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Agreement Signed: Japan Will Regain Control of Okinawa

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States signed an historic treaty with Japan today restoring to the island of Okinawa to Japanese sovereignty. President Nixon said it is an act which enables the two countries to work together in peace.

The signing ceremony in the bright future of the people of Okinawa who are being welcomed back to the mother island after 26 years of U.S. administrative control over the strategic military base in the western Pacific. The United States was one of the bloodiest engagements of World War II.

While the treaty ends postwar occupation, the United States will retain 28 military base facilities. The treaty goes into effect two months after ratification by the Japanese Diet and the U.S. Senate.

The treaty was signed in Washington by Secretary of State William P. Rogers and in Tokyo by Foreign Minister Kiichiro Aichi.

"We both have much to be proud of this day," said the Japanese minister. "The treaty goes into effect two months after ratification by the Japanese Diet and the U.S. Senate."

Nixon said the friendship and mutual respect which enables our negotiators to resolve the many difficult issues will, in turn, enable us to work together in peace for the well-being of our two countries and for that of the entire world.

Labor Chiefs Debate Loan To Lockheed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two major labor leaders split today over a proposed \$100-million government loan guarantee designed to keep Lockheed Aircraft Corp. solvent.

In a statement prepared for the Senate Banking Committee, AFL-CIO President George Meany said federal underwriting of the quarter-billion dollar loan would enable Lockheed to continue work on its new Trident jet.

A potential job loss estimated at 45,700 in at least 35 states was cited by the labor federation as its reason for opposing the loan.

But Leonard Woodcock, president of the United Auto Workers, told the committee in his prepared testimony that the loan proposal poses serious dangers and probably wouldn't save Lockheed anyway.

Woodcock said he is "greatly concerned about the welfare of my country and about the effect of this loan on the government's ability to balance its budget."

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Tokyo Police Hurt During Pact Protest

TOKYO (AP)—Twenty-four Japanese police were reported hurt today during a demonstration charge thrown by demonstrators protesting the signing of an agreement returning Okinawa from United States to Japanese rule.

Police expressed belief a pipe bomb, a section of steel pipe packed with explosives, caused the injuries. One of the officers, members of the riot police mobilized to deal with the demonstrators.

Nearly 40,000 demonstrators—students, labor union members and antiwar elements—turned out in Tokyo to march toward the Prime Minister's residence and past the Japan Diet building.

The demonstrators opposed the agreement on Okinawa, returned to Japan last week to have a final expedition for other material the Times may publish.

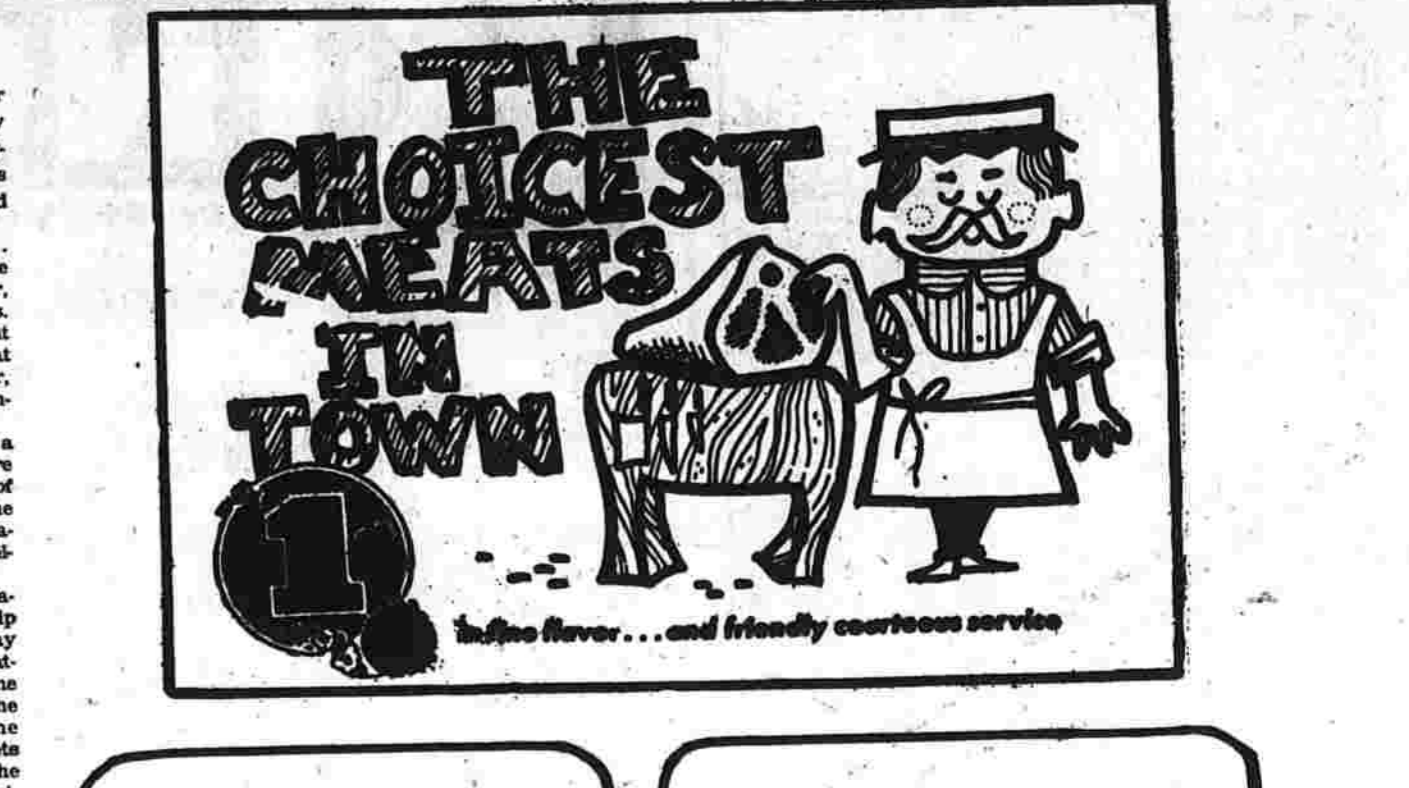

Small Supply, Big Demand Make Lobsters Expensive

BOSTON (AP) — The price of lobster is going up and one reason is that lobsters like to eat lobsters about as much as people do.

"Lobsters are cannibalistic," said Robert L. Dow, director of research for the Maine Department of Sea and Shore Fisheries in Augusta. "They eat each other—a sort of built-in contraceptive instinct for population control, good for the species but not so good for the lobster fancier."

Lobsters have gotten expensive because of interlocking economic and biological factors that can be simplified into one phrase: small supply and big demand.

Biological factors, such as cannibalism, help keep the supply down. The faller is responsible for starting much of the demand and for continuing it.

"Unless the lobster can be moved quickly from boat to table, they spoil," said Dr. Thomas Meade, professor of fisheries and marine technology at the University of Rhode Island.

"Before the airplane, it was all but impossible to get live lobsters to a place like Duluth," he said. "Now we can, and naturally there is a demand now in places like Duluth where there was little or no demand before."

In Boston, restaurants charge up to \$8.50 for lobster—\$1.50 to \$2 above the prices listed on menus.

In Seattle, restaurant owner Victor Rosenthal said he took Maine lobster off the dinner menu, carrying it as an à la carte item at \$8.50.

"I don't want to sell it, it's too expensive," he said.

A Chicago restaurant charges \$8.50 for a Maine lobster dinner. The price in New York is \$7. In Kansas City, you can get a 1½ pound lobster, potato and salad for \$6.95 but must add \$1 to \$1.50 for a full dinner.

The airplane also created a demand for American lobster in Europe where the native supply is low, largely because of the depletion of the North Sea.

The increased demand and resulting reduction in the natural lobster population forced American lobstermen to change age-old methods of catching.

Until the 1950s, lobstermen piled their traps in little and large along the East Coast from Labrador to the Carolinas where their traps—small wooden pots shaped like Quaker huts.

As the lobster population near shore dwindled, lobstermen

Begging Proves Easy, Lucrative in Malaysia

By HARI SUBRAMANIAM

MALAYA, LINGGAT (AP) — The authorities believe persuasion and not harsh treatment is the answer. When police arrest and charge a beggar, the magistrate only can send him to relatives if he has any, or send him to a government center for beggars which at present houses 700 beggars.

There are 10 government and one private center for beggars in the port city of Penang carrying 400.

But authorities estimate there are "several times that part-time or full-time beggars" wandering the streets of Malaysia, although the government is willing to take all of them into these centers or even build new ones for them but the beggars are not coming. Some of them keep running away from the centers and have to be sent to the center in Malacca, 100 miles southeast of Kuala Lumpur, which is situated in a remote area that offers less chance of escape.

When a beggar is brought to the center he is clothed and fed and made to "feel wanted."

W.C. Cheong, director of social welfare, says begging is easy in Malaysia because the Moslems, Hindus and Buddhists of Malaysia all believe in charity and must give alms to the poor. So most people who put out their arms manage to collect some thing.

Beggars congregate at temples and mosques and are seen in great numbers during religious festivals because they know they can make easy money then, says Cheong.

The department and police do not crack down on beggars at religious places because the worshippers would protest. No one in Malaysia starves as it is easy to get a meal from anyone or the welfare authority. Ninety-five per cent of beggars should give any decision to "Terima Kasih."

Malaysian beggars use the normal method of begging, they have no money to pay the metal rucks as the U.S. trap and jailing them saves a valuable export after corps.

Reid said the subcommittee is interested in "those government policies which withhold vital information from the American people, and violate the 1st Amendment guarantee of the right to know."

The resulting "tragedy in Vietnam" Reid said, "shows the danger to democracy when our government fails to trust the American people and the Congress with the truth."

The only two Johnson administration figures to speak out since portions of the Pentagon papers were published say they know nothing of the contents he forwarded.

Former Defense Secretary Clark M. Clifford said one of the 18 known copies of the document has been under lock and key in his office since it was handed to him.

He said he was told the study was under way after he replaced Robert S. McNamara as Pentagon chief. "I didn't pay much attention to it at that time, because I was more concerned with what was going on than what had happened in the past."

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Min., vice president at the time the report was prepared, said he didn't know of its existence until excerpts began appearing in the Times last Sunday.

He said in an interview the lack of candor in public disclosures during the time of the Vietnam buildup was regrettable, but insisted the Johnson administration had not lied to Americans.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said the Nixon administration's action against the Times amounts to censorship and added: "The publication could not conceivably damage American security interests."

There's a lot of difference between a memo and a policy, he added.

One thing that bothers me is that these documents don't bring out the way the nation was really anguished through this period," Humphrey said. "It has been done before," he said. "I lived it and I don't want to arouse a war spirit in this country."

Coventry County Soil, Water Study Accepted by Town Group

The Conservation Commission has accepted the 20-page report prepared by the Tolland County Soil and Water Conservation District. The document which is in two sections, is entitled "Natural Resources Report—Soils, Streambeds and Potential Water-Oriented Development Sites."

Section I deals with streambeds and potential water-oriented development sites, and was prepared from information gathered in the field and from map studies. Section II briefly points out some additional conservation needs and possibilities in the town.

The commission said it hopes to set up a meeting with the Planning and Zoning Commission to go over the report jointly. At that time, Thornton Becor district conservationist, will explain the findings in the report.

Ultimately the commission hopes to use the report in conjunction with its open spaces plan.

The report's summary includes several major points: Streambed concept, based on an open spaces corridor containing a permanent flowing stream; floor plains; associated wetlands yielding food to the stream or recharging ground water; water development sites; adjacent uplands with severe limitations on recreational quality; contiguous lands having special aesthetic wildlife sanctuary or recreational qualities; and sufficient other land to provide a continuous corridor.

Open spaces concept, based on the findings in the report.

Retention of the streambeds would provide a linear framework along these water courses, connecting all of Coventry.

Also cited in the report is the fact that there are some locations with potential for various kinds of recreational development for either community-wide or neighborhood use.

Another point is that, because of the topographic conditions in Coventry, some of the poorer and very poorly drained soils are not included in the delineated streambeds. Some of these upland swamps and much of the area of shallow-to-bedrock soil should be included in a future open spaces program for the town.

The report notes that an analysis of the soils in Coventry shows that about 21 per cent of the town has severe and very severe limitations for urban use and about 12 per cent of the town has slight limitations for these uses.

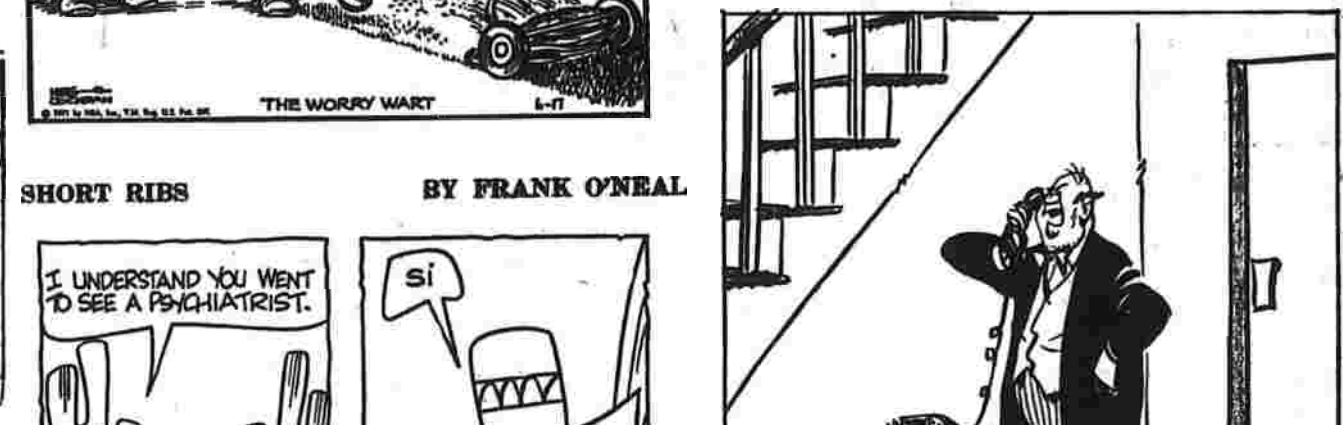
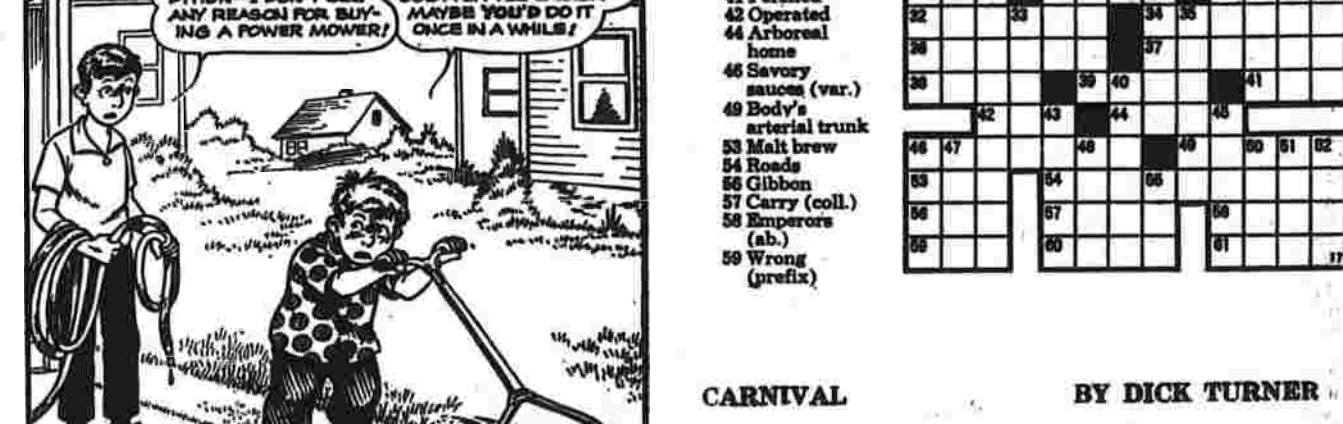
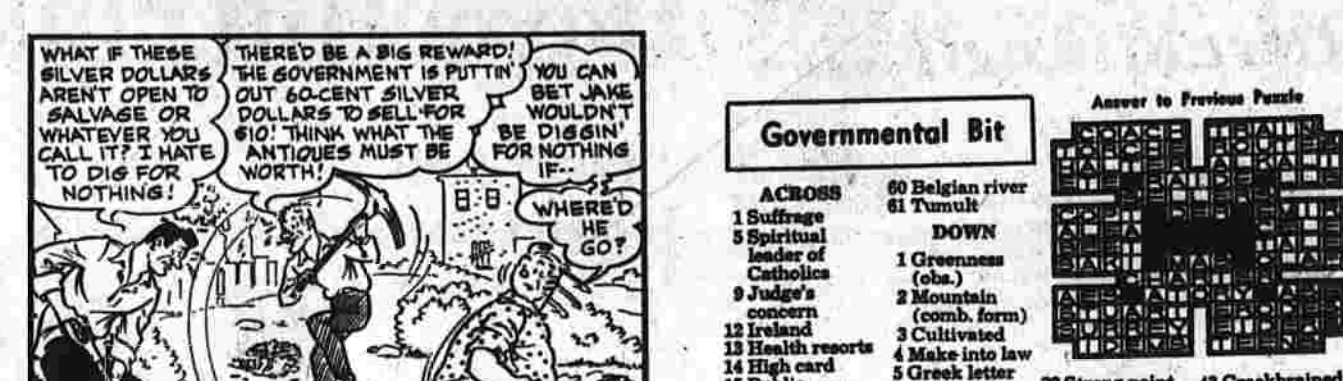
