The possible effect on the election of Leopold's throne remained the subject of much discussion. The tabulation of votes seemed an end. The right-wing Catholics pledged to Leopold's support, favor a referendum on the question of his return from the exile into which he was forced by the combined action of the Liberals, Socialists and Communists.

Probable Abdication Seen

Political observers expressed belief that should the Catholic party succeed in forming a referendum, Leopold probably would abdicate unless within 48 hours the people favored the restoration.

Some quarters believed that should the vote for Leopold be a minority he would renounce the throne in favor of his son, Prince Baudouin. Leopold is now in Switzerland.

Among the outstanding political figures who retained seats in the National Assembly.

Also present were: Joseph van Glabbeke, a Liberal leader and minister of the interior under van der Smissen.

Approximately 2,000,000 persons voted in the elections. Under the Belgian law every male over 21 who had not been disenfranchised because of collaboration with the Germans was required to vote on paying a fine of seven francs (10 to 20 cents). Women were not permitted to vote.

FBI Men Join Canada Probe

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—(AP)—The arrival of several FBI men from Washington stirred speculation here today of possible developments affecting the United States in connection with the Canadian government's inquiry into an alleged leader of "secret and confidential" atomic information.

It was learned, meanwhile, that the inquiry into the case—whether an authoritative source said involved the transmission of atomic secrets to Russia—had spread to London, where a Canadian official was reported taken into custody for questioning.

Twenty-two employers or former employees of the government previously had been interviewed in Canada in connection with the investigation.

All were being held incommunicado—many of them in the mountain police barracks near the Rockcliffe airport on the outskirts of Ottawa.

A large detachment of mounted police officers was placed around the barracks and no outsiders were permitted in the area.

Thus far the Canadian government has not formally identified the foreign mission in Ottawa allegedly involved in the atomic spy network, but Ottawa officials have declared unofficially that the mission was the United States. To be named during the trial.

The Foreign Affairs official said, however, that prosecution of any foreigners who might be involved was not anticipated. Those regarded as guilty of overt acts were held in connection with the secret disclosure of atomic secrets to the United States. Those persons not guilty and asked to leave Canada, the official said.

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Freedom of The Air

The Chicago Air Conference, held during the war in an effort to provide for world-wide freedom of the air after the war, was a failure for two principal reasons. One, still not cured, was the fact that Soviet Russia was not even prepared to discuss the possibility of any foreign plane should be allowed to fly over Russian territory. Those were the days when Russia would not even permit the military planes of her allies to fly over her territory. There was a joint war against a common enemy, Russia finally got over that, in grudging fashion, but there is still no sign or hope that Russia intends to have any part of any free commerce or free travel or freedom of the air.

And what Mr. Forrestal there made plain was that he had never recommended Pauley for anything. The appointment of Pauley had first been suggested, he said, by President Roosevelt. He, Forrestal, had first proposed another candidate but had later acquiesced in Roosevelt's desire. Later, he had told President Truman that, if it had been Russia and not we who first developed the atomic bomb, we ourselves would be stopping short of nothing in our own frantic efforts to steal Russia's knowledge.

When the spy efforts of one particular nation come to light, as it seems to be coming to light in the Pauley situation, those who relate the atmosphere of future war can whomp it up into an actual course of war.

Colonel Peron, the would-be Hitler of Argentina, has recently copied what was Hitler's favorite and, for a long time, most effective weapon. It is the weapon in which such nations as Italy and Germany were so successful. That is, we should judge, the nature of Colonel Peron's answer to the American State Department's Blue Book describing Argentina's past ties to Nazi Germany.
