Flexible Response

WASHINGTON — Quite apart from its specific merits or demerits, President Nixon's new anti-busing program is a fascinating case history in practical government. For it generally demonstrates how even the most stoutly advanced principles and philosophy must be modified in the face of reality.

Ever since taking office, the Nixon administration has preached the gospel of turning power back from Washington. This belief is one of the chief ideological underpinnings of the President's "new American revolution," and most specifically of his sweeping scheme for revenue sharing — to give states and cities more federal funds without tighter tied federal strings.

The problem, he said in a message to Congress a year ago, "is that states and localities are not free to spend these funds on their own needs as they see them. The money is spent instead for the things Washington wants and in the way Washington orders."

Yet now in his new school financing plan, Mr. Nixon would tie up the federal money in a whole ball of strings. To make sure the money goes where the need is greatest, he says, the administration will spell out "detailed program criteria." These will show how much the spending can vary from school to school within a district, the educational subjects that must be taught with the new dollars, rules for determining top-priority districts, and more — precisely the kind of guidelines for which he and other GOP leaders have criticized the Democrats in the past.

In 1968 Mr. Nixon campaigned as a "strict constructionist" who believed in a rather literal interpretation of the Constitution. Now, though, he suggests that the President and Congress jointly reach out for broad new powers — to limit the remedies that federal courts can order. To find any sort of precedent for his idea, he has had to go back to Reconstruction days, hardly a time of scrupulous regard for constitutional absolutes.

For the past three years the Nixon administration has constantly belittled the benefits of "compensatory education" — the pouring of money into slum schools in an effort to raise learning levels there. This is the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, which was the Democratic chief scheme for improving urban education, was derided as "typical of the Nixon administration pouring billions into a program without any real knowledge of what worked and what the Democrats had done better than far more slowly, the administration men have argued, carefully testing a variety of approaches before plunging on any one.

"We must stop letting wishes color our judgments about the educational effectiveness of many special compensatory programs," Mr. Nixon said in a March message to Congress. "The program depends on the quality of the teachers, the quality of the parents, the quality of the schools, the quality of the community, the quality of the child, and the quality of the program itself. It is not a magic formula, and it is not a magic wand. It is a program that must be tested and evaluated on its own merits, and it must be tested and evaluated in a way that is fair and honest to all concerned."

But, let the political dividends for this may, it's good to have good statistics for a change.

Staub On Our Side

Last year the story kept repeating itself. Every time the Mets seemed about to swing into real contention, Rusty Staub came along and batted them into submission again.

This year, if anybody is putting on uniforms, Staub will be putting on that of the Mets. It will be a comfort to have him on our side, and we hope his hits will be as timely for us as they have been, for the past two years, against us.

"Anybody But McGovern"

WASHINGTON—The collision course to chase at Miami Beach mapped by Sen. George McGovern's stunning triumph in Wisconsin became inescapable when judged by the remarks of a powerful lieutenant of Mayor Richard J. Daley's Chicago operation at the Democratic caucus over television last Tuesday night.

Viewing the jubilant McGovern celebration, the Daley Democrat snapped: "This McGovern is going to have all those woolly-heads around him, he might as well forget about the support of our kind of people."

But in truth, even if his eager young men visited the barber, McGovern would not melt the icy opposition of party regulars. Our telephone checks Wednesday with dozens of them showed that McGovern's astonishing appeal among Wisconsin's blue-collar workers had done nothing to make him more palatable. Rather, the regulars feel stopping McGovern at Miami Beach is a holy cause.

Thus looms a collision course which would become bloodier still by future McGovern wins. But the regulars now have no single clear alternative. The decline of Sen. Edmund S. Muskie continues unchecked, Sen. Hubert Humphrey's poor performance in Wisconsin underlines misgivings about him among the regulars and the means of actually nominating Sen. Edward Kennedy are shrouded in ambiguity.

Opposition from the regulars, deriving partly from McGovern's leftish ideology and partly from his anti-organization insurgency, seems immutable. "I think the nomination of George McGovern would mean the end of the Democratic party we have known," one highly respected party leader told us, adding he would not campaign for him. In the hierarchy of the AFL-CIO, McGovern is viewed as a menace with no less emotionalism.

Consequently, a great many regulars are now taking "anybody but McGovern," wiping out past enemies. A case in point is Daley's Chicago operation, which has long resented Humphrey's failure as 1968 nominee to stand with Daley when attacked by the left. On any list of Presidential possibilities, Humphrey has been close to last in Chicago.

In the wake of Wisconsin, however, the mood has

South Windsor CDAP Questionnaire Gets Varied Replies

Students in South Windsor High School were given the opportunity to "say it like it is" last week when the Community Development Action Plan (CDAP) education committee presented them with a 21 question survey. The results were finally released for publication and distributed this week.

The survey format was completed by CDAP in March of 1971, but was not approved by the school board until June. It was then distributed to students in grades 9 through 11, for completion during Senior Graduation Week, even though enough copies were available for all high school students.

Three seniors managed to get copies and completed them for tabulation. Of the 1239 students eligible to fill out the questionnaire, 602 did, and the results were compiled by the committee. Not only were the numbers of pro and con votes tabulated, but the comments made by the students also were recorded.

The committee received the "pro ahead" last week from Mayor Abraham Glassman to discuss publication of the high school survey. However, he asked that the survey be withheld when he learned that approval to hold the meeting was required from the entire Town Council.

No council approval has been given to the survey yet, but copies are available in the high school library and in the Wood Memorial and Central libraries for public viewing.

The purpose of the education survey was to collect the education committee on student's feelings when they are in school and to determine whether the education and interest in learning.

In essence, students claimed they were "bored," because of the lack of courses available; that they were not considered important as individuals (68% of voting "yes" and 59% "no"); that they were not interested in their problems to teachers, guidance counselors or principal.

Another area touched on was ability groupings, where students are graded from a scale of 1 to 5. Students claimed ability groupings improved their self-esteem and voted for continuing it.

However, they noted that it "tells a bad message to students who don't care to, and that there is difficulty in moving from one group to another once established.

Cyclist Blamed For Own Death In July Crash

MANCHESTER, Conn. (AP)—A 27-year-old motorcyclist, fatally injured in a crash at Broad and Center Sts. last July, may be held liable for his own death, according to a coroner's report.

The motorcyclist, John MacCar of Colchester, died July 14 at Manchester Memorial Hospital.

MacCar's motorcycle was involved in a collision with a small freight car owned by Nancy L. Johnson of 18 Benton St. on Center St. near Broad St. at 4:30 p.m. July 13.

The motorcycle pulled out of a driveway onto Center St. in front of Mrs. Johnson's house. Mrs. Johnson, according to the inquiry held by Hartford County Coroner Irving Avonson, found that the collision occurred as a result of MacCar's own critical actions in that he was operating his vehicle in the wrong lane and at a high rate of speed.

MacCar was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

Nets Announce Plans

15 Shows Canceled

NEW YORK (AP) — Fred MacMurray, Glenn Ford, Glen Campbell, Tony Curtis, David Janssen, James Franciscus, Elizabeth Montgomery and Don Rickles are among the stars whose television programs have been canceled by ABC and CBS.

Add to these the names of James Stewart and James Garner, whose shows got the hook at season's end from NBC—plus Shirley MacLaine and Anthony Quinn whose ABC series lasted only until midseason, and it becomes obvious that the television audience has been saying something.

It can only be one of two things: A film star is only as good in television as the material in his series, or that a program is only as strong as its competition is weak.

The three major networks have announced their prime-time plans for next September. They include 19 new programs with big emphasis on situation comedy, plenty of action shows and a little variety. Generally, the proposed programs seem to be safe, bland and decidedly nonexperimental.

Julie Andrews will have an hour of variety on ABC. CBS hopes Bill Cosby will churn up for it the kind of excitement that Flip Wilson has created for NBC. Since Archie Bunker has been a sensation on CBS, the

network has produced a comedy about a relative of dingbat Edith named "Cousin Maude," who is as liberal as Archie is conservative.

Since most shows scheduled for showing five months hence are unmade, the most interesting aspects of the new schedules are the cancellations. Two shows died essentially from old age, but were hurried along by their networks. Both "My Three Sons," on CBS for 12 years, and "Bewitched," an ABC fixture for eight, came to dismal ends when they were forced to compete with two of the most popular shows—NBC's "Flip Wilson Show" and CBS's "All in the Family," respectively.
