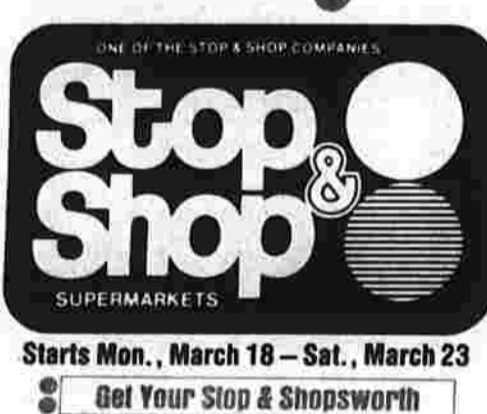

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Arab Ministers Discuss Oil Prices

Oil Embargo Lifting Delayed by Details

United Press International Arab oil nations have agreed in principle to lift their five-month-old oil embargo against the United States. Arab oil sources said today.

The sources said an announcement of the boycott's end has been held up so far while the oil ministers argued over details of the move.

In Tunis, the official Algerian press service also announced the boycott's end, saying the Arab ministers "decided purely and simply to lift the embargo measures."

An aide to Saudi Arabian Oil Minister Ahmed Zaki Yamani said the Arabs would hold a new round of talks this afternoon. Arab oil sources said a final decision was expected then.

Syrian Oil Minister Jibr El Kefri was awaiting new instructions from Damascus following Sunday's indecisive meeting of Arab oil ministers on lifting the embargo, the source said.

Egypt and Saudi Arabia had proposed the ban be scrapped in repayment of the U.S. role in negotiating an Israeli troop withdrawal from the Suez Canal, the sources said.

Syria wanted the ban lifted only temporarily in order to keep up pressure on the United States to get Israel to allow withdrawal from occupied Syrian territory, the sources said.

Many observers had expected the embargo to be lifted following a meeting of Arab oil ministers in Tripoli, Libya, last week but sources there indicated a formal decision ending the embargo would be announced in Vienna Sunday.

Nine members of the Organization of Arab Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) met separately in Vienna to consider lifting the ban after the 12-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) announced it had decided to continue a freeze on prices of crude oil another three months until July 1.

The 12 OPEC members nations produce 85 per cent of the world's oil exports.

In other energy-related news: Egyptian President Anwar Sadat told Newsweek magazine that he feels it would be a "real tragedy" for our area of the world if President Nixon were impeached. Sadat said Nixon had accomplished a "new look" in America's Middle East policy.

Carlyle-Johnson Plant Struck

The 48 production employees of the Carlyle-Johnson Machine Co. were on strike as of this morning and set up picket lines at 6 a.m. at the company gates at 82 Main St.

The employees are members of the International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machinery Workers (IUE), AFL-CIO.

The union's field representative, James Ingalls, said the company's gates will be under surveillance 24 hours a day.

The union's contract with Carlyle-Johnson expired at midnight Saturday and negotiations, begun about two months ago, have broken down.

The Carlyle-Johnson Machine Co. manufactures a variety of clutches for machinery.

A 38-day strike of the company's employees, the first in its history, took place from March to April in 1964. The strike started when the workers demanded a union shop and the company opposed it. The agreement which ended the strike expired in March 1968.

A brief walkout of a few hours occurred in January 1968. The walkout was in sympathy with an employee who objected to being transferred to the night shift. The workers were encouraged to return to their jobs by the union, in that instance.

Sirica Orders Grand Jury Report Be Given Committee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Federal Judge John J. Sirica today ordered that a secret grand jury report on President Nixon's handling of Watergate be turned over to the House Judiciary Committee's impeachment inquiry.

Sirica ordered a two-day stay in turning the report over to permit "whatever appellate review may be available."

"Having carefully examined the contents of the grand jury report, the court is satisfied that there can be no question regarding their materiality to the House Judiciary Committee's investigation," Sirica said.

"Beyond materiality, of course, it is the committee's responsibility to determine the significance of the evidence, and the court offers no opinion as to relevance."

The committee had requested the secret report so it can use whatever evidence the grand jury had uncovered in its inquiry into whether Nixon has been involved in impeachable offenses. The White House did not contest Sirica's right to turn the material over to the committee.

Sirica's 22-page ruling said that the two questions he had considered were: "Whether the grand jury has power to make reports and recommendations," and "Whether the court has power to disclose such reports, and if so, to what extent."

Sirica, who reaches mandatory retirement age on his 70th birthday Tuesday, will be replaced as Chief Judge of U.S. District Court by Judge George L. Hart, Jr. Wednesday.

Hart, 58, is expected to decide Watergate cases equally among the 15 judges remaining on the court. Hart will have to step down as chief judge when he reaches age 70 in 15 months.

A Watergate grand jury gave the report to Sirica March 1 as it indicted seven former close associates of President Nixon on charges of conspiracy in the Watergate cover-up. Sources have said the report deals with the President and that the grand jury asked that it be given to the Judiciary Committee, which is studying possible impeachment of the President.

In other developments: Rep. John B. Anderson, R-Ill., chairman of the House Republican Conference, sided with the Judiciary Committee, against the President, Sunday, saying the White House should give the committee 42 tapes it has requested. "I think the committee should be given that information," he said in a broad-

cast interview (NBC) Meet the Press. He rejected the White House view that the committee request is a "fishing expedition."

— Anderson also said the President has become a liability in many parts of the country. "A majority of candidates will concentrate on conducting independent campaigns," he said.

— Rep. Jerome R. Waldie, D-Calif., a member of the Judiciary Committee, said he believes the President may deliberately seek a contempt of Congress prosecution on the issue. "He can't confront the issue on facts because the facts are incriminating," said Waldie.

— Rep. Wilbur Mills, D-Ark., said Sunday (CBS "Face the Nation") that Nixon will be out of office either by impeachment or resignation by November. He said he is willing to sponsor legislation giving Nixon complete immunity from prosecution once he resigns.

The Senate Watergate committee questions the President's private secretary, Rose Mary Woods, in private session Wednesday about an alleged \$100,000 campaign contribution from billionaire Howard Hughes to the President's friend, Charles G. "Bebe" Rebozo. Miss Woods said in earlier testimony to the committee, released Saturday, she had two or three conversations with Rebozo about the money but never discussed it with Nixon.

Rep. Dooley Will Not Seek Re-Election

BARBARA RICHMOND this morning Democratic State Rep. Thomas Dooley of Vernon said he will not seek re-election to the General Assembly, a post he is serving for a second term.

The legislator cited his increased responsibilities as a Connecticut General Life Insurance Co. as his primary reason for his decision. Last fall he was elevated to the position of second vice president to head the marketing department.

His new position, he said, requires substantial time and travel which precludes his running for a third term. Asked whether he would be interested in running for Congress, Dooley answered with a definite "no" stating that "it is not my cup of tea."

Dooley, before reappointment, represented the entire town of Vernon. With reappointment he was elected to serve one portion of Vernon while the other sections share districts with other areas towns.

Dooley, who is an attorney, termed serving in the General Assembly "one of the most worthwhile and exciting activities I have ever pursued." He added, "It would sound corny but I found it thrilling to be part of the law-making process."

He said he also enjoyed his contact with people who he has never had any distasteful incidents and never felt he was ever harassed by his constituents.

"There is a real sense of satisfaction in representing your community in the House of Representatives, getting to know and assisting literally hundreds of citizens and being an integral part of the law-making process," he said.

He said his decision not to seek re-election was a difficult one and was reached after long discussions with his wife Ann and his children Karen, 16, and Larry 11.

"Realistically, however, I cannot spend what I consider to be the appropriate time required at the Capitol and with my constituents," Dooley confided.

He said his employer had not asked him to step down nor asked his family feel that way. "In good conscience, however, I do not want to execute the responsibilities of the office of state representative in a less

Banker Pays Ransom For Wife's Return

LINO LAKES, Minn. (UPI) — Banker Gunnar Kronholm has delivered a ransom to the kidnappers of his wife, Edna, a family spokesman said early today, and the kidnappers have promised they will let him know later today where his wife can be found.

Rev. Bruce Fleming, Kronholm's brother-in-law and pastor of the Bethlehem Baptist Church in Minneapolis, said money had been delivered "as promised" and that it was supposed to be received sometime this morning where Mrs. Kronholm can be found.

Fleming refused to say how much ransom was paid or give any details on how the money was delivered.

Earlier, the FBI announced that the car belonging to Mrs. Kronholm was found in the Minneapolis suburb of Edina.

Mrs. Kronholm, 46, disappeared Friday morning sometime after 7:30 a.m. last that day, a man telephoned Kronholm and said: "We have your wife. Deliver all the money you can at a station at..."

Kronholm said he immediately hung up. Since then, nothing has been heard from the kidnappers.

An IRA attack on an army foot patrol in Londonderry's Brandywell district Sunday night killed a soldier, raising the death toll to 977 in 4 1/2 years of violence.

Four suspected IRA gunmen broke into a U.S. Navy communications station at Londonderry during a St. Patrick's Day dance early Sunday, took four petty officers hostage and attempted to break into the armory.

Cmde. Chester Murphy of the New Philadelphia, Ohio, the base commander, said the raiders tried in vain to smash open the armory door with bolt cutters and an ax.

Murphy said the gunmen kept one of the four petty officers hostage during their escape, but managed to get away when they drove into a blind alley. "These apparently crazed men found their way out so they abandoned the truck," Murphy said. "Our man used that moment to break away. As he ran, the gunmen fired four shots but they missed and he got away and raised the alarm."

A Navy spokesman said no weapons were taken from the armory.

Police and troops manning checkpoints near the province's border with the Irish Republic and outside barricaded city centers stepped up searches today in an attempt to stop explosives and weapons traffic.

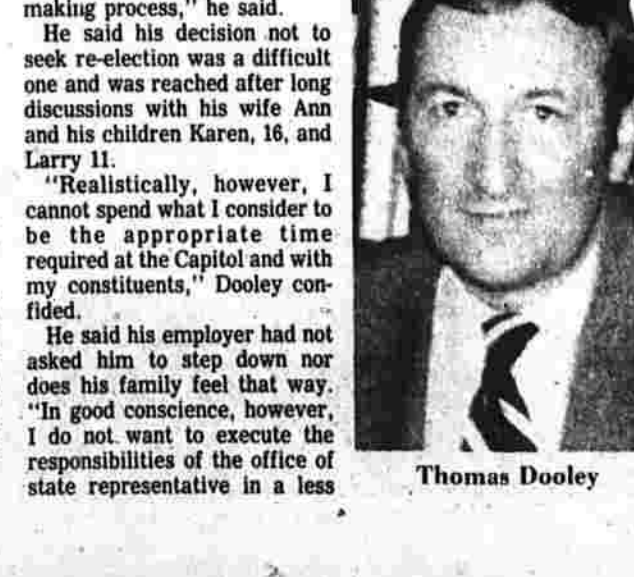

Labor Party Faces First Big Test

LONDON (UPI) — Britain's minority Labor government met the Conservative and Liberal opposition today in a parliamentary showdown that could force a new national election or set off a constitutional crisis.

The House of Commons ended nearly a week of debate and called a vote tonight to decide on new Prime Minister Harold Wilson's Labor government legislative program.

The Conservatives and Liberals vowed to vote against the program because the package provided legal curbs on prices but not wages. The two-party opposition said the move would inevitably step up inflation.

Political informants said, however, the government might try at the last moment to avoid a showdown by maintaining the old conservative government's pay curbs for another six months.

New Violence Kills Eight

BELFAST (UPI) — Authorities tightened security across Northern Ireland today after the worst violence in months rocked the St. Patrick's Day weekend.

Bomb blasts and ambushes over the weekend killed eight persons, including two Irish Republican Army (IRA) militants and three British soldiers.

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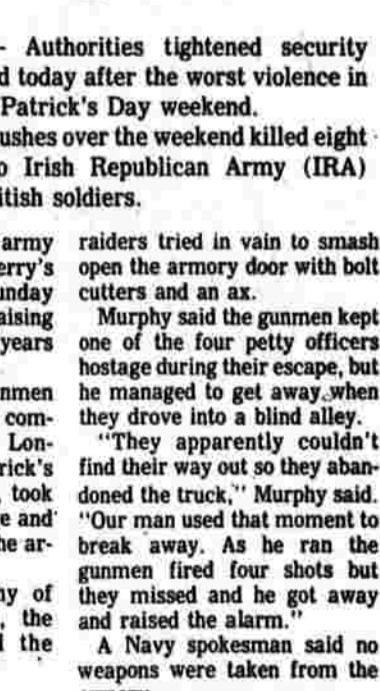

Maine Newsmen Defends Comet's Influence

JIM MCGREGOR
WHITEFIELD, Maine (UPI) — Joseph Goodavage, a former newspaperman who calls this tiny Maine hamlet home, says the world may be premature in labeling the comet Kohoutek a dud.

Goodavage, who used to be a science writer for the New York Daily News and has authored seven books, believes recent political kidnappings and other acts of violence might be effects of the comet.

"Just because the comet flizzed as it passed earth does not necessarily mean that we aren't feeling its effects," he said. "There has always been an increase in violence, extremely radical revolutionary movements and natural disasters."

Goodavage has written a book, "The Comet Kohoutek," which deals not only with Kohoutek, but traces the history of the world's other great comets and offers interesting theories about what effect they had on mankind.

"There appears to be a correlation and it affects different people differently," he said. "There are influences from the sun that haven't been discovered yet but they will eventually have to be accepted. With the passing of every large comet, something has happened to the minds of men. All the great minds in the past have said it."

Goodavage may not have been a comet at all, but an asteroid about 250 miles in diameter. However, he said that would not dispell his belief that it could have side effects on the world. "For an asteroid to come in and orbit is a very unusual thing," he said. "It might have an even more profound effect."

Goodavage, a native of Philadelphia, lives with his wife and two children, in a large

New England farm house. He thinks mankind has a lot to learn about cosmic forces.

However, he approaches astrology with caution. "It is about 65 per cent superstition and fortune telling and five per cent scientific fact that cannot be disproved," he said.



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He Learned to Follow Advice He Gave Others

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "Before I was blind," Dr. Dale C. Recker said, "I used to tell people 'you have to make the best of life with whatever you have.'"

"After giving this advice to other people for years," he added, "it seemed natural that when I became blind, I had to learn to take it myself."

He has, and now as the head of Blind Work for the American Bible Society, Recker is stamping the country telling people being blind is not an overwhelming handicap. He's also telling them the ABS has Bibles — in Braille, on phonograph records and even on cassette tapes for the sightless.

Recker, 66, was serving as pastor of the First English Lutheran Church in Cleveland Heights, Ohio, when he went blind some 25 years ago. "Made it easier."

"My adjustment was not quite as severe as it might have been for others," he said. "The whole congregation seemed to feel that this was their problem as well as mine and that made it a lot easier."

Recker stayed on at First English for 15 years after becoming blind and he estimates that in that time some 200 different men in the congregation drove him around on his pastoral calls and more than 30 women read him material he needed "to see" in his work.

He was reserved on giving an outright recommendation that "blind people still should consider the ministry," he said, adding that was important to pastoral counseling.

But he said he left the congregation not because of the difficulties, but because "I wanted to serve blind people in some special way."

He estimated there were about 500,000 blind people in the United States. "We serve directly about 20,000," he said.

"A lot of blind people don't know they are blind," he said "because they can still see some."

His chief emphasis is that we have Bibles for the blind — and would like to get rid of them. No one has to be deprived of the Bible because he can't see," Recker added.

Speaking of his own blindness, Recker said it was take for granted that were the "little things" other people hardest to deal with.

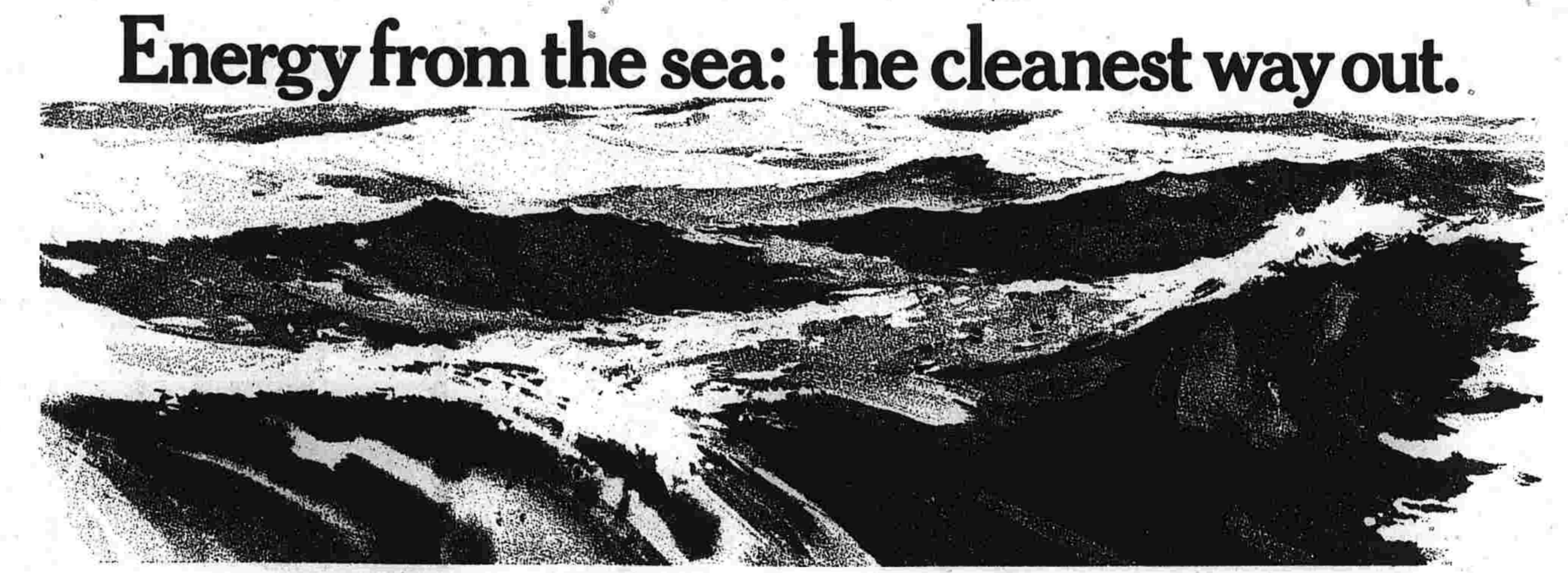

Legislators To Press For More Gas

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — State Sen. Joseph T. Gormley, R-Fairfield, says he has organized a New England delegation of 10 legislators to get a more equitable share of gasoline for the region.

Speaking on New Haven radio station WNBC Sunday, Gormley, who is co-chairman of the Connecticut Legislature's Committee on Banking and Regulated Activities, said the high cost of fuel is the result of poor handling of the 1973 Emergency Petroleum Allocation Act.

"Half the legislators from the entire New England area are acting in a concerted effort to get some relief from the federal government so we in turn can give relief to the people in Connecticut," he said.

The WNBC forum was organized in response to the controversy of the "fuel adjustment clause," which allows utilities in Connecticut to automatically pass along increased fuel costs to the consumer without a public hearing.

Public Utilities Commission Chairman Howard Hausman said public hearings are not necessary for each individual fuel cost adjustment.

He also said he has never been connected with utility companies and owns no stock in any of them.

Angus Gordon, president of United Illumination Co., said his company has especially high fuel adjustment charges because its reliance on nuclear energy is comparatively low with the state's other utility companies.

He said nuclear power is the promising route for a long term solution to the high fuel prices.

Scientists Cite Need for Cancer Research Workers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — When the nation's leading cancer scientists get together, what is the No. 1 problem they see confronting cancer research today?

The training of scientists and other cancer workers. They fear that not enough federal money will be available for training researchers; that too many strings attached to what training funds do exist will stifle creativity and that the national cancer plan will falter for lack of adequate manpower.

The cancer plan, released publicly last August by President Nixon, provides guidelines for harnessing scientific and economic resources to mount an accelerated attack on the nation's second leading killer.

"Most aspects of the plan cannot be delegated to management personnel without scientific competence," said Dr. James F. Holland of the Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York.

"We urge expansion of its personnel commitment to manage the plan, to preclude the plan's becoming under-managed or ineffectively managed. This could only delay the eventual success in the control of cancer," Holland said at a meeting of some 100 scientists who were drafting a revision of

Fighting Continues In Golan Heights

For the seventh straight day today, fighting erupted on the front between Israel and Syria.

At the same time, Israeli newspapers reported that the United States and Israel are in disagreement about the amount of captured Syrian territory Israel should retain in the Golan Heights, where the fighting is taking place.

The United States is trying to arrange a disengagement of forces there similar to that between Israeli and Egyptian forces along the Suez canal.

A Syrian military spokesman said that Syrian artillery opened fire on Israeli forces "trying to strengthen their front positions" in the central and northern sectors of the Golan Heights today.

The Syrian communique, issued at 2:15 p.m. (8:15 a.m. EDT), said fighting had begun at 11:10 a.m. (5:10 a.m. EDT) and was continuing.

Israel insists on retaining all of the territory captured in the 1967 Six Day War, and the United States opposes this, the newspaper Ma'ariv said. It appeared this would be among the topics discussed Tuesday in Washington by Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger.

Despite the current U.S.-Israeli differences, and the slowness in getting Israeli-Syrian talks started, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat said in interviews with the news magazines Time and Newsweek that he believes peace is near in the Middle East.

"Peace is now on the way, a peace based on justice under which all states in the area can thrive and prosper," Sadat said in Newsweek. He said a permanent settlement still depended on Israeli withdrawal from all territory captured in 1967 and a solution of the problem of the Palestinian refugees.

The newspaper Ha'aretz said Prime Minister Golda Meir and her cabinet colleagues are unanimously opposed to any withdrawal in an initial stage troop disengagement from the "purple line," Israel's ceasefire frontier with Syria until last October's fighting.

Ma'ariv said "the principle that Kissinger is aware of — but does not agree with — is that Israel is unwilling to go back behind the purple line. That, in effect, is the point on which Jerusalem and Washington do not see eye to eye."

Government sources said the scope of Israeli disengagement proposals will be on the agenda in Washington talks between Defense Minister Moshe Dayan and Kissinger, to be set following the secretary's meeting Tuesday with Foreign Minister Abba Eban.

UCLA-NC State Dream Semifinal Game Set

Wolfpack's Thompson Will Play Saturday

NEW YORK (UPI) - North Carolina State star David Thompson will return and so will UCLA for another "Dream Game" between the top-ranked Wolfpack and the Bruins--this time in the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship semifinals March 23.

Three All-Americans - Thompson and UCLA's Bill Walton and Keith Wilkes--will battle for the right to move into the finals at Greensboro, N.C. March 25 against the winner of the Marquette-Kansas game, which follows the Bruin-Wolfpack tilt.

Walton, a 6-foot 10 sophomore, moved into the finals at Greensboro, N.C. where they will take on Midwest Regional Champion Kansas, which upset Oral Roberts, 93-90, in overtime.

UCLA has an easy time beating San Francisco, 83-60, in the West Regional championship behind Wilkes' 27 points. Bill Walton, three-time college Player-of-the-Year, added 17 points, 12 in the second half, and played with 12 points.

Stormy NFL Talks Yield No Results

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Pro Football Players Association and NFL owners opened their new contract negotiations with the owners implying the players were acting like children and the players accusing the owners of bad faith.

Their attitudes, aired here Saturday, pointed toward stormy talks and even the possibility of a strike that would disrupt the 1974 season.

The two sides meet again March 28, only five days before a threatened cutoff in player insurance premiums now paid by the league.

The Association, representing some 1,200 pro players, has a long series of demands, many of them aimed at curbing the power of NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle. One would eliminate Rozelle's authority to decide what compensation a club must pay to acquire a player who has played out his option.

The players want to abolish the waiver rule to permit a player released by an NFL club to negotiate with any other team he desires and to let veterans, mainly trades. They also want to strip Rozelle of authority to arbitrate player-owner grievances, particularly involving injuries.

The Stars also hold the rights to Joe Namath, who has indicated he may play out his option next season.

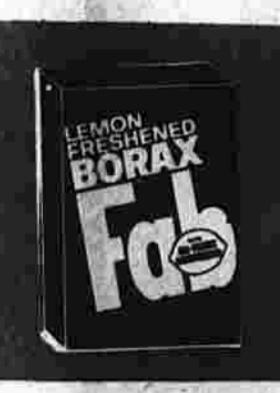

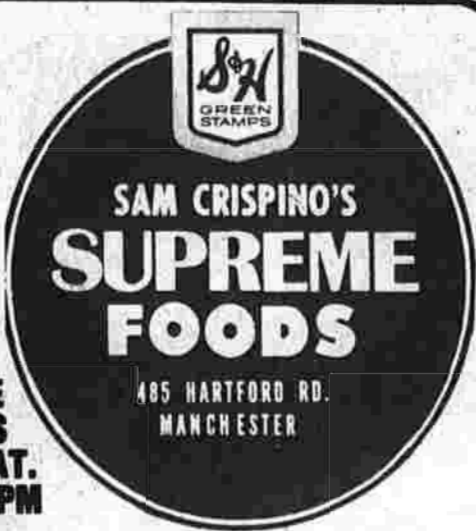

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Early Retirement For Women Being Challenged

HARTFORD (UPI) — Two Connecticut organizations are challenging a 1959 state law which permits women to retire from state jobs at age 50, five years before men are allowed to retire. Four state employees and two retired employees, all men, today will ask the U.S. District Court to stop the state of Connecticut from administering the statute. They are being assisted by the Connecticut State Employees Association and the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union.

Paul W. Orth, a CCLU lawyer, charges in a brief filed with the court, that the statute violates the Equal Protection clause of the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. Orth also charges the statute violates the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as amended in 1972.

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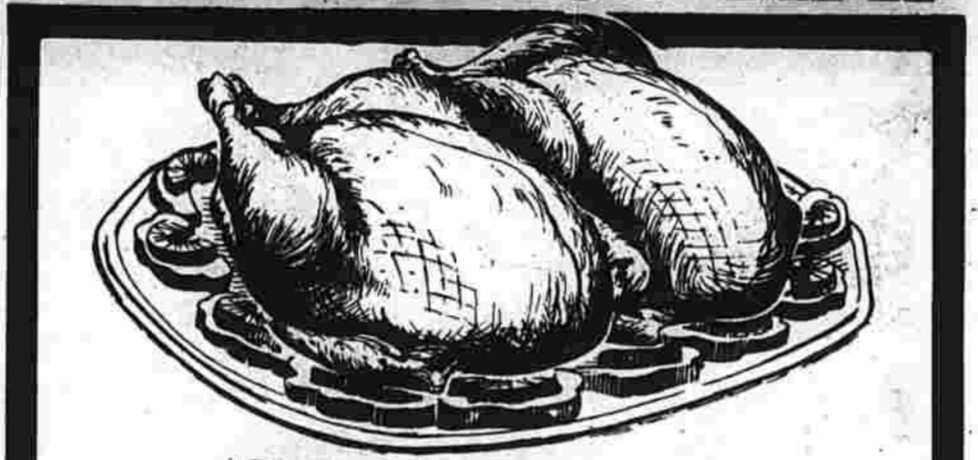
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Frank Pandolfi, 'Mr. Opera,' To Retire

Record Crop Forecast Repeated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Department officials repeated forecasts for record grain harvests this year and said they stand by earlier predictions that prices will rise less in 1974 than they did last year.
Don Paarlberg, the Agriculture Department's chief economist, reaffirmed earlier forecasts that retail food prices for all of 1974 will probably average 12 per cent above 1973 prices.
But, he said if farm production falls substantially below currently predicted levels, the increases in retail food prices could equal last year's 16 per cent jump.
Paarlberg discounted fears that the United States might run short of wheat this spring and said there would be no shortage of fertilizer to keep production down this year. He said government experts feel growers will harvest a record 2.1 billion bushel wheat crop this summer compared with 1.7 billion bushels last year. The wheat projection was unchanged from a preliminary forecast issued in January.
The new projection for corn — the key raw material for producing meat, milk and poultry — was also unchanged from January.
Paarlberg cancelled the new estimates show livestock feed supplies for the rest of the 1973-74 year ending this fall about 75 million bushels smaller than previously forecast because of increased exports. That meant the price of corn for feeding beef cattle will remain "strong," Paarlberg said.
Cattlemen have complained of losses of \$100 a head or more because live cattle prices have sagged in the face of high feed costs, and have warned this could slow beef production for the fall.

Wildcatter Favors Gas Rationing

OLNEY, Ill. (UPI) — Illinois' "Wildcatter of the Year" brought in his first 800-barrel oil well "before I was of age."
Perry Falk, now 58, has drilled risky wildcat wells — those planted in areas not known to contain oil — all the way to Australia since then. His view of the oil shortage: —It's real.
—The country needs gasoline rationing now.
—"We can solve this thing in about a year," if the government doesn't roll back prices on crude oil.
The Falk Oil Co., based in Olney, has only three full-time employees. Falk is one of them. He contracts for his drilling crews and isn't ashamed to admit he deals in the black market for equipment.
"Independents find 75 per cent of the oil, and they aren't going to be able to find investors and pay the black market prices for equipment if there is a rollback in prices," Falk said.
The current crude oil price is \$10 a barrel and Falk said he "couldn't kick at \$8 oil." But if the government rolls back prices, Falk feels many independents will go out of business.
"It isn't worth the risk to trade dollars," he said.
Falk said when he was in Florida on business last week he saw lines of cars from one to two miles long at some filling stations — drivers "waiting by \$3 worth of gasoline."
"I think it would be a good thing to have gasoline rationing now. It would end some of this panic buying. The same thing happened with beefsteak," he said.
A Falk wildcat well west of Nashville, Ill., last year that penetrated to the Silurian reef touched off a wave of Silurian tests in the Illinois basin and brought him to the attention of the first Nashville discovery well cost him \$50,000 to drill. Falk said 30 years ago the same well would have cost him \$20,000 to \$22,000.
From Coals To Oil
"Today, you have to pay from \$1 to \$1.50 a foot on the black market for tubing that you should be paying only 60 cents for. And used casing is going for \$5 to \$5.50 a foot when it should be \$2.50 a foot now," Falk said.
Falk has drilled wells in Illinois, Michigan, Kentucky, Tennessee and Oklahoma. Twelve years ago he found gas in three wells in the Northwest Territory of Australia.
Falk got into the oil business while buying cattle. "I got to know the farmers in Richland County, and when the Pure Oil Co. came in in the 1930s and started leasing, the farmers would lease to me before they would lease to the big company," he said.

Transit Notes

Gallagher, Zinsser Attend Highway Meeting

Two Republican members of the Manchester Board of Directors who boycotted a board executive session last Thursday were the only two elected officials at a Friday night meeting about state transportation department plans for Interstate 291.

The directors, Carl Zinsser and Hillery Gallagher, refused to attend last Thursday's closed board session — in which directors reviewed performance of the town manager — because of a board decision to close the meeting to the public and the press.

"We're making up for Thursday night," Gallagher quipped at the Friday highway meeting.

The Friday night highway meeting was set up by the Manchester Conservation Commission and was moderated by commission member Dr.

Frederick Spaulding, who opposes further highway construction.

Spaulding and Stanley Ostrinsky, a representative of the Manchester Property Owners Association, asked town civic organizations to send members to the meeting, but only a handful of people (about half a dozen) attended.

Ostrinsky criticized the absence of most town officials, but he admitted that the meeting was called on short notice (four days warning).

William Lazarek of the state transportation department was the featured guest at the Friday night informational session. The main topic of discussion was the proposed I-291 link from Windsor to Manchester, but he touched on several other transportation ideas, including:

- The transportation department is planning to eliminate turning ramps on the Founders

Bridge which now allow motorists bound for I-91 to avoid tolls on the Charter Oak Bridge.

When the "mixmaster" highway interchange at East Hartford opened several years ago, it allowed motorists to avoid the Charter Oak Bridge toll and thus created congestion on other highways.

Elimination of the Founders Bridge ramps will force traffic back over the Charter Oak Bridge. And to avoid opposition to that plan, the transportation department is also recommending elimination of tolls on that bridge.

- Most plans for Interstate highways are based on projections by the transportation department on the expected traffic volume in 1990.

Plans for I-291, Lazarek said, were based not only on expected increases in vehicular traffic but also in development of the Buckland area of

Manchester and South Windsor.

However, the projections were based on development of the Buckland tobacco land under Rural Residence zoning which existed until earlier this month, when the Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission granted zone changes to allow a massive, mixed-use development in the area.

- Highway planners are giving more consideration to environmental concerns, Lazarek said, in mentioning federal air quality standards for the Hartford area.

The Environmental Protection Agency puts a ceiling of 0.08 parts-per-million on oxidants, which are the hydrocarbons and nitrous oxides in the air commonly called smog.

But the existing situation in the Hartford area is 0.22 parts-per-million of the offending stuff, and the state has until

mid-1975 to conform to the federal standard.

"That comment drew reaction from Dr. Spaulding, who asked Lazarek why the transportation department is still building highways instead of mass transit facilities.

"I think you're going to see transit out here (in Manchester) before you see I-291," Lazarek replied, emphasizing, though, that mass transit doesn't develop overnight.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Pentagon considers it uneconomical to continue Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) courses at schools where low enrollments jack costs up as high as \$22,000 a student.

But an official has acknowledged that it costs three times as much for each cadet trained at the military academies.

Richard Rose, deputy assistant defense secretary for education, said at a news con-

ference that the services are concerned by the large number of colleges where the ROTC course enrolled fewer than 15 seniors.

Cost per student ranges from \$16,000 to \$22,000, compared to \$8,000 student in schools with more than 50 ROTC cadets, he said.

If the cadet corps is not brought up within a few years at those schools, he said, then the courses may be dropped.

Brig. Gen. Dean Tice said the

Army considered the small ROTC courses "uneconomical," but at another point in the news conference, Rose pointed out, with no complaint, that it costs an average of \$69,000 for each service academy cadet.
