There were many imperfections in the way the United Nations met this week, but the main thing was that it met at all. It is to be hoped that it will meet more frequently in the future.

Aggression was halted, and the spread of war prevented. So what better guarantee should Korea want than that the United Nations still stands united? Or that the nations which are supposed to be its members should want to give, that that our allies stand ready to undertake United Nations action against aggression anywhere?

But, no. The policy between Korea and ourselves says that a United Nations guarantee is better than a United Nations guarantee. Korea is safer with us than with the United Nations, and that we, too, might do better moving by ourselves than moving under the United Nations jurisdiction. Such differences are not only regrettable, but they are also questionable, from the point of view that what the world needs most is to have the United Nations concept grow, but they are also questionable, from the realistic point of view. The cause which fought aggression in Korea was stronger when it was a United Nations cause than it is now, because the cause of any one great nation, simply because "world" moral strength attached itself to it as it would never have done to any one intervention in Korea.

We need people in our administration who will do so carefully the spending of our money.

In the matter of the Keeney School, however, 30 qualified men and women have been laboring for 16 months over the building department. **Ab, Those Winters!**

We, too, remember what were the old-fashioned winters. They would begin, in mid-December, with a slight thaw, then a cold, a touch of snow and a touch of ice, and a touch of locust.

But by Christmas the pussy-winter would be pushing out again. The traditional January that would start on New Year's Day, with a strong hot wind straight from the southland, and the thaw would last all of January, with beautiful warm sun and lush moonlight nights. On Groundhog Day, so that no shadow could be seen. The first red wing black-birds and the first pine siskin would be in evidence on Feb. 28. On March 11 the peepers would start piping from the swamps. On St. Patrick's Day the farmers would start plowing under the grain winter rye, lest it grow too tall.

There would hardly be a day or night in which the citizens of New England did not feel a focal lack of envy for those who had gone through the nonsense of arranging to spend the winter in Florida.

These winters were benevolent to one and all. No black birds struck into the hearts of the bud on forsythia, and that on some hillside there would be no peepers. This thought came to us after walking from the barn with our pail of milk, we discovered that the milk had frozen on the way to the house. Come to think of it, there had been a curious writing upon the milking process, as if insects were shooting down into the pail.

Little forsythia, no peepers, we thought again as Ajax, the rooster, made his first crow of the morning, a muffled one, with his head still tucked under his wing.

Of all living things this morning, only the crows, with their black, cold hearts, seemed to float across the morning sun as if there were nothing unusual about the weather.

But in the good, old-fashioned days, there was no morning in which the robins and the blue birds would not be saluting that morning sun.

There is no doubt about it. There is something to be said for those old-fashioned winters, and a good many of us live in hopes of having them again.

**Surprise Customer**

The possibility that that great friend of ours, Soviet Russia, may lead us a hand in solving our farm problem is raised by the latest news out of Washington. It is that agents representing Russia have filed applications for licenses to export big chunks of two of the farm products our government now owns, to its great embarrassment, as surplus.

The government now owns approximately 250,000,000 pounds of butter and 825,000,000 pounds of surplus oil. Russia is now reported eager to buy about 150,000,000 pounds of butter, and an equal amount of softness oil. This would be the largest sale of surplus commodities ever made by the government, and it would make quite a dent in that surplus permanently, in order to give his proposed farm program a clean start to start with.

But Russia has not yet obtained our official permission to buy. One question is whether the administration wants to engage in such a large deal with Russia, even though these two items are not so much needed as they once were. The Russian proposition is obviously a friendly one, in the direction of establishing more normalcy in the relations between the two countries, and the administration may not want to let such normalcy come too fast—particularly when it is not accompanied by any hard and fast significant agreements in the diplomatic field.

One other factor also, apparently, has to be considered. If Russia succeeds in buying these things here, from us, that may lessen her need to buy them from other nations who are friends of ours and who need the trade for themselves. It may be that we do not want to cut any of our good friends out of the Russian market.

This is a novel thought; isn't it? Only yesterday, it seems, we were pressing as much of an economic boycott against Russia as we could. But now one of the factors in our own decision on a possible piece of trade with Russia is that we may hesitate to take this particular trade away from some other free world nation.

The incident drives home one point. Short of those hard and fast diplomatic agreements which are the pronounced objects of American policy, the new regime in Russia is doing everything it can to produce an illusion of change toward normalcy in the world. This Russian purchasing in the outside world is only one of many ways in which the Iron Curtain is being lowered these days. Perhaps the curtain can be raised again, at the Kremlin's whim. But perhaps it can't.

**The Treaty With Korea**

Quite clearly, there are exigencies of policy which have made the special mutual defense treaty between the United States and Korea seem necessary to President Eisenhower and the State Department. Primarily, this treaty, now submitted to the Senate for consideration and ratification, gives us some kind of diplomatic hold on President Eise, and in an assurance and relationship we are tending to him in the expectation that he, in turn, will behave himself and not recognize the Korean war.

This special reason for the treaty does not, however, alter the main reason for regretting it. This treaty is a two-nation arrangement, which pays lip service to the ideal of collective security, but which, nevertheless, ignores the manner in which collective security has already operated with respect to Korea.

South Korea today owes its continued existence to the United Nations. And we owe to the United Nations the fact that we were able to intervene in Korea against aggression without finding ourselves automatically in World War III. In short, Korea provided the great testing place for the United Nations as a force capable of preserving its own law against aggression.

The Reds insisted on more time for interviews with 22,028 anti-Communist Chinese and Chinese and that all prisoners be kept in military custody until a peace conference decides their fate.

The Indians said they would go ahead with the transfer of anti-Communist prisoners back to UN custody starting at 9 a. m. Wednesday (7 p. m. EST Tuesday). The Allies said they would be freed at midnight Friday. French POWs, including 1,000 Chinese, presumably will remain in Indian custody at least temporarily.
