Berlin, Aug. 21.—The big men on the campus of what's left of National Berlin university are not known for their football or soccer prowess, but by and large they are known for their ability to get along with their fellow students and American colleagues.

The contrast between the university and American schools in the manner in which party politics infiltrate into every duty corner of the German institution.

Attendance at the three-day conference brings to some 3,000 earnest German students not only the lessons taught in books, but those which are learned in the rugged, practical politics of present-day Germany.

No joyful fraternities life, no joyous fraternities life, no chattering groups of gay girls, no blabbering classes; nothing at all of the light side of scholastic life.

"Serious?" What are they? I asked a young one in faded blue overalls who was pushing a heavy wheelbarrow full of rubble. She was just completing her 8th hour helping to remove debris from the school grounds; she had 114 hours to go.

The most fortunate students have their own books, other lucky ones have been able to bribe the "old" "librarian" who cranks the mackintosh 50,000 volume stack haphazardly in a damp, low ceilinged cellar. The lucky have only their classroom lecture notes.

Average 35 Years Old

More than half the students are teachers, the average student is 35 years old; all of them have 12 years of isolation from the rest of the world to make up.

No part of the population observes political developments with more vigilance than these students. To them the present public emphasis on the "new democracy" is just so much window dressing. "In reality," said one intelligent student in speaking of the older generation, "they are still the same unchangeable, one-sided, hypocritical bunch they have been for the past 32 years."

Teach us all systems, not just one, and let us judge through our own eyes; they beg their professor, although with little hope. As one student put it: "Our pres-

## Klan in Florida Cites Bible for Principles

**Going Cautiously But More or Less Openly About Business of Enrolling Members**

(Third of Six Articles)

Miami, Fla., Aug. 21.—(P)—The Ku Klux Klan never died in Florida. Today it is going cautiously but more or less openly about its business of enrolling "native Protestant white Gentiles who believe in America above all."

When the "invisible empire" silently folded its regalia and suspended operations in Atlanta on April 22, 1944, Florida Klansmen took only a brief summer vacation.

On Sept. 7 of the same year the Ku Klux Klan of Florida obtained a regular business charter in the south Florida town of Palm Beach to the keys, apparently the only section of the state where the table revival has spread.

The Florida Revival Great Mystery Dr. James E. Colson, imperial wizard of the Klan at the time of its suspension, now lives in retirement in Miami. He said the Florida revival was all a great mystery to him.

"I heard that the local Klans are active again, but I know very little about it," Colson said. "I'm not active in the Klan any more and haven't been since the national organization suspended."

The new era of the Klan has shied away from public demonstrations. It has staged no public demonstrations.

**Neither Hooded Nor Masked**

Only once have fiery crosses been burned. The Dade county (Miami) sheriff's office reported that five crosses were lighted Nov. 2, 1945, in front of Negro dwellings northwest of Miami. The sheriff's report said the crosses were burned by white men who were neither hooded nor masked.

On March 28, 1946, The Miami Herald declared in a front-page article that "Local bigots are busy pumping fire again" into the two Miami Klans.

The John E. Gordon Klan No. 5 erected signs on highways leading into Miami welcoming prospective Klan members.

A month later the Klan issued a statement to the press under the imprint of the "great titan of the south province of the state of Florida." It said:

"We are operating under a legal charter under the name Ku Klux Klan of the State of Florida, Inc. We make income tax returns to the Federal government. The Klan does not and will not wear a mask."

"We are not race or religion haters and we do respect all other religions and respect others to respect ours. We are not Nazi or

## Flying Circus At New Haven

**Greatest Aerial Show Ever Seen to Be Put On Aug. 24 and 25**

On August 24 and 25, from 11:00 a. m. on, the flyers of the regular Army Air Force will put on one of the greatest aerial shows ever seen at New Haven. There will be all types of planes including the P-47, the jet-propelled P-51, the P-52; biplanes, Mustangs, Thunderbolts, and all of the other types that made the American Air Force the greatest of all in the recent war. The show is being put on for the benefit of the Civil Air Patrol which has no regular appropriations, and which the AAF is most eager to preserve and expand as a defense and preparedness measure.

The Civil Air Patrol, an auxiliary of the Army Air Force and a federally chartered organization, was supported through the war years by government funds. For the fiscal year of July 1946 to June 1947, the Bureau of Budget made no appropriations for this purpose. Consequently, the AAF agreed to furnish the aircraft, equipment, and personnel for an Air Show in each state, the proceeds from which

would take the place of the funds formerly received from the Government.

Used for CAP Program

The funds realized from the Show will be administered by a Board of Trustees and will be used for the expansion of the CAP program in general and the Cadet Training Program in particular. It will be used to purchase training equipment, issue flight scholarships to the boys and girls of your community, and to instruct them in aviation ground subjects. In short, it guarantees a backlog of aviation-trained youth to take the place of our already aging Air Force.

The Air Show will be staged by a picked team of Army Air Force combat veterans flying the latest and fastest aircraft in the world.

The outstanding feature will be the P-47 "Shooting Star," the jet-propelled fighter which approaches the speed of sound.

P-51 Mustangs, P-47 Thunderbolts will engage in dog-fights, dive bombing and low level strafing attacks. A-26 Invaders and a B-29 Superfortress will put on low-level maneuvers. The Army portion of the show takes 70 minutes and will be staged twice a day. It is designed to keep a flight of aircraft moving in the sky for approximately every thirty seconds.

Between the Army Show there will be civilian contests—balloon racing, spot landing, and paper-busting competition. There will also be a fifteen-truck Caravan of AAF emergency ground equipment.

The civilian flying contests and the ground exhibitions alone make a fascinating show—with the Army aerial circus it will be the most sensational spectacle ever seen in Connecticut.

### Urge Getting Out Big Vote

#### McMahon and Snow See Victory If Democrats Work Hard Enough

Old Greenwich, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The enactment of a Federal fair employment practice commission act, the establishment of a "deline program" for the coming elections and a campaign to get out the vote were urged last night at a meeting of the Fairfield county Democratic organization by Senator McMahon (D-Conn.) and Lt. Gov. Wilbert Snow.

McMahon said that although Connecticut always has been known as an "off-year" Republican state, the Democratic party could win the November election if it worked hard enough and got out the vote.

Speaking of the need for the FEPC, the senior senator from Connecticut asserted, "We must have first and second class citizenship in this nation. Every citizen has the right to work and to be treated as a citizen. It is the duty of every citizen to show called for the spending of more money on education in Connecticut."

"To Persevere" on Education  
"Elementary teaching in the grade schools has broken down," he said, "because we have been too permissive. We need more money for education."

The lieutenant governor praised the educational provisions in the G. I. bill of rights and asserted they should become the "permanent law of the land." He also advocated more money for farmers. This, he said, would induce young men to turn to the farm on completion of their service with the armed forces.

Speaking of the 1945 session of the State General Assembly, he said that body "degraded" Connecticut by the way it handled the minor court judgments. Approximately 20 persons from 18 towns attended the dinner.

Baldwin Planning Vacation  
Hartford, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Governor Baldwin is planning a vacation within the next week or ten days, but he declines to say just where he is going "to rest up" for the coming campaign. The governor said yesterday that he "had temporarily had his fill of politics" and that he was going to take a little rest now. He has had no vacation this summer and foresees no time for one after next month's state convention.

Heads of state and private mental hospitals and brain surgeons of the state have been invited to attend. The spokesman said the operation will be described by Dr. Harry C. Solomon, director of the Boston Psychopathic hospital.

## Some Brethren Picket, Others Get Wet

### Jehovah's Witnesses Fighting Among Themselves Over 'Worldliness'—And The 'Faithful' Attack the Pickets

Cleveland, O.—It's no secret, but the fact is the Jehovah's Witnesses, those 500,000 people throughout the country who are so imbued with the peaceful ways of humanity that they refused to bear arms during two wars, are now fighting among themselves. Even as you and I and Congress. Politics reared its combative head at their recent convention here. There were sharp words and dirty looks. And several of the embattled brethren were given the old heave-ho by the leaders of the Cleveland National assembly. Whereupon the disgruntled ones promptly equipped themselves with signs and picketed a meeting of 50,000 more tractable Witnesses at the Cleveland Stadium. Even as you and I and John L. Lewis.



Witnesses are supposed to follow scriptural teachings to the letter. They refuse to salute the flag as a "graven image," attack organized religion because of its worldly hierarchies, are convinced that Armageddon is just around the corner.

They have faced mob violence and imprisonment as conscientious objectors and as practitioners of street-corner evangelism in this country; many have seen the insides of concentration camps abroad. Their numbers increase yearly and they are now spreading the Word in 28 countries throughout the world as an outgrowth of a small sect started about 1878.

The Watchtower Bible and Tract Society handles all earthly dealings for the movement, including most of its publishing. While worldly persons are interested for more than a million dollars in Brooklyn, N. Y., as well as two farms in New York state. It buys expensive radio time, pays high-priced attorney fees, and its members get into trouble.

Disgruntled members feel that the whole thing has become too worldly.

Mr. F. Fugh of Cheyenne, Wyo., one of the leading "rebels" who has been a pioneer field worker for 20 years, explains that a tight little governing body of self-appointed administrators of God's rule on earth (the Theocratic State) is running things entirely to its own advantage. He says that no criticism is tolerated, that no "secret" is kept, including the bookkeeping.

Why, one who knows who the editor of the Watchtower is, a semi-monthly magazine, is the official mouthpiece.

"Don't misunderstand us," says Roy D. Goodrich of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., who has devoted all his time to the movement since 1912. "We have no fault to find with what they say when they quote the scriptures."

### Authorities Wait Medical Report

Holly Springs, Miss., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Marshall county authorities waited on a medical report from Mississippi State today before proceeding with the case of "the poisoned well."

#### Accountants Continue Probe at Bank; No Further Shortage

The accounting concern of Hartford, Conn., which has been engaged in auditing the 20,000 banking accounts of the Savings Bank of Manchester with 2,000 letters being mailed daily to depositors until all of the accounts of record have been audited, it was revealed today by Bank Commissioner Richard Rappert.

The accounting concern was called in by the officers of the bank as a result of the alleged defalcations of Louis Grosvenor, bank teller, and the possibility that other defalcations may be found in the accounts of the bank employee which is now out on bail pending the complete survey of all of his bank operations extending back over a period of time. No further defalcations were reported in the detailed study of the accounts have been found to date, Commissioner Rappert stated.

Additional Sum Reported  
At a conference held in Hartford before Bank Commissioner Rappert, Grosvenor previously stated that a total sum of \$2,500 representing defalcations of \$600 and \$700 in April and July, this year, respectively, was all the money taken from the bank. As a result of a preliminary audit, an additional \$1,100 was reported by Commissioner Rappert as missing from the account of the accused teller.

Bank Fully Protected  
No claims will be presented against the bank if such are found, until the complete audit of the books of the bank is made, Commissioner Rappert stated. The bank is fully protected against any and all losses resulting, he stated, in the letters now being mailed to depositors by the accounting concern. Bank clients are asked to compare their deposit book records with the statement given them by the auditors and to make note of any discrepancies or changes and report by mail to the Hartford, Conn., office of the accounting concern, 700 Main street, Hartford, Conn.

### Appeal Made To Autoists

#### State Highways Are Being Littered With Trash by Picnickers

Hartford, Aug. 21.—An appeal to motorists to discontinue littering the roadways of Connecticut highways with papers, picnic refuse, bottles and other trash was issued today by State Highway Commissioner William J. Cox. In some locations, he said, the offensive practice had reached epidemic proportions. The situation is particularly bad on the shore routes where beach regulations prohibit picnicking on beaches. Also bad are stretches of highways adjacent to roadside refreshment stands and state maintained picnic areas. The Merritt and Wilbur Cross Parkways are also subjected to this abuse.

Conditions, which have been the subject of much discussion in the department's Bureau of Roadside Development, have reached a point where it is almost impossible for the forces of this bureau, not yet returned to their pre-war complement, to keep up with the clean-up work. Collection of debris has to be done by hand and involves the use of trucks to haul the rubbish away. This takes the time of men and equipment which should be directed to needed routine maintenance. On some of the above resorts on Sundays and holidays it has become necessary to assign men and trucks to a continuous patrol of the areas most affected. Much of the trash is left on the roadways by picnic parties while the balance is thoughtlessly tossed out of car windows.

Practice Is Illegal  
Commissioner Cox points out that not only is the practice objectionable and detrimental to the department's efforts to keep the roadways attractive, it is also illegal under the General Statutes. Perpetrators are subject to fine and imprisonment or both. It has been suggested by citizens that proper signs be posted in an effort to effect control. The department doubts that this measure would be effective since it is believed those who throw refuse from their cars are not the type who generally pay attention to signs. Also it is likely that these persons would be inclined to make sure that no policeman was in sight before throwing the object from the car.

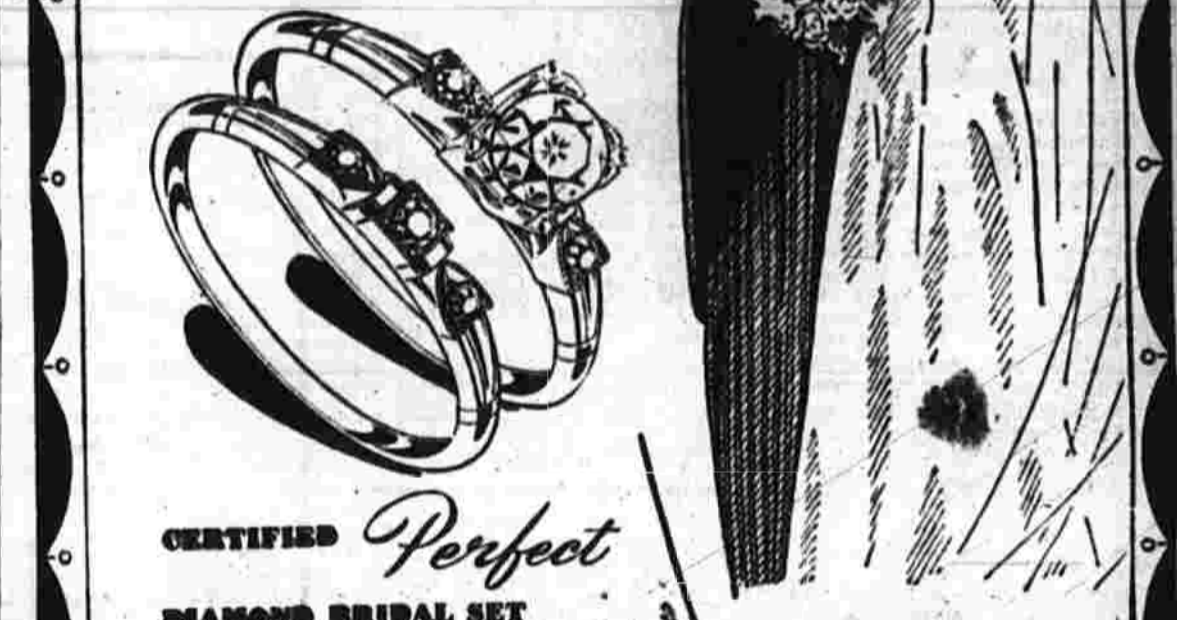
