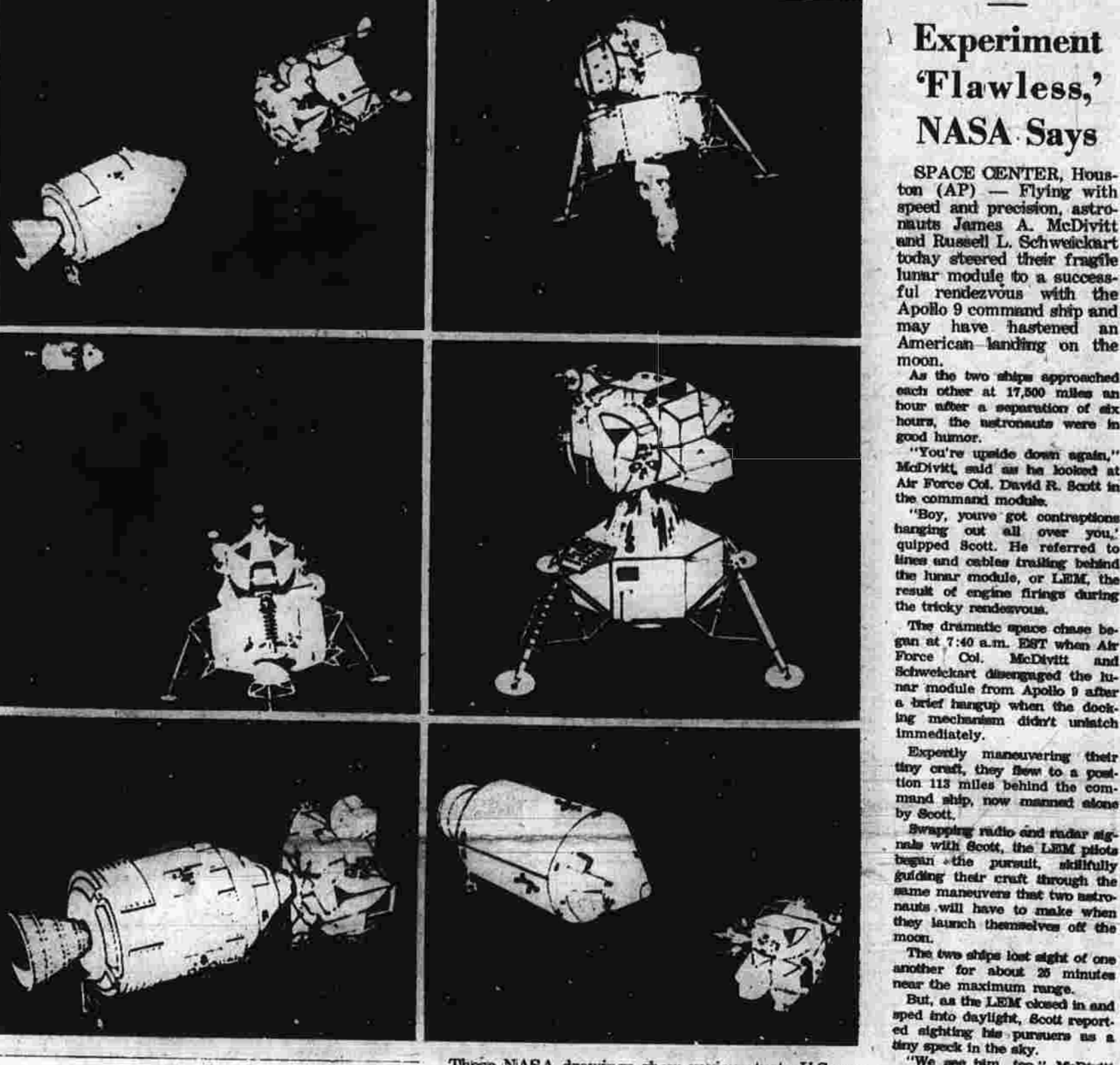

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Israel's Next Prime Minister 'More Guts Than Charm' Tag Doesn't Bother Golda Meir

JERUSALEM (AP) — Disgusted in Arab robes and veils, a sternly austere school marm from Milwaukee slipped across Jerusalem lines to persuade Golda Meir to remain prime minister of Israel's 1948 war of independence. Her eloquence failed. But then eloquence has never come easily to Golda Meir, the 70-year-old grandmother, Israel's next prime minister.

As successor to Levi Eshkol, Mrs. Meir is regarded as a skillful, sometimes abrasive, political broker who has long wielded enormous influence in backstage Israeli politics.

"She is the headmistress at a political school and those who have been her pupils and admirers grins her way," an Israeli political columnist once observed.

A kidding critic wrote: "She is a living denial of the cliché that all diplomats are slippery-tongued prevaricators. Her speech is neither polished nor streamlined. It is simple and warm. She is heart, much heart and a honesty."

And Gen. Carl von Horn, who headed the U.N. truce supervisory organization during her tenure as Israeli foreign minister, gave this description: "She is a heavily built lady who seems to exist on a diet of cigarettes and coffee and radiates an aura of what I can only describe as more guts than charm."

Aspirations about her lack of feminine charms were shared by Mrs. Meir, who wears a simple, short-sleeved, white blouse in a tight little suit.

"That woman built as she is doesn't fit an interviewer," she once told an interviewer. "The question is one of doing a capsule job."

In her new post, which she characterized only last week as "horrible," Mrs. Meir is expected to carry on much the same as her predecessor in dealing with the Arabs and withdrawal from occupied territory without face-to-face negotiations.

Miner, Rescuers Said at Least 24 Hours Apart

LARK, Utah (AP) — Rescue workers said today they were at least 24 hours away from reaching William Jones, the miner trapped underground since Saturday.

The rescuers were drilling a two-inch "guide" hole through the enclosure where Jones is entrapped.

The two-inch hole, drilled at a 45-degree angle, was expected to take two to four hours to complete, after which it would take an estimated 20 hours for a 30-inch diameter bit to carve its way along the same route.

Simultaneously, other rescue workers, using hand tools, were circumventing the rockfall trapping Jones by digging a route officials said would take three days.

Jones, strengthened by water and light food, helped direct rescuers Thursday.

A collapse of tons of rock and mud in the lead-sinc mine trapped Jones in a small dead-end tunnel. Rescue crews had all but given up hope of finding him alive when they were started to hear him call out early Wednesday. "When are you going to get me out of here?" Rescuers said Jones seemed to be in good shape but impatient to get out. He told the crew after getting some nourishment through a small pipe: "Why don't you send me up a pickaxe and I'll smash my way out."

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Doctors Hit Merger of Health Plans

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — At a hearing on a bill that would allow Connecticut Blue Cross to merge with Connecticut Medical Service (CMS), doctors testified they saw the idea as a move by hospitals to take over the domain of private physicians.

Last month an \$80,000 report prepared for Blue Cross and CMS suggested that a merger would be profitable to subscribers.

Blue Cross pays hospital bills and CMS, also known as Blue Shield, pays doctors. Blue Cross has been receptive to the merger idea, but the CMS board of trustees has voted against a merger.

At Thursday's hearing before the General Assembly's health care committee, Dr. Richard Sullivan, a Hartford urologist, said, "If for one week we participate in a merged operation. He noted that under the present arrangement doctors have half the vote in CMS matters.

Dwelling on the same point was Dr. Edward H. Conner of Bridgeport, chief of the general surgery section at Bridgeport Hospital. He said the CMS board is composed of eight doctors and eight laymen, while the 18-member board of Blue Cross lists only one doctor.

ROME (AP) — A judge is asking Italy's highest court whether sexual intercourse in a car is illegal.

The case involves a young woman who was arrested in what the vice squad said was an "obscene attitude" with a teen-ager in her car. The car was parked in a dark alley of the Borghese Gardens.

In the past, Italian courts have ruled that such incidents violate a law banning obscene acts in a public place. The maximum penalty is three years in jail.

Judge Angelo Morra said the law was written in the late 1950s when there were only two thousand cars in Italy, and it doesn't state specifically that a parked car is a public place. Nor does the law specify the precise meaning of obscene, he added.

Federal Aid Freeze Seen Welfare Threat

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Aid could bring a deficit of \$30 million.

One of the "ifs" of a balanced state budget surfaced Thursday during a lengthy public hearing before the legislative Appropriations Committee.

Each group would improve a relationship which, Shapiro said, has helped keep Connecticut's level of welfare dependence below that of neighboring states.

There was no violence immediately, although one bottle of purple ink was hurled against the embassy's store front.

The demonstration was the first here in reaction to the closing between Soviet and Chinese troops at the border between the two countries last Sunday. An unspecified number of soldiers on both sides were killed.

The main embassy building, situated further back from the street, escaped damage. The large embassy compound was built in the days of happier relations between the Soviet Union and China and is much larger than needed by the small diplomatic staff now maintained here.

A line of some 200 militiamen in front of the embassy kept the crowd from surging onto the embassy grounds. A policeman with a ball bat kept repeating, "Comrades, please don't throw anything at the windows."

But the demonstrators, who had been driven to the scene in buses, had come armed with milk bottles, stones, and tin bottles. They ignored the policeman's advice and each time a window was smashed the crowd let out a roar.

The main road truck in front of the embassy repeated over and over the Soviet protest note delivered to the Chinese government last Sunday right after the border clash in which both Soviet and Chinese soldiers were killed.

The entire demonstration was coordinated by police officers and Soviet army troops. Many buses stationed at strategic points held multiple-bus groups which is outlined in a bill now in committee.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—For the first time in the eight years of their existence, the New York Mets know they can't possibly finish 10th. 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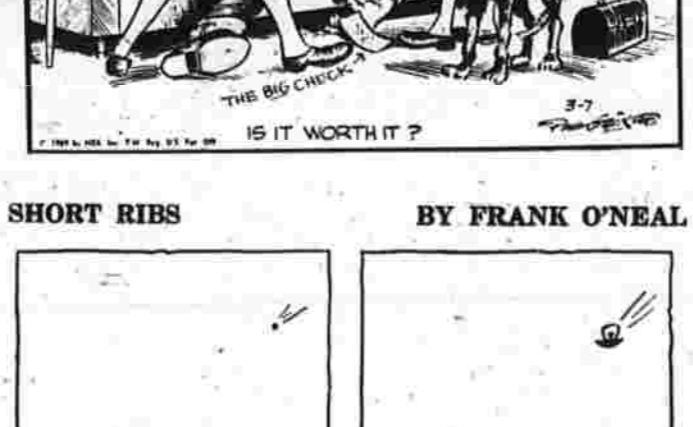
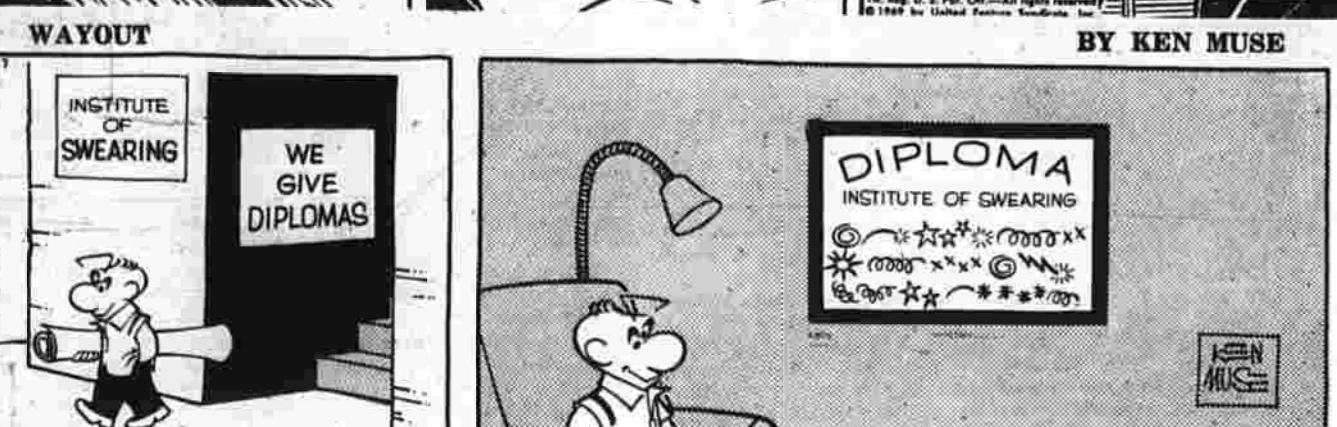

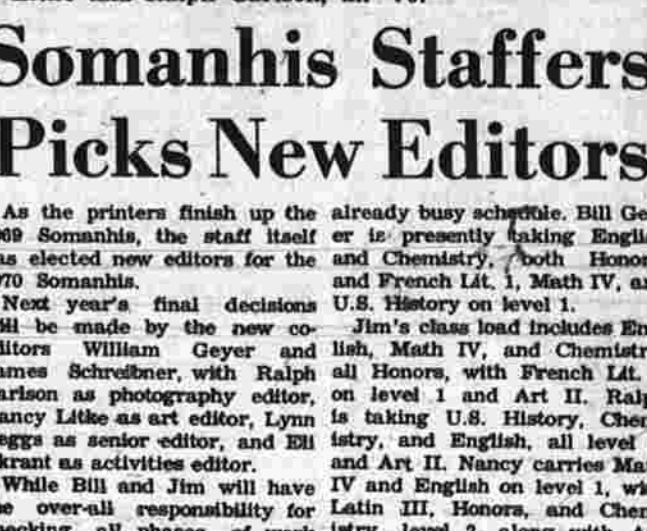
