'Non-Violent' Youth Killed

BOSTON (AP) — Police are mystified in the gangland-style death of a Connecticut youth whose body was discovered Saturday wrapped in a canvas tent and propped against a mailbox on the sidewalk in the Roxbury section. Police said Gary M. Carotenuti, 19, of Torrington Conn., had been once in the back of the head. The words "nigger lover" were carved in his back. The bearded, long-haired youth was a junior at Northeastern University, majoring in philosophy, and had been on the Dean's List since his freshman year. "He was one of the brightest students at Northeastern," said Dr. Sally Michael of the philosophy department. Department chairman, Dr. Walter Fogg, said he planned a memorial to the youth. Police said Carotenuti was last seen alive by two friends Friday night. He moved to Rox-

Haynsworth Seen Getting Senate Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite opposition from civil rights and labor leaders all signs now indicate President Nixon's nomination of Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr. for the Supreme Court will be confirmed by the Senate. Senate Judiciary Committee hearings starting Tuesday could change the picture, but so far no organized effort has developed within the Senate to block approval of the 56-year-old South Carolinian. Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., who indicated he probably will vote against the nomination, has nonetheless predicted Haynsworth will be confirmed—and others not enthusiastic about the appointment agree. The Haynsworth nomination also has picked up the far-from-enthusiastic support of Sen. Robert Griffin, R-Mich., who spearheaded last year's successful fight to keep Abe Fortas from becoming chief justice. "If you think my silence until now has been interpreted as meaning that I am not overjoyed by the appointment," Griffin said Sunday at Mackinac Island, Mich., "you're absolutely right." 'Black Day' In Pittsburgh

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Hundreds of demonstrators strung over 10 city blocks marched from the Negro Hill District into the downtown today—a day they called "Black Monday"—to press demands for more Negro jobs in the construction industry. The marchers, estimated by police at over 3,000, filed four abreast through the city's streets, clapping their hands and chanting: "Freedom, Freedom, Freedom." Leading the procession to their destination—the construction site of U.S. Steel Corp.'s new office building—were several demonstrators carrying large black flags with a clenched fist symbol of black power-painted on them. The marchers walked around the U.S. Steel building, clapping their hands and chanting, then marched back to the Hill District where the crowd disbanded. March leaders said they would stage similar demonstrations. "We will have a black Monday next Monday and the Monday after that, and a black Monday and a black Tuesday if necessary, and we will shut down the entire city until these injus-

Top GOP Role Not For Allott

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Gordon Allott of Colorado stepped aside from the race for Republican leadership today, leaving the field to the three declared candidates to succeed the late Everett M. Dirksen. "I am not a candidate for the position of minority leader," Allott said. "I have no commitments from any of my colleagues, nor have I asked for such commitments." Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, the acting leader; Sen. Roman L. Hruska of Nebraska; and Sen. Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee are candidates. Allott said he would not make any personal commitment in the leadership race, but his decision not to run benefits Hruska, whose support is based among the Senate's more conservative Republicans.

New Viet Pullout Planned: Could Involve 40,000 GIs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has decided definitely on another withdrawal of U.S. troops from Vietnam and the White House will announce specific figures Tuesday morning. Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler, talking to reporters today, did not dispute the announcement by South Vietnamese Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky earlier that 40,000 more American troops will be pulled out before November. But he would not specifically verify that number, saying repeatedly that consultations now are on with other troop-contributing nations and the formal White House announcement will be withheld until Tuesday. Asked whether Nixon still hopes to get more than 100,000 American servicemen out of Vietnam by the end of the year, Ziegler stood on what Nixon had said about that in a news conference. Former Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford had called in a magazine article for pulling out 100,000 troops by year's end and Nixon said he would hope to better that. The presidential decision on an additional withdrawal had been set in motion on June 8—the withdrawal of the first 25,000—was reached last week, Ziegler said. It was laid before a top policy conference last Friday, a conference that pulled together key administration experts in the military, diplomatic and intelligence fields. One of them was Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, U.S. military commander in Vietnam, who hurried back to Saigon and into conference with South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu. The latter called an emergency session of his National Security Council, followed by a second. And then Vice President Ky reported Monday that 40,000 more men would be withdrawn by the United States before November—a period of 100 more weeks.

No Letup in Battling In Israeli-Arab War

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Israeli planes attacked Egypt's Gulf of Suez coast for the fifth time in six days Sunday, keeping up a campaign to force the Egyptians to shift forces from the Suez Canal front.

An Israeli military spokesman said the air force bombed and strafed positions at Ras Za'farana, 55 miles south of the southern end of the canal, and Ras Gharib, an oil center 120 miles farther south. He said all the planes returned safely. Egypt's official Middle East News Agency said Egyptian anti-aircraft gunners forced the Israeli planes "to flee eastward after they attempted to raid

Ras Za'farana, the target of heavy Israeli raids for the past week, is 100 miles southeast of Za'farana. When Israeli troops landed on the Gulf of Suez coast for their unopposed armored sweep last Tuesday, they began by hammering radar installations and army camps at Ras Za'farana. Informants in Tel Aviv said the air attacks are continuing to keep Egypt from rebuilding these installations.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — New talks in search of Arab-Israeli peace are expected to begin in New York by the end of this week. Officials involved in previous talks on the subject are gathering for the 24th session of the U.N. General Assembly, opening Tuesday. Gunnar V. Jarring, Secretary-General U Thant's special representative to the Middle East, will arrive on Tuesday.

SS Manhattan Opens Northwest Passage

NEW YORK (AP) — Nearly five centuries after sailors began the search for a Northwest Passage above Canada, the SS Manhattan has become the first commercial vessel to negotiate the icy waters. But the historic voyage of the massive tanker, specially fitted with icebreaking equipment, has not proved that the treacherous northern route is feasible for shipping. The 1,005-foot, 115,000-deadweight-ton ship smashed through heavy ice north of the Arctic Circle Sunday to hit open water at the mouth of Prince of Wales Strait. "There's nothing in her way now," said a spokesman for Humble Oil Co., the ship's owner. Her final destination, Point Barrow, Alaska, is a week away. As far back as 1498, when John Cabot explored the eastern end of the route, Europeans sought the Northwest Passage as a shortcut to the riches and spices of the Far East. The great trading companies sponsored several attempts to find the route. Now the treasure isn't spices, but oil, the vast supply on Alaska's northern slope. Return to 'Bikini'

After 12 Years as Nuclear Target, Lonely Island Is Habitable Again

BIKINI ATOLL (AP) — The first no-man's land of the atomic age is ready to welcome back its people. The Atomic Energy Commission reports this isolated Pacific atoll, ravaged by a dozen years of nuclear testing, has less radioactivity today than the U.S. mainland. "We can't say there is absolutely no radiation danger," says AEC physicist Tommy McCraw, "but if there is we can't find it." McCraw was among a team of experts who toured the blasted atoll last weekend with a group of American and foreign newsmen. He said his atomic counter

showed only faint signs of radioactivity, "less than in Denver, Colo." Stripped of vegetation and badly scarred by 23 thermonuclear detonations between 1946 and 1958, the islands have sloughed off all visible effects of their former devastation. Lush foliage has returned to the meager string of islands, some 2,300 miles west of Hawaii, and its lagoons are swimming pool clear and bountiful. The rusted scrap-metal debris that littered the white sand beaches for more than 20 years are gone. A small force of U.S. military and civilian workers has been clearing up the at-

Another War Which Drags

Those who like to win wars are naturally impatient with any generality which seems half-hearted or strategically timid in its approach to the enemy.

This is the case with the holy war against racial segregation at home just as much as it is the case with the military war in Vietnam.

It is the national Civil Rights Commission which, in its latest public report, is intensely critical of the generalship of the Nixon Administration because it has seemed irresolute in its operations against segregation in the nation's schools.

The criticism of the Civil Rights Commission permits itself takes on additional weight and significance because of the identity of the present Nixon Administration to be chairman of this Commission.

He is the Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, president of Notre Dame University, who once found great favor with the President because of the President's interpretation of the stand he had taken with regard to possible campus disturbances during the Dime.

The report which Father Hesburgh and his fellow commissioners have now made expresses impatience with all the backing and filling on school desegregation policy which has been demonstrated by administration orders and decisions which have alternately advanced and delayed the application of federal pressures on Southern districts.

The report also warns against the potential retrogression involved in measures - like the "freedom of choice" law - now being considered in Congress.

That mainly what the Commission would seem to be saying is that the Supreme Court decided that the right of black children to attend the same schools as attended by other children was guaranteed by the Constitution. Five years have passed since Congress, in the Civil Rights Act of 1964, also declared that segregation violated the law of the land.

But segregation is more than just simply a violation of the law.

"In 1967," the report continues, "we issued a report, 'Racial Isolation in the Public Schools,' which concludes that racial isolation, whether caused by de jure segregation, discriminatory housing patterns or other factors of geography, is a serious educational harm to the children of minority groups."

"Conversely, integration significantly boosted the educational achievement of these children. If this nation truly respected the rule of law, if it truly cherished each of its children, the last vestiges of segregated education would have disappeared years ago. Instead, segregation continues as the pattern, and not the exception, of education in many states."

"While progress has been slow, the nation has been forward, and this is certainly no time to create the impression that we are turning back, but a time for pressing forward with vigor. This is certainly no time for giving aid and comfort, even unintentionally, to the laggards while penalizing those who have made commendable efforts to follow the law, even while disagreeing with it. If

anything, this is the time to say that law is running out on us as a nation.

"In a word, what we need most at this juncture of our history is a great positive statement regarding this central and crucial national problem, where once and for all our actions clearly would match the promises of our Constitution and Bill of Rights."

"We do not believe any such 'great positive statement' is to be forthcoming. We are not seeing the seemingly irresolute strategies of the Nixon Administration may not, in the end, prove the psychological ground for marked progress in anti-segregation war.

We know, in any case, that this war is not going to be won in a day, or in twice fifteen years.

And we remind everybody everywhere, not just administration officials in Washington, that "if the nation truly respected the rule of law, if it truly cherished each of its children, the last vestiges of segregated education would have disappeared years ago."

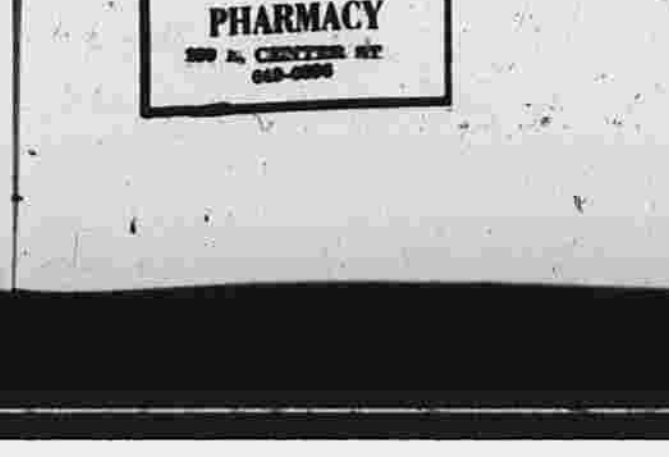
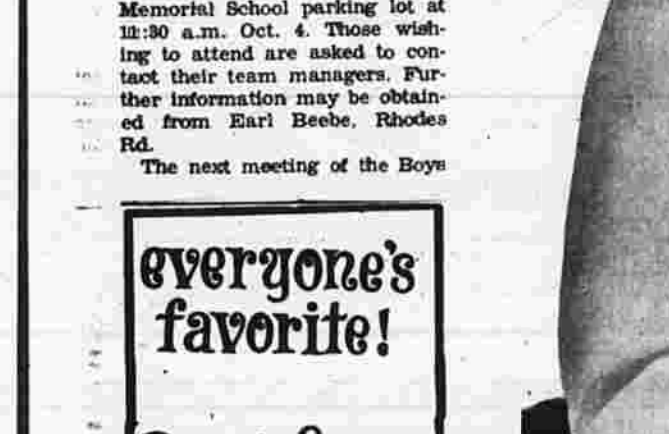

SUBIC BAY, Philippines (AP) — Lt. Cmdr. Albert E. Evans was put back in the command of the destroyer Frigate E. Evans, U.S. Navy, after a court-martial today.

The council will be considering the Sewer Commission's proposed ordinance, as well as a proposed usage ordinance for the town seal.

In addition, the council is expected to set the time and date for its regular non-agenda council meeting, and to issue a proclamation acknowledging the 50th anniversary of the League of Women Voters.

U.N. Probes Globe's Pains

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. General Assembly opens its 24th session today, facing a long list of formidable problems including the Middle East, disarmament and the crisis in Northern Ireland.

The assembly itself does not begin until Saturday night at a dinner which the secretary-general is giving for them.

What the assembly itself does on Middle East will depend largely on the results of private talks. If the Arabs and the Israelis feel that the negotiations are making progress, they may follow last year's pattern and defer public debate.

The disarmament debate is also dependent partly upon what happens in private U.S.-Soviet talks. The open charters will be reached in time to report it to the assembly at this session.

It seems fairly certain that no treaty will be ready on chemical and biological warfare, and other very live issues which will figure in the assembly arms debate.

The prospects for debate on the Irish situation are uncertain. The Irish Republic has asked to have the question placed on the agenda, but Britain will oppose any U.N. debate on the matter, thus outside the assembly.

Consultations were expected today or Wednesday between U.S. and Soviet diplomats to prepare for meetings between Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and Secretary of State William P. Rogers. The two foreign ministers will discuss the Middle East, disarmament and other issues.
