

# Mrs. Howe's Maternity Home

Hundreds of children were born at Mrs. Howe's Maternity Home, 52 Wadsworth St., Manchester, CT, between about 1922 and 1935. Some of those children are in the "reunion" picture below, provided to us by Bob Gorman, who was born at Howe's maternity home in July 1922. Bob received the photo from Don Lappen, who currently owns the house at 52-54 Wadsworth Street.

On May 31, 1931, the picture appeared in the Society pages of *The Hartford Courant*, with this caption: "MOTHERS AND BABES IN REUNION AT MANCHESTER – 325 mothers and children, former patients of the Howe Maternity Home, Manchester, were the guests May 12 of Mrs. George H. Howe of the Home at a reunion party. 150 of the number were mothers. The guests present were from Hartford, West Hartford, East Hartford, Windsor, Glastonbury and Manchester. © Fallo"

Mrs. Howe's establishment was patronized by residents of Manchester, Hartford, West Hartford, and other towns. Hospitals were also an option for families: Manchester Memorial, Hartford, St. Francis, Mt. Sinai. Mrs. Howe's maternity home is listed in the 1927 Manchester directory (see copy below); in the 1934 directory it's listed as a maternity hospital, as it is in an ad in the 1934 *Courant* classifieds, under private hospitals. Announcements in *The Courant* show births at the home from 1927 to 1934. Historical Society member and volunteer Ron Schack (1936) and his brother (1934) were both born at Mrs. Howe's. Mary (née Sanderson) Howe (1881-1964) was married three times, the second time to George Howe (1860-1940), whom she married in 1915. It was while married to George that the Wadsworth Street maternity home operated. Here is her obituary, from *The Hartford Courant* 12/17/1964:

**Mrs. Mary Hedrick.** Funeral services for Mrs. Mary S. Howe Hedrick, 83, of Lombardo, Ill., formerly of Manchester, who died Tuesday in Brookfield, Ill., will be held Friday at 11 a.m. at the Watkins-West Funeral Home, 142 East Center St. The Rev. Clifford O. Simpson, pastor of the Center Congregational Church, will officiate and burial will be in East Cemetery. Friends may call at the funeral home today from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m.

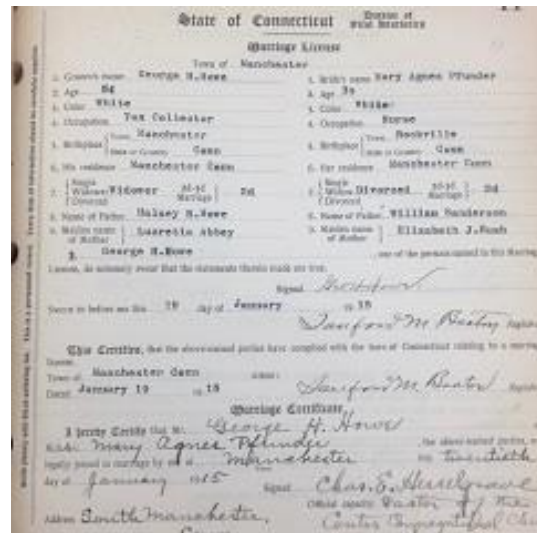
Born in Rockville Oct. 10, 1881, she had been a resident of Manchester for many years and operated and owned the former Howe Maternity Home here before moving to Lombardo.

She leaves a daughter, Mrs. Edgar J. Elliott, with whom she made her home; a granddaughter, Mrs. Milton H. Carr of Coventry; and two great grand-children.

**George Howe Resigns.** George H. Howe, who has been postmaster at Sub-Station No. 2 of the South Manchester post office, located at the Center has resigned as postmaster, and yesterday the books and other papers connected with the office were moved out.
