





Don't report it. If you paid tax on military pay for any of those years, you'll get a refund. Ask the collector of internal revenue for it on Form 843. If, in any of those years, you received civilian income of \$500 or more, you have to file a return on it, just as a civilian does. So much for the enlisted people. Now-if you're a commissione officer, including a commissioned

warrant officer: The first \$1,500 of your military pay from Jan. 1, 1943, through 1945 is tax free. Don't report it. Actually, wou don't have to file a return on your military pay unless it was \$2,000 or more because: The first \$1,500 is tax exempt, as noted. Then you get the usual \$500 exemption on the next \$500 in military pay before being required




