Thursday PUCA said it would not approve any part of the agreement until after a hearing at which it can examine the proposal. The agreement is subject to the pproval of a number of groups, including the PUCA. Under the proposed settlement, Northeast would re fund more than \$5 million to consumers in checks of \$4.26 each and reduce its rates by \$21.6 million effective May 1 The PUCA says it has no say on the refunds, but mus approve the May I date because it had ordered the firm last year to roll back rates in December.

Northeast's appeal of that ruling is one of the legal cases the firm has agreed to drop in the settlement. Some consumer groups have hailed the agreement as a step forward in the consumer's battle against utility prices. But others have been less enthusiastic, noting ortheast stands to lose much less from the agreemthan if it lost its court appeals.

The PUCA, in a letter to Northeast attorney Michael Halloran, said, "PUCA will not enter into any stipulation with the parties at this time without having firs examined in-depth the terms of the propose

If you and your finance are planning a honeymoon abroad, you will need to do some extra planning and pre-nuptial appointment-making to e sure that you don't spend your first hours of bliss trapped in a customs office for insufficient documentation!

You should apply for your passports at least two months before your departure, in order to allow extra time for processing.

Because the bride is not legally a "Mrs." until the wedding, you will more than likely be traveling with separate passports, hers under her maiden name, and you will need to carry with you your certified marriage license.

When you return from your trip your passports may be revised to show your marital status.

To apply for a passport, you need either a birth certificate, naturalization certificate, or a former passport. You will also need another proof of identification carrying your photograph or description and signature (a driver's license, for

The passport office requires two additional photos of you taken within the last 6 months, 2" by 3", on a plain light background (snapshots or photos taken in coin-operated photo





Bermuda's Caves; a tourist attraction

were possible to somehow turn Bermuda inside out, whoever did it would find that what is on the inside is every bit as exciting and attractive as what is on the outside

But a visitor doesn't have to turn Bermuda inside out just to get a peek at its subterranean world. What lies beneath all the palm trees, pink sands and constantly green grass is easily accessible - at least some of it is. All a visitor has to do is go to the eastern end of Bermuda where a narrow isthmus of ancient limestone rises above the sea forming a natural barrier that keeps Harrington Sound from spilling into Castle Harbour and vice versa. Here is where Bermuda's exposed rock is the oldest and where there is a proliferation of caves.

Of the four caves open to the public today, perhaps the most novel is Prospero's Ceve ad Discotheque which is owned and operated by Grotto Bay Beach and Tennis Club, one of Bermuda's small luxury hotels. As a discotheque and underground cocktail lounge, the cave is only two years old, but as a known natural masterpiece it is believed to be more than 365 years old. Its true age lies somewhere on the distant side of 100,000 years.


Known through the years by more than one name, the cave sits 50-feet below the surface and may have been discovered as early as 1609 shortly after the vessel "Sea Venture" carrying a party of settlers from England to Virginia was wrecked on a coral shoal off Bermuda's eastern

One of the crew members later wrote an account of the adventure which is commonly thought to have been used by William Shakespeare in 1611 as one of his sources for "The Tempest." A present-day legend says that the Grotto Bay Cave, originally called Island Cave, was the one Shakespeare mentioned in the play, hence the current name Prospero's

The main feature of the cave is an underground lake - 25 feet deep in some places - with a large stalagmite island rising from the crystal-clear water. The roof is an array of multi-sized stalactites, and with the use of indirect lighting, shadows in red, orange, blue and green cling to the walls, ceiling and lake surface leaving visitors with the feeling they are the central characters in a Jules Verne adven-

With seating for 80 patrons, the sub-surface discotheque has a dance floor that overlooks the lake and a sign at the bar advises every visitor that "Swimming is absolutely forbidden." Attached to a low lakeside limestone wall is a life ring, just in case some adventurous soul fails to heed the sign's message.

Less than 50 yards from the entrance of Prospero's Cave is another opening leading also into a subterranean world of stalactites and
