1.3 cents, within 2 cents of the union's demands.

The News said the expected Ford offer could set a formula for settlement of the disputes across the country.

Ford denied the reported new offer in a statement which said: "The rumor that the Ford-Mo-Cio another wage proposal has no merit of fact. The company's position is still that the offer of 17-1/2 cents is not substantial."

A union spokesman commented that the story was "mere speculation."

Meanwhile, General Motors said it was standing on its previous offer of 12 1/2 cents. The union's demand of 19-1/2 cents increase, or 2.3 per cent, despite its original demand of 30 per cent.

The UAW-CIO was believed to be negotiating further strategy today in view of General Motors' refusal to accept a 10 per cent wage increase.

The deadline for GM's acceptance of the smaller figure, as announced by President Truman's administration, is Monday night and passed without comment from either side.

May Offer Price Increases

As the meat fact-finding board assembled in Chicago last week, hearings today on the strike of 20,000 AFL and CIO packhouse workers, there were reports the administration planned to recommend a 10 per cent wage increase to avoid taking over the meat plants.

Top government officials held a series of strike strategy conferences yesterday as the nation's steelworkers, the walkout of 70,000 CIO Steelworkers, closing near 1,000 plants, and other unions. Further meetings were planned today and the settlement of the steel strike is expected by hold No. 1 priority.

While the meat fact-finding panel is being given every possible chance to mediate the wage dispute, sources close to the industry said the government's new price formula might involve a government commitment to purchase 25 cents a hundred pounds of meat.

No increase for consumers

The price of meat to retail wholesalers, it was reported unofficially in Washington, also would be held steady. Certain food products as against a previous proposal of 12 1/2 cents a hundred pounds, which would have absorbed the raise or receive higher subsidies without increasing consumer prices.

The striking CIO United Packaged workers, who are demanding a 37 1/2 cent an hour wage boost and the AFL Meat Canners and Packers workers are asking 20 cent an hour increase. The highest offer for the packers, made by the CIO, is 15 cents an hour hike.

The first effects of the paralyzing steel strike began to be felt as the country's biggest work stoppage closed steel mills and affected construction, railroads and public utilities, but there was no indication of wage negotiations between the CIO United Steelworkers and major steel producers.

Production at 52-Year Low

Steel production dropped to its lowest level in 52 years, as strikers took up picket lines in plants in states where only two instances of violence, both in Ohio, were reported.

At Pittsburgh 4,000 railroad workers and 400 employees on river barges were furloughed because of declining steel and coal shipments. Most large steel mills operate their own interplant railroads and with the mills idle they had little or no work to do.

Fuel Gas Flaming Averted

A fuel gas famine appeared averted at Gary, Ind., when Carnegie-Illinois Steel corporation announced it would utilize an amount personnel to continue manufacturing gas after the Independent Forum's Association of America, acting as CIO negotiator, notified members not to continue to operate the plant.

The only disturbances reported in the first day of the walkout were at Cincinnati, where a man was charged with brandishing a revolver as he attempted to pass a picket line and a management official complained to police that two pickets struck him as he attempted to enter the Wagon Wheel Hotel company plant. The men were charged with assault and battery.

In Washington, the Civilian Production Administration lack yesterday suspended all outstanding priorities for the purchase of steel and instructed businesses to react to all deliveries so that no customer will receive more than is needed for immediate needs.
