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## **Reproduced Below Is The Text** Of An Order Of The Public **Commission** Of Utilities **Connecticut** Dated State Of 1946. 10th, May

MAY 16th. 1946

ORDER OF THE PUBLIC UTILITY COMMISSION TO ALL ELECTRIC UTILITY OMPANIES RESPECTING CONSERVATION OF ELECTRICITY IN THE PRES-ENT FUEL CRISIS.

Pursuant to the directive of His Excellency the Governor dated May 9, 1946, declaring that the dire shortage of hard fuel is rapidly precipitating an emergency which threatens the health and safety of the people of the State, in which directive His Ex-cellency has directed and empowered this Commission to take whatever steps are necessary to conserve fuel supplies through curtailment of gas and electricity or any other public utility service affected by this emergency, the Commission hereby makes the following order with respect to each electric utility subject to the jurisdiction of the

1. The Commission finds that the emergency arising out of the dire shortage of coal requires a program be immediately undertaken for the curtailment of electric service in order to conserve the remaining supply of coal on hand so as to prolong, as far as possible, the ability of every electric utility company to sup-ply electric service essential to the public health and safety and the protection of property; such curtailment not to extend to the point where public health and safety and the protection of property may be impaired. Effective May 13, 1946, each electric utility company, subject to the Commis-sion's jurisdiction, is hereby ordered, during the period of the emergency and until further order of the Commission to curtail, the use of electricity in the

following respects; a. For all such purposes as advertising, decorative or ornamental, display and <sup>3</sup> flood lighting, sign lighting, window and show case lighting, comfort air con-ditioning, and interior lighting in excess of minimum safety requirements; b. For all non-essential uses of electricity for industrial purposes that can be eliminated or deferred, and for all other non-essential uses of electricity by

domestic and commercial users. 3. Each electric utility company, subject to the Commission's jurisdiction, shall interconnect its transmission lines with those of other electric utilities within the State to the extent that such interconnection will result in a conservation of fuel or produce an equitable allocation to the different sections of the State of fuel or produce an equitable allocation to the untertait sections of the state of the available fuel supply within the State. In order to accomplish the curtailment of the use of electricity set forth above, each electric utility is authorized and directed to request its customers, includ-ing other utilities and municipalities, through advertising or other means to curtail the use of electricity, as set forth and to enforce compliance with such requests to the extent the utility deems practicable, including discontinuance

of service. of service. 5. Whenever any electric utility company has information that a user of its service is persistently violating the program of conservation of electricity di-rected in this order, such utility company is directed to make application to the Commission for an order authorizing the company to discontinue service to uch customer.

 Such customer.
 In the execution of this order each utility is released from compliance with all conflicting provisions of the General Statutes covering electric utility com-panies, and from all conflicting orders and rules and regulations of this Com-mission heretofore issued, and conflicting schedules, rules and regulations and contracts of the several electric utility companies.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that each electric utility adopt such operating meas-ures not inconsistent with the prior provisions of this order as in the judgment of the irres not inconsistent with the prior provisions of this order as in the judgment of the utility will conserve fuel. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that each electric utility operate to the greatest of its generating facilities that can produce electricity without the consumption of coal. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Commission retain jurisdiction of the sub-ject matters herein under consideration for the purpose of entering any such further order or orders as the Commission in its judgment may deem necessary.
