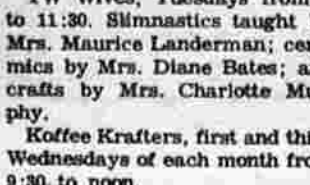

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Vernon Two Win Bissell Scholarships

Two Rockville High School students today were named winners of the LeBaron Bissell Scholarship Awards. They were chosen at a meeting of the committee yesterday afternoon.

Miss Carol Nicholson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Nicholson of Lewis St., and James Anetia, son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Anetia, Riverside Dr., are the recipients of the scholarships, which provide a complete four-year tuition to the college of the student's choice.

The fund was established in December 1964 by Bissell with John Mason as president of the trust fund. It was originally set up to be primarily for residents of Vernon but residents of Tolland, Ellington or other Tolland County towns are eligible. For the past two years there has been a winner from Rockville High and Ellington High.

Now Capital Population Over 71% Non-White WASHINGTON (AP) — New figures show that the population of the District of Columbia is now more than 71 per cent non-white, the city government says. The new statistics are estimates based on birth and death records and school enrollment figures and give a population picture of Washington as of July 1967.

City demographic analysis officials said Wednesday the report shows that as of July 1967 the city's nonwhite population had increased 4.5 per cent over the previous year. The white population dropped from 32.5 per cent to 28.3 per cent of the city's total. The city's estimated total population increased from 683,700 in 1966 to 690,400 in 1967, although the white population increased from 220,800 to 243,000.

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Navy's Probe Of Sealab 3 Inconclusive

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The two-week hearing into the ocean-floor death of Aquanaut Barry L. Cannon left unanswered a key question: Did he die because of negligence, an accident or some other reason?

The Navy's board of investigation assigned to probe the Sealab 3 tragedy adjourned not on strike getting a 20 per cent cost cut in pay, effective Wednesday. In closed session it was told Navy photographic experts were unable to determine which of the four rigs available for the dive was used by Cannon.

Cannon, 33, died Feb. 11 during a 60-foot dive to the Sealab habitat on the ocean floor near the Clemente Island. An autopsy report said he died of carbon dioxide poisoning.

It is necessary to remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere/ breathing gas were missing from one of the diving rigs, No. 5.

Testimony revealed that Cannon wore rig No. 5 or No. 4.

The Sealab project, a planned 60-day underwater living experiment, was postponed indefinitely because of Cannon's death. It was the first fatality in the program.

The three-officer board of investigation will prepare a report and forward it to Washington. Decisions based on the report are not expected to be announced for many weeks or even months, a Navy official said.

Airline Strike Ends 2nd Week

NEW YORK (AP) — The strike against American Airlines by maintenance workers ended its second week Wednesday night with airline employees getting a 20 per cent cost cut in pay, effective Wednesday.

The 14,000 nonstriking employees had been getting half pay for the first two weeks. The company said that if the strike continues for more than another 14 days there will be another 20 per cent pay cut.

The walkout was staged by lines by maintenance workers and communications employees to port Workers Union.

The strike over wage demands and other contract improvements has grounded the planes of American, the nation's second largest air passenger carrier.

The union's original demand was for 30 per cent pay raises for the mechanics, inspectors, and other employees whose wages began in 1967 at \$4.48 an hour and \$4.16 per hour depending on the type of job.

The Impotence of Power
 A rather surprising measure of agreement is emerging about the shape of America's post-Vietnam foreign policy. On the one hand, there is a widespread consensus that the Vietnam war was a mistake, and that the United States should withdraw its troops. On the other hand, there is a strong feeling that the United States should not retreat completely, and that it should continue to play a leadership role in the world.

Perhaps it isn't really so surprising: The Vietnam war, in all its demoralizing aspects, has shaken people's thinking to the very foundations and created a kind of consensus among observers who ordinarily see most things quite differently. As Mr. Schlesinger writes in an article in the current *Harper's*, "The tragedy of Vietnam is the tragedy of the catastrophic overextension and misapprehension of the principles which underlie the principle of collective security."

What was wrong about Vietnam, he writes, was not the country's initial involvement there; that is, the attempt to save millions of human beings from being overrun by communism and at the same time thwart Red China's ambitions of territorial aggrandizement. The trouble, instead, was the mistake approach, which led the Government to lose the war. The mistake was not the war itself, but the way it was fought. The tragedy of Vietnam is the tragedy of the catastrophic overextension and misapprehension of the principles which underlie the principle of collective security.

Those Poverty Tours
 Most of us have no particular inclination to deny the accuracy of statistics which show that a certain percentage of the American population still lives in poverty conditions which are a disgrace to the general affluence of our society. But we can be excused, we think, if we fail to respond properly to the crusading tours of United States Senators who go out to bring such poverty conditions before the camera.

The trouble is that the people who come along with the cameras are examples of the poverty-stricken life do not usually seem very under-sourthed. Sometimes, even though their living conditions are obviously deplorable, they themselves do not seem quite as miserable as they should show themselves, if they want to be taken seriously by the crusade. And they have a perverse habit, these poor, of putting on their best clothes when they know they are likely to appear on television, which is another way of spoiling what the show is really supposed to demonstrate.

There are, in this great and wealthy country, living conditions which are a shame upon us. Nor does one always have to travel to some far-off special sector of the country to find them. If Washington is like other large American cities, the crummiest Senators could find sad scenes there for their cameras which might have been even more effective than anything they found down in some Florida wasteland.

No one really has to argue with us Americans to make us realize that our dream is still marred by great and savage gaps. We all know that, in our hearts, even though we may indeed have some instinct to look the other way. But, on the other hand, the value of any contrived effort to find it and point it out and make us all look at it is questionable. Often, the publicity photograph and the leading question tend to make the viewing audience turn skeptical, not only with regard to the actual living conditions, supposedly being pictured, but also with regard to the motivations of the politicians who are conducting the tour.

Best Revolt Of The Year
 We read that some 60 to 100 students at Sarah Lawrence College have rejected the College's administration budget for a sit-in designed to protest a recent \$350 increase in the annual tuition which raises it to a new total of \$4,200 for a single college year and we say to ourselves isn't it wonderful that some young college people have finally found a cause which makes some kind of sense and which really has something to do with the business of seeing to it that American higher education is open to more and more people on a more democratic basis as time goes along, and isn't it wonderful to have these young agitators concentrating on a legitimate cause like this instead of trying to invent demands nobody really wants and nobody can really give just in order to foul up and paralyze the establishment, and after we say this to ourselves we find that we agree with ourselves enthusiastically and want to lead these others for the best student revolt of the year.

Never Up To Par
 Entertainers and eating have always been mixed in the more civilized societies, with various kinds of linkage between the two. A very handsome restaurant set to one of its food might import a famous entertainer to take the minds of the patrons off their food. Or, a celebrated entertainer, food, past his or her performance prime, might suddenly discover a passion to open a restaurant to which erstwhile fans and admirers might repair to continue to pay, and pay for the privilege of paying, homage to the great performer.

One is, of course, the particular civilization which does everything for you wholeheartedly.

For us, then, nothing will do but that the figure who attains nation-wide prominence in the entertainment world by use of the nation-wide entertainment media, shall open himself or herself a whole "nation-wide" chain of food dispensaries.

To such star-branded establishments the faithful members of the public are

WASHINGTON—A minor incident involving some 40 California grape pickers and the U.S. Department of Agriculture revealed the tip of the iceberg of a fierce bureaucratic struggle about to surface here.

The grape pickers, carrying proposals for distributing free food to the hungry poor, had made an appointment to see Dr. Charles Erbes, regional director of the department's economic and marketing services. But they arrived at his office in San Francisco only to find themselves locked out.

There would be no interview, they were told, because it might compromise the government in a legal suit involving food distribution to the poor.

Deeply disappointed by this exclusion, the grape pickers then learned that Robert Finch, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), was in town. They went to his hotel, and Finch agreed not only to discuss their proposals but promised to tell President Nixon.

Finch's eagerness to promote the cause of the hungry was no sudden inspiration. Finch and some of his top aides, in fact, are now angling to take complete control of surplus food distribution from the Agriculture Department, whose unwillingness or inability to get food to the hungry is proverbial.

For eight years during the Kennedy-Johnson administrations, for example, Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman never could unseat the red tape hampering the Federal government in getting food to the hungry, or even find out where and how many hungry people there are.

The reason wasn't that Freeman is heartless. Rather, the Agriculture Department is geared not to consumer interests but to producer interests. Protecting that relationship are some of Washington's sharpest-eyed guards: Southern Congressmen who chair the committee controlling programs and appropriations for the Agriculture Department.

For example, Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota, now conducting Senate hunger hearings, is the only non-Southern among seven Democrats on the Senate Agriculture Committee. In the House, Agriculture Department money is under the tight control of Rep. William of Mississippi, chairman of the Farm Appropriations Subcommittee. Most of these Southerners have no desire to convert the department into a national food dispenser for the hungry.

But things are changing at Agriculture under the new Secretary, Dr. Clifford Hardin. It was Hardin who personally made the decision to change in the food stamp program announced last week, under which the poor in the South Carolina counties now receive food stamps from Hardin, moreover, made that decision under the violent (but private) protest of his number one aide, Under Secretary Paul Campbell, a leading Georgia politician who

Quarrels With Price
 The question of the sale of the facilities of the General Water Company to the Town of Manchester has been with us for quite some time. On the 17th of February 1969, Eighth District Fire Chief, Granville Lingard reported his findings relative to the condition of Manchester Water Company facilities to the Eighth District Board of Directors. In his report he called attention to the fact that tests made by the District showed that many of its fire hydrants provided 1,000 gallons per minute, 100 to 250 gallons per minute, against a requirement of from 1,000 to 1,500 gallons per minute (about 50), of its 159 hydrants are inadequate and the remainder of the hydrants are inadequate for 4 inch water mains, which are, and which will continue to be totally incapable of providing sufficient water flow in cases of any fire.

I am happy to be able to say that Chief Lingard's report, in complete agreement with the opinion of those of us who have questioned the actual value of the Manchester Water Company holdings, and who have opposed their purchase by the Town of Manchester.

If Chief Lingard's report on the condition of the Manchester Water Company's holdings was in any way accurate, (and I am very sure that it was), I cannot blame those members of the Town Board of Directors who are trying to break away from the Manchester Water Company for the efforts they are making to dispose of them as soon as possible, and at as high a price as possible.

Shortly after the date of Chief Lingard's report (on Feb. 28, 1969 to be exact), we were told by Manchester Evening Herald that officials of both the Manchester Water Company and the Town of Manchester were in all probability meeting to agree to such an arrangement in spite of the discouraging report which was given the Board of Directors by Chief Lingard.

The Manchester Water Company has put its current selling price at \$1,800,000 plus the costs of whatever additions and improvements that are made prior to the actual date of sale. The fact which neither the Town nor the Board of Directors should forget, is that the price which the town will pay for the Manchester Water Company hold-

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From Your Neighbor's Kitchen

Many Americans (perhaps most) have a conception of Italian cuisine that has been established by the many Italian-American restaurants in this country whose menus usually feature spaghetti, spaghetti sauce, meatballs, veal scallopine, spumoni. I am sure you all know what these foods are.

Because the majority of Italian immigrants came from the southern part of Italy, their dishes became the best known in this country, and mighty tasty they are. However, each region of Italy speaks its own dialect, and has its own unique cuisine. For diversity, the traveler need only tour from one end of the country to the other.

Prof. Mario Pel, a linguist and student of national cultures, who has written several books about languages, confirms that countries with the widest range of dialects are those which are geographically diverse. Conversely, lands where differences in dialects are few offer some monotony in food. It is of the personal opinion that there is an intimate relationship between language and food.

There are literally thousands of Italian dishes. Unfortunately, they often cannot be found in cookbooks. I have a personal fondness for north Italian cuisine which is partly nostalgic because that is where my paternal grandparents were born.

The Lea family of Manchester are also of Piedmontese origin. Generally, the cuisine of this area has a light and delicate touch with garlic. Butter is used liberally, and olive oil, sometimes a combination of the two.

One of the very few dishes which uses a fair amount of garlic is bagna cauda (pronounced BAHNYA CAOON). Usually comes out BAHNYE (with the uninflected). It is a regional specialty of Piedmont and is not widely known in the U.S.A. Fred P. Lea has the authentic recipe which is his mother's. What does the name mean? Literally — hot bath. Bagna means bath and cauda, hot. It's a hot bath in cooking instead of olive oil. The diner selects the vegetables he desires and places them on his plate. Provide sharp knives or cut into bite sized pieces.

Now, we are ready to begin. Bagna cauda is a good ice breaker. Everyone dips into the hot sauce, just as with fondue. The diner selects the vegetables he desires and places them on his plate. Provide sharp knives or cut into bite sized pieces. Dip separately in sauce, cooking the meat to your pleasure. I like small pieces of cabbage, a serving of artichoke hearts (wine flavored), and a piece of meat, cutting it like a miniature hot dog.

Use your bread to catch all of the delicious drippings. For a few don't—don't use any other cooking oil nor substitute. Also for butter in this recipe or you will be sadly disappointed. Good olive oil is an essential feature of Italian cooking. If you have eaten in an Italian restaurant and found the salad or the food "oily", then chances are they are not using a first quality olive oil. Note that the ingredients call for "pure" olive oil. This is oil extracted from the finest olives which are pressed quite simply crushed. While it may look yellow in color, it is also slightly greenish and keeps fresh indefinitely. Second grade olive oil is taken by pressure under heat. It is weak in color, sometimes almost white, and becomes rancid quickly.

The ancient Romans ate raw vegetables for dessert. By the first century A.D., they became prelates to the meal. I have no idea why they took such a swish but raw vegetables are still an antipasto in Italy today. Sometimes they are dipped in an oil and vinegar dressing, sometimes just pure olive oil and salt.

Fred Lea began cooking at an early age, about 8, while hanging around his mother's kitchen. The senior Mrs. Lea tells me that Fred would cook, brother Albert would be the tester; then Fred would wash the dishes and Albert would dry. The brothers are still cooperating today in their grocery store, Lea's Market on Spruce St. Fred rules the meat department while Albert is responsible for other produce.

The elder Mr. Lea, Fred W., is ruler of the cash register with mother Lea the grande dame of the whole operation. The Fred W.'s are supposed to be retired but even they haven't accepted that. Today's cook is Fred P. He has two sons, Fred J., age 5, and Frankie who is 3.

When Fred P. gets the urge to cook during the course of his business day, he goes right ahead and does it, as he has a stove right in the store. One day last week he got the urge to bake oatmeal-raisin cookies. He makes his own Italian sausage and salami for family consumption. Every Saturday night, rain or shine, the barbecue is hot at 111 Spruce St. Freddie's special steaks are sizzling. Wouldn't a barbecued roast of beef be elegant now with all the snow on the ground?

Freddie's Barbecued Beef is approximately 4-lb. boneless rib of beef. Using charcoal and an ordinary grill, heat about 20-30 minutes or until charcoal looks white-hot. With rack placed 3-4 inches from coals, sear meat on both sides. Remove from flame and wrap in aluminum foil. Return to rack. Turn over, still wrapped, about every 10-15 minutes. For a medium-rare roast, cook about 45 minutes. Fred says the outside slices may be dark but the rest of the meat



will be tender and succulent. (You might look up the 1968 edition of the Neighbor's Kitchen cookbook, page 84, and serve Fred's mother's bagna cauda with the roast.)

Fred does not care for wine, which is unusual for anyone of Italian descent. He does, however, like the famous Asti Spumante, a sparkling wine much like champagne, but somewhat sweeter. It is best served after dinner, with or without dessert. Fred recommends a light dessert, following bagna cauda.

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State Senate Will Debate Lottery Bill

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—The Senate General Law Committee has given an unfavorable report to a state lottery referendum bill approved over-whelmingly in the House last week.

The Senate committee Wednesday agreed, however, to bring the bill to the floor of the Senate for debate.

Rep. John A. "Tony" Maciacki, D-Hartford, said this will be the first time in 108 years that the Senate has had to consider a lottery bill. Maciacki predicted that the Senate would reject the unfavorable report on a bill that would not create a lottery but simply set up a referendum on the subject. The referendum would not be binding on the 1971 legislature.

Maciacki felt the Senate would have to approve the bill rather than "tell the people they can't even have the chance to say what they want."

In the past the Senate has avoided debate on lottery bills by holding the bills in committee. Unless petitioned out by a majority of the senators, the bills die in committee.

Maciacki said he thought the lottery bill would have been petitioned out of committee. The committee's unusual action of letting the bill leave the committee despite an unfavorable report was seen in some quarters as a move to pacify the House which resent the Senate's traditional role as graveyard for controversial bills.

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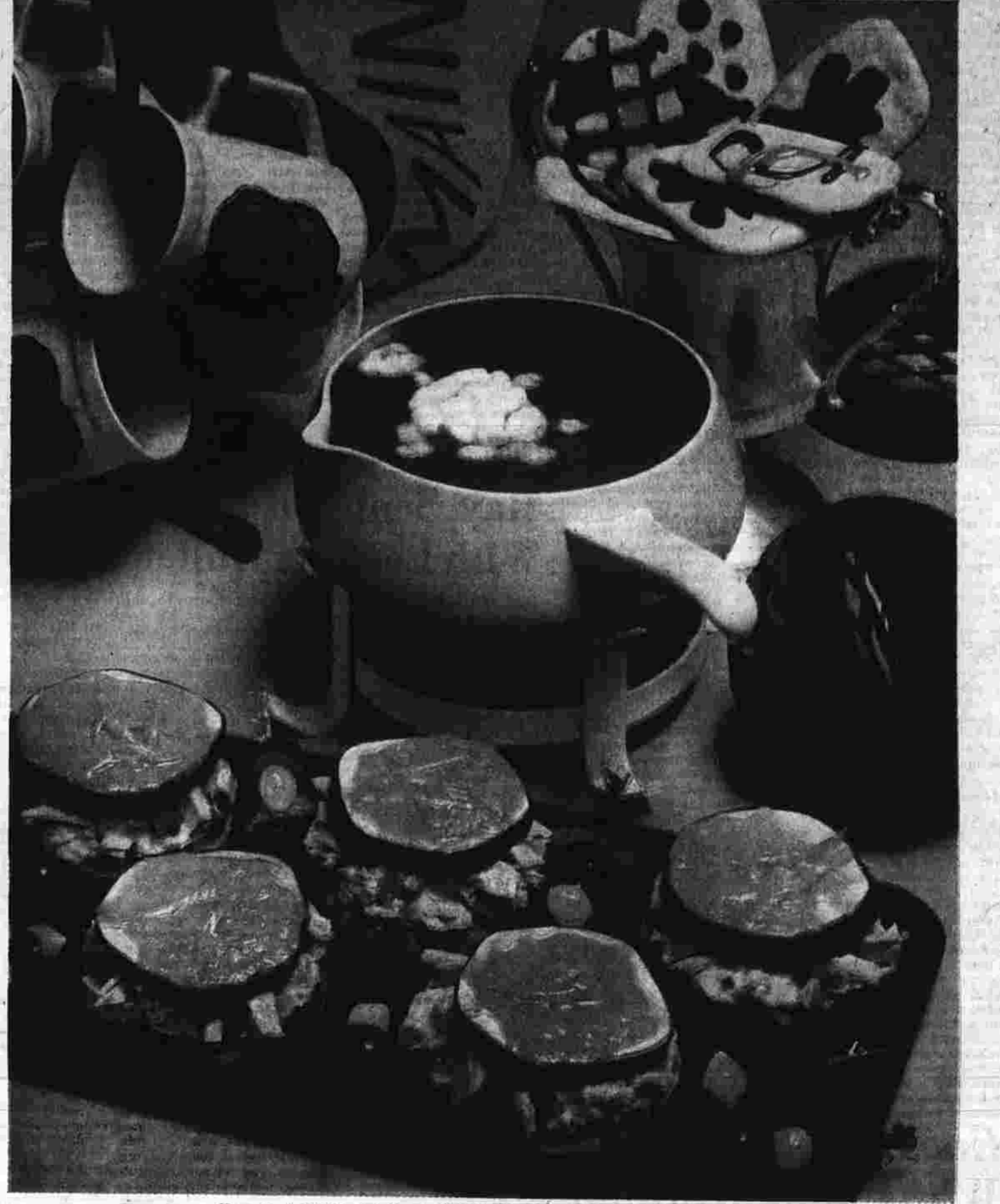

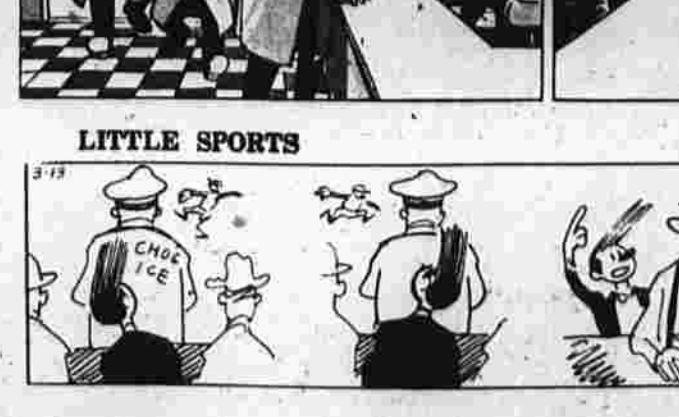

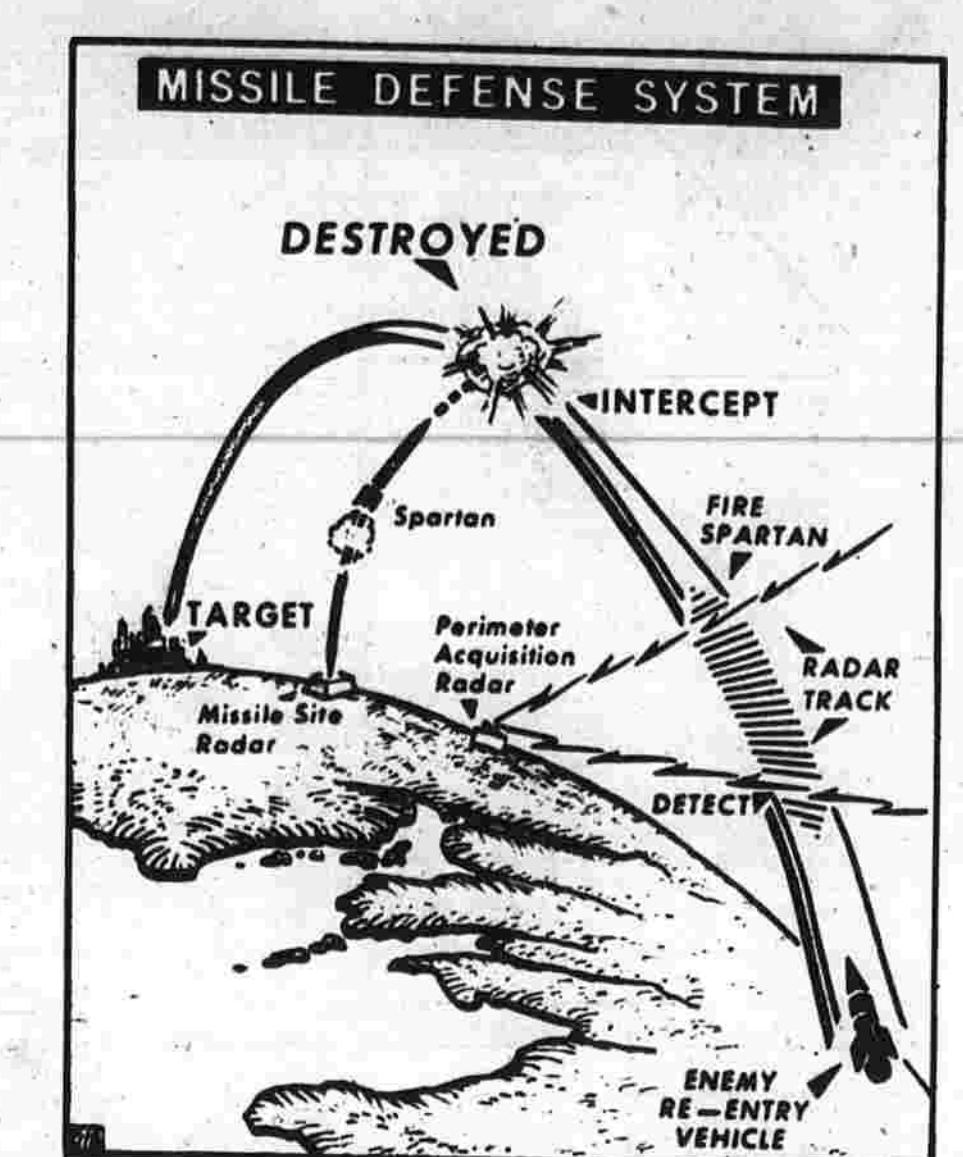
