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Plot to Bomb Jap Diet Told

Witness Admits Missiles 'Firecrackers' to Scare Lawmakers
 Tokyo, June 26.—A witness in the war crimes trial of 28 fallen Japanese leaders testified today that witnesses in 1951 plotted to bomb the Diet and seize power, but said under cross-examination the bombs actually were "firecrackers" designed only to scare the lawmakers.

The prosecution witness, Konosuke Shimizu, in whose home the "bombs" were hidden, told the international war crimes tribunal they would "make a loud noise and not hurt anyone."

Helped Avert Incident
 Another witness, Maruko Yoshikawa Tokugawa, a pacifist, said he helped avert the incident by persuading Dr. Shimizu Okawa, a plot ringleader now on trial, to give up the conspiracy.

Tokugawa declared he then induced Shimizu to return the "bombs" to the army because it was "too early" to seize the government.

In direct testimony Shimizu asserted the plot was designed as a cover for the Japanese Army's grab in Manchuria, but it was abandoned because the infamous Mukden incident was substituted.

Shimizu said 300 bombs to be used in the plot actually were brought to his home to be concealed in readiness for a march into the Diet.

Gives Version of Plot
 Shimizu's testimony, read from an affidavit that did not make his own background clear, gave this version of the alleged plot:

In the current trials and now a mental patient was to have led a trip to Manchuria with the Hon. Col. Kingoro Hashimoto (also a defendant and other army leaders had planned the trip).

Okawa later told Shimizu that the plot had failed because the military had backed out—and that Gen. Kuniaki Koiso (another of the defendants) reported "it is direct order from the Army that the plot be abandoned."

Later, in August, 1931, Okawa told Shimizu that Okawa and three Army colonels including Shojiro Higashi, vice chief of staff of the Kwantung Army, and a defendant, would "bring about an incident in Mukden."

Okawa subsequently promoted ultra-nationalist movements as the ultimate purpose of expelling the white race from Asia.

Colonel Kijuro Shidehara, then foreign minister, told the court today that neither he nor War Minister Jiro Minami (now on trial) were informed in advance of the Manchurian incident, and "his cabinet was not in a position to discipline the Army in Manchuria or anywhere else."

The Japanese army's Korean reinforcements into Manchuria not only without informing the cabinet, but also without the sanction of the emperor, Shidehara testified.

Puppeteers to Gather At Waterford Theater

Energetic Artists Organized Ten Years; Will Put on Shows for Each Other, Give Talks

 New York, June 26.—(AP)—New England, long accustomed to summer visitors, fairs and conventions, will be host this week to an unusual festival—the first puppet gathering of the puppeteers of America at Hartford, Conn.

It may be surprising that there are about 300 active puppeteers in America, not to mention hundreds of other people connected with the art.

The energetic artists who operate puppets (any figures under human control and used for dramatic purposes) are a puppet organization 10 years ago to share techniques and explore new uses for their art. They publish a bi-monthly news sheet and bravely work to prompt their art, discouraging the use of such invidious anti-puppet expressions as "puppet rule."

Actually Part of Residence
 This year's festival, June 27-30, will have its headquarters in the Rufus Rose theater, in Waterford, where puppeteers will put on shows for each other and give talks. It is a unique affair designed by Mr. Rose, an Antioch college graduate. It actually is part of his residence and so constructed that 200 people can be seated in the living room. A wall of his shop opens so a truck can be driven in and prop loaded.

Rufus and Margalo Rose are one of several family groups which are in the puppet business. Their children, James, 12 and Rufus, Jr., 10, are professionals. In the last year the family has given an average of one show a week in their theater. It is larger than the Martin Stevens in Middlebury, Indiana, and comparable to the "Theater of the Yale puppeteers" in Hollywood.

Curtailed For Five Years
 The puppeteers of America, both professional and amateur, have been curtailed for five years. Many younger members were in various branches of the armed services. Transportation and other difficulties limited activities.

"The war brought a change in puppet shows," says Paul McPharlin, tall, bespectacled graduate of the University of Michigan, well-known professional and editor of the puppeteers' year book. "Individual puppeteers boiled down their equipment for full technical production and worked up routines. They entered the field of night clubs, vaudeville, and musical comedy through traveling shows, packing their little trunks in a suitcase or two. There was a trend away from string puppets to hand-puppets. The latter require less draperies and properties, afford more freedom in operation."

Presenting Shadow Shows
 Many of the newest puppet shows are presenting shadow shows where all properties—stage, scenery, props, puppets, are flat as cardboard.

America's artists, not forgetting the theatrical uses (the new field in television) now are interested also in such fields as child psychiatry (plays can be acted out to find out what a child reacts to), and occupational therapy (plays give a patient a purpose for using certain muscles).

All puppeteers—whether amateur or professional—have a working acquaintance with theatrical matters. They not only design and manipulate their characters, but select or write plays and music.

As in most arts, the field that impresses the layman are not the ones requiring most skill. For instance, an audience is impressed

Charter Revision

Preliminary Draft of Proposed New Charter For Town of Manchester

The Herald will publish the complete preliminary draft in daily installments. It is suggested that these installments be clipped for reference when the proposed charter is submitted to the voters for final approval.

Chapter IV
General Manager
Section 1. Appointment. At the meeting of the Board of Directors on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in October, 1948, the Board of Directors shall appoint a General Manager who shall be chosen on the basis of his executive and administrative qualifications with special reference to his actual experience in, and his knowledge of, accepted practices in respect to the duties of his office as hereinafter set forth. He need not be a resident of the Town or State, but during his term of office he shall reside within the Town. No member of the Board of Directors shall receive such appointment during the term for which he shall have been elected, nor within one year after the expiration of his term.

Section 2. Powers and Removal. The General Manager shall be appointed for an indefinite term and may be removed for improper performance of his duties by the affirmative vote of five members of the Board of Directors. At least thirty days before such removal the Board of Directors shall be made effective the Board of Directors shall by a majority vote of five members of the Board of Directors make a preliminary resolution stating the reasons for the proposed removal, and a copy of such resolution shall forthwith be mailed by registered mail to the General Manager at his usual place of abode. The General Manager may reply and may appear and be represented by counsel at a public hearing which shall be held by the Board of Directors for a date not less than twenty nor more than thirty days after the adoption of such preliminary resolution. After such public hearing the vote of all its members may adopt a resolution removing the General Manager from office, which may be made effective immediately. The Board of Directors may suspend the General Manager from office and until such removal he shall have access during regular business hours to all records, files and documents in the custody of any town officer pertaining to his conduct as General Manager. It is further provided that if the General Manager shall be found guilty by any court of misdemeanor or malfeasance in office or of any felony, he may be summarily dismissed by the Board of Directors and he shall not be entitled to any salary other than any unpaid balance which may be due him.

Section 3. Salary. The salary of the General Manager shall be fixed by the Board of Directors and it shall not be decreased except at the beginning of the fiscal year of the Town.

Section 4. Dismissal or Disability of General Manager. To perform the duties of the General Manager during his temporary absence or disability, the Board of Directors may appoint an acting manager who shall not be one of its own members, to perform the duties of the General Manager until he shall return or his disability shall cease.

Section 5. Powers and Duties. The General Manager shall be the chief executive officer and the head of the administrative branch of the Town government and none of the administrative duties of the Town shall be performed by any member of the Board of Directors. All rights, powers and duties of the Town not otherwise vested by this act are exclusively vested in the General Manager. He shall have charge of the preparation of the annual report of the Town required by law at stated meetings of the Board of Directors, may participate in any discussion and may make recommendations, but shall not have the right to vote at such meetings. It is the duty of the General Manager to perform such other duties as may be required of him by the Board of Directors, and he shall conform to the provisions of this act.

Section 6. Delegation of Authority During Vacancy of Office. Unless otherwise specially provided for in this act, the General Manager shall have the power to delegate any person to be the acting head of any department, commission, bureau or board appointed by him during the period of any vacancy, absence or disability and until a new appointment shall have been made.

Section 7. Budget and Finance. The fiscal year of the Town government, which shall also be the budget and accounting year shall begin on the fifteenth day of August of each calendar year.

Section 8. Preparation. The General Manager shall prepare and not less than forty-five days prior to the beginning of the fiscal year, shall submit to the Board of Directors a tentative budget for the ensuing fiscal year and an explanatory budget message. Such tentative budget shall include a statement of receipts during the last completed fiscal year, an estimation of receipts for the entire fiscal year, and an estimation of expenditures during the entire fiscal year, all itemized in accordance with a classification approved by the Board of Directors. Such budget shall also include a statement of the expenditures during the last completed fiscal year, the expenditures during the first ten months of the current fiscal year, and an estimation of the expenditures for the entire current fiscal year.

of the Collector of Revenue shall be fixed by the Board of Directors except that such compensation shall not be reduced except at the beginning of a fiscal year. The date on which property taxes shall be due and payable shall be fixed by the Board of Directors at the time when the tax rate is fixed. Section 22. Borrowing in Anticipation of Taxes. In any fiscal year in which the Board of Directors shall fix a tax rate, whether levied or to be levied in such year, the Board of Directors may, by a majority vote of all its members, authorize the borrowing of money by the issuance of negotiable notes of the Town. Such notes may be issued for a period not exceeding one year and may be renewed from time to time but a sum sufficient to pay any such notes which are outstanding at the end of the fiscal year shall be included in the budget for the ensuing year as an expenditure.

Section 23. Borrowing for Capital Improvements. To finance all or any part of the expense of any capital project which the Town may lawfully contract or acquire, the Town may incur indebtedness by issuing negotiable bonds, notes or certificates of indebtedness, subject to the limitations of the general Statutes. Such bonds or notes shall be authorized by a majority vote of all its members of the Board of Directors. No bonds or notes shall be issued until the project for which the bonds or notes are to be issued has been approved by the voters of the Town at any regular or special election for only one half the value of the project.

Section 24. Public Hearings. The Board of Directors shall hold a public hearing not less than thirty days prior to the beginning of the fiscal year at which any elector or taxpayer may have an opportunity to be heard. The Board of Directors shall determine the date of the hearing and shall cause a notice of such hearing to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the Town not less than three times and not less than seven days prior to the date of the hearing. The hearing may be adjourned from time to time by the Board of Directors as it shall deem necessary.

Section 25. Consideration by the Board. After the conclusion of the public hearing the Board of Directors shall continue its consideration of the tentative budget, the Board of Directors may revise its expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year and may increase or decrease any item of expenditure requested by any department or officer of the Town. Whenever it may be deemed necessary for the Board of Directors to hold a public hearing, giving notice of such hearing at least five days in advance and stating in the notice the nature of the proposed additions or increases.

Section 26. Adoption. The final budget shall be adopted by the Board of Directors not less than five days prior to the beginning of the fiscal year. Should the Board of Directors take no final action to adopt the budget on or before the fifth day prior to the beginning of the fiscal year, the Board of Directors shall be deemed to have adopted the budget submitted by the General Manager and it shall be the legal budget of the Town for the fiscal year ensuing.

Section 27. Certification. A copy of the budget as finally adopted shall be certified by the General Manager and recorded in the office of the town clerk. Section 28. Board of Assessors and Board of Tax Review. This section shall not be construed, however, to prevent the levying of bonds to finance public improvements.

Court Allows Will Revision

State Supreme Tribunal Alters Provisions Put In by 1852 Assembly

Hartford, June 25.—The second Executive session of the State Supreme Court has received its second report in 95 years of the terms of the will of William Stanley who in 1852, left property to the church, the revenue from which was to be used for the benefit of the society.

The State Supreme Court yesterday in a unanimous opinion altered certain provisions which had been placed in the ancient will in 1852 by the General Assembly which at that time assembled in provision prohibiting the sale of the property.

Without prejudice to long range plans like that proposed by the committee to adopt immediately measures leading to the outlawing of atomic warfare, the proposal of such a measure has been laid before us by the representative of the Soviet Union.
