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### Baldwin Reveals State Public Works Program

Discloses Details of Tentative Five-Year \$120,000,000 Building Plans; 3-Year Study

Harford, Aug. 22 - (AP) - Gov. Raymond E. Baldwin last night disclosed the details of a tentative five-year, \$120,000,000 public works building program which he said was the result of a three-year study of the state's needs in maintaining the full employment during the post-war reconstruction period.

Plans for financing the program will be financed, according to the preliminary schedule, by \$25,000,000 from the cash on hand balance, \$50,000,000 from annual state revenues, both revenue and general funds, and \$45,000,000 from the sale of state bonds.

Improvements at University projects scheduled under the proposed program include the following: construction of the University of Connecticut at Storrs; construction of dormitories, student building and auditorium, \$2,000,000; to be paid for by selling 100,000 acres of land; temporary barracks and utilities throughout the institution building, \$38,500; isolation unit for control of bronchitis, \$20,000; agricultural industries building, \$400,000; horse barn, \$20,000; Racineville Hicks School of Agriculture classroom building, \$200,000; building, \$200,000; to be paid for from proceeds of a gift of 100,000 acres of land; and minor new structures, \$3,346,000.

Pickets Prevent Speech by Smith Minneapolis, Aug. 22 - (AP) - Three hundred pickets blocked the entrance to the hotel where the Learning-picks who stormed the Learning-hotel hotel here Wednesday night, forced cancellation of a speech by Gerald L. K. Smith, Detroit, director of the America First party.

Smith at a later press conference termed the disorder, marked by broken doors to the meeting place and a few hurled chairs, "a shameful exhibition of lawlessness and hoodlumism." He said he was leaving today for a conference with his party leaders in Omaha and would speak to a Denver "young people's" rally Sunday.

Both pickets and Smith's auditors were asked to clear the ballroom by Glen McLean, Minneapolis police chief, reinforced by 50 of his officers, and left peacefully.

Blast at Jet Unit Plant Kills Eight Azusa, Calif., Aug. 22 - (AP) - Eight persons were dead and 30 injured today after a fire and explosion yesterday wrecked the Aero-Jet Engineering Corp. makers of jet-powered take-off units for Navy fighter and bomber planes.

Case of the fire, which apparently licked its way into a volatile fluids mixing plant, remained undisclosed as Navy authorities took charge of the plant. The blast, which blew some of the volatile fire-fighters 60 feet, pounded holes in buildings 60 away, destroyed the plant's fire engine and equipment, and was heard at Wrigley field in Los Angeles, 35 miles distant. It was several hours before the dead, all local residents, were identified. Some were dismembered by the force of the explosion.

### Teachers Will Return Papers

Refuse to Sign Contracts Sent by Norwalk School Board

Norwalk, Aug. 22 - (AP) - Norwalk teachers, in effect going on strike in demands for higher wages and recognition of their association as a collective bargaining agent, said their contracts for the coming school year would be returned, unless today by the Board of Education.

Their action confronted the School board with the alternative of reopening negotiations with the Norwalk Teachers association, which represents virtually all of the city's 225 public school teachers, or attempting to recruit an entire new teaching staff before the 16 schools open Sept. 4.

Report Shortage in State State officials have reported a shortage of teachers in Connecticut. The decision to return the contracts was made by a vote of 220 to 1 Tuesday night at a meeting of the Teachers association, in the face of an ultimatum by the School board that noon, today, or consider themselves no longer employed.

Miss Alice K. Cole, chairman of the Association of Professional Teachers, said a delegation would call upon Dr. Philip A. Jakob, superintendent of schools, at 10 a. m. to return the unsigned contracts.

Miss Cole said that all the teachers at Tuesday's meeting, had turned over unsigned contracts to the association, and that she had received word that four more unsigned contracts were in the mail.

The Board of Education, re-elected in September, had recognized the Teachers' association.

Tate and Mr. and Mrs. William Parker, who were moving into the home, were killed. Mrs. Parker, 34, and her month-old son, Carey Lynn, Troy West, 40, and Janice, 12, a neighbor 2 1/2 who was visiting the Wests, died in a hospital later. The house was blown 100 feet into the air.

### Japanese to Man 106 Liberty Ships

San Francisco, Aug. 22 - (AP) - The first Japanese sailors to visit the west coast since Pearl Harbor day will arrive in San Francisco today.

The Japanese crewmen and officers will man 106 Liberty freighters which were loaned to the defeated government for repatriation of their nations, and are now being sent back to the United States.

Each ship will be manned by 65 Japanese. The ships will sail in small convoys under orders of an American convoy commander.

Upon arrival at west coast ports, Irving F. Wilson, immigration director, said the Japanese crews would be put on another ship and returned home.

Wilson said none will get ashore, but "they will get a chance to see that San Francisco was not bombed out."

### Thomas Urges Merger Action

#### Proposes Truman Order Into Effect Immediately

Washington, Aug. 22.—Senator Elbert Thomas (D-Utah) proposed today that President Truman order into immediate effect a partial merger of Army and Navy functions.

Thomas, who is chairman of the Senate Military committee, told a reporter he is drafting a letter to that effect which Mr. Truman will find on his desk when he returns from his vacation at sea.

Specifically, the senator said he will appeal for establishment of a council of national defense such as is called for in pending merger legislation. This legislation failed to reach a vote in either house before Congress quit three weeks ago.

It is Thomas' contention that the president has full authority to order unification in the entire field of policy making without waiting for Congress to pass on this question.

Concurring in this view, Senator Brewster (R-W. Va.) said in a separate interview that while he does not challenge the president's right to initiate such a change, he thinks it would be much better for Congress to decide the issue when it comes back next January.

There have been reports that Mr. Truman discussed such a course at a recent meeting of Army and Navy leaders and the secretary of State at the White House.

While Thomas said he did not know whether the move actually is under consideration by the president, he added he believes the need for at least a partial merger is pressing daily.

The only spot where we have a single head of military police in Japan, where Gen. Douglas MacArthur is supreme Allied commander, the Utah senator declared.

The success with which General MacArthur is meeting in administering police there illustrates the need for unification elsewhere.

Thomas said he is suggesting to the president that a council for common defense be set up with Secretary of State Byrnes as its chairman.

Under terms of the merger bill, members of the council also would include the proposed national security resources board.

### Chinese Reds Discuss Peace

#### Pro-Government Paper Charges Gas Used in Siege of Tatsung

Nanking, Aug. 22.—Two Chinese Communist leaders discussed the issue of peace for China today with the U. S. ambassador and a tumult of civil war rumors, including a charge the Communists had resorted to poison gas.

The wholly unsupported allegation came from the pro-government newspaper. Yu Kung Pao of Tientsin, which asserted the Communists had used it in their siege of Tatsung, coal and rail center more than 150 miles west of Peking.

U. S. Ambassador John Leighton Stuart met for two hours with Gen. Chou En-Lai, chief Communist negotiator, and Wang Chia, Communist spokesman.

"Have Not Ceased Talk," This indicates, Wang told the Associated Press later, that the Communists have not ceased talks aimed at a peaceful settlement.

At a second meeting, General Marshall, special U. S. envoy, conferred with the two top-ranking United States officials in China—Lieut. Gen. Alvan C. Gillem, Jr., Army chief, and Admiral

### No Evidence of Klan Activity in Michigan

#### State and Local Police Confirm Statements on Inaction; Still Officially Cling to Life

(Fourth of Six Articles) By Arthur W. Evers. Detroit, Aug. 22.—Officials of Catholic, Jewish and Negro organizations say there has been no evidence of any organized Ku Klux Klan activity in Michigan in recent years. State and local police confirm their statements.

However, an official in a position of authority in Detroit told The Associated Press that it would be "premature" to describe the Klan as entirely inactive. The knights still officially cling to life.

The Michigan state charter was granted in 1925 and the KKK still makes statutory annual reports to the State Corporations and Securities commission. John W. Flint, whose name appears on the latest one, declined to say how many members are enrolled.

The old Klan headquarters in downtown Detroit is now occupied by the United Sons of America. George W. Mathis, one of the organizers of the United Sons in 1943 and now its leader, said: "The Communist Klan is not now, and never has been connected with the Ku Klux Klan."

A police file in Detroit describes an official of the United Sons as a man who has "carried on the activities of the Ku Klux Klan." Neither the United Sons nor its leaders has been accused of any unlawful activity.

There are recent reports of Klan activity within factories—especially the big auto plants—around Detroit. It is currently inquiring into such allegations.

Officials of the CIO United Auto Workers report no important evidence of large-scale Klan activity after the First World War.

In 1923 the Michigan Legislature, aiming directly at the Klan, outlawed public meetings of masked persons.

By 1925 the KKK was credited by newspapers with controlling 300,000 votes in Michigan. However, later a national Klan officer said that 1924 was its heyday in the state and its membership in that year at 113,000.

The state Klan was disbanded in 1924, but testimony in a court case disclose that it continued under the guise of the SYMVA club, letters of which stood for "Spend Your Money With America."

The national Klan set emblems in Michigan in 1920, and the Klan was revived and incorporated.

A Detroit mayor once accused the KKK of fomenting race riots. Former Klansmen were identified as members of the Black Legion, a terrorist organization of the 1930s.

### Fails to Get \$8,800 Back

#### Boyington Salvages His Navy Cross and Clothing Out of Romance

San Diego, Calif., Aug. 22.—Lieut. Col. Gregory "Pappy" Boyington salvaged his Navy cross and a suitcase of clothes today out of his romance with Mrs. Lucy Malcolmson and waded out to land who was going to pay the income tax on \$8,800 he didn't get back.

The suborn-haired wife of an Australian businessman was cleared yesterday of Boyington's charges that she had embezzled the money.

Afterward she sent him the Navy cross and clothing by her attorney.

"Is this all I get out of it?" she asked the 22-year-old Marine fighter pilot. "Who is going to pay the income tax?"

Charges dismissed by Judge Municipal Judge Eugene Daney, Jr. following two days preliminary hearing.

Boyington had Mrs. Malcolmson arrested several months ago, charging she wrongfully appropriated \$8,800 of nearly \$20,000 he had entrusted to her while he was overseas.

She maintained she had spent more than the \$8,800 in traveling and other expenses authorized by Boyington in connection with their marriage plans.

Divorce Action Dropped. The marriage didn't come off. Boyington married his present wife, Frances Baker, Hollywood actress, on the day Mrs. Malcolmson said she was to have received her \$8,800. Mrs. Baker said she dropped her divorce action then.

"I'm very relieved it is all over," she told newsmen after the hearing. "Thank God I had those receipts."

"Congratulations," Boyington muttered, as she passed the court all table where he and his wife were sitting.

"I hope you enjoy the money," Miss Baker chimed in.

Rogers said today.

The survey, he said, was the first of its kind in the state. The maps will be used to locate industrial sites of varying requirements for industries seeking to locate in Connecticut.

Maps excavated upon the site of Pompeii—destroyed in 79 A.D.—depict inhabitants of that ill-fated city wearing hats and bonnets.

Price to the new survey, Rogers explained, no adequate maps have existed for a large part of the area. Photographs from the air, and the aerial survey taken by the state in 1944 has become obsolete from the viewpoint of showing currently existing industrial locations.

The areas covered by the project, he said, is that most deficient in up-to-date maps, and future surveys will be needed to complete all the industrial sections of the state.
