A U.S. Embassy spokesman said three men had been killed but gave no further details.

# Independent party nominates Maddox

governors running for President. Lester Maddox, who gained fame a decade ago chasing blacks from his Atlanta restaurant with pick handles, was nominated in Chicago Friday night as the presidential candidate of the conservative American Independent party.

Maddox actually has been on and off the campaign trail for months, claiming his successor as governor, Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter, is dishonest.

A recent addition to the menu at Maddox' Atlanta eatery was a "Jimmy Carter sandwich" - two pieces of bread, a dab of peanut butter, and a lot of baloney.

On the Republican side, President Ford disagreed with those who claim his GOP running mate, Sen. Robert

The first benefit would have come next year when up to \$100 could have college tuition, increasing \$50 per year until the full \$250 credit was realized

In the first revision of the capital gains tax in more than 30 years, the committee agreed to increase from six months to a year the time that an asset must be held to receive the more favorable capital gains tax treatment.

In addition, the present \$1,000 limit on the amount of ordinary income that may be offset by capital losses would be increased to \$3,000. This is the first such increase since 1942. The net result of increasing the time limit for claiming capital gains

tax treatment will be an increase in taxes on investors, especially speculators in the stock market or in real estate - an estimated \$11 million in 1977, \$56 million in 1978, and up to \$134 million a year by 1981. Capital gains are taxed at half the

rate of ordinary income such as wages and salaries. Capital gain or losses are realized from the sale of an asset such as stocks or property.

Both provisions would be put into effect over a two-year period, with the holding period first going to nine months in 1977 and the \$1,000 limit going to \$2,000 in 1977. One exception was made to the

longer holding period. Gains on agriculture commodity futures contracts, which almost always are realized within less than a year, will remain under the six-month rule.





# Token collectors known as vecturists

What's a vecturist, Pop?"

"Umm...ah...Did you pick up your room?"

A vecturist is somebody who collects things like that at the right. It is a transportation token. ("Vecture" is an old-time name for a carriage.

Stamps and coins

The token shown here reads (Queensboro Bridge Railway Co. Inc." on one side and "Good For One Fare" on the other. The railway, under this name was in existence from 1939 to 1957 and was the last surviving trolly system in greater New York City. The length of the line was about one and a half miles. The cars were made to hold 44 passengers, but an ox-motorman is quoted as saying: "You could make it a hundred if you wanted to push 'em in.'

The tokens are almost as large as a quarter, and show a double-truck trolly car on both sides. They were composed of various and sundry metals over the years. The half-moon cut-outs made them harder

The background of geometric engineturned designs is a familiar sight of vecturists. To see a reallife example just check your miscellany box for one of the little three-holed tokens formerly used by the Connecticut Co. You might need a magnifying glass, but the geometry is there on the circular flat areas, front and back.

Vecturists have a spot within the TAMS organization (Token and Medal Society): this in turn is sponsored by the American Numismatic Association, which this very day is winding up its 85th annual convention in NYC. Coin World came out with an edition of 175 pages to beat the drum for that event.

# FCC jumps on radio 'bandwagon'

The biggest CB news is being transmitted out of Washington, D.C. from the granite headquarters of the Federal Communications Commission

As a result of many complaints about channel congestion and interference, the FCC had to do something.

Their answer was primarily increasing the number of channels for Citizens Radio

Service from 23 to 40. All of them in the AM band. They did some other

The FCC decided that equipment authorization would be required of the manufacturers prior to marketing the unit. Type acceptance of the transmitter must be obtained from the FCC. This is a change. Also, certification for the receiver

The type acceptance and certification for transceiver and other equipment, having both transmit and receive capabili-

ty, is quite a departure from the way it has been handled in the past. As a result of these new rules, manufacturers won't be able to play games with pricing as it relates to quality and type of equipment being sold.

Obviously, not all manufacturers were guilty of this sort of thing. But, a lot of inand-outer assemblers did it and the result

Now, transmitters must comply with FCC specifications or they will not be accepted and certified. This will eliminate, or at least greatly reduce, spurious emission and comply with harmonic suppression limitations. Net result: Less interference and a reduction in the complaints of many of your neighbors and the commercial broadcasters in our area

All this goes into effect on all sets marketed after Jan. 1, 1977. One other thing the FCC did might aid in the efforts to resist thievery: All new equipment must have a unique identifier, both type or model number, according to the rules governing type acceptance and certificatitn

Out of this welter of rules there is this sort of thinking in Washington: First it is felt that manufacturers will offer a rebuilt program which will utilize your unit and add the additional present channels for a modest amount. Thus, you will have the benefit of 40 channels for only a little more than your original investment

It will ultimately cut down on the congestion so you can reach your good buddy without so much trouble. So, that's a second good point.

Third, assuming you don't get your set modified, you'll not have as many people on the original 23 channels as you have now. That will make it a little easier.

One thing to keep in mind, though, is the Date when all this goes into effect: Jan. 1. 1977. If you are buying or planning to buy a unit now, don't let a hard-selling salesman unload 23 channels on you without clarifying the program he has for handling the changeover to 40 channels.

He may be caught with a big inventory in 23-channel units right now and, to move them out, he'll make rash promises. Get the modification plan in writing.

All this is necessary because adapters which might connect your existing 23channel radio with another unit containing 17-channels is illegal according to the new
