Jim Crow Given Slap By Supreme Tribunal

Decision on Interstate Buses Will Result in Some Changes in the Treatment of Negroes

By James Marlow Washington, June 5.—(AP)—The Supreme court has given Jim Crow a slap which will cause some changes, but not great changes, in the treatment of Negroes in the country. The court has ruled that interstate buses—those traveling from one state into another—cannot force Negroes to ride in the rear, behind white passengers. This was aimed at southern states, the only states with Jim Crow laws compelling Negroes to ride in the rear of public vehicles. The decision was a victory for those who have opposed Jim Crow laws wherever it appeared, but it is a limited victory. The court ruling applied to nothing except buses which cross state lines. On buses or trailers which operate entirely within a state Negroes still are compelled to ride behind white people. Jim Crow is the name for the way in which Negroes are kept separate from whites. Jim Crow, in some cases as a law and in some as a custom, is a rule of life in the south. For example, Separate railroad waiting rooms for Negroes, separate hospital wards, separate bathing benches, separate schools. White restaurateurs refuse to serve Negroes; if they get into white theaters at all it is in a section apart. Jim Crowism practiced. The north has no Jim Crow laws but it practices Jim Crowism very effectively in many ways and in many places, such as by refusing them seats in certain theaters. But no matter what the form of Jim Crowism, north or south, the Supreme court in this decision left the practice untouched except to ban any law compelling Negroes to ride behind whites on interstate buses. Thus the Supreme court decision knocks out just a little bit of Jim Crowism. Southern Jim Crow laws are about half a century old. They were passed about the turn of the century. Two questions arise: How did the name Jim Crow start? And why did the Supreme court this week limit its ruling to interstate buses? Webster's dictionary says: "Jim Crow—said to be so-called from a Negro song or dance, the refrain of which is 'wheel about and turn about and jump Jim Crow,' popularized about 1830 by T. D. Rice, a famous Negro minstrel." As to the Supreme court decision: Under Virginia law Negroes riding in buses—whether they cross the state line or operate entirely within the state—must ride behind white passengers. Refused to Move to Back A Negro woman, riding an interstate bus in Virginia, was told by the driver to move to the back to make room for white passengers. She refused, was arrested, convicted, and finally appealed to the Supreme court. The court quoted that part of the constitution which says Congress has power to regulate interstate commerce. This is the famous clause giving the Federal government power to regulate interstate commerce but leaving states free to regulate commerce conducted entirely within states. Going on from there, the court said the Federal government, not a state government, is the authority for preventing burdens on interstate commerce. Entitled to Protection Then the court reasoned that the Negro woman was entitled to protection from a burden on interstate commerce. And it said that, being forced to change her seat was a burden since she or any other Negro could be forced under Virginia law to change seats a number of times. So the court limited itself to interstate commerce. Nine other southern states.
