Jessica, who weighed 20 pounds before the ordeal began, was rushed to a waiting ambulance for a one-mile drive to Midland Memorial Hospital.

Dr. Carolyn Rhode said Jessica had no broken bones, but was dehydrated and might suffer circulation problems in her right leg and foot, which had been immobilized in the narrow crevice.



OLD BRIDGE TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) - A 78-year-old man who felt senior citizens center wanted companionship so badly he turned to teen-agers who assaulted him and stole his meager savings, police said Friday.

Three teen-agers and a 21-yearold woman have been arrested for assaulting and robbing John Stief and for burglarizing the modest bungalow where he lived, said **Detective Thomas Piscitelli**

After Stief's wife died nine year ago, loneliness overcame him, the detective said, and "he thought it was quite innocent to invite local

teen-agers in." "From what we understand, for about a year, several kids were using his house as a party place," Piscitelli said. "They were taking advantage of the man - taking his

The teen-agers that Stief turned

to for companionship, however, were runaways - youths in trouble so frequently that some of their parents refused to help them after heir arrests, Piscitelli said. The first two girls never left his

(Stief's) house," he said. "They were constantly robbing him of his money, literally going right through his pants. The situation grew more and more out of control. Stier appar-

A short while later a parademic was lowered into a parallel shaft that rescue workers had dug two days before. Later still, a tube of lubricating jelly apparently to help make Jessica slippery enough to squeeze out of her jam was sent down, as well as the backboard.

Jessica had been wedged in a narrow crevice 22 feer below ground. Rescue workers had to first dig a parallel shaft about five feet away, then create a 20-inch diameter tunnel across to the well through rock so hard it dulled diamond-tipped drills.

Just after noon, workers bored a hole into the well shaft that was large enough for a paramedic to reach in and check her condition, Midland Police Chief Richard Czech said. She appeared fine, but her right leg was somehow stuck. "He was able to talk to the little girl.

She was able to respond to commands, lift her foot up, do a few little things. She's helpful," said Czech. "We still don't have enough room to get her out." High-pressure water drill equipment

had to be flown in from Houston to widen the rescue tunnel, forcing yet another delay in a process that workers had first predicted would end early Thursday During the life-saving efforts, the

Butterfield says change to out-of-town firm made for 'no reason'

The former medical director of the Meadows Convalescent Center has criticized the center administrator's decision to switch its ambulance service

to an out-of-town firm.

Dr. Robert K. Butterfield, who was Meadows' medical director from the early 1970s until Aug. 8, said that Meadows' new administrator, Martin Meighan, changed the ambulance company serving the center for apparently no reason and without consulting the medical staff.

Since the 518-bed center opened in the 1960s, Meadows has used Manchester Ambulance Service, but Meighan, who came to Meadows last spring, switched to Professional Ambulance Service of East Hartford.

"There is no medical reason I know of

why they switched." Butterfield said. He said that when the decision to switch was made, he argued with Meighan that Manchester Ambulance

should be retained. "Manchester Ambulance has always been a part of Manchester's emergency system. With another company coming from out of town, they sometimes don know our system and could get lost,

Butterfield said. Meadows, the state's largest convalescent center, was sold last October by Geri Care Inc. to the HealthCare Corp. of America. Soon after, Meighan became its administrator.

Meighan said he made the change in offered by Meadows."

Meighan said that the East Hartford ambulance company offered educa-tional programs for Meadows employees, such as CPR classes, that made the change worthwhile. He said that the Meadows nursing staff is now completely licensed in CPR.

Butterfield is critical of the service

In another incident, on Aug. 28, there was confusion over whether Manchester Ambulance or the East Hartford company should handle a call. The incident happened when a patient at Meadows was having difficulty breathing and a staff member called Professional.

The Professional dispatcher judged the situation to be an emergency and called Manchester Ambulance, because he thought Manchester Ambulance could get there sooner. Both ambulances arrived at ispute occurred over which ambulance should transport the patient.

to repair the Hop River bridge. The bridge was cited by the state Department of Transportation during a routine inspection last May. The bridge was closed on May 28 by he town under orders from the

Half of the bridge is in Coventry. the other half is in Columbia. The ridge allows residents access to the paved section of Hop River Road, which leads to Route 6. After the bridge was closed, residents were forced to use a single-lane, firt portion of the

"It's a cowpath," Johnson said. Residents said that Town Manager Harold B. Hodge Jr. promised them that the bridge would be reopened this summer. When that did not happen, they feared condi-tions would become dangerous

when winter arrived. Residents feared emergency vehicles and school buses would not be

able to use the narrow, rocky road in bad weather. School vans are now being used instead of buses, but the bus company serving the town said vans would no longer drive the

road after Oct. 23. But things are looking up.

In early September, residents brought the matter to the Town Council and the attention of Town Engineer Domenico M. Bammarito, as well as State Rep. Edith Prague, D-Columbia. The DOT agreed the bridge could be reopened if temporary repairs met with its approval.

Water companies sale ends four-year wait of residents

Tuesday's decision by the De-partment of Public Utility Control to approve the sale of L&M Water Co., which serves Manchester's Redwood Farms subdivision, and the Elm Water Co., which serves Coventry's Pilgrim Hills and Coventry Hills sections, ends more than four years of waiting.

'We're very happy that this has finally been concluded." said James Vance, chairman of the water committee of the Coventry Hills Homeowners Association

"I'm extremely pleased it's finally been approved." added Coventry Town Council Chairwoman Joan Lewis. "It is something we've

been working on for several years. Since 1983, when Stafford resident John Wittenzellner took over the companies as receiver, customers have looked forward to the time when the companies could be brought to an acceptable level of

Wittenzellner has greatly improved the two systems since they were left in a state of disrepair by former owner George Kopelman. Kopelman abandoned the financially ailing companies early in

Wittenzellner proposed to buy the two companies soon after becoming receiver, but a settlement with the pelman estate had to be worked out before the sale could be approved in West Hartford Probate

That approval came in February. and allowed the sale to go before the DPUC for final approval. The DPUC hearing began in Manches ter on July 3, and did not end until Sept. 9 in Coventry

Throughout the hearing, most esidents who testified said they favored selling the water companies to Wittenzellner. They said that he has done an excellent job in restoring the water systems and making necessary repairs.

Cancer survivors have kids safely

BOSTON (AP) — Most survivors of childhood cancer can safely have children without fear of passing the disease to the next generation, a study

The research, conducted by the National Cancer Institute, is the biggest survey ever conducted on the offspring of men and women who were treated for cancer during childhood and

Except in a few limited types of cancer, there was no evidence that the youngsters inherited cancer from their parents.

"I think it's a good news article for cancer survivors. There are more and more of them," said Dr. John J. Mulvihill, who reported the findings in the Oct. 10 issue of the British journal

The American Cancer Society estimates that 6,600 cases of childhood cancer will be diagnosed this year, and 2,200 children will die of the disease.

A lingering concern has been whether survivors are likely to afflict their own sons and daughters with the disease, either because they pass on the same genetic defect that caused their cancer or because their reproductive organs were damaged by their treatm

Dr. Frederick P. Li of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston said the latest findings are important because they rule out any large increase in the risk of cancer in the next

"If a man or woman who's had cancer wants to have children, they can probably proceed with a reasonable level of confidence that they are not going to produce a child with cancer except in certain circumstances that can be recognized beforehand," Li said. "You can sort out those at high risk from those who are not."

After receiving complaints from consumers and Jewish newspapers, the company changed the design to eliminate the medallion on future boxes of County Chocula and also edited television commercials, which had not yet been broadcast, to remove the

General Mills decided, however,

Experience, Dedication, Concern - VOTE Pull Lever 2B on Nov. 3 Paid for by the Committee to Elect John Garside, Jr., L. Benjamin, Tressurer. against recalling the boxes on the shelves because there were not a health bazard.

SNET wants to set limits on free information calls

NEW HAVEN - Southern New England Telecommunications Corp. said Friday it wants to end unlimited free directory assistance calls for most customers who seek operator help in finding telephone numbers. In a proposal filed with the state Depart-ment of Public Utility Control, the telephone

company said it would allow most customers. both business and residential, five free directory assistance calls a month before charging 25 cents for each call over that

SNET would exempt from the plan disabled people who cannot use telephone books for looking up numbers. The company also would not charge for directory assistance calls made

More than 70 percent of SNET's 1.5 million Connecticut customers make five or fewer directory assistance calls a month now, said William Werwaiss, SNET division manager of

regulatory matters. If the proposal is approved. SNET would realize an extra \$15 million in revenue and savings, company spokesman William Seekamp said. The telephone company would apply \$9.7 million of that to reducing ong-distance in-state toll charges, while \$5.3 million would be applied to recovering

The DPUC recently prohibited SNET from proposing price changes that would result in increased revenues to the company for 18

mpany depreciation costs.

Seekamp said the recovering of more depreciation expense would mean that customers would pay less for telephone service in the future.

The company has projected that the directory assistance call, while some allow no proposal would be "revenue n airal" for

SNET through at least Jan. 1, 1989, Seekamp

"Calls to directory assistance have been growing by several million annually and over the next several years more operators and millions of dollars in new equipment would have to be added to keep pace," said Werwaiss. "By reducing calling volumes, the new charge would avoid this additional

SNET handles about 500,000 directory assistance calls on an average business day. the company said.

Charges for in-state directory assistance calls are made now in 48 states. SNET said. Only Connecticut, with the exception of Greenwich, and Tennessee have unlimited free directory assistance calling, the com-

pany said. Residents of Greenwich who are served by New York Telephone are charged 25 cents a call for each directory assistance call after a five-call limit. Greenwich businesses pay for

all such calls. State Consumer Counsel James Meehan. who represents consumers' interest in DPUC matters, said he has not formed an opinio

Meehan said he wants to find out who are the heavy users of directory assistance. He also said he would analyze SNET's proposal to apply the \$9.7 million to reduction of long-distance rates only.

He suggested that if the proposal was implemented, the reductions could come in other places, such as basic service or special rates for the elderly and people who have low

Other state telephone companies charge from between 10 cents and 25 cents per free calls and others allow five. Seekamp said.

Teams go into field to teach about AIDS

NEW HAVEN (AP) - Teams of state and city workers will soon be on the streets trying to curb the spread of AIDS by educating drug abusers and others at high risk of catching the deadly disease. The city of New Haven on

Thursday announced the creation a city-financed, three-memb AIDS team, which officials said was the first of its kind to be financed by a municipality.

Mayor Biagio DiLieto said the team, part of the city's Health Department, will be supported by \$110,000 in city funds. The outreach workers, trained in finding and educating at-risk groups, will be joined by a health education supervisor not yet hired.

The announcement in New Haven came two days after the Connecticut Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission aiotted eight part-time positions to create AIDS outreach eams in Hartford, Willimantic and Middletown. It is the first statewide effort to counter the spread of acquired immune deficiency

The state health department will help coordinate the commission's program. But the commission will finance its program with \$102,400 in grants from the federal Centers for

The commission program will be handled by three agencies: The Hartford Dispensary, a non-profit methadone clinic; Perception House, a residential and outpatient drug agency in Willimantic; Mid-dlesex Memorial Hospital, at an

outpatient clinic

coordinate New Haven's program. according to Robert B. Savage. assistant to the commission's exec-

The city program, which officials hope to expand with state funds. will seek to "motivate a behavior change among individuals who are at high risk of contracting and ransmitting the AIDS virus due to their drug use and or sexual city Health Director Edward DeLouise said.

DiLieto said the program is unique to Connecticut in that New Haven will have a unit "built into clusively with AIDS" prevention

In New Haven, health officials say AIDS has caused 74 deaths. A total of 114 residents have been

About 68 percent of New Haven's AIDS cases are attributable to the practice among drug users of ording to the state health

"There's a lot of misinformation on the streets, a lot of ignorance and fear," said Elaine O'Keefe, education director for the New Haven



Witnesses said residents pushed and shoved to get a glimpse of the names of the dead written on scraps of paper that served as makeshift gravestones

WASHINGTON - Pilots of the jetliner that crashed 'Aug. 16 near Detroit, killing 156 people, were sidetracked from completing critical preflight procedures amid confusion over a runway and a mix-up over

radio frequencies, documents indicated Friday.

The documents reiterated that the Northwest Airlines plane's flaps had not been set properly for takeoff from Detroit Metropolitan Airport, and revealed that an alarm, designed to warn pilots of a false flap setting, did not sound because the alarm was

not getting electrical power. Setting flaps is the first item on Northwest's preflight checklist, according to aviation sources who declined to be identified by name and is essential to give a plane the lift it needs to take off.

The crash was the second worst in U.S. aviation

Troops surround Tamii stronghold

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka - Indian soldiers ringing Jaffna town in northern Sri Lanka killed at least 120 Tamil separatists who tried to break out of the last

rebel stronghold, officials reported Friday.

Leaders of the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam, the main rebel militia, requested a cease-fire to end the week-long offensive in which more than 500 Tamils have been reported killed. India said its soldiers would not let up until the rebels surrendered all their

Violence continued in eastern Sri Lanka, where reports said Tamil militants shot and killed 11 members of the island's Sinhalese majority on a bus in Pulmaddai, 28 miles north of Trincomalee port.

WASHINGTON - President Reagan's 3-month-old AIDS commission, navigating crisply under a new chairman, held what amounted to an organizing session Friday in its first public meeting since its top

At the conclusion, another member, who had been thinking about quitting, pronounced himself optimistic with the course set by the new chairman, retired Navy Adm. James D. Watkins, and said he would stay on the

"I sincerely believe that if anybody in the United States can make a go of this panel, you can," Cardinal John J. O'Connor of New York City told Watkins. "If you had asked me, I would have said you would be crazy to take this job.

Shultz begins talks in Israel

JERUSLAEM — Secretary of State George P. Shultz opened talks with Israeli officials Friday by focusing on their campaign for massive increases in Jewish immigration from the Soviet Union.

Both Prime Miniser Yitzhak Shamir and Foreign Minister Shimon Peres urged Shultz, who will be in Moscow next week, to relay to Soviet authorities to insistence that Jews with exit permits be flown directly to Israel.

About 5,430 Soviet Jews have been granted exit visas to Israel so far this year, compared with 51,320 in the

peak emigration year of 1979.

Israeli leaders told Shultz it was important to establish direct flights from Moscow to Israel for Soviet Jews because only about one-third of emigrants with Israeli visas were coming to Israel. The rest settled in Europe or the United States.

First lady faces breast surgery

WASHINGTON (AP) - First lady Nancy Reagan will undergo a biopsy Saturday and have her left breast removed if "a suspicious lesion" turns out to be cancerous.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said the lesion, which 'might represent an early stage of malignancy," showed up in a routine mammography that Mrs. Reagan underwent on Oct. 5.

The first lady took the news stoically, the spokesman said. Referring to her husband's bouts with colon and skin cancer, she commented "I guess it's my turn," he said. Mrs. Reagan, 66, had skin cancer removed from her upper lip

The Reagans arrived at Bethesda Naval Hospital by helicopter at 7:04

Reagan and Richard Davis, Mrs. Reagan's step-brother, planned to spend some time with the first lady at the hospital Friday evening, then return to the White House.

Elaine Crispen, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, said Reagan would "tuck her in and make her comfortable" at the hospital Fri-

worried and anxious, and wants to have it all behind him." Mrs. Crispen said of Reagan. She said that Mrs. Reagan "is not so much worried, but is looking forward to when it's over.'

If Mrs. Reagan needs the operation, she would be the second wife of a president to undergo a mastectomy in recent years. First lady

Betty Ford, wife of Gerald R. Ford, had a breast removed in 1974. Rosalynn Carter had a noncancerous lump removed in 1977.

'There is the hope, of course, that it would be benign, and that the surgery would not be necessary," Fitzwater said.

U.S. condemns tanker attack in Persian Gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) - With the White House accusing Iran of an "outrageous act of aggression. President Reagan met with advisers Friday and declined to say how the United States might respond to the missile attack on a U.S.-flagged tanker in the

The White House and the Defense Department both said they believed the empty tanker, the Sea Isle City. was hit by a Silkworm missile as it approached a refueling pier near Kuwait's Al-Ahmadi oil terminal.

Iran is known to have Chinese-made Silkworm missiles in its arsenal.

The Pentagon said 16 men were injured in the attack. although the Kuwaiti health ministry said there were 18, including two who were treated on board.

"Ten are in the hospital, including the American master, the Italian captain, a United Kingdom chief officer, one Pakistani crewman and six Filipino crewmen." a Pentagon statement said. It said none was in critical condition.

Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told reporters. "Iran has committed an outrageous act of agression against a non-belligerent country. Kuwait. and a U.S. flag vessel operating commercially and

The president, questioned by reporters after a meeting with Soviet students, said, "I cannot and will not discuss what our future action might be. We are in discussion with the government of Kuwait." Fitzwater said Reagan met with his national security

assistant, Frank C. Carlucci, and other advisers and received "a full update on the attack." but no decisions "As in all such cases, we are examining the full range

of diplomatic and other options available to us." he "The United States is consulting with its partners in the United Nations and with Kuwait concerning this

ncident," Fitzwater added. "In addition, the Congress will receive its normal full briefing on the attack." "We have not discussed specific diplomatic or military options at this time," the spokesman said.

We will continue to analyze the situation. At the Pentagon, officials who asked not to be identified said the debate about a military response to the attack had been clouded by Kuwaiti expressions of

"They don't seem to want to tie themselves any closer to us: to appear that they're pulling completely inside our military umbrella," said one official "They've got cold feet, even though these missiles are hitting ships inside their territorial waters."

The Pentagon sources also said Kuwaiti military forces detected the Iranian missile in flight and tried unsuccessfully to shoot it down with a small missile of their own from the island of Faylaka.

Officials also said the Reagan administration has rejected appeals from American shipping firms that their U.S.-owned, foreign-flagged tankers receive military protection in the Persian Gulf.

The companies had petitioned Pentagon and White House officials for Navy protection, arguing their ships - unlike the reflagged Kuwaiti tankers - were ferrying oil to U.S. shores.

At the State Department, spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said Iran had been made "aware fully of our position concerning attacks on U.S. flag vessels, specifically, and other hostile actions against U.S. argets generally.

She said messages were sent to the Iranians through Swiss diplomats in Tehran, although she was not aware of any specific messages sent after the latest attack. The missile strike was the second on an Americanowned or American-flagged vessel in Kuwaiti waters

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said, "Iran should be on notice that if they use these missiles on American sh they are going to be exposing themselves to possible

and evan probable retaliation. Nunn and Sen. John Warner of Virginia, the senior Republican on the armed services panel, were briefed by Cartucci. The meeting had been set up earlier to discuss Secretary of State George P. Shultz's current visit to the Middle East and the Soviet Union.

Docs give newborn new heart

LOMA LINDA, Calif. (AP) - A boy born with a fatal heart malformation underwent heart transplant surgery Friday just hours after his birth, an unprecedented operation.

The 6-pound, 634-ounce redhaired boy was delivered by Caesarean section at 10:54 a.m., and the transplant operation was under way by 1:30 p.m., said Dick Schaefer, chief spokesman for Loma Linda University Medical

'It's the first time it's been done, and it's fair to say there was some electricity in the air," said Dr. Elmar Sakala, who performed the Caesarean on 35-year-old Alice Hole of Vancouver, British

The transplant was expected to take four or five hours. Details on the donor were not disclosed.

The medical center has made headlines with Dr. Leonard Bailey's pioneering infant transplants, including the transplant of a baboon heart into a human baby in 1984. Sakala said the boy appeared

Analysts won't give up hope on battered market

NEW YORK - With stock prices toppling and the bond market seemingly flat on its back, Wall Streeters are confronted with a scary question these days: Is this The Big One?

The financial world's equivalents of the Richter scale have unquestionably registered some powerful

In the past two weeks, yields on long-term government bonds have climbed above the 10 percent milestone. And the Dow Jones average of 30 industrials has posted, back-to-back, its two biggest weekly point declines ever, capped off by a 108.36-point slide just on Friday.

Nevertheless, some of the securities industry's most prominen analysts say they are not ready yet to consign the long bull market in stocks to the history books or to declare that the market and the U.S. economy are headed for any

The stock market has peaked for the time being, "but this is not a major bear market," Robert Farrell, a Merrill Lynch strategist, said Friday.

Farrell was named No. 1 in the market timing category of Institutional Investor magazine's just-published annual "All-America Research Team.

Though rising interest rates have "a hostile environment" for the stock market, Farrell predicted stocks will be ready for another move up in the first half of

Past bull markets, he said, have not expired in the face of adverse news, but rather amid euphoria and talk of endless prosperity.

"I'm not being cavalier about this. There are risks," he added. "But I keep thinking the market will make its final top with good



WASHINGTON -During his four-month tenure as acting attorney general after the firing of the Watergate special prosecutor in late 1973, Robert Bork suggested that the FBI might need legislative authority to conduct "black bag jobs" and harass suspected

"As you know." Kelley continued, "the FBI has conducted an in-depth study of the scope of FBI jurisdiction and authority, and it was concluded that additional legislation is needed to enable us to more fully discharge our responsibilities relating to the nanal security.

The immediate cause for concern at the time was the imminent release to NBC reporter Carl Stern of two COINTELPRO documents under the Freedom of Information Act. The

internal documents confirmed that FBI agents had used such illegal tactics as break-ins and anonymous telephone calls designed to disrupt the lives of suspected radicals, their

Bork's Dec. 5 memo appears to be an attempt to defuse the anticipated unfavorable publicity by calling for a report on "action taken to insure that the rights of individuals are not violated while essential FBI investigations are pursued."

In 1978, two FBI officials, Edward Miller and Mark Felt, were convicted on charges of violating citizens' constitutional rights in 1972-73 by giving illegal authorization for FBI break-ins and wiretaps aimed at the Weather Underground

It seems unlikely that Bork would have learned about the Weather Underground break-ins during the brief period he was acting attorney general in late 1973 and early 1974.

However, if Bork had treated the matter as an organic problem, instead of viewing it as a public relations matter, he might have discovered that the FBI was still using illegal techniques.

Pecuniary Interest

One thing that was overlooked in the Iran-contra hearings - probably with good reason - was why Honduran officials were willing, even eager to have the United States continue supporting the Nicaraguan rebels either openly or covertly. The answer is money. Honduras figures that it will get brownie points with the White

House and Congress for letting the contras operate unofficially from bases in its territory. And that presumably means Washington will be grateful whenever Honduras asks for economic and military aid for

There's more important reason that is even less noble: Much of the contra aid funds have been funneled through Honduran officials - and a lot of it sticks to their fingers. Some intelligence estimates we've seen suggest that as much as half of the many millions that have flowed to the contras never made it past the greedy Honduran intermediaries. It's the same problem the United States faces with aid to the Afghan freedom fighters; corrupt officials in Pakistan take a big share of the supplies intended for the rebels across the

Censorship cancer is spreading

What's with Arkansas, Hawaii, Maryland, Mississippi, Nevada, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, South Carolina. Utah and the District of Columbia?

They're totally out of step.

In the 41 other states, parental fanatics, right-wing zealots and organizational dingbats have been scurrying around like cockroaches in a garbage can, trying to resurrect a 1987 version of the Index Liborum Prohibitum. But those nine states and Washington. D.C., have been marching to a different drummer.

They were the only states omitted in an annual report by People for the American Way listing parental or organizational demands to remove books from classrooms and libraries or restrict curricula.

For the other 41 states, Mark Twain's observation would appear to be ruefully accurate: It is by the odness of God that in our country we have those three inspeakable precious things: freedom of speech, freedom of conscience, and the prudence never to practice either of them."

"BLESSED ARE THE MINE-SHALL BUG THE UNITED "Attacks on the Freedom to Learn, 1986-87." self-anointed custodians of our morals tried to censor 127 books, plays, films and magazines. (Would you believe Sports Illustrated?)

Like the AIDS crisis, censorship is worsening. In the past five years, censorship attempts have increased 168 percent, and they are up 20 percent over the last year.

AIDS Awareness Week is Oct. 23-31. In the same spirit of hope and concern with which we look at the struggle and tragedy in Central America, we begin to face the threat of AIDS.

For sale: sunken ships; cash in dollars up front

NORTH MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) -Why dream about searching for treasure at the bottom of the sea or a ship that went down in a violent storm, asks Sidney J. Simon, when he has 18 such

The sunken or abandoned ships he owns, Simon admitted, will not produce gold and silver treasures, but the 70-year-old businessman promises that. as salvage, they are worth a fortune.

'Why search for the Republic when you can buy one of mine and go for the real cash?" asked Simon, referring to current efforts to salvage the 600-foot RMS Republic that sank off Nantucket Island, Mass., in 1909 with an estimated

\$1.2 billion in valuables on board. Most of Simon's wrecks are in relatively shallow waters off his native Nova Scotia, having run aground or struck sunken reefs between 1900 and 1935. Although some are broken in half. Simon claims they are mostly intact. Some are partially visible from the

None of his ships is small, said Simon, a Canadian citizen who also has a residence here. They are mostly freighters, but he also owns what's left of a 470-foot hospital ship and a four-stack World War I-vintage U.S. destroyer.

There are only two conditions to buy one of his wrecks, explained Simon. president of Trans World Slag an Metals Co.: "Cash up front and only U.S.

Records Simon has indicate most of the ships carried coal, lumber or salt or were empty when they went down. However, some apparently carried they sank.

Their value, he said, is in scrap metal. fittings and engine parts he contends have been preserved by salt water. "And there's the copper tubing." he

added with a smile.

One ship has a solid bronze propeller weighing 25 tons, he said.
"Just dig away the sand and cut the

shaft and there's \$50,000," he continued. Someone could make a killing."

Most of the ships were purchased from the Canadian government or insurance companies by his father, the late John Simon, and passed on to him in

Simon also owns millions of tons of old white slag and coke breeze at two abandoned steel mills he has in Londonderry and Ferona, Nova Scotia.

Slag is a steel mill byproduct used to make building and insulation materials. asphalt, glass and for nourishing oyster beds. Coke breeze is the residue of the manufacture of coke and used to make charcoal briquettes.

Simon also speculates some of his ships might be refloated with the help of a large salvage ship.

As to a price for any of Simon's ships. he said, "Make me an offer. What's it worth to you?" The majority of the ships would have

to be bought sight unseen. "I couldn't see them either when I bought them," he said.



LUMPS IN THE BREAST About 29% of American women have ibrocystic disease, in which small tender lumps can be felt within the breasts. The condition portends a somewhat increased risk of cancer. Caffeine and related 'xanthine' substances in coffee, tea, chocolate, cola, some medicines, and tobacco smoke are partly responsible, reports the Journal of AMA. Fibrocystic lumps disappeared from the breasts of 37 out of 45 women who eliminated their intake of xanthines. The Journal also reported that fibrocystic lumps disappeared or decreased in 22 of 26 women who took vitamin E, 600 units daily, for 12 weeks.

Richard Kiley adds TV to career

e is tall, lean, softspoken... less "celebrity" than any star you can name. But if you saw the iniseries "A Year in the Life," which introduced the multi-generationed Gardner family on NBC last Christmas, you know that a star he is and that Richard Kiley who (in 2,000 stage performances over the last 25 years) immortalized Cervantes' Don Quixote, now has a new and very up-to-date star character on his hands.

He's no longer fighting windmills; he's coping with family life in 1987, bringing to the tussle the work ethic and morals, like Joe Gardner brought along from the Depression years.

This is no "Lafe with Father." This is no "Father Knows Best" or any of the other "daddy" shows. "A Year in the Life" is the brain child of John Falsey and Joshua Brand who created "St. Elsewhere" and who aren't afraid to tackle today's problems and aren't about to let sentimentality interfere with their realistic sophistication. Nor is Richard Kiley who has a good deal of input into the substance of the series.

"We all agreed that this family has to be exposed to real problems," he says. "Luckily, we cover three generations and there are so many good people in the cast and enough dramatic 'layers' so that everyone will have a chance to have a show built around him or her. We want this to be a regular American family, which is why we are shooting up in Seattle. No palm trees. No Beverly Hills or Manhattan. And I'm not just borrowing my relationships with my children and grandchildren from my own family, although, heaven knows, I have them.

He has in real life six kids and 11 grandchildren and they're a close and sharing family. "But I'm not one of those actors who used his grandfather's death to trigger all emotions. I try to make emotions happen within the character rather than as me in this other person's clothes and

Kiley is a man who loves being at home, treasures it; but he also loves the road... which know that we believe in each other and that we're going to try to make something happen. Not all charities are created equal

400,000 organizations lamoring for your than \$70 billion in each year, it's no easy matter deciding which charity is right for you. The situation is further confused, according to Robert Burns, general manager of the Los Angeles City Social Services Department, because there is such a wide variance from one locale to another regarding how charities may

solicit donations. Since each municipality and state has its own laws governing such activity, and each exercises differing levels of enforcement of these statutes, the general public is often at loss for clear guidelines and standards to But Burns, whose department

regulates all charitable fund-raising in the city of Los Angeles, says there are some basic precautions you can take to ensure that the organizations to which you give are indeed legitimate, and that your money is being spent in a prudent manner for programs that meet with your approval.

"Don't overlook the obvious," Burns advises, "Who are you looking at? Is this your best friend whom you have been dealing with for the last umpteen years and whom you would trust with your life?" If you're familiar with the charity and know that it's credible, then, he adds, "you don't need to check it out.

A typical example, Burns says, is when you give at your place of worship. "If you go to church or temple or synagogue regularly, and you know what's going on with respect to your ax-exempt dollar, so be it." His and similar agencies. Burns insists, don't want to play any regulatory role in that process But when you are approached

for a donation by someone you don't know, representing an organization with which you're not acquainted, your first reaction should be, "I'm not going to give you a dime unless you can answer certain questions

Who are you; what's the name of questions outlined above of your organization; where is it located; in what activities is it involved; what is the purpose of this particular fund-raising drive; are you tax-exempt; and most importantly, what percentage of

the money you raise goes for administration, and how much is actually used for charitable purposes? These are the kinds of queries you should direct at any olicitor, says Burns.

In many parts of the country, this task is made infinitely simpler by the issuing of permits or information cards that must be presented by the individual or organization soliciting contributions. Burns cautions. however, that such cards do not constitute an endorsement, and are for information purposes

The general rule of thumb is that fund-raising costs should be kept below 20 percent of the total monies generated. "That's not to say you should feel proud if you're running at 19.9 percent," Burns concedes. "A ot of the better agencies are coming in at 8, 9 and 10 percent. So just because you're under 20 percent doesn't mean that you're good, only that you're not bad."

On the other end of the spectrum, Burns's agency has issued information cards on groups whose fund-raising costs are as high as 95 percent. Though this is legal, Burns advises against giving in such cases, since the lion's share of the money is siphoned away from the charitable activity, and

can often find its way into the bank account of a private profit-maker. Fund-raising efforts that revolve around the sale of seemingly overpriced merchandise sometimes fall into this category.

Not all appeals, however, are made in person, Burns points out. "For telephone solicitations, you should be prepared to ask the same kinds of questions that might otherwise appear on an information card. And before the actual solicitation is finalized - usually people banging on your door and taking money out of your hand - they should present to you their information card (or permit)." And if you're not comfortable with their answers, hang up, Burns says emphatically.

The same principles apply when the contact is made through the mail. Is a permit or information card included in the material sent you? Are the kinds answered to your satisfaction? "If not," he says, "don't

But how do you check out organizations if you live in an area where local permits to

solicit funds are not required? "Police departments in many cities regulate charitable fund-raising, that is, in-person, on-site, panhandler-type things, Burns says, adding "and city clerks handle it in many other locales." Burns emphasizes, though, that for the most part, all they can do is tell you whether or not the organization is in fact a charity, not if it's a good or bad one. Another source of information

is the Internal Revenue Service. In order for any charity to be tax exempt, it must submit a form 1023 to the IRS and be issued a 501(c)3 federal exemption certificate. So Burns suggests you always make an organization prove its tax-exempt status by requesting to see a copy of its 501(c)3 before you consider giving. If you suspect that the organization has presented you a bogus or altered form, contact your nearest IRS office and check it

"The 1023 form is public record and is available to anybody," says Burns. "It tells you all kinds of things about the charity that'll help you make a decision about giving."

Likewise, state revenue and taxation codes, according to Burns, must also grant tax-exempt status to charitable organizations if the gifts they receive are to be tax-deductible Therefore, he suggests you check at the state level as well for additional information on an organization.

The local library also has a wealth of valuable information The reference desk should have a publication called the Cumulative List of Organizations" that's issued yearly by the IRS, with quarterly updates. About three inches thick and resembling a telephone book, this volume provides you with an alphabetical list of all legitimate charities and the city which each is located. Additionally, there are a number of directories that give pertinent information about foundations, including specific facts about their finances, programs and

officers. There are also three national voluntary service agencies that provide detailed information about charities. The National Charities Information Bureau evaluates charities based on how they comply to eight standards of performance established for judging such organizations.



These include board of directors' purpose, program, expenses, promotion of activities. fund-raising, accountability and

"The Philanthropic Advisory Service of the Better Business Bureau does more or less the same things," says Burns. The Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability, on the other hand, is a membership organization, whose members have pledged to meet certain high ethical and fund-raising standards, as well as provide financial statements upon request

to all interested parties. Burns advises you always make contributions with a check made out to the organization. never to the individual solicitor And when possible, get a receipt. "Cash donations set up the skimming opportunity," Burns warns, where money is siphoned off the top before it ever gets back to whomever is doing the accounting for the

If you want your donation used for a specific purpose, Burns suggests you indicate this on the check. Better yet, you should write a letter to accompany your gift, outlining how you want the money spent. This is done all the time, Burns insists, when you give at church and earmark the money for the building fund, general operating budget or

If you ever experience misgivings about how your donation was used, your first recourse, Burns insists, is to complain directly to the charity. "A personal contact with someone at the agency will take care of the problem nine times out of 10." In cases where you feel there was intentional fraud, and willful effort to mislead and deceive, he thinks you should direct your complaints to law

enforcement authorities regulatory agencies and the attorney general's office.





However, if the ovaries are also surgically removed along with the uterus (often called a complete hysterectomy), a woman loses her primary source or disorder that needs to be of estrogen, one of the hormones found in higher amounts in women. Business success needs marketing

business will be depends to a large extent on how you market your product or service - and how you market yourself. But even though effective marketing is essential to success. many entrepreneurs starting out underestimate the importance of spending sufficient time and money on promotion and

ow profitable your

advertising "They're so busy burying themselves in other details, they often look at marketing as something they can approach with as little time and money as possible," says Adrienne Zoble senior partner of Adrienne Zoble Advertising, a marketing consultant and planner, and an Active Corps of Executives (ACE) counselor for the Small Business Administration (SBA).

There are many variables as to what percentage of time and budget should go to marketing. No single estimate fits every business or every entrepreneur

Joan m. Sobeck, owner of a highly successful real estate company, estimates that she spends approximately 15 percent of the company dollar (the gross income her company takes in minus all commissions paid out) for advertising in newspapers, industry magazines and journals for high school band concerts. local art shows and other community events. Some entrepreneurs spend less than

"As we change from a product to a service economy the amount of money we spend on promotion changes, explains Zoble. "It used to be hat a basic guideline was 5 to 10 percent, but that was purely advertising. Today you can generally stay with the 5 to 10 percent, but this percentage is for total marketing, and it covers the gamut of advertising and

Learn to talk about your business in a confident and lucid manner. Instead of taking five sentences to answer "What do you do?" in a routine way, prepare an ear-catching, one-sentence answer that's easy to remember. Any description that's longer than one sentence is too long. Here are two

"I'm a realtor." Now she answers, "I own Joan m. Sobeck realtors, with the red-and-black sign of service." This publicizes not only her

name but also the logo she uses. A logo - special identifying motif that gives a picture of what your business is - is an extension of your image. It's an

extra expense, but it's good for nearly every business and ustifies the printing costs. Talk to different printers to get their estimates. Your printing will become expensive if you use too many colors, so limit yourself on colors and consider repro

For both consistency and visibility, make sure your logo is your stamp of identity both in your advertising and or business cards, stationery, memo pads, sales slips, labels, purchase orders, invoices, shopping bags, towels, signs, awnings on your shop and whatever else might be applicable to your type of business. Obviously the logo you choose will depend on the business you launch. But if you own a computer firm, for instance, you might use a computer robot, or if you run a speaker's bureau, try a hand holding a microphone.

Business cards are absolutely indispensable for letting people know what you do. They're one more extension of your image, too, so think of them in relation to your business and your image. "If you're in foods, don't hand out buff-colored cards with brown ink," advises Zoble. "That's an image of stale

There are clever ways to use business cards. In your case, if you're launching:

· a catering service, get initial notice and future referral by mailing business cards to friends attached to a note that says, 'Instead of sending seasona cards this year, I'll do your seasonable parties and charge

a book and gift shop, have your cards made up as oookmarks.

a restaurant, put a map with directions to the restaurant on

an office-supply store, have your cards made up as Rolodex

Once you have cards, you can use them in mailings and ask stores to display them by cash registers and on counters for take-out purposes. Pass them out to friends, neighbors, relatives and business contacts.

Make other contacts through leisure activities and at health clubs. Go to trade shows. conferences and conventions and meet and exchange business cards with people. This networking will expand your prospects and cultivate

es, it's that time of year again... pumpkin pie time. Wait! You can do pumpkin than make pies. After all pumpking bers of the squash

Pumpkins have been grown in this country for centureis. When our forefathers came to America, they found that the Indians grew a wonderful huge vegetable - the pompion. Since it was a super easy vegetable to grow, it soon became an important part of the diet of the early colonist. The Indians taught them to eat it roasted, boiled, broiled, mashed. in soups and even to dry it to

Later the women used the new vegetable with other ingredients to make pies, puddings tarts, breads, cakes and pancakes. The men concocted a type of pumpkin beer. They made it with pumpkins, maple sugar and persimmons. It was a drinkable but not too tasty brew.

Before you make several traditional pumpkin pies, why not try some of these pleasing pumpkin dishes such as... Pumpkin Chili with Cormeal Dumplings, Pork Pumpkin Squares or Pumpkin Peanut Butter Pudding for a change of

Serve this hearty Mexican-style dish with a tossed salad and vanilla ice cream with caramel topping.

PUMPKIN CHILI WITH CORNMEAL DUMPLINGS

pound ground beef (16-ounce) can cooked

2 (16-ounce) cans whole tomatoes, cut up I cup water l tablespoon instant minced

I tablespoon dried parsley flakes 1/2 teaspoon dried celery flakes 1/n teaspoon garlic powder I teaspoon chili powder Salt to taste I (16-ounce) can red kidney

oven. Drain off excess fat. Add pumpkin, tomatoes, water, onions, parsley, celery, garlic and chili powder. Bring to a boil; stirring frequently. Lower heat; simmer for 10 minutes. Add salt to taste and kidney cans. Bring back to a boil.

Combine flour, commeal, baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt in a large bowl. Add milk and oil; stir until thoroughly combined (Don't Beat). Drop by large tablespoons into soup. Lower heat; simmer uncovered for 10 minutes. Then simmer tightly covered for 10 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Pork chops baked with pumpkin, apples and raisins make a perfect autumn meal. Serve with hot fluffy rice, green bean salad and molded fruit

AUTUMN FEAST 1/4 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon salt pork chops, %" thick (about 1/2 pounds) tablespoons vegetable oil

(6-ounce) can apple juice 1 (16-ounce) can cooked

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon Salt to taste 2 tablespoons brown sugar

1/2 cup raisins 2 apples peeled and sliced

Preheat oven to 350 F. Combine flour and 1/2 teaspoor salt. Coat pork chops with mixture.

Heat oil in a 10" skillet Brown chops, two at a time. Remove and place in a 9 x 13 x onions 2" baking dish.

When all chops are browned, leaves stir apple juice, pumpkin, nutmeg and cinnamon into the skillet. Heat to bubbling, Salt to taste. Add brown sugar, raisins and apples. Stir in thoroughly. Spoon over pork chops. Cover with aluminum foil. Bake for hour or until meat tests done.

Pumpkin adds moisture and a new flavor to meat loaf. Serve with noodles tossed with cheese, broccoli and chocolate pie.

PORK PUMPKIN SQUARES 11/2 pounds ground pork

I cup canned pumpkin 2 tablespoons ketchup

Makes 6 servings.

1/4 cup crushed saltine crackers I teaspoon instant minced

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Combine pork, pumpkin, ketchup, egg, crackers, onions and cinnamon in a large bowl. Mix thoroughly. Spread evenly in an 81/2 x 12 x 2" baking dish. Bake in a 350 F oven for 60 to 70 minutes or till meat tests done. Spoon off drippings. Let stand 5 minutes. Cut into squares to serve.

The Princess Bride (PG) Director Rob Reiner continues to reveal a fondness for childhood narratives. As a follow-up to his ruefully nostalgic "Stand By Me," Reiner has now come up with a full-length fractured fairy tale.

"The Princess Bride" introduces us to a contemp ary kid who is sick in bed and being read to by his grandfather (Peter Falk). We see the boy's bedtime story — a romantic tale involving a breathtakingly pretty blonde princess (Robin Wright) and a breathtakingly pretty blond hero (Cary Elwes), who must survive countless obstacles before living happily

Reiner, by way of William Goldman's screenplay and novel, has given this fairy tale a comic spin. The result is the Brothers Grimm as told by a Borscht Belt comic. Albeit a gentle one.

The casting is canny. Chris Sarandon makes a dashingly arrogant evil prince, and Mandy Patinkin hams it up as a swordsman with a not-always-decipherable Spanish accent. Small, sour-looking Wallace Shawn plays a nasty kidnapper, and Billy Crystal turns up as a very wizened, Yiddish miracle

Why then, with all its pleasantries, doesn't the movie add up to more? If Mel Brooks — the old Mel Brooks, not the fired director of "Spaceballs" - had helmed this movie, it might have had a little zest and bite, and maybe a little visual wildness. The way it's been done, children and tender-hearted adults will probably be satisfied. But more demanding viewers, while entertained, may find it a little too mild. Grade: **%

Surrender (PG) This movie is certifiably schizoid a part-engaging, part-irritating split between a breezy romantic vehicle for Sally Field and Michael Caine and a stronger, caustic comedy about how money destroys

Michael Caine plays a wealthy writer whose ex-wives have taken him to the cleaners; consequently, he's become a misogynist. Sally Field is a struggling artist who's been fooling herself about her boyfriend (Steve Guttenberg), largely because of his bankroll

Brought together during a robbery (they're literally tied together naked). Caine and Field fall in love. Meanwhile. Caine pretends to be a pauper to make sure Field isn't after his money.

The plot, scripted by director Jerry Belson, moves its characters through a series of improbable situations to illustrate the almighty dollar's ability to ruin a good thing. On the heels of scenes that show each of the three main characters at their worst, there's a happy

ending. It sticks in the craw. Probably only the Johnny Carsons of this world can fully appreciate the marital paranola of Caine's character. But he is such a charismatic actor that he ends up seeming sympathetic. Field doesn't fare so well. Half the time she might be playing a typical warm-hearted heroine. Then, suddenly, the script has her behaving in uncharacteristically greedy fashion in order to make its points. The curiously unappealing Steve Guttenberg is all too effective as the boyfriend.

The film's best moment is a simple visual gag. Two elevator doors open. One elevator contains a curvy, flirtatious blonde: the other holds a man and a fierce-loking barking dog. Caine chooses the elevator with the dog. Grade: **%

Debbie Reynolds still survives, and she's a success once again

LOS ANGELES - She is a self-proclaimed survivor, having weathered one marriage that sparked an international scandal and another that erased \$8 million in earnings and left her \$2 million in debt. Both breakups, she says, drove her to consider suicide.

But Debbie Reynolds is still here. Not only has she survived, she has prevailed. Her third marriage is an apparent success, she has created a best-selling exercise video and she has been breaking records across the country in a show co-starring her "Singin' in the Rain" buddy, Donald O'Connor.

She also is starring in her first movie in 17 years, "Sadie and Son," which will appear on CBS on Oct. 21. She plays an over-50 New York police officer who asks for street duty and ends up as partner with would-be comedian.

"Sadie and Son" was filmed in Toronto last summer under condi tions far different from what she enjoyed during her MGM heyday.

"Once we worked for 22 straight hours; 14 to 16-hour days were average," she recalled, adding that co-star Sam Wanamaker once asked: "Why are we doing this?" Her reply: "Because it's film. If this were stage, we could walk off. There's something sacred about

Reynolds spoke on a wide range of matters one morning at her local base, a comfortable house on a modest street not far from where she grew up in Burbank. Her brother, Bill, a makeup artist, shares the house, and her recently widowed mother lives across the street. Son Todd Fisher's house is nearby and daughter Carrie is not far away in Beverly Hills.

Reynolds believes in maintaining her roots, despite 40 weeks per year on the road. Though she is worried that the skies have grown dangerous (she has endured two nearcrashes), she enjoys performing. especially if it results in the standing ovations that she and O'Connor have received.

At 55, the face is smooth and the compact figure trim from long hours in the rehearsal hall. She has known triumph and tragedy during a career of nearly 40 years

Her first big crisis came in 1959 when husband, Eddie Fisher, fa-ther of Carrie and Todd, left her for Elizabeth Taylor, Reynolds married shoe magnate Harry Karl a year later. When they divorced in 1973, she discovered that his gambling and business ventures had wiped out her earnings and left

"I think more than Eddie, it was the end of the second marriage that caused a lot of Carrie's pain," Reynolds said, referring to the emotional upset of her daughter, whose best-selling book, "Post-cards From the Edge" deals with an actress' drug and drinking

"I don't think she verbalizes that yet. But she had never seen her mother in pain. I never cried in front of the children, I always took care of everything; no one ever saw that I had a problem. Carrie did see that at the end of my marriage to Harry. She was so shocked that I fell apart that it confused and bothered her," Reynolds said.

"She holds a lot of grudge and upset, as I do, when he changed our lives for the worse. ... I didn't have a car, I didn't have a house and I had to go on the road. The children had to be uprooted. The life was ripped apart for everyone. That was the beginning of the end of the children's growth." Karl died in 1982.

Reynolds believes that the children, including her stepdaughter. Tina Karl, have come to grips with the emotional trauma.



The play of the eight in front of K-J-9-4 and similar holdings is always suspect, since it is a textbook situation for falsecarding. Still, there is a sound reason for paying off to such a deceptive play. If

West has a singleton eight he must play it; if he has 10-8-5-3, he might well play either the five or the three. Declarer did go through the exercise of coming to his hand with a spade to lead up to the K-9 of hearts in dummy. When the heart three appeared from West, he went right up with dummy's king, and down he went.

Maybe we can find a moral here. When your side has 34 or more bal-anced high-card points, don't look for a 4-4 fit. Instead, play no-trump, where you may be able to survive having two losers in a particular suit. If declarer were in no-trump, he could survive misguessing the heart distri-

surance industry could indeed have something to gain from people break-ing speed laws. State insurance regutory agencies allow the companies to surcharge policy holders for speeding tickets, a practice that made some sense before 1974 when limits were set at 65, 70 or 75 mph. The interstate highways were designed to be safely traveled at those speeds, and it could se argued that any motorist driving faster was being reckless.

When Congress decreed the 55-mph limit in 1974, "the insurance industry received a windfall, without assuming a bit of added risk," says Tomerlin. Nothing had changed to make driving not people. The limit was imposed to conserve fuel, not to promote safety At first, motorists complied. But, as

anyone who treks the highways knows, in recent years the 55-mph limit became a joke. A joke to every one, that is, except those unlucky motorists who got caught going 60 or 65 and the insurance companies who then had an excuse to boost the motorists' rates

In fact, the majority of motorists always tend to drive at a speed that feels comfortable for any given road. regardless of the speed limits imposed. According to Kent Milton of the California Highway Patrol, that comfort zone on highways seems to be 62 to 68 mph.

The new 65-mph limit legalizes what people were already doing."

And perhaps it also removes an unjustified insurance-industry windfall in the bargain.

Starling still looking for recognition from title

HARTFORD - Marlon Starling should have been basking in glory these last two months since he knocked out former Olympic champion Mark Breland to win the World Boxing Association welterweight title.

But the 29-year-old from this Connec ticut city's North End ghetto is feeling somewhat cheated

"I went to this boxing thing down at Toots Shor's restaurant in New York and (Sugar) Ray Leonard came up to me and said 'It still hasn't happened yet. has it?" Starling said during a break in a recent workout

"Ray was the first to recognize it. I thought by winning the title I would begin to feel like, 'Damn, I did it.' But it hasn't happened yet. It was just another fight." said Starling, 42-4 with 26 knockouts.

Starling's rise to the championship was atypical, filled with setbacks that would have sent lesser-willed boxers back to street fighting and the unem-

ployment line.
It was as a scrawny 8-year-old that Starling first walked into the Bellevue Square Boys Club. a gym set in the middle of an expansive housing project known as the "brickyard" because of its brick and concrete buildings and lack of trees and grass

"WHEN HE FIRST PUT ON a pair of gloyes, I knew he could be a winner because of his heart and determination. He wasn't afraid of anybody." recalled Johnny Duke, a gruff little man who was Starling's first trainer and still runs the

His amateur record was 97-13, including the 1974 Junior Olympic 139-pound title and three New England Golden Gloves championships. He reached the semifinals of the 1979 National AAU

Tournament But in the seventh round of his sixth professional fight. Starling knocked out Charlie Newell, leaving the state prison inmate comatose. When Newell died nine days later, on Jan. 18, 1980. Starling was devastated and thought seriously about quitting.

Starling returned to the ring, but he is still coming to terms with Newell's

"When I'm talking to kids about boxing and how they should stay away from drugs and keep their bodies in shape. I always remind them not to kid themselves." he said. "You can get killed in that ring. I have firsthand

experience. I lived through it.

Duke blames Newell's death on smelling salts (since banned from the boxing ring) administered after the knockout, but Starling believes Newell's fate had already been determined.

Biggs, cut over the left eye in the third round, took several hard shots but finally could not resist the man who has been irresistible since turning pro on March 6.

Rosters in NFL may grow to 85

NEW YORK - The end to the 24-day NFL strike may leave teams next week with as many as 85 players on their rosters - regulars and replacements. But only 45 would be allowed to suit up for the games.

The league is also likely to approve a version of the old "taxi squad," allowing coaches to keep players who impressed them during the strike.

As some of the regulars turned away when the strike ended Thursday returned Friday to begin preparations for next week, league officials were trying to get ready for the full influx of regulars next week.

NFL Management Council spokesman John Jones said teams will be allowed to keep up to 85 players on their active and inactive lists next week, and would have to name their 45-man active roster by 4 p.m.

That could set up possible confrontations if the players share the same locker rooms and practice

The final roster size will probably be determined at a league meeting scheduled for Kansas City Oct. 27.
Tex Schramm, a member of the Management Council's executive committee and president of the Dallas Cowboys, said it was likely the owners would decide to keep the active roster at 45 but that a "reserve squad" might be added so that coaches could keep

eplacements who had impressed. But he said it was unlikely the roster would be increased to 49, a figure tacitly agreed upon during the negotiations but never formally approved. "That's a sensitive figure right now." Schramm said. "I don't

know that we'd want to go for that."
The union, meanwhile, said it was considering filing lawsuits through the National Labor Relations Board to try and get players paid for this week. Players who reported after the union sent them back were barred from playing this weekend and being paid, though they can practice and be paid at a per diem rate, while their replacements play this Sunday.

Jones also that the owners will honor the provisions of the 1982 contract with the exception of union dues checkoff. That means the union will have to collect dues individually for players rather than having them deducted from paychecks.

"No player benefits are getting interrupted," Jones Jones also said that despite the antitrust suit filed against the league by the union, the owners were still



MINNEAPOLIS — Jack Clark is out for the entire World Series. Terry Pendleton is out for now and the St. Louis Cardinals wondered Friday what else could go wrong.

Awaiting them for the Series opener Saturday night were the strange sights and sounds of the Minnesota Twins' Metrodome. Especially the sounds.

Joe Magrane, the Cardinals' starter in Game 1, has his own way of dealing with the noisy ballpark. "I'm probably going to wear ear plugs. I'm serious," he said.

"When people scream like that for nine innings, it puts such a frantic pace to the game." Magrane said. "You keep looking over your shoulder, wondering if the blimp is going to crash through the roof or something."

Magrane will be the first rookie.

Magrane will be the first rookie left-hander ever to start a World Seies opening game.

Magrane, hit hard in his one start during the National League playoffs, pitched in the Metrodome in 1985 for the University of Arizona, losing to Minnesota 5-3.

"There were about 2,000 fans here and it was hard to hear," he said.

A crowd of 55,000 is expected to cheer Frank Viola, Minnesota's ace left-hander, who will be starting on the same day he was supposed to be best man at his brother's wedding in New York.

Earlier this week, Cardinals Manager Whitey Herzog wondered whether Magrane would be able to overcome the pressure of Game 1. the Twins and their fans.

"I don't know who is going to handle the crowd here." Herzog said during a Friday workout held to let the Cardinals get accustomed to finding fly balls in the Metrodome's white ceiling.
