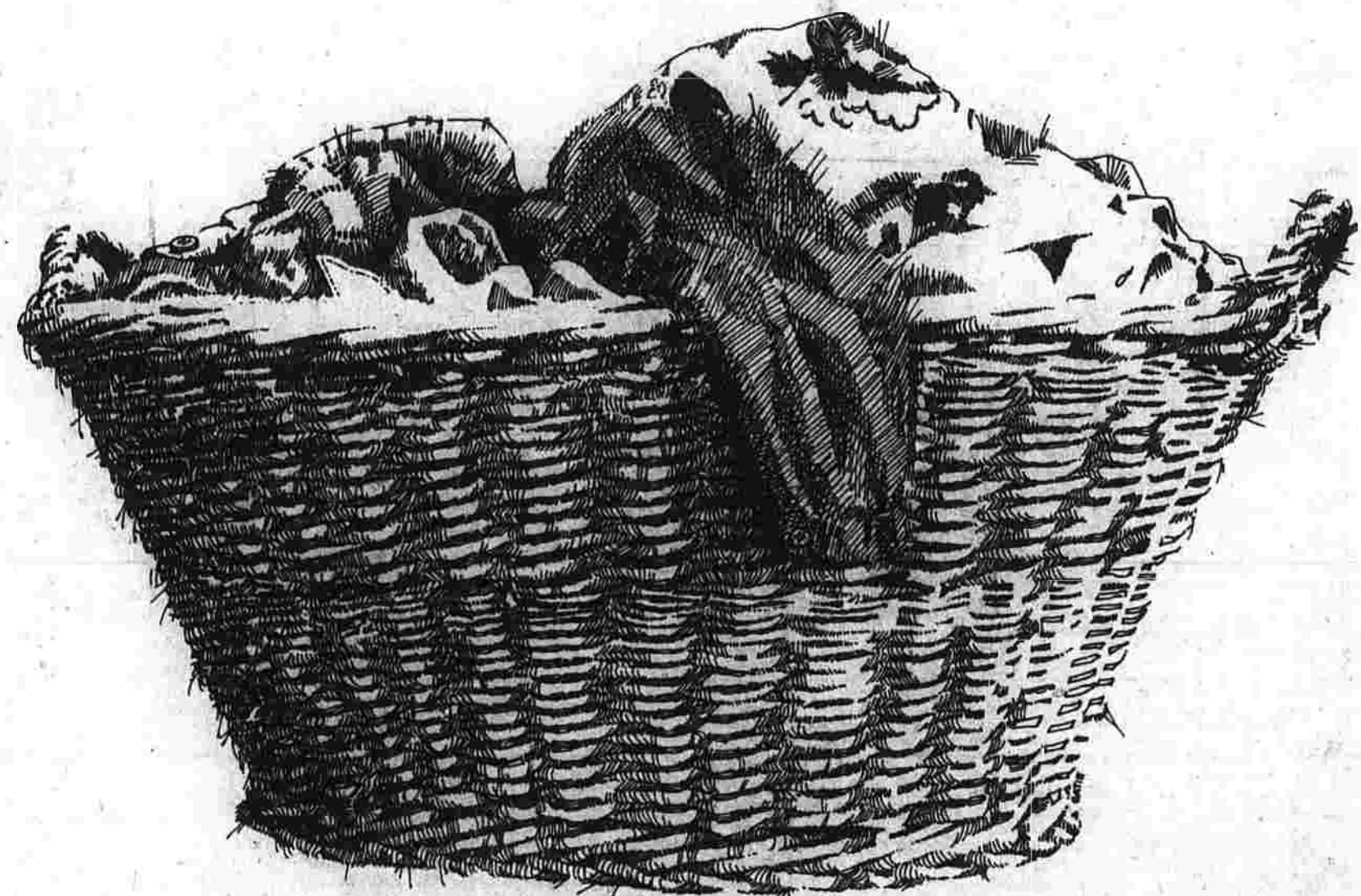

State Chutists Take Top Awards

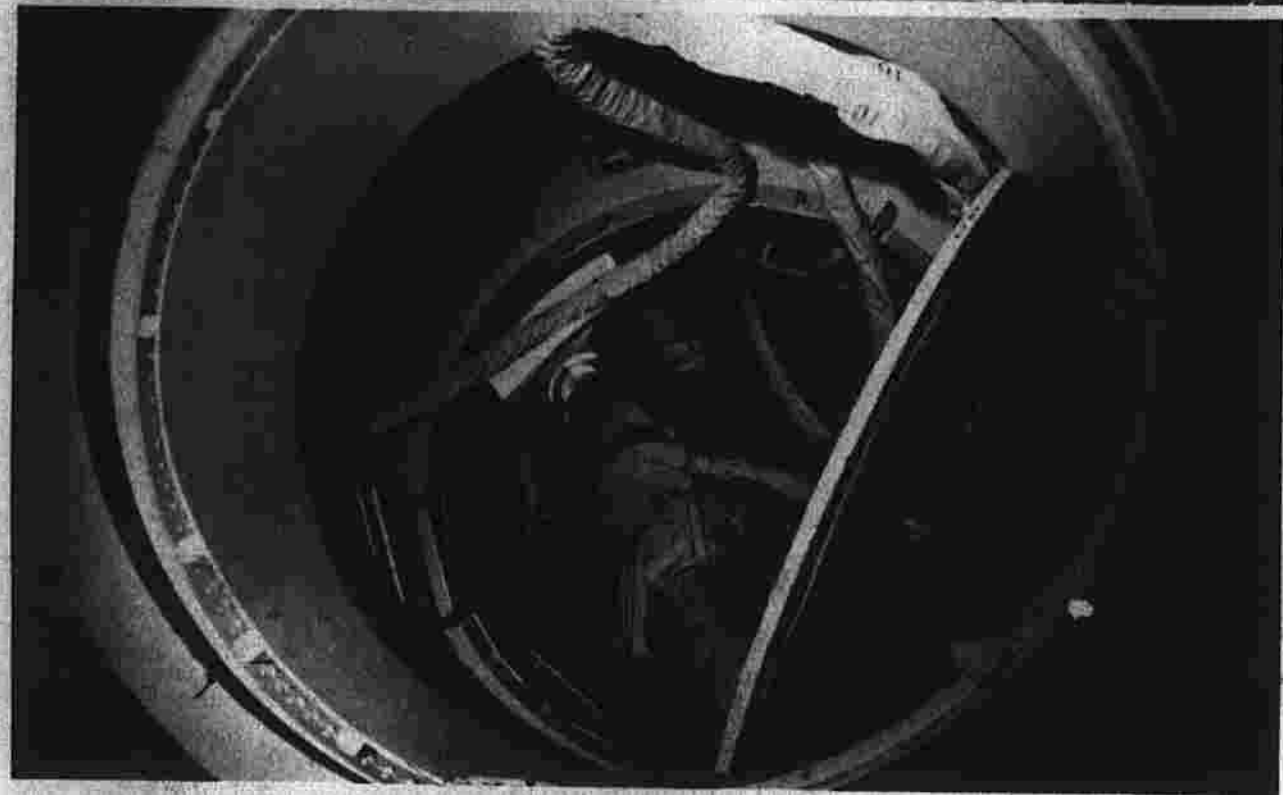

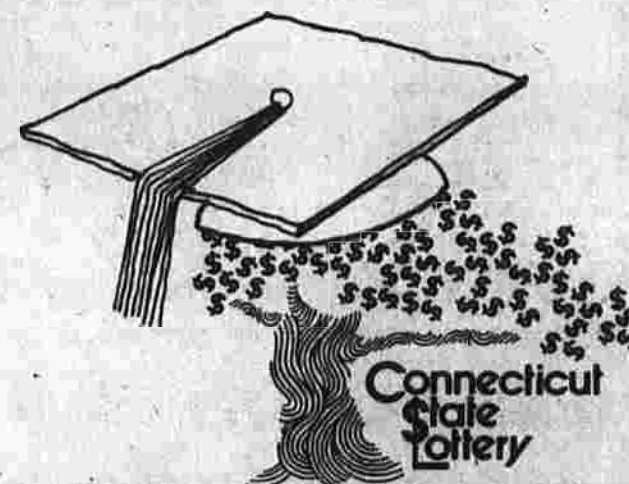

This is the third year the Manchester Jaycees have run the "DO SOMETHING" program. Inspired by President Nixon's Volunteer Action Program, it is a campaign to encourage local residents to help each other. This can be done by interested persons donating their time and efforts to any one of several local organizations. - Do you like to play bingo or cards? Volunteers are needed to share one night a week with the residents of Manchester Manor Nursing Home. Men are especially needed. Volunteers are also needed to instruct classes in Arts and Crafts.
- These are but a few of the volunteer needs. The job qualifications are varied. Some demand the trained skills of a therapist, the knowledge of a teacher or the training of a nurse. All demand a desire to help.

Early Success Encouraged South Windsor Hobbyist

Less than two years ago, a South Windsor youth saw an advertisement in a hobby magazine for a "Mandala Kit," more popularly known as "string art." At the time, the kit was too expensive, but because the hobby concept presented him with a challenge, Kent Carney of 617 Nevers Rd. decided he would try to create a work of art without the benefit of diagrams or instructions.

Looking about his home, Kent found some old wood planks and string. He purchased some small nails and burlap material. He covered the wood with the burlap and arranged the nails and strings on the plank into an art object he titled "Fantas-tic." He liked what he saw in the finished product and entered it in the South Windsor 1971 Annual Arts and Crafts Exhibit at the Pleasant Valley School. He was first prize in the junior division for the tri-colored string sphere.

With this winning entry, Kent's interest grew and he decided he would try other ideas. He first penciled designs on paper, then, using the equipment, he constructed patterns and entered his works in art shows around Connecticut. As he became more proficient in his work, Kent changed his patterns by adding wood wedges to the backplank and created three-dimensional pictures in the stringed portions.

Kent admits he needs to be inspired for most of his creations and one of his better selling items are dog heads in string. A friend, George White, a dog trainer in California took an interest in Kent's works and asked him to do a doberman pincher's head which White later purchased and took with him to the other side of the country.

With a little prompting in the "inspirational" department from his parents, Kent has made a tennis racket in red, white and blue strings after the family attended the Virginia Sluis tennis tournament in Rhode Island. The arrangement of the strings to create the curved racket head was, according to Kent, the most difficult and time consuming endeavor he had attempted, but added, "everyone, including myself, was pleased with the result."

One of his most unusual works is on the wall in the family recreation room. It is a study in black and white, or dark and light, which Kent has appropriately named "The Resurrection." It is a cross in three dimensions which, when highlighted, has an air of mystery about it. Kent said the idea for it came when, as a member of the Wapping Community Church, he looked long at the cross above the minister's pulpit one morning as the light rays rested on the angles of the cross. In the study, he said he tried to re-create what the light had done to the cross that day.

Kent is able to continue working on the string art and is paying for his materials with prize money and sold items. He holds a "Best of Show" award this year earned at the Annual South Windsor Art League's Outdoor Exhibit for a entry he did not name. The \$25 cash award provided the necessary capital to continue the work.

His ability and interest has not gone unnoticed by Kent's art teacher, Miss Geraldine Maillet, at South Windsor High School where he is a sophomore this year. He said she has encouraged him to try another phase of the art and he has even though all strings are strung from one end to another, and in a straight line. At age 15, Kent is a very enterprising young man whose interests vary. He likes sports, especially tennis and is also a member of the computer programmers club in school. He considers himself a "very good" math student which, he believes, helps in making his creations look like abstract sculpture.

Book Review

THE NEW OXFORD BOOK OF ENGLISH VERSE, 1500-1950. Chosen and Edited by Helen Gardner. Oxford University Press, 974 Pages, \$10.

For more than a generation, beginning in 1906, it was edited by the Cornish scholar and critic Sir Arthur Quiller-Couch, whose terse pseudonym was "Q" and who, before being killed by an American jeep in World War II, brought out "The New Oxford Book of English Verse" in 1933. "Q" apparently was trying both
