### McCarthy to Seek Reason For McLeod Power Loss

Washington, March 2 (AP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) said today he will demand an official explanation of Secretary of State Dulles' order stripping R. W. Scott McLeod of authority over State Department personnel.

The department announced yesterday that McLeod, a close personal friend of McCarthy's, will have charge only of security and consular matters from now on. McLeod has been handling both security and personnel for the department and recently stated he regards these "two distinct functions" as personal office. He had been in charge of the department since the order, McLeod told McCarthy, "has made it infinitely more difficult for me to do a good job of running the department of subversion."

McCarthy also said the new order "just doesn't do good on the surface."

The Wisconsin Senator and the Army Secretary waged open warfare "until last week over McCarthy's handling of Army vetoes in his probe of alleged Communist 'colluding' by the Army. They made a 'peace pact' which averted a nationally televised showdown.

But that pact—a memorandum of understanding—was widely regarded as a Stevens surrender to McCarthy. Stevens stoutly denied this and after White House conference, he issued a statement in which he insisted that he would accede to withdrawing "Army vetoes" only if the government could be assured that the vetoes would be applied to a 10-mile radius around Mong Hsat, Mong Yaw and Pan Yang until March 31.

Meanwhile, in Indonesia, the French announced today they would wipe the village of Long Kiet in the Red River delta, off the map because it was an ambush site for the Communist-led Vietminh rebels.

French troops, using knives and hatchets, chopped up the hamlet's bamboo and straw thatched huts, long decorated with 1,000 or so rice growing Vietminh flags.

The village was six miles southwest of Nam Dinh, 55 miles south of Hanoi.

Its deserted huts had been used day and night by the Vietminh as their headquarters for ambulances on French and Vietnamese troops moving along the road to Nam Dinh.

The French engineers also cleared a wide area around Long Kiet to destroy potential cover for the rebels.

Elsewhere in the Delta today the French reported killing Vietminh and capturing 24 in minor mopups.

Heavy detective reinforcements were assigned to Puerto Rican sections of the city and authorities were quick to act against possible disorders. It is known that FBI agents have been called into the city, acting on the theory that the shooting plot was hatched here.

Friends and relatives of the four policemen were questioned by the FBI and New York Police. Literally hundreds of Puerto Rican Nationalist party were set in the homes of two of the four.

Three arrests were made. One was assigned to guard Grace Stanton, the mother of one of the slain policemen, and another to guard Robert F. Wagner, Jr., a member of the House of Representatives.

City Hall also was given special guards with the understanding that two men boosted to five men and a sergeant. Five detectives also were assigned there. The other two were ordered to be on hand today.

FBI agents declined to comment on the raid.
