

First of Series Of Book Sermons

Presenting a review Revised Standard Version of the New Testament," Rev. W. Ralph Ward, Jr. will give the first of a series of book review sermons which will bring to a close the evening services of the South Metho-dist church for this season. This revised version of the New Testament has been described as the most important publication of 1946.

This new translation has been completed by a committee of Biblical scholars named by the Internatoinal Council of Religious Education with which the educational boards of forty of the major Protestant denominations the United States and Canada associated. It was published the first week of February and has already had a very wide sale and is becoming popular with minis-ters and laymen alike, and used a great deal in churches. The revised standard version

will be an authorized revision of the American Standard Bible of 1901, which in turn was a revision of the King James Version, pub lished in 1611. In his book review Sunday eve ning. Mr. Ward will point out many of the interesting and im-portant changes which this new version gnakes in the familiar Bible text.
