## News summary

### State

**STORRS** — University of Connecticut President Glenn W. Ferguson says he will not ask for another tuition increase this year, but warned one might be necessary in the future. Last year tuition was raised for students in all sections of the state's higher education system. UConn resident student tuition is currently \$540 per semester and students also pay a \$400 annual fee.

**STRATFORD** — Democratic vice presidential candidate Walter Mondale helped Gloria Schaffer raise about \$30,000 for her bid to unseat Republican Sen. Lowell Weicker in the U. S. Senate in two fundraisers in the state's affluent suburbs Saturday night.

**HARTFORD** — A report prepared for Gov. Ella T. Grasso says enrollment at Connecticut's four state colleges reached an all-time high last year with 34,226 students, a two per cent increase over the previous year. The colleges are Eastern in Willimantic, Western in Danbury, Southern in New Haven and Central in New Britain.

### Regional

**MANCHESTER, N. H.** — Teachers have voted to remain on strike in Manchester, New Hampshire's largest city, defying an order from the state Public Employees Labor Relations Board. Only 34 of the 950 members voting Sunday night favored ending the walkout which began last week in the city's 30 schools and affecting 18,000 students.

**BOSTON** — A female student has survived a five-story plunge from a dormitory window at Graham Junior College. Denise Bernardao, 19, of Livingston, N.J., landed on the roof of an adjacent building where she was found by a policeman Saturday morning. She was taken to Beth Israel Hospital with an injured right arm and leg and numerous internal injuries. She was in stable condition today.

### National

**WASHINGTON** — Secretary of State Henry Kissinger began today his long-shot personal diplomacy mission to prevent open racial warfare over minority rule in South Africa.

**WASHINGTON** — Citizen ownership of handguns for self-protection does not significantly deter crime and may increase the possibility of violence, according to the U. S. Conference of Mayors in a weekend report. Executive Director John Gunther said, "The myth that handgun provide self-protection is being foisted on the American public by gun manufacturers and the National Rifle Association. This is a cruel hoax and the data in this study prove it."

**ATLANTA** — World health officials say smallpox, a disease that has plagued the human race for centuries, will be wiped out soon.

**STATELINE, Nev.** — Frank Sinatra has banned representatives of the Reno Evening Gazette and Nevada State Journal from attending his performances at Harrah's casino next to Lake Tahoe because Sinatra resents what he considers "a continual review of age-old stories about him and his battles with Nevada gaming authorities in the 1960s."

### International

**UDINE, Italy** — Officials said Sunday that the two strong earthquakes that shook northeastern Italy Saturday seriously hindered four months of recovery efforts from the May 6 tremors that killed nearly 1,000 persons. The jolts were the heaviest recorded since the spring earthquake which left 72,712 persons homeless in 50s towns near the Austrian and Yugoslav borders.

## 'Saucepan' hijackers arrested

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — The 85 passengers filed past the X-ray and metal-detecting machines and boarded TWA's Flight 355 to Chicago. No one paid much attention to the four men and a woman carrying a collection of saucepans and what looked like gifts.

Within an hour or so, the five used the contents of their saucepans and gifts to launch one of history's most bizarre publicity stunts — a 44-hour odyssey that included a transatlantic hijacking, the blackmailing of four major U.S. newspapers and the death of a policeman.

For good measure, they dropped propaganda leaflets over London and Paris, forced authorities to make similar drops over New York, Chicago and Montreal, and asked to speak by phone to President Ford or Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

They did it all, they said, to bargain for publicity for an obscure separatist struggle in Yugoslavia.

For their success, the five self-styled "Fighters for Free Croatia"

may pay dearly — perhaps with their lives.

They surrendered Sunday in Paris and were flown back to New York to face charges of air piracy and perhaps murder — the former for America's first hijacking in nearly four years, the latter for the death of New York police officer Brian Murray, 26, killed trying to disarm a bomb they left behind.

Murder of a police officer in New York is punishable by death in the electric chair.

The hijacked flight took them to Montreal, Newfoundland, Iceland and Paris and, when they surrendered Sunday, back to New York where they started — this time in handcuffs.

The New York-to-Chicago flight was near Buffalo, N.Y., when the hijackers forced it to turn north, toward Montreal.

In a locker in New York's Grand Central Station, they said, authorities would find a 2,400-word manifesto of the "Free Croatia"

movement with a demand it be published in its entirety in the New York Times, the Chicago Tribune, the Washington Post and the Los Angeles Times.

With the manifesto police found a bomb — the one that exploded and killed Murray. Unless their demands were published, the terrorists said, a second bomb would be detonated in a "busy location."

Behind, their propaganda leaflets were fluttering down over New York, Chicago and Montreal. From Iceland the hijacked plane swung over London and circled to land in Paris. They dropped still more leaflets over those two capitals.

The plane touched down at Charles de Gaulle Airport.

French police shot out the plane's

tires to keep it from taking off, bathed the jet in the glare of three searchlights and gave the terrorists two choices — surrender to either U.S. or Yugoslav authorities, or die.

The terrorists, too, acted. They demanded to talk to either Ford or Kissinger, but settled for a discussion with U.S. Ambassador to France Kenneth Rush. They demanded proof their manifesto had been published in the U.S. newspapers.

Then, the terrorists surrendered. They pulled apart their "bombs," including some attached like a bulky necklace around the neck of one, and distributed chunks to the passengers as souvenirs.

The "bombs" were harmless putty.

The five, who face 20 years to life if

convicted on federal air piracy charges, were identified as:

— Zvonko Basic, 30, a native of Croatia and leader of the group. His last known address was New York City.

— Julienne Eden Basic, 28, his wife, born in Eugene, Ore. She reportedly was arrested in Yugoslavia for distributing leaflets.

— Mark Vlasic, 29, a naturalized U.S. citizen and resident of Stamford, Conn.

— Frane Pesut, 25, a Croatian reportedly residing in Fairview, N.J.

— Peter Matavick, 31, of Manhattan, a naturalized citizen.

Basic had a last warning:

## Three accused in plot to kill Sen. Kennedy

**SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (UPI)** — Three persons arrested in connection with an alleged plot to assassinate Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., pleaded innocent today during arraignment in Springfield District Court.

The innocent pleas were entered by the court on behalf of Robert Earl White, 42, and David J. King, 31, both of Springfield, and Mrs. Sandra Rondeau 34, of Westfield.

Judge George Brigantes ordered White and King to meet with a court appointed psychiatrist Tuesday. King and Mrs. Rondeau said that since they were unemployed they could not afford an attorney. The judge appointed a public defender and continued the cases until Sept. 20.

Bail on White, which had been set at \$50,000 following the arrests Saturday, was reduced to \$25,000 by the judge. King and Rondeau were continued free on their own recognizance.

White, who revealed during arraignment today that he has an alias of Nick Santorini, was questioned last year by the Secret Service in Milwaukee as a possible threat to President Ford and other political figures.

Kennedy himself appeared untroubled by the report he was slated for the same fate as two of his brothers, President John Kennedy and U.S. Sen. Robert Kennedy, both slain by assassins' bullets.

## Strike against Ford now a possibility

**DETROIT (UPI)** — The strike that seemed so unlikely when auto industry contract talks began in mid-July now is a strong possibility at the Ford Motor Co. in less than two days.

Woodcock emerged from an intensive two days of bargaining at the No. 2 auto company late Sunday afternoon and told a cheering union group a strike by Ford's 170,000 workers is almost certain at 11:59 p.m. Tuesday.

"I must say, in all frankness, that we are a long, long way apart and it does not look good," a somber UAW President Leonard Woodcock said Sunday. "A lot of things can happen before midnight Tuesday night, but I'd be kidding you if I didn't admit that I'm personally very pessimistic."

That is when the three year contract expires and Woodcock said Ford has not budged on any key issues, particularly the one to shorten time on the job. He warned that the auto firm may be trying to challenge the union.

## Bulldozer act show-stopper at band shell program

Hundreds of Manchester residents sat on a sunny lawn at Manchester Community College campus Sunday to enjoy a variety of dance and music. But the big act was a short drama starring a bulldozer and its operator, Orville Cleveland.

The supporting cast included Nate Agostinelli, Fran Mahoney and Ralph Maccaroni.

They broke ground, in grand way, for the Bicentennial Band Shell, to be built with publicly donated funds.

Agostinelli and Mahoney are co-chairmen of the Bicentennial Committee. Maccaroni handled

arrangements for the Sunday show. They rode the dozer for the first pass across the band shell site.

Just before the ceremony, Mahoney said the use of the bulldozer instead of the traditional shovel "shows that we really mean business."

The entire performance, which included dance, choral singing, martial music, pipers, and a jazz concert, among other things — was designed to focus attention on the band shell plans and the need for funds to build it.

Master of Ceremonies Ronald Mocado introduced the entertainers and did not overlook any opportunity

to plug the band shell fund drive, calling attention to the fact contributions were being accepted, raffle tickets were on sale, and that the whole performance would sound better if it emanated from a shell.

The performers used a makeshift stage at the bottom of a natural amphitheater just north of Wetherell St. on the college campus.

Just beside the stage was an area about 68 feet wide and 30 feet deep, marked off by a line of banners. It was within the confines marked by these banners that the bulldozer cut one swath then another and another, leaving the depression where the band shell foundation will be built.

The events got under way at 2 p.m. with the Sphinx Temple Highlanders Pipe Band and ended at darkness with State Bicentennial Balloon aloft. The balloon arrived late and its place in the schedule was shifted to the last event.

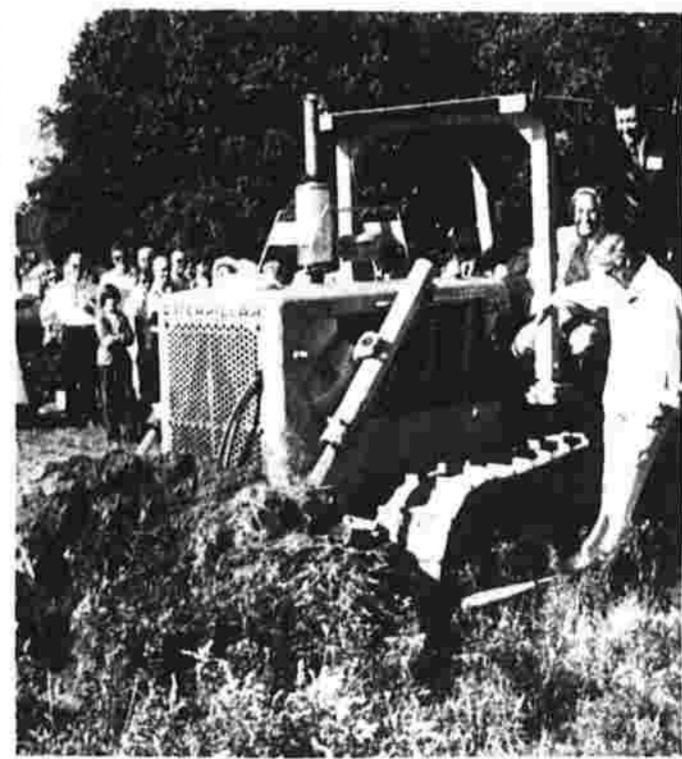
Spectators came and went during the five-hour span with the big grass

area crowded at some times and more sparsely filled at others.

Promoters of the band shell said they were happy with the results and felt the "Afternoon of Entertainment" would make the shell seem like a more concrete project to Manchester residents who are being asked to contribute money toward it.

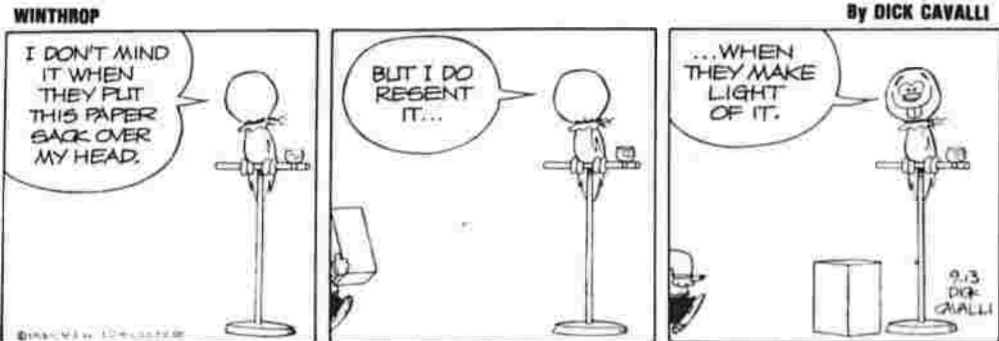
