

The long vacation will give them time to campaign for re-election. The general election is in November. There are six main jobs which Congress will try to wind up be-fore leaving in July.

"HOW'S TELEPHONE SERVICE **COMING ALONG?**"

A report of progress since V-J Day

More than 35,000 people were waiting for new telephone service in Connecticut on V-J Day. There was not one exchange where service could be given immediately to everyone who asked for it. Every exchange needed more telephones. Almost all needed more central office equipment and outside cables and wires.

Now, eight months after V-J Day, we've come a long way up the road toward providing telephone service for everyone who wants it.

elephone instruments, manufactured on a mass production basis, have been delivered to us it record-breaking numbers. And no one in Connecticut now is waiting for service b of this item of telephone equipment.

Even central office equipment, which must be individually engineered, has been manufactured and delivered to us in record time. Already equipment additions have been completed in 40 central offices; work is in progress in six others; and detailed arrangements have been made for the installation of equipment in every central office where people are waiting for service.

About 35,000 miles of wire in cable have been installed since V-J Day. One new building and five building additions are nearing completion; while three new buildings and two other building additions are about to start.

During 1946 alone, we are spending \$17,500,000 on an expansion program to speed the installation of equipment, buildings, cables and other facilities necessary to provide the kind of telephone service a growing and prosperous Connecticut wants.

Today, we are giving new service as soon as requested in 64 of our 84 central offices, except in a few scattered locations where more outside wires and cables are needed. In the remaining 20, we will fill orders just as fast as equipment becomes available.


We've installed over 61,000 telephones in Connecticut during the past eight months. During January, February and March of this year, the net gain in telephones was more than during the entire pre-war years of 1938 and 1939 combined. On April 1, we were operating 539,088 telephones in Connecticut.

New orders for service continue to pour in - at a rate even higher than in the peak days of the war. But we are getting telephone materials now. And gradually, the "held order" list is being cut down. From the V-J total of 35,000 we've reduced the waiting list for new service to 12,511 on April 1 - and almost all of those now waiting placed their orders after V-J Day.

There is still a big job to do in Connecticut before everyone who wants a telephone can have one, before everyone who wants a private line can have it, before we are able to give everyone the kind and quality of service we want to give.

But we are going full-speed ahead - 8,200 telephone employees working together to complete the biggest job in telephone history - aiming first to give service to the thousands who are waiting, and then to provide Connecticut people with better telephone service than ever before.
