Somewhat Confusing

Once again, it has been a touch of the almost automatic, inevitable escalation which has always come so easily to the war in Vietnam which has raised new doubt about the reality of the assurances that what we are really doing is to get out of the war.

The latest new escalation has now taken place in our bombings of North

First, we began delivering "protective reaction strikes" against specific missile aunching sites which we had detected firing on our unarmed reconnaissance planes, or their fighter plane escorts. over North Vietnamese territory.

Next, we began bombing North Vietnamese missile and anti-aircraft stations the moment we felt their radar fixing on one of our planes. This shifted our strategy from one of attacking after we had been attacked to one of attacking before we could be attacked, but it was still, supposedly, in response to a definite enemy act - that of daring to let his radar fasten on anybody flying over his own country.

Last Sunday and Monday, the nature of our bombing of North Vietnam took a hundreds of planes, and a wide assortment of targets, including not only mispots and troop concentrations

This was, temporarily, almost a full return to the bombing at will policy we followed in North Vietnam until we halted all bombing in the effort to get peace talks going at Paris.

The timing of this big new re-escalation of bombing of North Vietnam was almost self explanatory.

Sunday and Monday seemed to be the crucial days in which the last of the South Vietnamese troops inside Laos were fighting their way back toward their own border, and what Washington was afraid of, and determined to harass, was any build-up of North Vietnamese troops which might move down into the battle and make the South Vietnamese

withdrawal more difficult or bloody. . With an escalation of reasons and reasonings, we have now executed an escalation of bombing of North Vietnam until, so far as these things seem to go with a benumbed public and a benumbed world, we will be able to bomb as much as somebody pleases from now on, without causing any great issue any-

Since this is the way we got into Vietname in the first place as deeply as we did, it is mildly confusing to find us repeating it as a part of the strategy by which, we are promising ourselves, our exit from Vietnam is to be accomplish-

When Do Votes Count?

Whatever their decision might have been, the action of their own General Assembly at Hartford made a complete mockery of any presumed right of Connecticut people to choose and decide for themselves. They had been called upon

for their presumably sovereign opinion in an official referendum on a proposed constitutional amendment last November; they had, at the polls, turned the amendment down and decided they did not want it part of Connecticut law.

The other day, at Hartford, the same representatives and senators these same voters had been electing on that same colling day acted, in ratifying the new proposed amendment to the federal Constitution just launched in Washington that same day, as if the people of Connecticut were to be presumed to be in If American democracy today is fac-

ing any kind of crisis, it is facing it on the precise issue of whether or not the vote means anything, the question o whether or not a voter is able to ac complish what he wants to accomplish when he goes out and casts his vote. The people of Connecticut went out and voted their minds last November. A little more than four months later their own elected representatives at Hartford have voted something exactly opposite There has been, it is true, a complicated change in the situation, in the Supreme Court ruling which held the federal 18-year-old law valid in one type of election but not in others. But it has not been enough of a change in situation to justify any automatic conclusion that the people of Connecticut no longer wish to take the position they took last November. One judges, by the pleased, self-congratulatory looks on the faces of the lawmakers at Hartford, that they think they have done their constituents proud by putting them in the lead of the supporters in March, for the proposition they defeated in November. What makes them think we're so happy

Court And Conscience The recent 8-1 Supreme Court decision t conscientious objectors may not pick and choose between wars does not nuch clarify the fundamental problem of conscience. It may be described as a ragmatic decision, but one that leaves side the question of principle.

In his lone dissent, Mr. Justice Dougas leaned heavily on a famous 5-4 split ecision: the MacIntosh case of 1931. In eking naturalization, Douglas Clyde MacIntosh a Canadian and professor ivinity at Yale University, would not promise in advance to bear arms in deense of the United States unless he believed the war to be morally justified. Five justices denied him naturalization our, headed by Chief Justice Hughes and including later Chief Justice Stone and Mr. Justices Holmes and Brandels felt differently.

In referring to Professor MacIntosh's scruples against unjust wars, Chief Jus-tice Hughes said: "There is nothing new nent statesmen here and abroad have their country in entering into wars they thought to be unjustified."

The Chief Justice continued: the forum of conscience, duty to a moral power higher than the state has always een maintained. . . . The essence of re ligion is belief in a relation to God involving duties superior to those arising from any human relation." In his dissent on March 8, Mr. Justice

Douglas echoed these words, saying: " had assumed that the welfare of the sir gle human soul was the ultimate test of e vitality of the First Amendment." In 1918, a majority of the court overruled the MacIntosh and other decisions, holding that one unwilling to take up arms in the country's defense would not be deprived of citizenship. This applied not only to selective objection to wars but to all wars and did not really settle the issue of picking and choosing be-


In all probability Congress, in making statutory provisions for conscientious objection, had in mind truly pacifist principles which object to all wars. But the Nuremberg decisions, as well as many other rulings, like the MacIntosh-case statements, almost require an individual to pass jusgment on the moral validi-

Thus the problem of conscientious obection arises on many levels, all of hem relating to the individual and own moral concepts. There are those who object to all wars, to all fighting, to all taking of life. Such cases are clear, Some such objectors also object to nonmilitary service. Some do not. Some are willing to perform service—such as that of medical corpsmen - involving great and heroic risk to themselves. There is also the question of formal religious teaching and belief as contrasted with merely moral, ethical, or indi-

vidualistic belief. Draft boards have a very difficult task in winnowing out the degrees of belief and of integrity in pro-The Supreme Court in its latest deci sion seems to recognize the difficulties

draft boards have, and it appears unwilling to add to them by admitting the selective rights of conscience. Yet conscience by its very nature is selective. It must pick and choose. It is also by nature difficult to assess and test. The trend of legislative action and ju-, dicial decision is all toward fuller recog nition of the rights of conscience, despite the most recent decision. 





Crimes Blamed In Court Load HARTFORD (AP)-If Connecticut's crime rate rises as steeply in the 1970s as it did in the 1960s, the courts will have to handle twice as many cases in 1980 as they did last year, Su preme Court Justice John P. Cotter said Thursday.

A leading factor in the rising crime rate is the drug problem said Cotter, the state's chief court administrator, in his annual report. "In 1961 the Circuit Court recategory; in 1969-70, there were 3,859 offenses against . . . the user law alone," Cotter said, adding that "authorities estimate that as many as one-half of today's crimes are committed by persons seeking the means to support their habit." Cotter said that during the '60s, the number of criminal

eases per 1,000 Connecticut resilents increased from 51 per year to 91 per year. Not only is there more criminal business, but it takes longer o handle criminal cases because of the increased activity by public defenders and the added safeguards of defendants' rights laid down by the Supreme Court, the report noted.

And there is an increasing amount of civil business, too Cotter said. "People today appear to be more cognizant of their rights and more inclined to sue to attain them, whether in an effort to obtain equal rights and opportunities, better-maintained housing, a dissolution of mar-riage by divorce, or damages injuries caused in an acci dent," he said.
