The Fifth Week

The Paris Peace Conference in its fifth week, its time to date has been consumed with oratorical shadow-boxing in which the winners of this war have gone through the motions of current enmity toward one another. Only it has been more serious than mere shadow-boxing, these various feints and leads and parries have all been designed to play a part in the final determination of the issues of this conference—there is to be no such final determination. The various powers have been seeking tactical advantages, but they have been missing their targets as well. It is shadow-boxing, but there is a bit of French present too.

A bit of French present seems to come close to giving an accurate description of the hard game into which the diplomats of all nations have now entered.

"On one side" writes a commentator in the nation which is frequently in the middle in the struggle between the East and West, "the position is too great as the totalitarian states are presented as democracies and the enemies of yesterday as allies." That has been the Russian tactic.

"The other side," adds the same French commentator, "repeats hypocritically principles which it could hardly reconcile to its actions." That is the West, weakly and almost automatically repeating its oratorical volleys in its deeds, but, in its actions, yielding to those very same impulses of power politics in which the world's mortal danger lies.

This game of power politics has become so important—perhaps so fatally absorbing—that the task of building a peace seems to have become of secondary importance at Paris. No observer has any very philosophical view, as the conference enters its fifth week, about the future prospects of the east for the conference. None has found any of the spirit of peace present. Perhaps, when they have tempered their patience and gradually shift toward a more reasonable and sincere attitude. But for some time yet, perhaps, the world must watch them play with the diplomatic kindling of new war.

As Hitler Planned It

One war Hitler did win. It was his Spanish design to insure a long range change in the comparative population of Germany and the nations surrounding Germany.

Hitler probably got his idea for this kind of war when, taking over power in 1933, he saw that it would still be some six years before Germany's next bumper crop of soldiers matured. The Kaiser's Germany, fighting from 1914 to 1918, was fighting "one war at a time. Germany during the four years of the first World War dropped off 3,000,000. And this meant that Hitler had to wait until 1920 or twenty years after the German soldiers of the first war got back home—for his first full crop of new soldiers.

So when it came to fighting his own war, Hitler had some original ideas about what he should leave for the future. He attacked the problem from two angles. First, on the purely domestic side of things, he did everything possible to see that the war would have relatively little influence on the rate of increase of the German race. Where most other nations considered that the most impor-

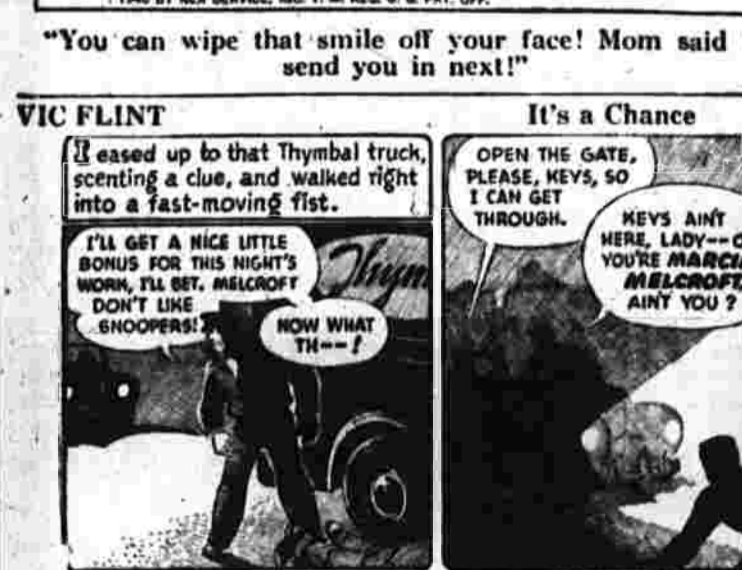
