Killer Storm Churns Gulf

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) —Tropic was located at latitude 20.7 at Storm Agnes, already northeast, longitude 83.2 west, or 300 miles from the coast of Cuba.

Last Infantry Deactivated In Da Nang

SAIGON (AP) — The United States today deactivated its last remaining infantry brigade in South Vietnam, officially ending its ground combat role but continuing the commitment of a 100,000-man air and naval force to the war.

U.S. air and naval forces again heavily bombed North Vietnam, and stayed below the 20th parallel 70 miles south of Hanoi to avoid any incidents during the visit of Soviet President Nikolai Podgorny to the North Vietnamese capital.

The U.S. Command reported that Air Force, Navy and Marine fighter-bombers carried out more than 250 air strikes against North Vietnam Friday. More than 350 strikes were flown over the North in the previous day.

The major raids Friday included attacks on the Dong Phung Thung railroad bypass bridge 210 miles northeast of Thanh Hoa near the 20th parallel, 200 miles north of the demilitarized zone, and renewed strikes on MIG air bases at Bal Thuong, Khe Phat and Quang Lang. Navy and Air Force pilots reported knocking out the bridge and 20 MIG aircraft. The three MIG aircraft were reported cratered in 15 different places.

Bomb damage assessment for the day as reported by the U.S. Command included six bridges, 33 trucks, 20 surface craft, 29 trucks, 40 surface craft, 25 railroads rolling stock damaged or destroyed.

The Command said one plane, a Navy F4U Corsair, was hit by enemy anti-aircraft fire while on a reconnaissance mission near Thanh Hoa. The pilot flew the aircraft out to sea, bailed out and was rescued uninjured by a Navy helicopter.

The Command announced the shutdown of the 3rd Brigade, 1st Air Cavalry Division, the last full infantry brigade remaining in the war zone.

The Command said the move would cut American strength in Vietnam by 2,500 troops.

The disclosure that the brigade was being deactivated came less than 24 hours after the start of the pullout of the 9th Air Cavalry Brigade from Da Nang. Sources disclosed earlier that seven Air Force and Marine fighter-bomber squadrons at the Da Nang base had begun shifting their operations to three bases in Thailand.

One battalion of the 3rd Brigade and some helicopter units reportedly will remain behind in Da Nang Friday night.

Air Bosses Trying For Strike Ban

NEW YORK (AP) — The Air Transport Association is set to press today for a federal court order barring American airlines from taking part in a 24-hour work stoppage 30 days that could curtail air traffic in 64 nations.

The work stoppage, which could affect up to a million passengers, has been called by the International Federation of Airline Pilots Association to demand more for stronger international security measures and airport records against hijackers.

Announcing the protest action aimed at involving 50,000 pilots, Ole Pumborg, president of the federation, said Friday: "This stoppage is definitely on, we just can't hold it off."

He said the shutdown is scheduled to start at 2 a.m. EDT Monday.

Several pilot groups balked at the work stoppage call, however, and the Air Transport Association, representing U.S. scheduled airlines, went into federal court in Washington to request an injunction against the threatened shutdown.

U.S. District Court Judge George Hart scheduled a hearing today on the airline association's suit.

Trans World Airlines obtained a temporary federal court order in New York barring any work stoppage by its pilots.

A spokesman for nearly 8,000 pilots at United Air Lines, the nation's largest carrier, said those pilots would not participate in Monday's planned shutdown. Pilots for Braniff International also said they would continue normal domestic service.

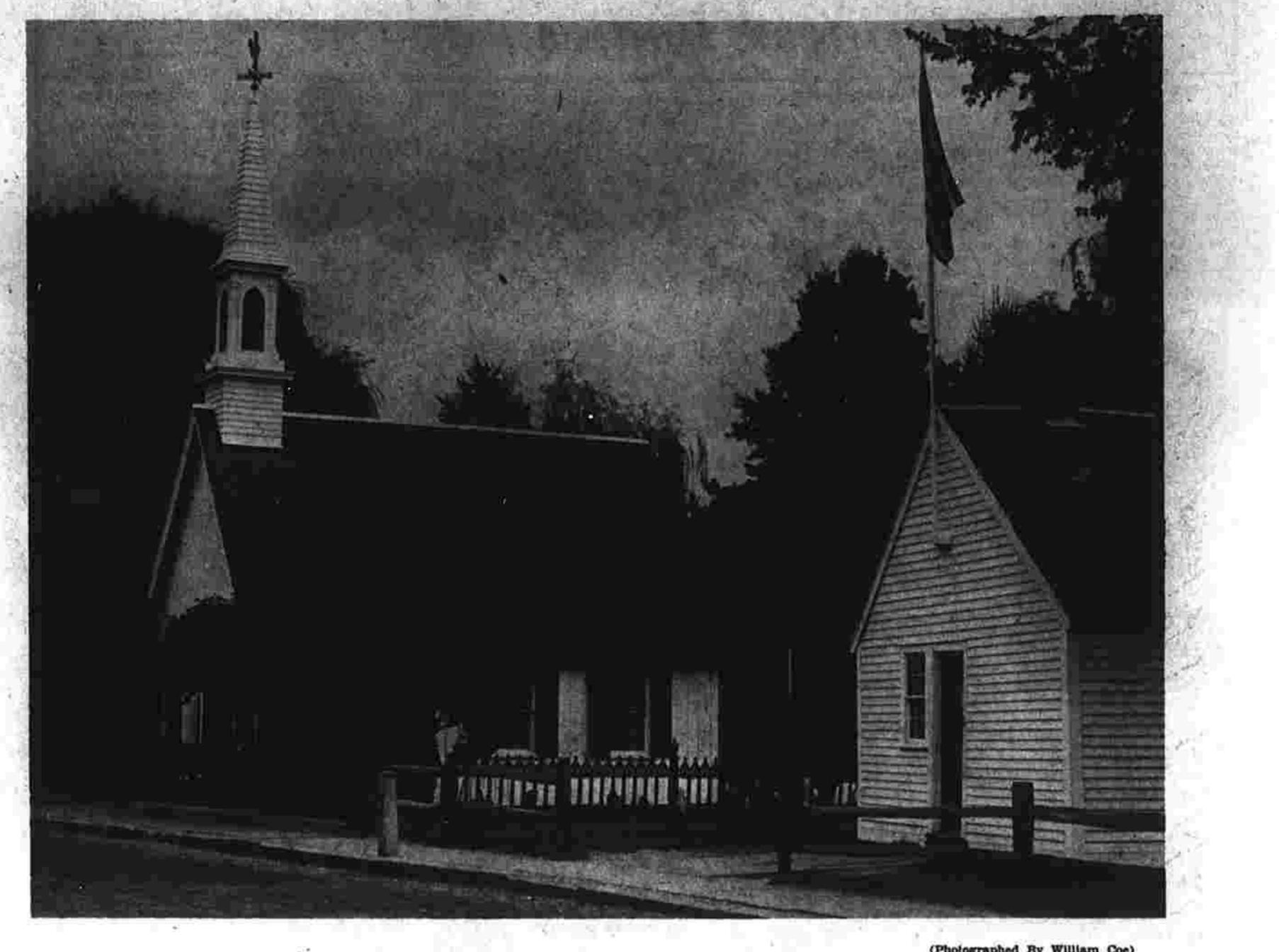

Mr. Bellow, in such circumstances, was a candid and honorable gentleman, and informed Yale or Harvard that Harvard or Yale had already engaged him for a cap and gown appearance this year.

But one can also understand that for either university to withdraw its invitation for such a reason would be for it to admit that it was being presented for itself rather than seeking to do honor to a talent which so richly deserved it.

We can imagine, then, that whichever university was second in time swallowed its disappointment bravely, and put as cheerful a face as possible on the fact that Mr. Bellow, a product of Chicago and Northwestern Universities, would be receiving homage from two Ivy League citadels in the same week.

Inside Report Connecticut Yankee Mr. Meany, Meet Teddy

WASHINGTON—A mysterious meeting between President George Meany of the AFL-CIO and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy has planned a secret, and selective, in pasting out their annual books. They like nothing better, these great institutions of learning, than to "accompany" one another by having the best honoree list each June.

What was said between Meany and Kennedy at their meeting last month is shrouded in secrecy and conflicting reports. Nevertheless, word has circulated at AFL-CIO headquarters that Meany candidly asked Kennedy to run for President.

Although the pivotal California Democratic primary was then two weeks away, Meany told Kennedy that he had no intention to run for President, much less sabotage George McGovern.

Meany and close associates decided weeks ago that Kennedy was the only alternative to McGovern. Although last year Meany was complaining privately about Kennedy's militant opposition to the Vietnam war, he now regards him as vastly preferable to McGovern, who would be the first Democratic Presidential candidate since the 1920s without intimate ties to organized labor.

There is no proof this was actually discussed between Kennedy and Meany. Indeed, Meany's top aides, out of ignorance or a desire for secrecy, deny knowledge of the meeting. In fact, however, the meeting was held at Meany's request late in May. Sources close to Kennedy claim the discussion involved issues, with no mention of Presidential politics—a most improbable omission. However, one knowledgeable AFL-CIO staffer has written a memorandum which gives this account of the conversation:

Meany stressed to Kennedy that McGovern was totally unacceptable to labor. If McGovern were nominated, he predicted a battle over whether the AFL-CIO would endorse him. But even if an endorsement to Meany's amazement, Kennedy was noncommittal. This account has nourished wild thinking among top labor leaders that McGovern can still be stopped.

The strange story reflects labor's desperation more than political reality. Three closest to Kennedy are confident he has no intention to run for President, much less sabotage George McGovern.

Meany and close associates decided weeks ago that Kennedy was the only alternative to McGovern. Although last year Meany was complaining privately about Kennedy's militant opposition to the Vietnam war, he now regards him as vastly preferable to McGovern, who would be the first Democratic Presidential candidate since the 1920s without intimate ties to organized labor.

There is no proof this was actually discussed between Kennedy and Meany. Indeed, Meany's top aides, out of ignorance or a desire for secrecy, deny knowledge of the meeting. In fact, however, the meeting was held at Meany's request late in May. Sources close to Kennedy claim the discussion involved issues, with no mention of Presidential politics—a most improbable omission. However, one knowledgeable AFL-CIO staffer has written a memorandum which gives this account of the conversation:

Meany stressed to Kennedy that McGovern was totally unacceptable to labor. If McGovern were nominated, he predicted a battle over whether the AFL-CIO would endorse him. But even if an endorsement to Meany's amazement, Kennedy was noncommittal. This account has nourished wild thinking among top labor leaders that McGovern can still be stopped.

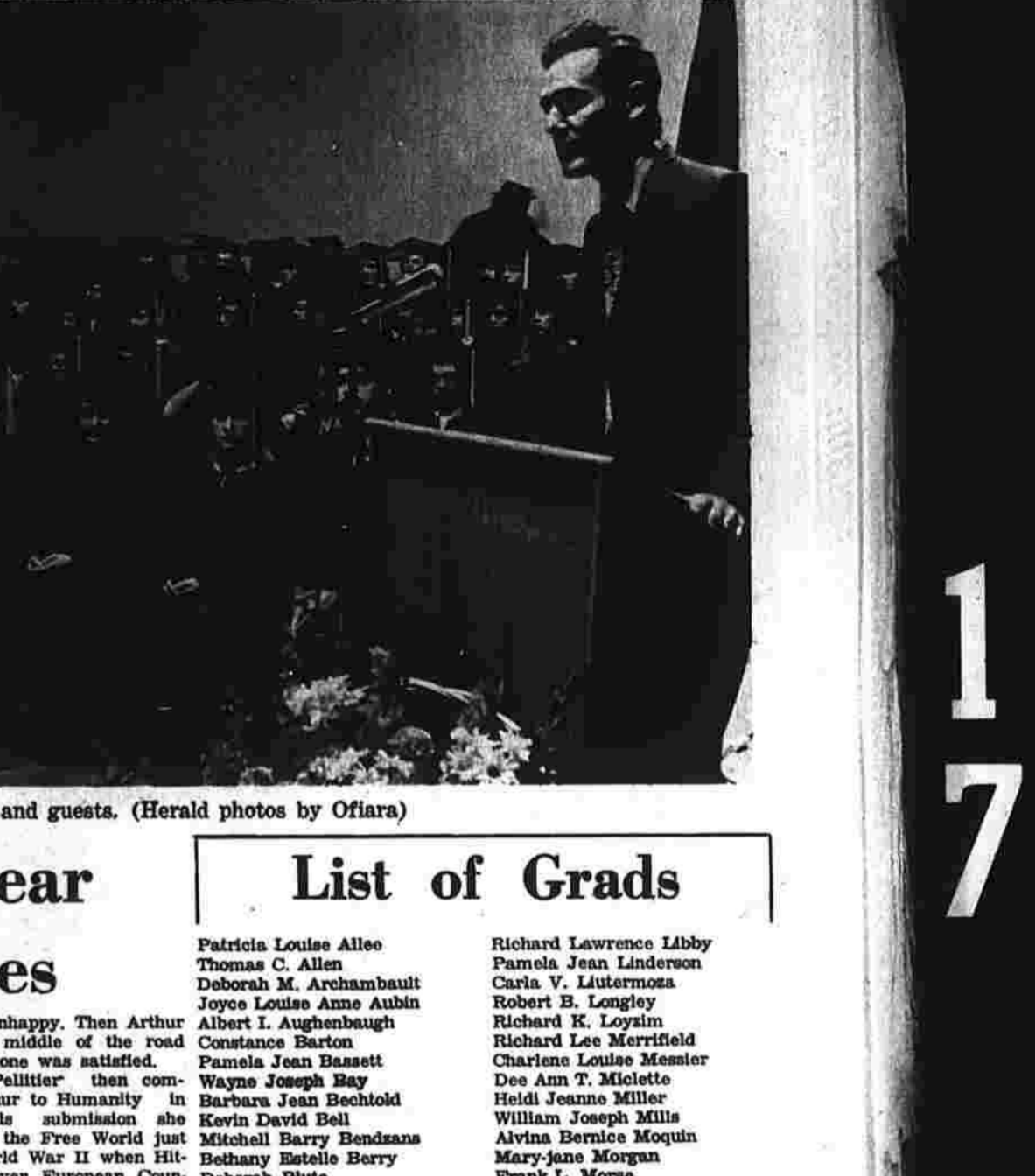

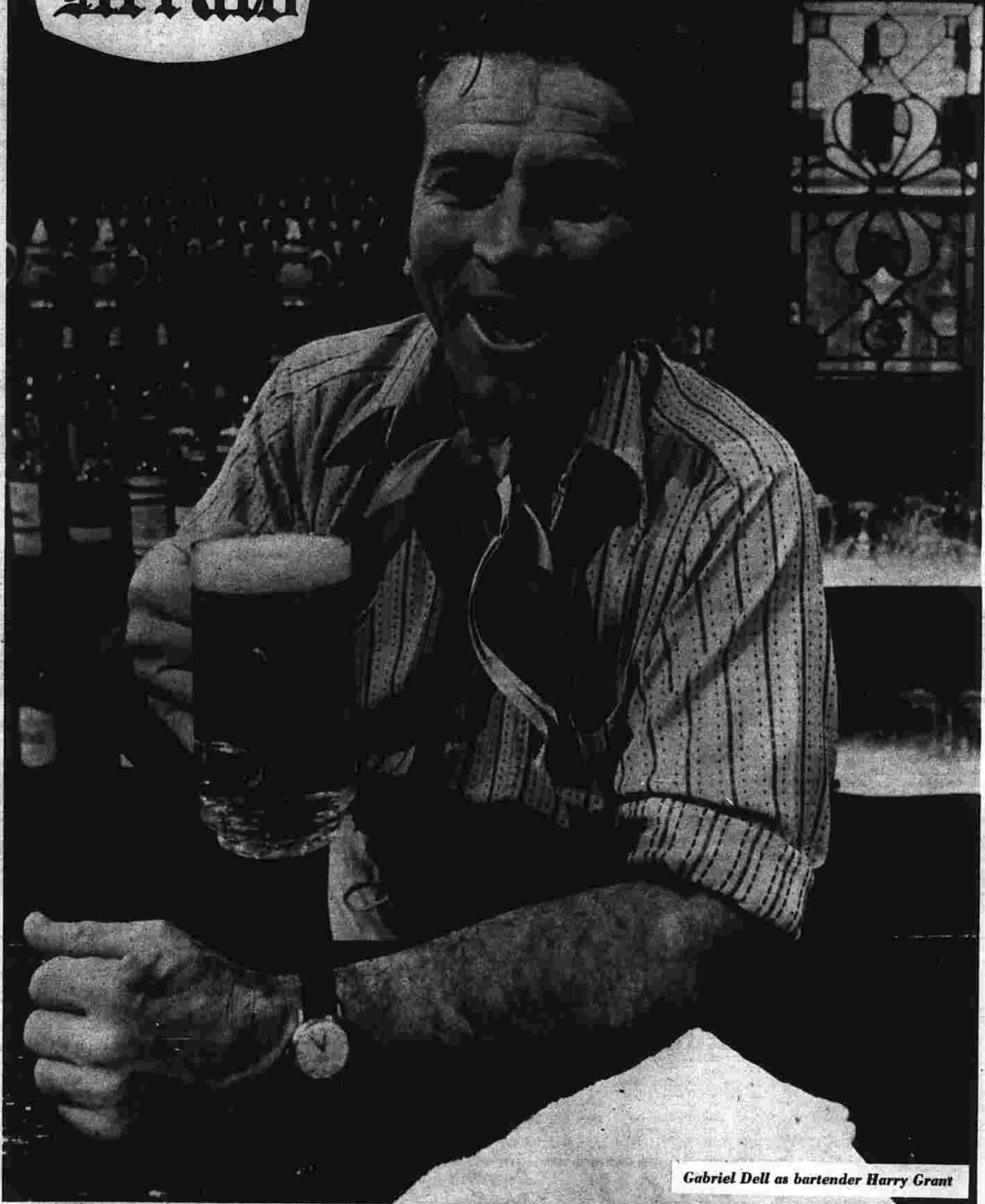
