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Victorious Lebanese leftists launch new attacks in Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Victorious left-wingers stormed past the blackened ruins of the conquered Hilton Hotel today, launching new attacks against Christian right-wingers in the heart of Beirut.

The embattled hotel, the Christian Phalangist party's last major stronghold in uptown Beirut, fell to a force of several hundred left-wingers Sunday night after a floor-by-floor battle.

Attacking from two sides with support from rebel tanks and artillery, the left-wingers first assaulted the hotel basement, then fought hand-to-hand battles with defenders making a last stand on the upper floors. A Phalangist spokesman confirmed the fall.

The assault propelled the left-wing offensive into Beirut's main downtown squares where Christians battled to blunt an eastward drive toward the Phalangist party headquarters in the Saifa district.

The left-wingers also pressed attacks on Christian positions in the strategic Metan region of Mt.

Lebanon east of the capital. Left-wingers in Ras Beirut pounded the downtown area with mortars and rockets.

Outside the capital, fighting broke out between leftists from Tripoli and right-wing forces from neighboring Zgorta, right-wing stronghold of President Suleiman Franjeh.

In the east, leftists from Aley, the stronghold of Socialist leader Kamal

Jumblatt, clashed with rightists around the Christian town of Kahalah.

In 48 hours of fighting, at least 100 persons died and 210 were wounded, raising the toll for Lebanon's 11-month civil war to nearly 15,200 dead and 32,300 injured.

Newspapers estimated some 200 corpses, some of them days old, lay scattered in Beirut's downtown streets with no one able to retrieve them.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat called Sunday for urgent intervention by "symbolic" forces from Arab countries to end the "shameful and bloody struggle" in Lebanon.

But most political observers here did not take the proposal seriously. Egypt is openly wary of Syria's attempts to mediate the Lebanese crisis while Iraq actively opposes them and Libya is financing a number of left-wing groups.

"Iraq and Libya would hardly agree to participate with the Syrians in a joint solution and it would take far more than 'symbolic' forces to

restore order where some 12,000 Syrian-backed Palestine Liberation Army and Saika troops have failed," one observer said.

Left-wing leader Kamal Jumblatt dealt a heavy blow to the Syrian peace initiative when he walked out of negotiations with Syrian President Hafez Assad and returned to his mountain stronghold of Aley Saturday.

But political sources said Syria was maintaining contact with Jumblatt through Palestinian guerrilla leader Yasser Arafat, who met the left-wing leader at Aley Sunday then traveled to Damascus for talks with Assad.

Teamsters reject offer

New England Teamsters, representing about 16,000 truckers, have followed the national union membership in rejecting the latest trucking industry contract proposal and okaying a strike if no agreement is reached by Wednesday.

Labor Secretary William Usery was expected to meet today in a Chicago suburb with negotiators who remain about 10 per cent apart on wages — the union demanding a 30 per cent hike in a 36-month contract.

In Boston, Local 25 which represents 13,000 members in Massachusetts voted 1060-162 to give their national leaders authority to call a strike at midnight Wednesday when the current contract expires.

Connecticut's truckers rejected the offer and gave the go ahead for a strike, but union officials declined further comment.



Work resumes on firehouse

Manchester officials have been asked to reconsider a proposal which would allow dumping of Bolton's refuse in the Manchester sanitary landfill area. Town Manager Robert Weiss said today.

Weiss said he has received a letter from Bolton First Selectman David Dreselly, which asks Manchester to make its landfill area available for Bolton refuse.

Details haven't been discussed. Weiss said, and the proposal will go to the Manchester Board of Directors April 6. If directors favor the proposal, Weiss will study possible costs and other matters, he said.

Weiss said he has no recommendation on the request but he will have one in time for the April 6 meeting. He said there may be some advantages for Manchester if Bolton's request is approved. He didn't elaborate.

The letter from Dreselly is the second request for Bolton use of the Manchester landfill.

Last June, Weiss told directors that Bolton had asked for help in its refuse disposal program. He said a study indicated that the volume of Bolton refuse wouldn't be significant and would have little effect on the Manchester landfill.

However, Weiss said there might be a substantial increase in landfill-bound traffic because Bolton didn't have curbside refuse pickup.

Directors agreed last June that they might be willing to help Bolton if not for the unreasonable traffic increase, estimated at up to 400 vehicles per week.

Bolton's long-term agreement for

use of the Town of Andover landfill expires June 30, and Andover townspeople have refused to continue sharing their facility with Bolton.

Bolton officials have been investigating various alternatives for refuse disposal, which include curbside refuse pickup for transfer to an out-of-town landfill site, Dreselly said.

Alternatives for the Bolton refuse program will be aired at a public hearing tonight at 8 at the Bolton Community Hall. Selectmen are suggesting two options — each involving a local transfer station — with one calling for full curbside pickup and the other without pickup. Costs to Bolton are estimated at \$74,500 and \$41,640, respectively.

Police report no new leads in Dawn Peterson murder

WINDHAM (UPI) — State police today continued examine clues in their search for the killer of 13-year-old Dawn M. Peterson.

Windham County Medical Examiner Dr. Edwin Basden said it appeared the murder weapon was a large blood-covered stone found at the scene.

"It was a frightful wound. I'd say it was a brutal slaying," Basden said, adding, "Early tests indicate the victim was not sexually assaulted."

Lieutenant James Rice, commander of the state police Colechester barracks, said residents have given the police what he termed an incredible number of descriptions of persons seen in the neighborhood around the time of the murder.

Rice said Sunday the police do not have a definite suspect, but he said he is confident the case will be solved.

A police officer described the rural road near the concrete foundation of an old house where the girl's body was found. "This place looks like a real isolated and abandoned area, but we're finding there were lots of people walking around here Friday afternoon — of course, it was real nice weather."

Music teacher Robert Brouillard who taught Miss Peterson, an eighth grader at Kramer Middle School, said she was "the nicest, a quiet girl who always had a smile."

He said, "In my class she was a student guitar instructor for less advanced students. She didn't hang around with those kids — you know teenagers — who get a little wild. But she was friendly with everybody."

When Miss Peterson did not return home as expected at 4:30 p.m. Friday, and did not call, her parents called the police at 8 p.m.

Volunteer searchers found her body at 11 p.m. in a wooded area about 100 yards from the intersection of Spencer Lane and an abandoned section of road, formerly Route 6, near the Natchaug River.

Dawn's father, Clarence Peterson,

an assembler at Pratt and Whitney, said he warned his three daughters to stay away from the area.

"Ever since they closed the road it has been an ideal spot for these things to happen. I don't like it, but sometimes she used to take walks down there. Her mother thought I was jumping to conclusions," said Peterson.

Mrs. Clara Peterson was treated at Windham Community Hospital for emotional trauma and released.

Miss Peterson's funeral will be Tuesday at the North Windham Congregational Church, two buildings from her family's home on Station Road. Burial will be in the churchyard.

A group of North Windham residents have set up a fund in memory of Miss Peterson, a better than average student who was interested in art and had considered making art a career.

WATERBURY — The jury in the Murray R. Gold double-murder case resumed deliberations today after being given Sunday off by Superior Court Judge Robert A. Wall. Gold is accused of killing his former in-laws, Mrs. and Mrs. Irving Pasternak in 1974.

NEW HAVEN — New York Mayor Abraham Beame said Sunday in an address before the Yale Political Union that population shifts to the suburbs cannot solve the nation's urban crisis, and might create new cities with the same old problems.

HARTFORD — A \$40,000 grant has been made by the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving to provide most of the local financing for a federal study of the region's public transportation needs. The study is required by federal authorities before they will consider applications for mass transit grants and other transportation projects. The study will cost about \$300,000 and take 18 months.

BOSTON — Attorney F. Lee Bailey's past successes and failures indicate the guilty verdict in Patricia Heart's first courtroom battle will not damage his reputation, according to his Boston colleagues.

Of all petroleum imports, 25 per cent came from Arab sources last year compared with 16 per cent in 1973.

NEW YORK — A transit workers' strike may force New Yorkers, who take some six million bus and subway rides each weekday, to drive, hike, compete for the city's 12,000 licensed cabs or hoof it starting Thursday. Some 5,000 members of the Transport Workers Union Sunday shouted unanimous approval to strike if a new contract agreement is not reached by midnight Wednesday.

Street sweeping plans announced

Street-sweeping operations this week in Manchester were announced today by George Ringstone, acting superintendent of highways.

They will be in the area bounded by Main St. on the west, Oak Grove St. on the east, E. Center St. on the north and Charter Oak St. on the south; plus the area bounded by Broad St. on the west, Main St. on the east, Center St. on the south and Woodland St. on the north.

Ringstone is advising property owners (just prior to sweeping operations on their street) to sweep dirt from their sidewalks into the street. Many times in the past, he said, the streets were swept and then dirt from sidewalks was swept into them.

The proposed commission regulations would eliminate the ban on impersonators, but would leave intact a rule barring live entertainment without prior commission approval.

The regulations would also continue to ban persons performing at liquor establishments while unclothed, bottomless, or in attire that displays breasts.

The legislative Judiciary Committee will hold hearings on marijuana measures Tuesday.

Marijuana laws were thrust to the attention of the legislature by a Superior Court judge's decision that penalties for possession of marijuana with intent to sell had to be distinguished from penalties involving more dangerous drugs.

The legislative Finance Committee will hold hearings Tuesday night on measures intended to close tax loopholes. One measure would apply the 7 per cent state sales tax to the trade-in allowance on new car purchases.

Also proposed are an expansion of the inheritance tax to include life insurance proceeds, an increase in liquor taxes and removal of the sales tax exemption for meals which cost less than \$1.

The measures were expected to raise small amounts of revenue to help balance the state budget.

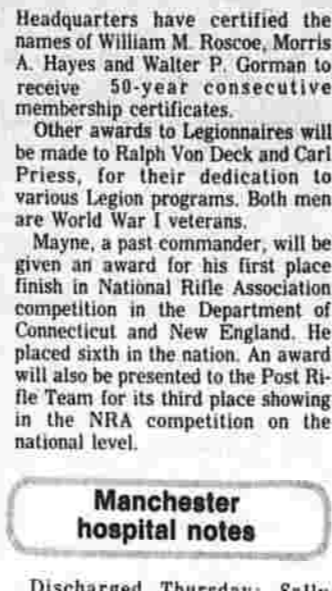

SUBJECT: Tentative Budget and Budget Increase
Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 1978

The General Fund Budget submitted to you reflects an overall expenditure increase of 8.2% above the current year's level of expenditure. While this appears to be a relatively modest increase in view of the cumulative impact of inflation in recent years, the impact on the tax rate is considerable requiring an increase of 5.38 mills to \$6.63.

Unfortunately, revenue from sources other than property taxes appears substantially lower than in the current year. In recent years a major reliance has been placed upon Federal Revenue Sharing for operating costs. At this time the status of Revenue Sharing is uncertain beyond the first three quarters of the new fiscal year.

It should be understood that in developing budget recommendations for next year, with the exception of some modest increases in police services, this is at best a "hold the line" budget. Any budget can be cut and the Board may want to seriously consider reductions in services. A great deal of "risk taking" would be involved in this process but the following areas are suggested for your consideration:

DEFER PENSION CONTRIBUTIONS \$400,000
This action would merely postpone the inevitable cost for pension benefits but is an option open to the Board at this time.

NO SALARY INCREASES \$200,000
In view of the Compulsory Binding Arbitration Law it is unlikely that an arbitrator would deny increases. However, the effect of any increases could possibly be delayed to a future fiscal year by the Town due to delays intrinsic in the Compulsory Binding Arbitration Law procedures.

FREEZE ALL VACANCIES \$100,000
This would seriously impair our ability to maintain service levels expected by the public we serve based upon our current year's experience.

NO IMPROVEMENT IN POLICE SERVICES \$52,000
With the present crime patterns in Manchester, this could be a self-defeating move.

PROVIDE FOR ONCE PER WEEK RUBBISH COLLECTION \$35,000
Based on last year's reaction, strong negative public response could be anticipated.

GENERAL FUND table with columns: Categories, 1976-75, 1976-77, \$ Increase, % of Total Increase. Rows include Board of Education, Fixed Costs (misc.), town - employee fringes, debt - other.

In addition, the Fire Department Special Fund will require a tax rate of 6.65 or an increase of .45 mills. As a result of increased costs, the water rates should be increased by 30% - the first increase since 1970. This compares with a quarterly cost of \$15 for the typical Metropolitan District residential customer and \$19 for the Hazardville Water Company. Projected increases for these companies are \$6 and \$13 annually, respectively. This will mean a quarterly increase of \$3.35 for the typical residential customer. The rate for the Special Sewer cost will increase \$4.02 for the typical residential customer for each quarter. The rate for the Special Taxing District will remain at the present 12 mills.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS - CURRENT
The following capital improvements are recommended to be funded from Revenue Sharing funds. Separate capital improvement budget contains further detailed information.

- 1. Manchester Recreation Center \$14,000
2. Highway Equipment \$20,000
3. Town Hall Heating System Improvement \$12,000
4. Sidewalk Construction \$75,000
5. Sidewalk Repairs \$25,000
6. Convert Library Basement to Hearing Room \$25,000
7. Center Springs Park Pond Dredging \$15,000
8. Public Works Radio System Improvement \$5,000

If Revenue Sharing funds available exceed the above amount, it is recommended that the resurfacing of playground and parking areas at Bowers, Nathan Hale and Waddell be added to the program as recommended by the Board of Education at a cost of \$45,000.

ELIMINATE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ANTICIPATE THAT FEDERAL REVENUE SHARING WILL CONTINUE AT THE PRESENT LEVEL. This would be very speculative as to funds and would seriously affect several areas of proven need.

If you decided to choose all of these options, the amount of taxes to be raised would be reduced by \$1,009,500 or approximately 3.3 mills.

REVENUE ANALYSIS
The Grand List showed a healthy increase of \$11,064,837. At the current tax rate this would produce some \$560,000 in extra revenue. However, this is partially offset, as mentioned above, by the revocation of Public Law 74-34 under which certain personal property had been exempted and for which we received \$189,000 in the current year in lieu of taxes from the State.

Property tax collections for the current year will probably reach 98 1/2% of estimates compared with an original projection of 99%. A major reason for this shortfall is the elderly tax freeze and circuit breaker tax relief bill - the impact of which had not been fully considered in last year's projections. The deficit total amounts to \$129,000 which fortunately will be made up this year in other revenues. For next year's tax projection, we anticipate a collection rate of 98 1/2% which takes the above into consideration.

Estimates from Federal Revenue Sharing are somewhat speculative at this time. We are certain of three Revenue Sharing payments in the new fiscal year but do not know what the actual payment will be due to annual formula adjustments which will be known late in April. For budget purposes we have anticipated the continuation of the present rate of quarterly payments - which you will recall are less than for the previous year. The fourth quarterly payment is set up for Capital Improvements. Also \$7,600 of Revenue Sharing Funds are allotted in this budget to the Fire District which is the estimated portion of Revenue Sharing receipts attributable to the District activities under the Revenue Sharing formula. In summary, Revenue Sharing in the General Fund shows a decrease of \$200,000.

Carter support swells

Top Manchester Democrats have announced their support for former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter, a leading candidate for the Democratic nomination for president.

Announcing in a group today were State Rep. Ted Cummings, who is also Democratic town chairman; Mayor Matt Moriarty Jr.; Judge of Probate William Fitzgerald; Town Director Robert Price; Democratic Registrar Herbert Stevenson; Paul Phillips, deputy registrar and town committee treasurer; Mary LeDuc, town committee secretary and state central committeewoman; Anthony Pietrantonio, former town director; and Richard LaPointe, town committee member.

Carter supporters who announced several weeks ago are Town Treasurer Roger Negro; Deputy Mayor John Thompson; Carolyn Becker, school board member; and Joel Janenda, town committee member.

Cummings, speaking for the group of nine who announced today, said, "Of all the active Democratic candidates for the nomination, no one but Jimmy Carter seems to us to show the best skills to keep the Democratic Party together and, if he's nominated and elected with the best chance to keep the nation together and to move it ahead."

Thompson, Manchester coordinator for Carter's campaign, has named Negro fund-raiser for the Manchester area. Negro has announced a major fund-raising event for late in April at Manchester High School. He said he'll announce the details later.

Former Rhode Island Gov. Frank Licht will be in Connecticut Friday, Saturday and Sunday on behalf of the Carter candidacy. On Saturday he will meet at the Marlborough Tavern with top Carter backers from statewide towns and cities.

Barry to vote for 'bottle bill'

State Sen. David M. Barry, D-Manchester, said today he will vote in favor of the so-called "Bottle Bill" when it comes before the Senate, probably tomorrow.

The proposal would prohibit the use of flip-top cans as containers for beer and soft beverages and would require deposits on glass bottles.

Barry said that he has considered all of the arguments for and against the bill and feels that, on balance, the evidence favors the measure.

"The time has come to preserve our natural resources and to do what we can to end the economy of waste that has become a way of life in this country," he said. "I am sympathetic to grocery and package store owners who will have a handling problem and I am not convinced that the law will do all that its sponsors hope it will. But, I believe in the purposes of the bill and I believe that most people do."

Barry said that almost 80 per cent of those people who have responded so far to a poll he is conducting in the Fourth Senatorial District have indicated their support of the "Bottle Bill." Barry gives the bill about a 50-50 chance of passage in the Senate. If passed by the Senate, the bill will be returned to the House committee on environment, where its fate is uncertain.

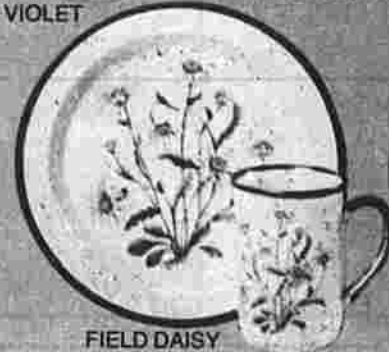

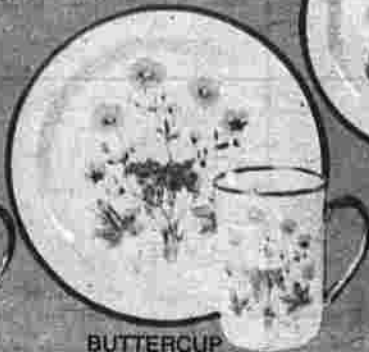
