Fulton, Mo., March 6.—(P)—Winston Churchill, with a stern warning against any definite expansion of Russian "power and doctrines," is pinning his hopes for the next century of mankind on a "fraternal association" of the United States and Great Britain.

Two Schools of Diplomatic Thought React To Impact of Churchill Talk in Missouri Washington, March 6.—(P)—A disturbing new element best described as "Pro-Churchillism" is being introduced by Truman today, Winston Churchill's plea for quick creation of an Anglo-American military alliance.

Germany's air weapons, he wrote, "were ahead of ours at the start of the war, and far ahead at its end. We won the air war... with muscle, not mind. We smothered them with the sheer weight of our planes. Our air forces high command... he went on, "bring stupidity and stubbornly to the idea and weapons developed and put into combat those of today and tomorrow. Our future air defense," Thomas declared, "should be in civilian hands—in some organization, such as the National Defense Research Council, composed of the best scientific minds in America. It should be broad professional, snug and narrow. It will promote a broader source of scientific knowledge. Such control, by producing better planes, would have averted near-disaster in the air during the last war."

Stratford Plants Grant Increase

Stratford, March 6.—A pay increase estimated to average 15 per cent for both hourly workers and salaried employees drawing under \$5,000 annually is provided for in a new contract signed by the Chance Vought and Sikorsky divisions of United Aircraft Corp. with Local 877 United Automobile Workers (CIO).

A statement by Rex E. Beigel and Bernard L. Whelan, general managers of the plants and Mitchell Sviridoff, president of Local 855, said the increase would affect nearly 4,000 workers and add \$2,400,000 to the payrolls of the two divisions.

The contract was ratified at a union meeting yesterday and spokesmen said it will be immediately submitted to the National Wage Stabilization board for approval, which will make it operative.

Cornack, of Massachusetts, appealed for enactment of what was left of the much-buffed measure. The House defeated the Senate provisions will be reinstated for submission on price ceilings. By turning down the Republican bill, the House defeated an effort to prevent price ceilings on new dwellings. This was the principal difference in the Republican bill authorized by Representative Woodell (R., Mich.) which made no mention of price ceilings.

The watered down administration measure, as it now stands, provides:

1. An increase of \$1,000,000,000 in the authority to insure home mortgages, which means the government will take the risk on the construction of homes for veterans. The insurance would be at 90 per cent of housing value. This is a veteran or other person could purchase a home with small down payment and the government would protect the mortgage for the remainder.

2. Continue for a year, war-granted priorities and allocations authority for channeling scarce building materials into homes for veterans.

3. Give preference to veterans in buying or renting new houses.

4. Vest in the housing expediter, Wilson W. Wyatt, broad authority to issue directives to other government agencies. He could tell G.P.A. what ceilings to put on building materials.

5. Authorize Wyatt to stop the export of any lumber needed for home construction in this country.

Heroine of Alleged Attempt

Mrs. Schirach was brought into the defense as a heroine of their alleged attempt to soften Hitler's persecution of Jews, which they said caused them to live afterward in fear of arrest or assassination.

replied "no primarily." He added that it might have been one of the Chinese factions.

Churchill spoke at Fulton, Mo., yesterday as a private citizen. But the fact that he was introduced by President Truman lent perhaps even more importance to his words than if they had been spoken on the floor of Congress in Churchill's role of leader of His Majesty's government's official opposition.

It has been emphasized, however, that Mr. Truman's appearance, on the same platform does not constitute an administration endorsement of Churchill's views.

There was little disposition here to believe that Churchill's speech would provoke any official action on the proposal for a strong Anglo-American military alliance—either for or against.

Instead it was generally believed that the United States will pursue a policy of calling the world's attention to actions it deems in violation of the United Nations charter and then resort to one of three possibilities:

1.—Action by the United Nations when it meets in New York this spring.

2.—Discussion of pending controversies when the Allied foreign ministers get together for their scheduled meeting in Paris by May 1 to formulate peace pacts with Italy, Finland, Bulgaria, Romania and Hungary.

3.—Settlement of specific issues by creating special commissions such as the one the United States has suggested to deal with Japanese reparations.

It is believed that the United States will not be in a position to take up the matter again.

Shirt Situation Demands Care

As ex-GI's join other civilians in the fevered quest for shirts, limited stocks in stores become more important. One reason is we're at the seasonal time for onion supply. We're drawing on storage stocks, and giving frayed collars and cuffs a turn for the better. Before laundering, examine his shirt for rips and tears. If you have a hole in your shirt, you can't get a new one until new onions start coming to market from Texas. The onion crop was a little above average last fall, certainly not in the record-breaking 1944 class. Still, shipments from storage have been on the whole, about the same as last year. But there was a limit to our storage stocks, and weather conditions of the northern producing areas affected a quantity of the onion crop around now to keep us from having a bumper crop. Some of the supply has been reduced.




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
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
