President to stress China ties

PLAINS, Ga. (UPI) - President Carter is expected to stress the growing economic and political ties between the United States and China when he meets with Premier Hua Guofeng for the first time in Tokyo

this week. Both leaders will be in Japan Wednesday to attend the memorial services for Prime Minister Masavoshi Ohira. The Carter-Hua hour-long meeting

will take place Thursday morning (Tokyo time) just before Carter flies back to Georgia for a vacation on Sapelo Island. Enroute, he will have an overnight stop in Anchorage, Alaska, and a brief fishing jaunt with Republican Gov. Jay Hammond. The huddle with Hua takes on added meaning in view of Republican Ronald Reagan's hint he may re-establish diplomatic relations with Taiwan if he is elected president.

The vague Reagan statement several weeks ago upset Peking. Carter announced what he has since described as a highly sensitive and controversial decision to formally recognize China in December 1978. He told a fund-raising gathering in California last week that trade with both China and Taiwan has increased dramatically since recognition of the





ELECTRICAL SAFETY: WHAT YOU DON'T KNOW MAY SHOCK YOU.



Electricity is one of the safest and most useful forms of energy we have. But people sometimes forget that when some simple rules of safety are ignored, electricity can become dangerous. Here are a few basic safety rules that may make the difference between a great day outdoors and the shock of

1. Don't be misled by birds sitting on electrical lines. The covering which you may see on the lines is not insulation, and it will not protect you from a shock. 2. Metal ladders near electrical lines can

be very dangerous. When using ladders around the house or on the job, be sure to move them cautiously, always watching for power lines above. 3. Be careful with roof antennas. They should

never be near electrical wires. Check the area thoroughly for wires before you begin to install, repair or remove a roof antenna. 4. Teach your children the hazards of climbing

utility poles and towers or playing around any electrical facility. They may not be aware of just how dangerous electricity can be.

5. Trimming or climbing trees? Watch out for electrical wires! Wires may have become concealed in the branches, so inspect the tree carefully before you begin work.

Use outdoor electrical equipment properly. Never use it in the rain, and use electric power mowers or clippers only on dry grass or dry shrubs. 7. Go fly a kite—far away from electrical wires. If your kite string should get snagged on or near a power line, do not try to remove it yourself. Call







Barracato, 47, spent 10 years as a New York City fire marshal and was the co-author with Peter Michelmore of a book detailing cases he investigated. He now specializes in arson control and investigation for Aetna Life & Casualty Co., and has written a manual outlining various tricks of the arson trade.

The manual is a primer for law enforcement personnel and claims agents for the Hartford-based company. If the arsonminded know there's a good chance of being caught. Barracato says they'll think twice about setting fires.
