none exists in the Hartford area.

The high riser will have two tennis courts and a swimming pool for its members, Kryzak said.

When plans for the marina were first proposed, a legal snag developed. The towns of Hartford and East Hartford got into a hassle on the control of the Connecticut River.

According to Kryzak, Hartford said it had control of the river right to the East Hartford shore, while East Hartford claimed the boundary between Hartford and East Hartford was the center of the river.

This issue has not been resolved, Kryzak said.

By voting to make postage for letters and post cards 6 cents—including greeting cards—and for air letters and cards 10 cents, the subcommittee added \$90.1 million to the administration's proposal for a \$571.4 million increase.

But it knocked \$69.5 million—or nearly 40 per cent—off the proposed \$175.9 million increase for third class mail, which includes such bulk mailings as catalogs, and samples as well as solicitations.

Because the two moves partially offset each other, the subcommittee bill would add annual revenue of \$846.2 million by the time all provisions take effect, while the administration proposal only added \$824.9 million. The difference would help pay for postal pay increases to be recommended in separate legislation.

First class mail currently pays about 103 per cent of its handling costs, while air mail pays 121.3 per cent. Under the subcommittee proposal, these percentages would rise to 124.3 per cent and 139.2 per cent. Regular third class mail, which was due to go from 61.2 per cent to 80.2 per cent, would only reach 73.5 per cent under the subcommittee bill. Hechler wants to raise the rate so it will cover costs.

took up positions behind trees and trained their automatic rifles on the building. Tanks lumbered up.

The youths, believed to be the same group that attacked the Chinese Embassy twice before during the past 16 months, used axes and crowbars to rip down the huge outer gate. Others scaled the 10-foot concrete wall topped with broken glass and barbed wire.

The youths, members of a small nationalistic political party, immediately set fire to a small house near the gate, apparently an office. As they got a blaze going at a second building, Indonesian troops began arriving.

The youths, with soldiers milling around them, then surged against the main building, smashing windows and damaging doors. But the Chinese apparently had been expecting such an attack, military officers said, for they had fortified the doors too strongly for the youths to break in.

The Indonesian government warned the Chinese it would tear down the embassy walls if they were not lowered from 10 feet to 5 feet.

The embassy was stoned in April last year and again this April by youths. The Red Chinese are widely accused of having been involved in the abortive Communist coup attempt of 1965.

The four existing railroad tracks will be reduced to two, by agreement with the New Haven Railroad. The State Motor Vehicle Department has estimated that 14,000 vehicles per day will use the crossing in the year 1990. All cost of the construction will be borne by the MRS, from the renewal funds.

chared close to the burned-out wreckage.

The only unburned section of the plane was the tail assembly, jammed high in the branches of a tree.

None of the occupants of several houses nearby was injured, and firemen extinguished the flames before they spread into the brush and threatened the houses.

Officials at Bridgeport Airport said visibility at the time of the crash was good and that the cloud ceiling was estimated to be about 1,500 feet.

Airport tower officials said they had given the plane a routine warning on the possibility of thunderstorms, though the nearest storm at the time of the crash was many miles away.

An occupant of one of the houses near the crash scene, Ray Elterich, said the plane "went over the house and you could hear it sputter."

Then he said he heard "a loud muffled bang in the woods and the sky lit up."

According to Elterich, the plane crashed about 50 feet from a home which was not damaged by the explosion and fire.

CRASHES INTO HOME

LANCASTER, Pa. (AP) — I saw red, white and blue markings on the plane, and I knew what was happening.

"It was coming right at me," said Kenneth J. Granbois Friday, after a small twin-engine plane smashed into his home during a violent thunderstorm, killing all three persons aboard.

Granbois and his wife, Margaret, both 62, were not injured.

The plane, en route from Danbury, Conn. to North Carolina, apparently was struck by lightning, and just missed hitting St. Joseph's Hospital, police said. Granbois said he was standing

ing just inside the front door and his wife was in the living room when the plane hit.

"I saw the plane coming right at me but I didn't recognize it for what it was at first," Granbois said. "I saw something spinning around and later I found it was a wing tore off the plane in the air."

"I walked and watched until just before it hit, and then I closed the door and stepped back a few feet," he said.

The plane hit Granbois' glass-enclosed porch and some pillars only a brick wall away from the living room.

The small craft was piloted by Kathryn Nisbet, a 46-year-old aviator who had flown in many women's air races, including the annual coast-to-coast Powder Puff Derby.

The other victims were Lee Ahlborn and his wife Barbara, who were traveling with Mrs. Nisbet from Connecticut to her home in Wachow, N.C., near Charlotte. Ahlborn was a teacher at Kent School in Kent, Conn., and his wife was a pianist and former correspondent for the Danbury and Waterbury newspapers.

The Ahlborns' four children, ranging in age from less than one year to nine years, remained in Kent.

Ahborn, who taught English literature, had accepted a post on the faculty of Phillips Exeter Academy in Exeter, N.H., and was preparing to leave Kent.

During the summer he was teaching at Columbia University graduate school in New York City.

Police said the plane left Danbury Airport at 5:48 p.m. for North Carolina.

Bits of wreckage were scattered as far as 100 blocks from the crash scene, police said. The crash also knocked out telephone and electrical service in the area.

Networks Turn to Specials

BY CYNTHIA LOWEY HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Network television's interest in special programs for the coming season dramatically illustrates the flexibility of programming. A couple of seasons back, the theory was that a special program — perhaps more expensive and intellectual than the bread-and-butter shows — normally occupy the time spot — was a good buy for a sponsor who wanted to associate his name with something classy and it gave the network something to brag about in terms of public service. Many an expensive special program actually cost the broadcasting network money, and ratings often were poor. During the past season, however, so many special programs logged high ratings in the Nielsen charts and received such ecstatic critical notices that sponsors now are as interested in underwriting them as the networks are in hunting for good properties. The old theory was that a show needed a continuing hero to persuade audiences to tune to the same network spot each week. If you weren't getting the full treatment by the hero, as in "The Andy Griffith Show," it was a good idea to have a weekly host as bait, which was Bob Hope's introductory function in his departed anthology series. During the past season there was a definite swing away from concern with the sheer numbers of viewers and new interest in audience make-up. The result was a number of highly successful programs aimed directly at special audiences. A household appliance manufacturer was delighted with results of sponsoring a musical show starring Herb Alpert and his Tijuana Brass because it attracted a big young-married audience. A soft drink manufacturer was completely happy with swinging, youth-oriented special even though the audience was shy of Lawrence Welk and Liberace fans. The sponsors of the Telephone Hour stated frankly at the season's start that they didn't expect to win any TV numbers game, but would be happy if viewers at some 12-million sets — a small number by current standards — tuned in and enjoyed their shows. During the approaching season, sponsors are eager to take over big chunks of commercial time on expensive dramatic and

Mostly, though, it is foggy and chilly. "There are problems shooting here," says executive producer Gene McCabe. "The weather is a big problem. And movability of equipment is another problem." On the sand, as though to underline McCabe's words, a bulldozer had to come and pull the camera crane out where it had bogged down. Patricia Landis, with Doris Lynn the costume team for the show, said that her problem was to get a variety of bikinis. The girl dancers and the girls who just hang around all wear them, and how much can you do to a bikini? "Some girls," Pat Landis said, almost to herself, "look sexy in anything. And some girls, even in the skimpiest bikini, still manage to look like saints." Most of the Bob Bana dancers were of the former type, happily. Ed also is host on NBC's new day-time game show, "Snap Judgment." Here he writes, with considerable awe, about Johnny's activities. NEW YORK (AP) — People always ask that question: "What is Johnny Carson like?" Here is: There has to be something a little nuts about a guy who wants to free-fall from an airplane holding the title cards for

the "Tonight Show" with a moving photographer free-falling beside him filming an opening for the show. We talked him out of it. He has played football with the Jets — he suited up and scrimmaged with them. He pitched once to the leadoff man of the New York Yankees in Yankee Stadium. He scuba-dived off Freeport, Grand Bahama. He did some stage flying in a Peter Pan rig. He did a hand-over-hand peg climb some 20 feet up a wall. He has hand-fed ice cream to a 300-pound jaguar. He has done a Twiggly imitation with a wrap-around boa, only this boa

was a boa constrictor, still living and looking hungry to me. He even allowed an American bald eagle to perch on his shoulder. He learned bravery early, at the age of 18, when he was doing a magic act as The Great Carson. Rumor says the act was done from the back of a moving truck. He can still do magic. On the "Tonight Show" he recreated his old magic act and did a splendid job. He's a ventriloquist and handles cards like a Mississippi gambler. To this day he sits around his office rolling quarters over his fingers. He handles bow and arrow like a sharpshooter. He can wield a battle axe. He can fly-cast better than anyone I've ever seen. He can dance a bit, sing a bit, play the guitar a bit — he's practicing all these things. He plays the drums with a surprising amount of confidence. He is a mentalist. At a Miss Universe pageant, he memorized the names and countries of 99 contestants. When he marries (is that the term?) mentalism and cards, he can look at three hands of a bridge game and in an instant tell you the cards of the fourth. He's a star gazer, and I mean real heavenly bodies, and he uses a telescope. He has learned to fly an airplane. What is he? He's a perfection-

ist. He's determined and intent about things. He's outlandish in his demands on himself. If he had not been a success in television, he would have been a disc jockey doing a marathon seven days in a store window. He would have been a magician sawing not just one woman in half but a whole chorus line. He would have been that Mississippi gambler. If he isn't a man for all seasons, he is a man of all interests, all hobbies. It's good because it keeps him off the streets. And it keeps him from thinking, much, about free-falling from airplanes.
